Baruch May Head Civilian Group to Study G-M Strike

Lobo Strength a Big Surprise to Breckenridge

An outmanned but game Cisco Lobo eleven Thursday afternoon in defeat served notice on a perennially invincible Breckenridge team that the days of Buckaroo domination of District 9-AA football are rapidly waning.

Breckenridge, a fine and sportsmanlike outfit, came off the field with little honor to add to the long gallery of their victories over down-trodden Cisco, yielding to the Cisco lads credit for superior line play and the most thrilling play of the game. The score was 26 to 13, an outcome vividly in contrast with Buckaroo victories of the past ten years.

Breckenridge partisans, obviously disappointed at this margin of their victory, blamed "flu" for a shuffled lineup, but all of the Buck players were on hand and used with effect, while the Cisco team was also weakened by illness and injuries, Sauls with flu and Noble with a shoulder injury and a serious boil on his arm. The Cisco team was at disadvantage in having little reserve strength to shuffle with.

By United Press

The United Automobile Workers Union (CIO) today sought the aid of an "impartial" group of persons from public life in settling the 10-day strike that has halted car production in General Motors Corporation plants.

The announcement came as the number of American workers idle because of strikes and shutdowns rose to more than 638,000, highest figure in several weeks.

UAW officials invited the persons to meet in Detroit next Tuesday and Wednesday to examine transcripts of union negotiations with General Motors and recommend a settlement of the strike.

Union Vice President Walter Reuther said Bernard Baruch, New York financier and adviser to presidents, was suggested as head of the committee. He did not say whether Baruch had accepted.

A break in the bitter UAW strike against the Ford Motor Company of Canada, at Windsor, Ont., was expected as 8,000 sympathy strikers prepared to return to work in 28 plants.

Their return would leave 2,000 other sympathizers and 10,000 Ford workers on strike.

Hess Says He Is Sane; That He Has Been Faking

NUENBERG, Ger., Nov. 30. (U.P.) The war crimes trial flared up dramatically today when Rudolf Hess told the court he had been faking a loss of memory and a Nazi espionage chief testified that the Germans plotted to murder Gen. Maxime Weygand and Henri Giraud.

Toward the end of the session Hess himself strode to the stand to declare defiantly that he was mentally fit and ready for trial. His counsel, who had pleaded passionately that the charges against Hess be quashed, said "that proves he's crazy." The court did not rule immediately.

Lord Justice Sir Geoffrey Lawrence, British member of the tribunal, proposed that Hess should go to the stand and tell the court how he felt.

Hess leaped up, grabbed a sheaf of notes from his coat pocket, and began speaking slowly, in an even, controlled voice.

"At the beginning I gave my counsel a note saying I believed the proceedings could be shortened if I were allowed to speak myself," he said.

He said he had intended to save the "surprise" until later in the proceedings, but gave no reason why he decided to spring it when he did.

Speaking from scribbled notes, Hess said, solemnly: "My memory is again in order." He paused for effect and resumed: "The reasons I simulated a loss of memory were tactical."

He said he had hoodwinked his own counsel, as well as a corps of 10 of the greatest psychiatrists the four Allied Nations had to offer.

SWIMMING RECORDS. NEW YORK, Nov. 30. — Three of Alan Ford's swimming marks are among the 25 record applications up for approval at next week's national AAU meeting in Richmond. The Yale star was timed last January in 55.7 for the 100 meters and 56.4 for the 110-yard distance. In February he churned the 100-yard dash in 49.4.

AUSTIN, Nov. 30. (U.P.) — Employees in the secretary of state's office are getting Christmas cards from Waylon Galloway early this year — and what cards they are!

Galloway is an office boy and claims the distinction of being the smallest state employee. Actually the cards are 1946 calendars. Beneath the pictures, Waylon had the following printed:

"Compliments of Waylon H. Galloway, state's smallest employee; age 21, weight 50 pounds, height 43 inches. Box 2305, Capitol Station, Austin, Texas."

All of the pictures on the calendars are different. One he handed out was titled, "Man's Best Friend." It showed a Scottie dog tugging at a girl's skirt and exposing a neatly-stocking leg.

The calendars were so popular Waylon decided to give the 200 away before Christmas, he said.

Memorial Certificates for Texans Killed During War

AUSTIN, Nov. 30. (U.P.) — Next of kin of more than 8,000 Texans killed in World War II have received memorial certificates from the state.

Texas is believed to be the only state awarding the certificates, which were authorized by the 48th session of the legislature. Other states, Colorado the most recent, have asked for copies.

Names of the valiant Texans who died in the armed services are furnished by the war and navy departments. Of course 8,000 is not the total number of Texans killed. It was some time after the certificates were authorized in 1943 before the first list of casualties was received. Lists are still coming in.

First they came from the war department, and it was after that that the navy department provided lists of navy, marine and merchant marine personnel. The 13 x 17-inch semi-cardboard certificates read:

"Be it known that the State of Texas places the name of (name of deceased) upon the roll of those who have rendered the highest service. The loss of his life in the service of his country in World War II will always be remembered by those who love freedom."

"In humble recognition of his sacrifice, the legislature of Texas, in the name of its people, has directed me to acknowledge the debt of free men to him who gave his life that others might live, and commend him to the living memory of Texans everywhere."

The certificate is signed by Gov. Coke R. Stevenson and attested by Secretary of State Claude Isbell.

Bronze Star Citation Reads Good to Cisco People

Mrs. Lafoye A. Lenz, the former Miss Dixie Barker, has received a handsome bronze star medal citation awarded her husband, Pvt. Lafoye A. Lenz, of which she is very proud.

Private Lenz, who was born at Roscoe and reared in Cisco, is nearing his 20th birthday and is now with the occupation forces in Germany. He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. W. E. Lenz of Cisco and has been in the service since August of last year. He also has three battle stars. The citation reads as follows:

"Lafoye A. Lenz, private, headquarters, Second Battalion, 255th Infantry Regiment, for heroic achievement in action on April 15, 1945, in the vicinity of Waldenburg, Germany. When the rifle company was in the attack, one of our supporting tanks was immobilized and mired in the mud, blocking the road. Private Lenz, under heavy artillery, mortar and small arms fire, worked for five hours to free the tank so that it could be dragged from the path of the remaining tanks. On completing this he helped repair the road into town, enabling the tanks and the company to go forward again and successfully complete their mission. The bravery and devotion to duty displayed by Private Lenz reflect credit upon himself and upon the Armed Forces of the United States. Entered military service from Cisco, Texas. F. M. HARRIS, Brigadier General, U. S. Army, Commanding."

US. May Ease Nationwide Sugar Shortage Soon

WASHINGTON, Nov. 30. — Cries arose in congress today for government action to ease sugar shortages.

Both Republicans and Democrats joined in the clamor. Meanwhile, a two-day congressional investigation of the situation gathered steam.

The chief demand for federal action came from an unofficial Republican food study committee. Acting as its spokesman, Rep. Jonkman (R-Mich.) said in a speech prepared for house delivery:

1. A survey by the GOP group showed "there will be 1,500,000 more tons of sugar for United States civilians in 1946 than in 1945."

2. Accordingly, the government should announce immediately an increase in sugar rations, the report concluded.

ARMOUR MEN VOTING. FORT WORTH, Nov. 30. — Some 200 employees of the Armour and company's Fort Worth plant and the Fort Worth stockyards company, vote today in a nationwide strike ballot.

Communist Paper Asks Marshall to Remove US Troops

CHUNGKING, Nov. 30. (U.P.) — The Communist New China Daily today urged General of the Army Geo. C. Marshall to withdraw American troops from China immediately and get them home by Christmas.

At the same time, a Tass Agency report from Changchun, capital of Manchuria, said that Soviet troops will remain in Manchuria "for some time" after the original Dec. 3 withdrawal date, at the request of the Chungking government.

The Lobos tightened up on their pass defense in that period, too, and produced the most thrilling play of the game when Tipton passed to Williams, who lateraled to Harrelson for the score in a total gain of 54 yards. Breckenridge had Williams covered with two men all afternoon but the stellar Cisco

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Cisco made six first downs to ten for the Buckaroos, gained 105 yards passing to Breckenridge's 52, and 57 yards rushing to 162 for the Buckaroos.

end shook off the defensive screen to take Tipton's perfect toss and, when tackled, lobbed the ball to Harrelson, who outran the Buck secondary for the count.

Harrelson's kick was good and the scoring record of the second half gives the Lobos a one-point advantage.

Fields played his fine game at center, Hill was a standout at guard, Baum at the opposite guard took care of his assignment splendidly, while both Williams and Pence, playing positions in the path of the Buckaroos' most potent offense, were a considerable disappointment to Breckenridge.

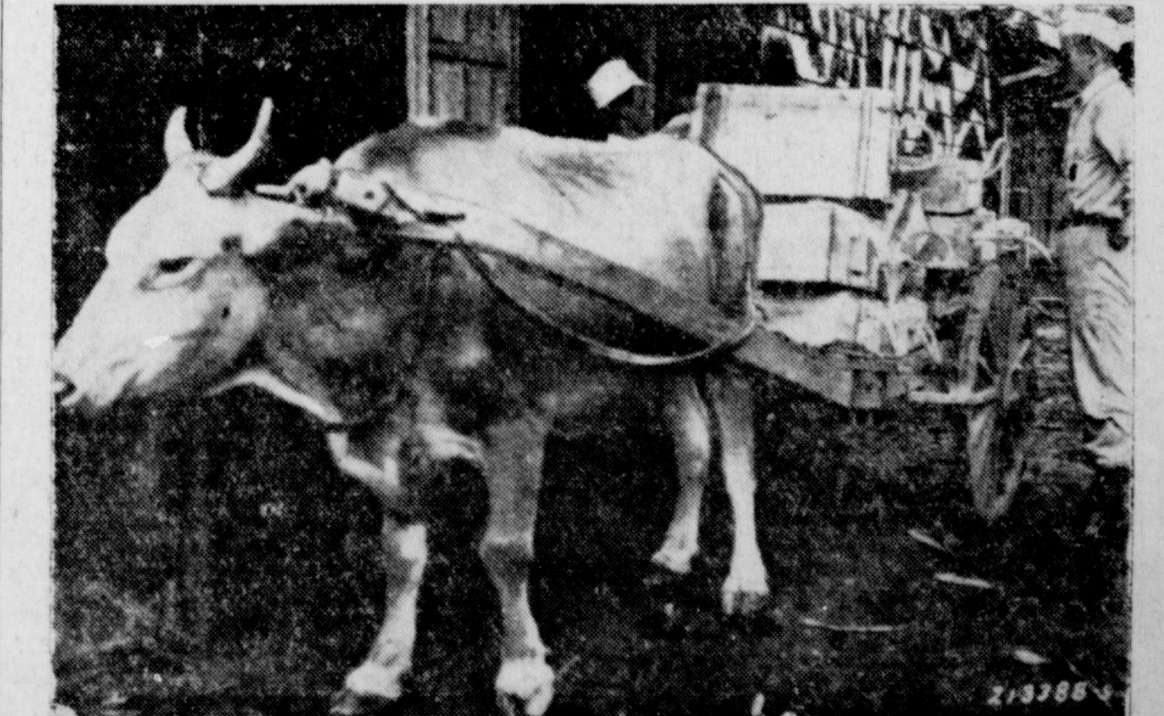
