Carrs Have 2 of Hal Lavery Will 3 Sons at Home; Become City Secretary on Dec. 17

Mr. and Mrs. R. T. Carr, Lake Bernie Road, who had three sons in the service — all Cisco-born — now have two of the young men at home with them. The third is stationed at Amarillo with the navy air corps.

J. D. Carr, 22, who spent almost two years with the Seabees in the south Pacific, has been discharged.

Raby J. Carr, 21, has been discharged after spending 22 months in Germany. He was a heavy artilleryman and was attached to the forces of Gen. George Patton. Otis Carr, 19, was attached to an airplane carrier operating in Okinawa waters when his ship was blown up by the Japs. He was later transferred to the air corps and is now at Amarillo.

The Carrs are very happy to have two of their sons at home after the trying days of war and look forward to the early return of the third boy. The father started Saturday that in addition to all three sons having been born in Cisco, it might also be interesting to mention that all three were delivered at birth by the same physician — Dr. F. E. Clark of Cisco.

Sheriff Hart to Be County Judge Candidate, 1946

John Hart, sheriff of Eastland county, called at the Daily Press office Saturday and stated that he had definitely determined to become a candidate for the office of county judge in the Democratic primaries of next year.

Mr. Hart has been sheriff of the county for three terms and was formerly county tax collector, also serving three terms in the latter office.

The high sheriff is a native of Eastland county, has a pleasing personality and he and Mrs. Hart are the parents of four children — three sons and a married daughter. Two of the sons served with the armed forces during the late war, one of them overseas.

Wm. C. Campbell President Eastland Bank, Dies

William C. Campbell, president of the Eastland National Bank since its organization, Nov. 4, 1934, died at his home in Eastland Saturday morning. He was 75 years of age and a native of Findlay, O.

Funeral arrangements at noon Saturday awaited the arrival of his son Verne C. Campbell from Drumwright, Okla. It was thought likely that the body would be returned to Findlay, O., for burial.

Mr. Campbell, long-time resident of Eastland and one of the city's most progressive citizens, spent 51 years in the oil business, from which he retired about three years ago. He was with the Prairie Oil & Gas company at Eastland until that organization was acquired by Sinclair and served with the Sinclair company until his retirement.

Besides his wife and son, deceased is survived by three brothers and two sisters, as follows: F. D. Campbell, Tulsa; George Campbell, Findlay, O.; E. V. Campbell, Ponca City, Okla.; Mrs. F. M. Saye, Winfield, Kas.; Mrs. F. A. Hoker, Findlay, O.

Legion Hopes For Big Crowd at Monday Night Session

Cisco Legion members will hold an important session Monday night at Laguna Hotel. Time of meeting is 7:30 and all vets of both wars are invited and urged to be present.

Emphasizing the desire for a large turnout at the meeting, a member of the Legion expressed himself thusly:

"Numbers of legionnaires have not attended meetings for some time and there are many eligible men who have not yet joined. It would be a real pleasure to have these men with us Monday night, and they can be very helpful in a practical way.

"Matters of the utmost importance will be discussed, including educational opportunities under G. I. Bill of Rights, repairing of the Country club at Lake Cisco as a temporary meeting place and place of entertainment for legionnaires and members of the Country club, and further work on plans for the construction of a permanent home for the Legion on the old Elks club property — as well as other matters of vital interest to the Legion and the city as a whole."

Kidnaper Phones Father He'll Get Babe Back in Box

CHELSEA, Mass., Dec. 8. — Detectives sought desperately Saturday to find the person who told the father of kidnaped 6-month-old Ronald Carlin, that the child would be returned "in a box."

James J. Carlan, a Navy man, told police a man telephoned him Friday night and said: "Tell your double-crossing wife that the deal's off because she tipped the police. Tell her you'll get the baby back in a box."

Little Ronald was taken from his carriage, near his home, on the afternoon of Nov. 28. At the time, children told of seeing "a woman in black" take the baby.

Reds Determined to Move Troops Into Japan Area

TOKYO, Dec. 8. — An Allied headquarters official today confirmed a report that a division of Russian troops would arrive in the Japanese home islands early in 1946.

Gen. Douglas MacArthur's planning and operations section said he had no information on reports that the Russians were sending 20,000 troops to join the occupation of Japan, however.

The matter was reported still unsettled in high diplomatic quarters because the Russians want to occupy Hokkaido under their own administration while the Americans are insisting that all Allied token occupation forces be under General MacArthur, and integrated under the Eighth Army.

Figures show Management Can Hike Wages 10 Percent

WASHINGTON, Dec. 8. — Careful study here of price outlook by the Bureau of Foreign and Domestic Commerce concludes that management can boost wage average by 10 per cent immediately, with still more increases possible when reconversion is completed.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 8. — In a sharp rejection of a White House appeal for the end of the General Motors shutdown, the United Automobile Workers Union — CIO — tonight accused President Truman of using a "policeman's club" to abrogate the right to strike.

UAW President R. J. Thomas sternly warned the president that he was "striking at the heart of the program which led to a Democratic election victory in 1941."

The powerful union is mobilizing its 650,000 members for a fight against the administration's labor legislation proposals and the wage-dispute paralyzing General Motors appears no nearer settlement now than when 175,000 workers struck at 93 GM plants, eighteen days ago.

While the break with the White House was gathering in fury, the UAW turned to another government arm for support. Thomas yesterday revealed a report from Atty. Gen. Tom C. Clark that General Motors was under investigation for possible anti-trust violations.

When reached at Birmingham, Ala., Clark confirmed the report, but said the study had been started five or six months ago — or long before the UAW filed a complaint charging a GM stranglehold on production of fuel pumps for the entire automotive industry.

Nazis Heard FDR-Churchill Pre-War Phone Talks

WASHINGTON, Dec. 8. (U.P.) — Gen. George C. Marshall disclosed today that Germans intercepted pre-war telephone conversations between the late President Roosevelt and former British Prime Minister Winston Churchill.

He told the Pearl Harbor investigating committee that the knowledge of the German interceptions may have been one reason why he did not telephone a war warning to Hawaii on the morning of Dec. 7, 1941.

The message was dispatched by Western Union and Commercial Cable and did not reach Lt. Gen. Walter C. Short, Hawaiian army commander, until hours after the Japanese sneak attack.

Under questioning by committee members, Marshall took on his own shoulders a share in war department responsibility for not realizing in late November that the command of Short was not properly alerted for a surprise attack. In response to a warning from Washington of possible hostilities, Short sent a reply indicating his command was alerted for sabotage only.

Marshall's first warning, the one to which Short replied was sent Nov. 27, 1941. The second, which arrived too late, was sent a short time before the Dec. 7 attack.

Asked why he did not call Short directly by telephone to deliver the second warning, Marshall alluded to the Roosevelt-Churchill talks.

"I'm not sure, looking back on it now, whether that was the reason I did not use the telephone at that time," Marshall said.

Marshall explained security was a consideration. He knew that the message, as it was sent, would be in code. He was not sure, however, whether that was the reason he did not use the telephone. He told the committee that every effort was being made not to give the Japs a chance to claim that this country took the first overt action.

Biggest Congressional Row May Start Next Week

WASHINGTON, Dec. 8. — Look for year's biggest congressional row to break next week.

Labor legislation will be up on the House floor. Bitterness repressed on both sides during the war will flare out.

Fight will come when Smith-Connelly repealer is called up for action. Rules committee attached Arends amendment which would outlaw for a year any union striking in violation of a contract; also attached new restrictions on CIO-PAC activity. Administration forces will try to have new Truman formula, modeled after Railway Labor Act, substituted even though hearings will not be complete. Administration hopes to kill Arends amendment, pass Smith-Connelly repealer and Truman bill in some compromise form. More likely: Punitive anti-labor bill will pass House, languish in Senate until after holidays.

Meanwhile White House, troubled by hostile labor reaction, is trying to regain favor with Phil Murray, William Green by putting heat on for unemployment compensation bill, now moldering in House ways and means committee. Indications are committee will report substitute bill to reimburse states for unemployment insurance paid to government.

Latest New York gossip says Eleanor Roosevelt will run for House seat of Rep. Samuel Dickstein if plans fall through for having Sen. Mead enter the gubernatorial race, with Mrs. Roosevelt running for Senator.

TEXAS U. HOLIDAYS.

AUSTIN, Dec. 8. — Official Christmas holidays for the University of Texas will be from 1 p. m., Dec. 22, through Dec. 27, Dr. T. S. Painter, acting president, said Saturday. New Year's Day also will be an official holiday, for the first time since 1943.

EIGHTEEN KILLED.

BILLINGS, Mont., Dec. 8. (U.P.) — Eighteen persons, including 16 overseas soldiers and two civilians, were killed and five others injured today when a B-47 army transport plane crashed and burned one mile south of the Billings airport during a blinding snow storm.

Baird Won Bi-district From Greyhounds, 14 to 12

Baird high school Bears, champions of District 7-B, defeated Strawn Greyhounds, District 8-B titlists, 14 to 12 in a bi-district championship game at Chesley Field Friday night before a widely cheering crowd of 1,200 fans.

Baird, its attack led by D. Nordyke, completely dominated first half play, scoring one touchdown in the first and another in the second through what seemed an utterly helpless Strawn eleven. The capable Baird fullback, whose running, passing and educated toe were the difference between the two elevens, ran the ball over for the first score in a series of sweeping end runs, and threw a 40-yard pass for the second.

The second half saw one of those phenomena of high school football in which a complete reversal of form occurred. From the moment a Strawn back captured a mid-air fumble and scampered half the length of the field to the ten-yard line, it was Baird who seemed helpless and Strawn the aggressor. That break blunted another Baird surge which seemed headed for pay dirt.

Strawn deserted its futile end-run tactics and began to crack the center of the Baird line from the T formation. David Kenny, Baird full, furnished the power, rushing over in three plays. The Greyhounds hawked a second Baird fumble on an attempted reverse play to begin their second touchdown drive, taking the ball on the Baird 40 and plunging and passing to the score which Reibe garnered on a quarterback sneak from about the two-yard line. Both Strawn attempts for extra point were blocked.

Loboes Meet Mavericks at Eastland, Tuesday

The Cisco Loboes will go to Eastland Tuesday night for a return game with the Mavericks after defeating the Eastland team 20 to 16 in opening their basketball season here Thursday night.

Cisco scored 16 points in the first half but were held to only four in the second half by a tight Eastland defense, while the Mavericks rang up 11 of their count in that period.

Both teams showed lack of practice, the Loboes having worked out only three days since the close of the football season. A tendency to individual performance and neglect of team play was characteristic of the Lobo offense and this proved costly in the second period. However, the boys showed considerable promise and an ability to control the ball and the coaches were hopeful that by the opening of the conference season they will be able to put a smooth functioning group on the floor. The work of Noble, who had never played basketball before, was particularly pleasing.

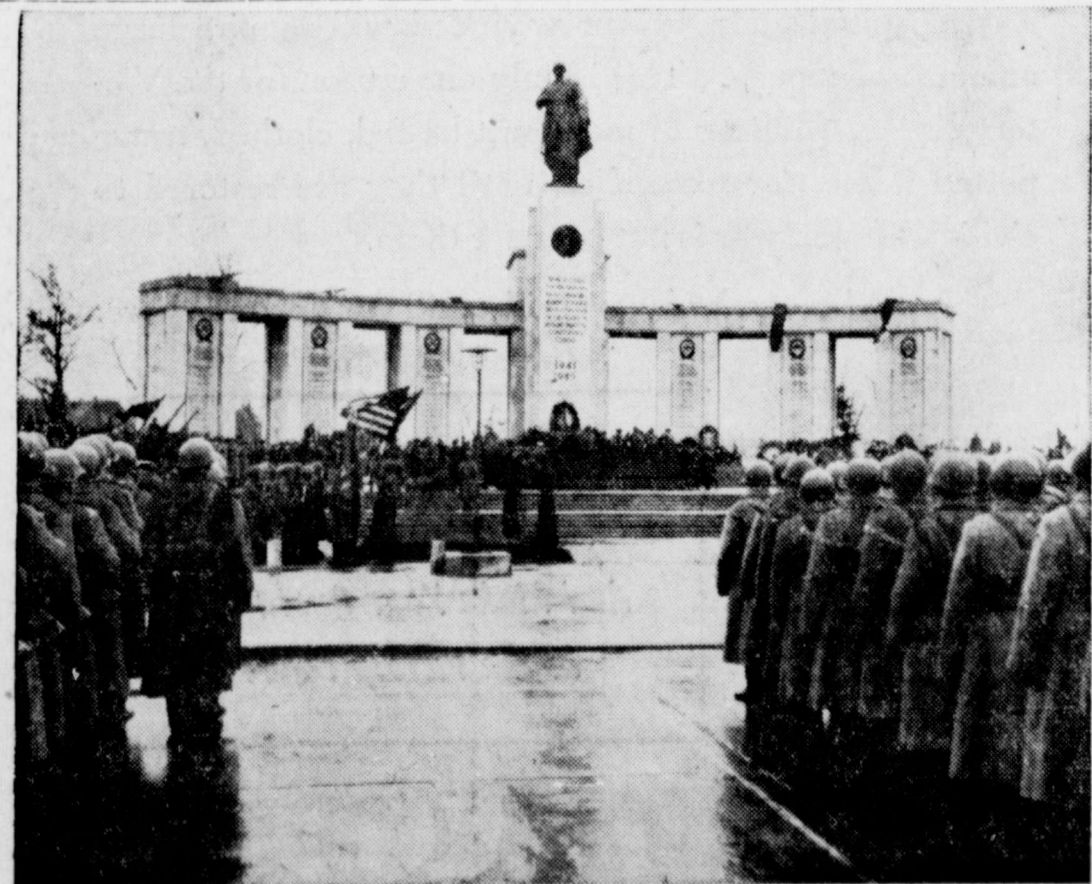
Coach O. V. Overall has other games scheduled with Moran and in a tournament at McMurry college next weekend in which he hopes to develop the team.
