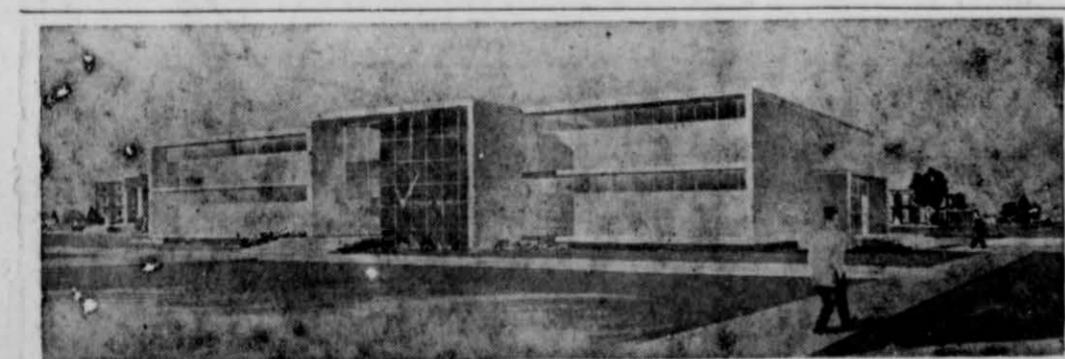
These men had not intended spraying for greenbugs so their wheat will be used to determine the effectiveness of different insecticides.

A&M Specialists To Study County Vegetable Chances

Texas A & M is looking about over Castro County to see what it can do to evaluate a possible vegetable-growing program.

Joe E. Cole, associate County Agent working in the horticulture field here, and H. M. Sorenson of A & M have started a survey to see what could be done about vegetable raising as a basic crop in this area.

Most agriculturists feel the High Plains would be a good producer of vegetable crops if the market were available. This will be part of the project of the A & M representatives. As things stand now, year-around storage would necessarily be available for perishable vegetables before such a market could be developed.

Anyone interested in vegetable growing in Castro County is urged to contact Marvin Simms, Castro County Agent. At present relatively few vegetables are grown in the county. Findings of these men will be reported at a later date.

The permit requirement is no reflection on the salesmen or their products, Noble said, but serve primarily as a city tax. While these men are operating in Dimmitt they are essentially merchants and subject to taxation the same as local store operators.

Any transient person selling goods in Dimmitt without a permit should be referred to the City Hall, Noble said.



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Deaf Smith REA To Give Rebate To Irrigators Soon

At a meeting of the Board of Directors of Deaf Smith County Electric Cooperative, Inc., on February 1, 1956, it was voted that all members of the cooperative should receive a 10 percent cash rate adjustment check at the annual meeting to be held on April 21st. This adjustment will be made to all members regardless of type of service used.

The Board gave the reason for the rate adjustment to be made in 1955 when it was not made in former years. Due to the drought, the farmers have had to use a lot more electricity than was budgeted for. The budget was set up with the idea that each irrigation well would use 42,000 kilowatt hours per year. Actually during 1955 each irrigation well, on the average, used 70,000 kilowatt hours. Theoretically, if we had sold 42,000 kilowatt hours per well, there would have been no money to distribute.

At the annual meeting on April 21st, the administrator of Rural Electrification, Mr. Ancher Neisen will be present.

He has recently returned from Geneva, Switzerland where he accompanied John Foster Dulles, Secretary of State. Mr. Neisen represented the United States in Rural Electrification. During this tour, he took his wife on a tour of Denmark. They made many colored slides of the Danish way of doing things. These slides will be shown along with his lecture at the annual meeting.

Ancher Neisen, Minnesota farmer, became administrator of REA in April 29, 1953 and in the period since then has established a record of sound and energetic administration of REA's two loan programs—the rural electrification program and the rural telephone program.

Son of Danish immigrants, Mr. Neisen was a farmer from the start. He took an active part in 4-H Club work and later built up a 280 acre diversified farm near Hutchinson raising corn, hogs and dairy products.

He is a farmer of the pre-electric era but set out to do something about it. Once he rigged up a home-made 6-volt generator that lighted the barn for chore time. Later he helped organize the McLeod Cooperative Power Association which brought electricity to his country. He got the job as director and vice-president and served until he went to Washington.

An active farm leader in many fields, he held positions in several elevator, mutual insurance and conservation organizations. He was Minnesota state senator from 1935 to 1948 and was elected Minnesota lieutenant governor in 1952.
