## Marshall Takes Blame For Too Late Hawaii Warning

By United Press.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 12.—Gen. George C. Marshall said today he "accepted the responsibility" for failure of the army high command to realize before Dec. 7, 1941, that its Hawaiian department was not prepared to meet attack.

The former chief of staff engaged in a spirited exchange with Rep. Frank Keefe, R., Wis., in his sixth day of testimony before the congressional Pearl Harbor investigating committee.

Keefe's rapid-fire questions, asked in a booming voice, evoked from the normally taciturn and softspoken general the longest statement he has yet made to the committee.

"Do I understand that this strong statement is to be considered an extenuation of the failure of the general staff?" Keefe asked as Marshall concluded.

"I have stated," Marshall retorted, "that I accepted the responsibility."

Earlier the committee had released conflicting and confusing "top secret" army reports, both asserting and denying that Washington officials had evidence four days before Dec. 7, 1941, that a Japanese attack was coming.

## FBI Head Warns Police Chiefs to Be on the Alert

MIAMI BEACH, Fla., Dec. 12.—John Edgar Hoover, guiding spirit of the world's most renowned police force, the FBI, told a group of newsmen the postwar crime wave predicted a year ago is not coming — it's here.

"Crime has taken on such startling proportions as to stagger the imagination," said Hoover.

Pulling a paper from the coat of his conservative tan suit, he read off the figures.

"Crime over the nation increased at a serious rate this past October, 19 per cent over last year. Over \$40,000,000 worth of property was stolen in the last six months, 69 per cent more than last year. And what I am greatly concerned over is the fact that of all the persons arrested in recent months, 21 per cent are under 21.

These underage persons commit one seventh of all the murders, nearly a third of all the rapes, and about two thirds of all the car thefts."

Hoover revealed for the first time that his agents listened in on a telephone call to Tokyo from a woman espionage agent in Honolulu Dec. 5 before Pearl Harbor.

He knew at the time that diplomatic relations between America and Japan were breaking down, and had alerted all his operatives in Hawaii as early as Nov. 27, he said.

Hoover and some of his aides are to appear before the current Senate-House investigating committee on Pearl Harbor, he added.

In a noon address to the International Chiefs of Police convention here Hoover sounded a stern warning against "the lunatic fringe who are the American Communists," and what he called "a recession of moral fortitude."

"I hope, as you do, the racketeers, overlords and desperadoes who characterized the roaring Twenties will not come back," he said. "I fear, however, that this is wishful thinking. Crime waves proclaimed today in the press are not imaginary. If anything the press is guilty of understatement. They are bloody, they are real."

We must not, however, let the antics of the American Communists prejudice us against Russia, which has a right to any form of government she desires. Hoover declared.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 12. (AP)—President Truman appointed a fact-finding board to probe the General Motors strike today, and Ford of Canada rejected the CIO United Auto Workers offer to end a three months strike at Ford plants in Windsor, Ontario.

CIO steelworkers inferentially invited steel manufacturers to renew negotiations.

Mr. Truman admitted that the board will have no authority to examine the books of General Motors, without the legislation he has asked Congress to pass, but he said he expected cooperation on both sides.

## Price Ceilings For Old and New Dwellings Soon

WASHINGTON, Dec. 12. (AP)—Pres. Truman today announced the government would place price ceilings on old and new dwellings and would reinstitute government priorities on building materials.

He also announced that he was accepting the suggestion of Reconversion Director John Snyder for the appointment of an overall government housing boss.

He appointed Wilson Wyatt, former Mayor of Louisville, Ky., to the job with the title of housing expediter.

The new housing program is aimed primarily at curbing inflation in the real estate market. It will be put into effect as rapidly as possible.

REJECT UNION RULE. LOS ANGELES, Dec. 12.—For the second time in eight months, Northrop Aircraft employes have turned down unionization. The National Labor Relations Board announced that balloting Tuesday showed 1,194 employes voting for no union; 624 for CIO and 99 for AFL affiliation. The "no" vote of 61.4 per cent represented an increase of 11 per cent over the antiunion vote at an NLRB election last April.

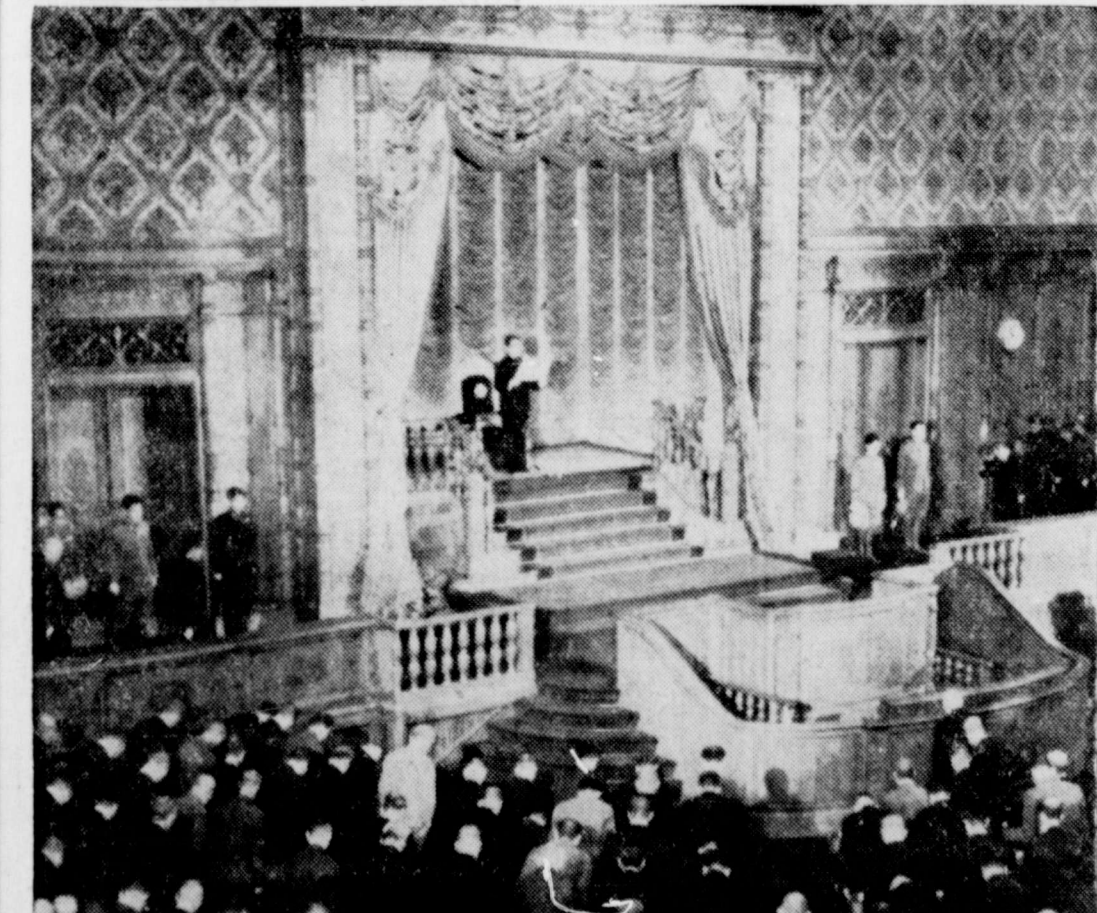
## Liquor Law Violators Shell Out \$1,497 in Cash

EASTLAND, Dec. 12.—A total of 13 cases in which violation of state liquor laws were charged and which were set for trial yesterday before County Judge Lewis Crossley, were settled when defendants entered pleas of guilty in each case and paid fines totaling \$1,100, plus court costs of \$397.

It has been suggested that hereafter names of all convicted whisky vendors be filed with federal income tax officials for investigation.

## W. R. Blanton, Son of Tom Blanton, Out for Congress in Western Java

ALBANY, Dec. 12.—New candidate for Congress from the 17th district is ex-Sgt. William W. Blanton, county judge of Shackelford county. His father, Thomas L. Blanton, represented the district for 20 years.

A graduate of Princeton university, Blanton attended the law school at the University of Texas. He practiced law in Albany and was elected county judge in 1940.

Re-elected in '42 without opposition, he resigned in Jan., 1943, to enlist in the army. Blanton served 18 months as a special agent of the Counter-Intelligence Corps in the India-Burma theater, and returned to the States early in November.

Upon the resignation of Judge G. B. King, who was appointed county judge when Blanton resigned to enter the army, Blanton was named county judge Dec. 1 by the commissioners' court.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 12. (AP)—The House Education Committee today disapproved a \$300,000,000 federal-aid-for-education bill. The vote was 10 to 9.

BATAVIA, Dec. 12.—Fighting flared at several points in central and western Java today as British authorities brought fresh reinforcements into the strait-torn island despite an Indonesian threat that such action would be answered with a general uprising.

The British took over all main railway stations at Tandjong Priok and Batavia to facilitate local movement of supplies.

Dr. Hubertus J. Van Mook, acting governor general of the Dutch East Indies, postponed his intended departure for Holland for a possible renewal of peace talks with Indonesian leaders.

The most serious outbreak of fighting was near Buitenzorg, where British Indian troops called for tank support to repel Indonesian attacking a convoy.

In central Java, six British Thunderbolts bombed and strafed two small bridges southeast of Semarang and hammered Indonesian gun positions.

FT. WORTH, Dec. 12.—Union and management were to resume their conferences at 2 p. m. Wednesday in an attempt to settle the five-week strike of Southwestern Greyhound bus drivers.

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## THEN AND NOW.

Many still living recall a time when America spent much of her energy and money developing real estate allotments, building houses as well as schools, churches and stores, many of them of wood. Now residences faced streets usually unpaved, sometimes mere quagmires. Frequently sidewalks were lacking. Draymen belabored their horse-teams struggling with heavy loads of lumber, lime, slate for roofs, stone for foundations,

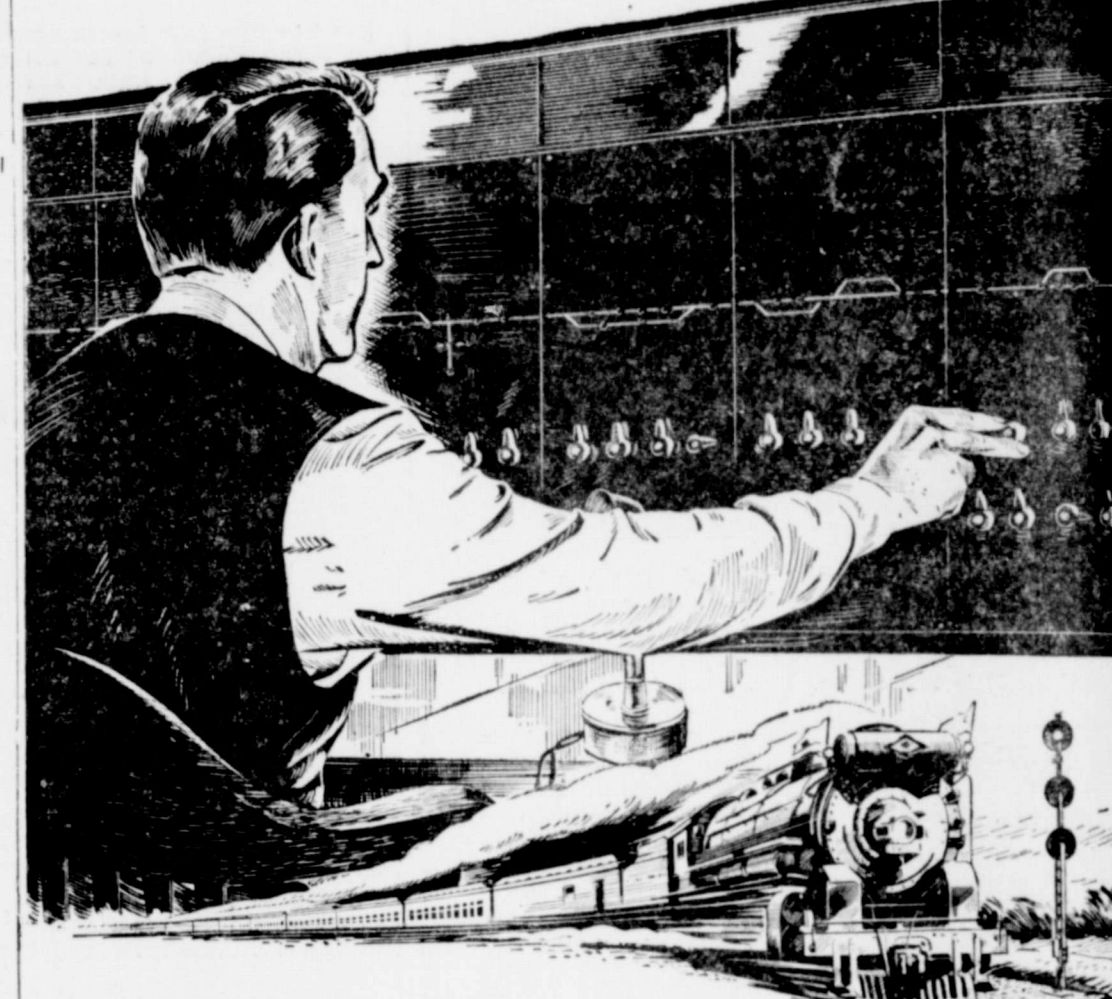

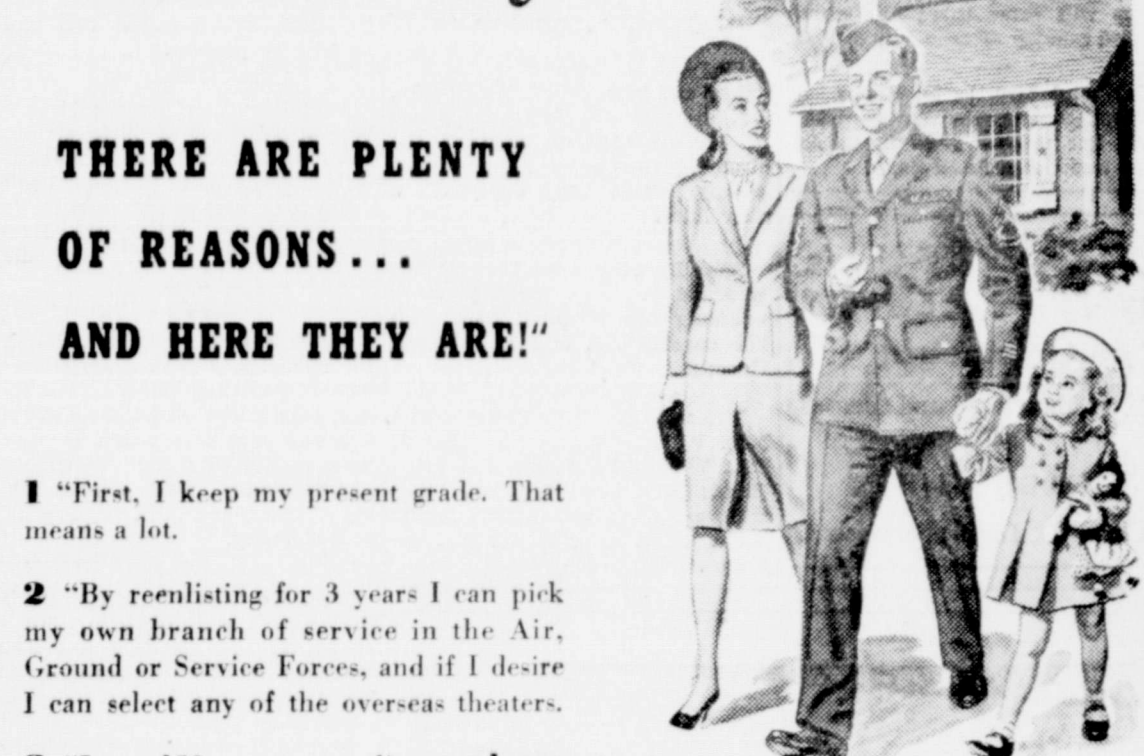
