Truman To Reorganize U.S. Executive Branches

WASHINGTON, Dec. 13. (AP)—The senate today voted 49 to 23 to accept a conference report empowering the president to reorganize the executive branch of the government.

The House had approved the conference report earlier today.

Senate Republicans made a bid to send the report back to conference after Sen. Arthur Vandenberg, R., Mich., demanded that the federal Deposit Insurance Corporation be exempted from any reorganization.

Under the measure finally approved, the FDIC could not be included in a general reorganization plan, but the president could submit a separate proposal for the FDIC. It would become effective unless both Houses of Congress vote disapproval during their first 60 days of meeting after the president offers his plan.

Bright Moon Led Sub to McVay's Ship, Jap Says

WASHINGTON, Dec. 13. (AP)—Comdr. Iko Hashimoto told a navy court today that his Japanese submarine scored at least three direct torpedo hits on the cruiser Indianapolis, last July 30.

Hashimoto told the court martial trial of Capt. Charles McVay, skipper of the Indianapolis, that he first sighted the cruiser 10,000 meters away an hour before she finally sank shortly after midnight.

The Jap testified that a bright moon was shining and that he could see the cruiser plainly. The navy has blamed McVay for not pursuing a zig-zag course to make the ship a more difficult target. Previous testimony, however, has been conflicting as to visibility at the time of attack.

Live Bomb Buried in Resident District is Problem

CROYDON, Eng., Dec. 13. (AP)—A freak accident today interrupted the defusing of a monstrous 8,000 pound live bomb buried in the center of a crowded Croydon residential district, and wardens cleared the streets in fear of a possible explosion.

A crew of royal engineers hurriedly dragged two young bomb experts out of the bomb crater late this afternoon when it was discovered that the bomb fuse had broken and wedged itself down into a 3,000 pound mass of crystallized TNT.

Authorities sounded an immediate warning that the TNT—now in its most volatile state—might explode at any instant and level a wide area.

Police cars equipped with loud speakers drove through the streets warning residents.

"You must leave this neighborhood. This area must be cleared immediately. There is grave danger if you remain in your homes."

Marshall Closes Testimony With Personal Opinion

WASHINGTON, Dec. 13. (AP)—Gen. George C. Marshall concluded his testimony before the Pearl Harbor Investigating Committee today with the declaration that the Hawaiian army command should have been ready for the Japanese onslaught.

Referring to a warning sent out over his signature on Nov. 27, 1941, the former chief of staff said, bluntly—

"I am still in the position of thinking that when you give a command to a high officer you expect it to be executed."

36 Germans Sentenced to Death By Rope Route

DACHAU, Dec. 13. (AP)—An American military court today sentenced 36 Germans to hang for participating in mass murders while serving as officials and guards at the Dachau concentration camp.

One of the 40 men convicted yesterday was sentenced to life imprisonment, and other three to 10 years imprisonment each. The sentences are subject to the approval of Lt. Gen. Lucian Truscott, commander of the U. S. 3rd Army, and Gen. Joseph T. McNarney, commander of the European theater.

Christof Knoll, former Dachau prisoner who betrayed his fellow inmates, fainted when sentenced to death. Dr. Klaus Schilling, charged with killing hundreds of inmates in malaria experiments, nodded his head as though expecting the sentence, then staggered slightly when he was sentenced to die.

The other defendants heard their fate without the slightest show of emotion.

24 States Furnish Free Text Books; Texas Top Buyer

AUSTIN, Dec. 13. (AP)—Supplying Texas school children with text books is big business. In fact the state purchase of books to be furnished free to pupils makes up the biggest book transaction that takes place anywhere.

Twenty-four states furnished free school textbooks but none ranks with Texas in the extent of purchase. No other state can buy an adopted book cheaper, for a part of the contract is that if the book is sold cheaper anywhere else, the price to Texas must come down to the minimum.

Currently the state board of education has set aside a \$2,225,000 fund for the school book purchase for the school year to start next September. How much actually is spent is dependent on how many books are ordered.

The selections that were made recently by the Board of Education resulted in re-adoption of about half the books that already are in use in the public schools. Orders for those texts will be required as replacements for worn-out books and to care for increases in the number of scholars.

Mathematics are among the most stable books in use. For next term the schools will have a new geometry text book for the first time in 11½ years. New arithmetics will go into service

Large Part 36th Division Now in Sight U.S. Shore

WASHINGTON, Dec. 13. —More than half of the lads of the famed Texas 36th Division today were just beyond sight of American shores and a Christmas reunion with their families.

Friday morning 9,125 men of the division which distinguished itself in fighting through Italy, France and Germany will start disembarking at Hampton Roads, Va., and New York.

Senate Won't Pass Anti-Racket Bill Union Leaders Say

WASHINGTON, Dec. 13.—Organized labor took solace today in past Senate performance as it pondered its first recent major setback in the House.

Failing to block a drive that won top-sided approval for a bill designed to make unions liable to punishment for violations of the 1934 anti-racketeering act, labor supporters said they were confident they could win in the Senate.

Their optimism was summed up by Representative Marcantonio of New York, who told reporters: "There isn't any question that we can stop it in the Senate."

MUST OBSERVE LAW.

AUSTIN, Dec. 13.—Summary sales of real estate for delinquent taxes without foreclosure of the liens in court were held contrary to law in an attorney general's opinion today. The opinion by Arthur L. Moller, assistant attorney general, said that a law passed by the 41st legislature in 1929, providing that all sales of real estate for collection of delinquent taxes shall be made after court foreclosure, "must continue to prevail."

Real Estate Men May Launch Fight on Truman Plan

FT. WORTH, Dec. 13.—R. P. Estes, president of the Fort Worth Real Estate Board, next Tuesday will ask the board to protest residential price control and building material priority plans advanced by President Truman yesterday.

Estes contended that neither price controls nor priorities would further building of new homes but rather would "stop all residential building."

He said under the present conditions no builder would start a house under a ceiling and also held that a ceiling probably would result in a black market on old houses.

LEASE BRINGS \$412,000.

SAN ANGELO, Dec. 13.—An oil deal involving 4,120 acres in Northwestern Crockett county was completed here by W. E. West, Ozona ranchman residing in San Angelo. West said he sold commercial oil and gas leases for cash bonuses of \$100 an acre or \$412,000.

W. M. Witt, Overseas Veteran, May Attend College

Staff Sgt. William M. Witt, 29, who was discharged from the army air corps at Camp Fanning on December 8, has not decided whether he will take a job or enter college, but leans toward the latter course.

The young man, son of Mr. and Mrs. Max Witt, who reside just outside Cisco, entered the service in September, 1941, and was overseas a year and a half. Part of the time he was in the Pacific area and for quite a while he was stationed in Panama.

Before entering the service Mr. Witt was an employee of the Missouri-Pacific railroad company. However, he does not contemplate returning to railroad work. The Ciscoan received a severe back injury while in the army, but is by no means incapacitated.

SCOUTS' GOOD WORK.

DALLAS, Dec. 13.—Final tabulation of Victory Bond applications taken by more than 3,000 Boy Scouts in Dallas last Friday showed sales totaling \$511,762.85. Ray Dixon, county Victory Loan chairman, announced Wednesday. A total of \$236,752.25 of that amount was for E Bonds, Dixon said.

VIAREGIO, Italy, Dec. 13.—A force of more than 200 American and Italian military policemen jailed 80 American soldiers today on charges of desertion, being absent without leave and blackmarketeering.

Free school textbooks in Texas date back to an act of 1918 which became effective in 1919. Since that date there have been many changes in the system.
Even before that time, the state adopted a list of approved text books. The state then was what was commonly termed "open territory" into which agents for the approved text books could go and argue with each school for purchase of the firm's particular book.
On the basis of cost the state free text book system seems to have all the argument. For the school year 1944-45 the cost was but 77.7 cents per scholastic. Parents who remember the old days when outfitting a school child with books meant several dollars will agree the system has its good points.
Average cost per pupil since the state purchase of free text books started in 1919 has been \$1.1676 per pupil.

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CREAM INTO BUTTER.

Every citizen has an obligation to work for what should be mankind's absorbing concern today—world unity. So says Andre Maurois, French author and lecturer who is a familiar figure in the United States. As a prelude to action he would have everyone keep fully informed by making the

study of current events a daily habit. He tells the story of two frogs who fell into a cask of cream. One, a pessimist, gave up easily and was quickly drowned. The other kept on kicking, falling back after each futile attempt to scale the sides only to thrash about and attempt it again. Never giving up, he finally churned the cream to butter. From this solid foundation the do-something optimist frog leaped to freedom.

Maurois is himself a deer. Except for the interval when he served in active duty in this war with the French army, he has spent his life attempting through his books to interpret France to British and American readers, and the English-speaking peoples to his native countrymen.

A morass of tensions and problems threatens to engulf all thinking people today. As Maurois sees it, intelligent workers, who keep a clear view of facts, like the frog who fell into the cask above his head, can churn a usable springboard from which they can launch themselves into a better future.

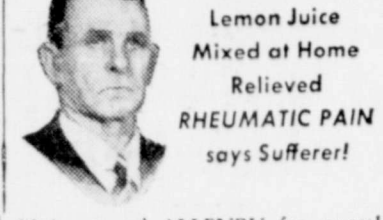

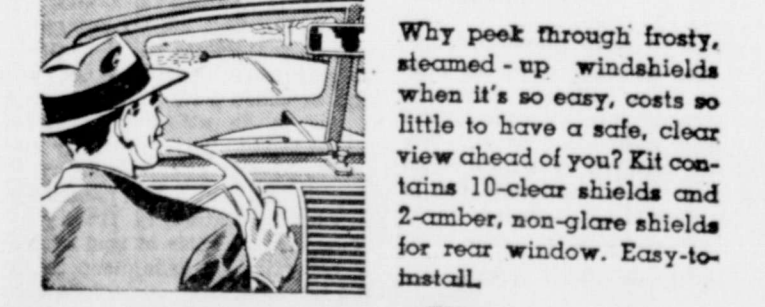

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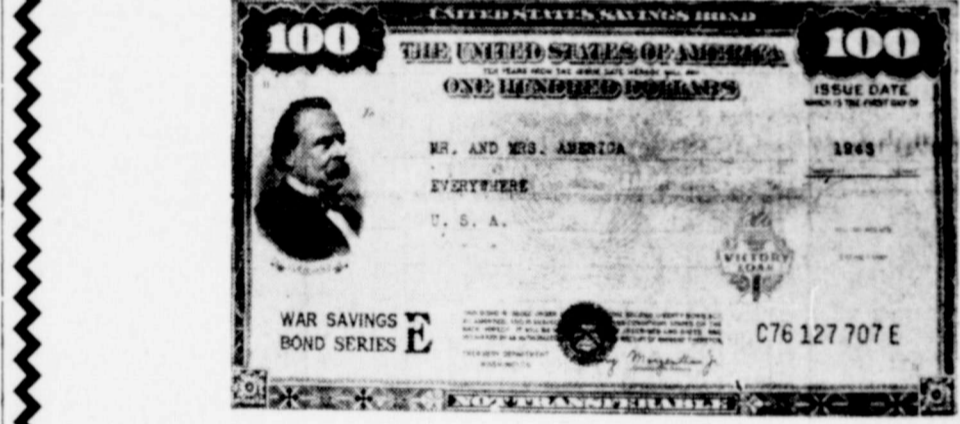
