Joseph Oliver Is on Way Home from Shikoku, Japan

SIXTH ARMY, Shikoku, Japan. Corp. Joseph L. Oliver, of Cisco, Texas, has left Japan to return home for discharge after serving 25 months overseas.

Oliver was a member of the 642nd ordnance company, one of the crack Negro outfits in the Pacific. He served in New Zealand, Australia, New Guinea and the Philippines during combat and was stationed at Shikoku, Japan, with the 24th infantry division, a unit of Gen. Walter Krueger's Sixth Army, when he left for home.

Oliver, husband of Mrs. Modeneer Oliver, 303 Franklin, Cisco, Texas, wears the Asiatic-Pacific and Philippine Liberation ribbons, with two stars; American theater ribbon, Victory Medal and good conduct Medal.

British Officer GI With Plural Out Account Jewish Plot Charge

LONDON, Jan. 4. (U.P.) — The UNRRA today discharged Lt. Gen. Sir Frederick E. Morgan, its chief of operations in Germany, for saying Wednesday that organized Jewry was plotting a mass migration from Europe to Palestine.

"The administration reached this decision with deep regret in view of the valuable services already rendered by General Morgan to the displaced persons operation in Germany and because of his close personal concern for the welfare of all persecuted peoples, including Jews, who have suffered greatly and are in need of further help."

Even before the formal disclosure that Morgan had been asked to get out, an official of the UNRRA said an announcement of his resignation had been prepared in advance last night, and the resignation itself was expected by midnight.

Several hours after the deadline, Morgan issued a statement in Frankfurt today saying that he had not resigned "because I can see no reason why I should resign."

The reports of Morgan's resignation capped a storm of protest touched off by his assertion in a Frankfurt press conference Wednesday that a clandestine Jewish organization was backing an organized, positive plan for a mass migration of Jews from Europe to Palestine.

Denials were issued in widely scattered quarters. Morgan's statement was repudiated in part yesterday by Judge Simon H. Rifkind, U. S. Army adviser on Jewish affairs in Europe, who derided the allegation regarding the Jewish plan as "poppycock."

Reports leaked out during the night that the resignation of the British officer from the UNRRA post in Germany was imminent. They were clarified today by a UNRRA official here, who said Morgan had rejected a "suggestion" that he resign.

"Morgan's resignation was expected by midnight, but didn't come through," the UNRRA official said. "Instead Morgan issued a statement saying he saw no reason why he should resign."

The official indicated that pressure had been put on Morgan for his resignation as soon as the outburst of criticism of his Wednesday statement on the Jews.

GI With Plural Wives Won't Be Given Plural Aid

WASHINGTON, Jan. 14. — To the GI who married several wives on a South Pacific island and wanted to bring them back while he went to college in hopes of collecting \$15 a month each for them under the GI Bill of Rights — the answer is no.

Other people have tried something like it, government officials say and have failed because:

1. The Veterans Administration recognizes but one spouse; it won't pay any benefits for more than one.
2. The immigration service won't permit more than one wife to enter the United States.

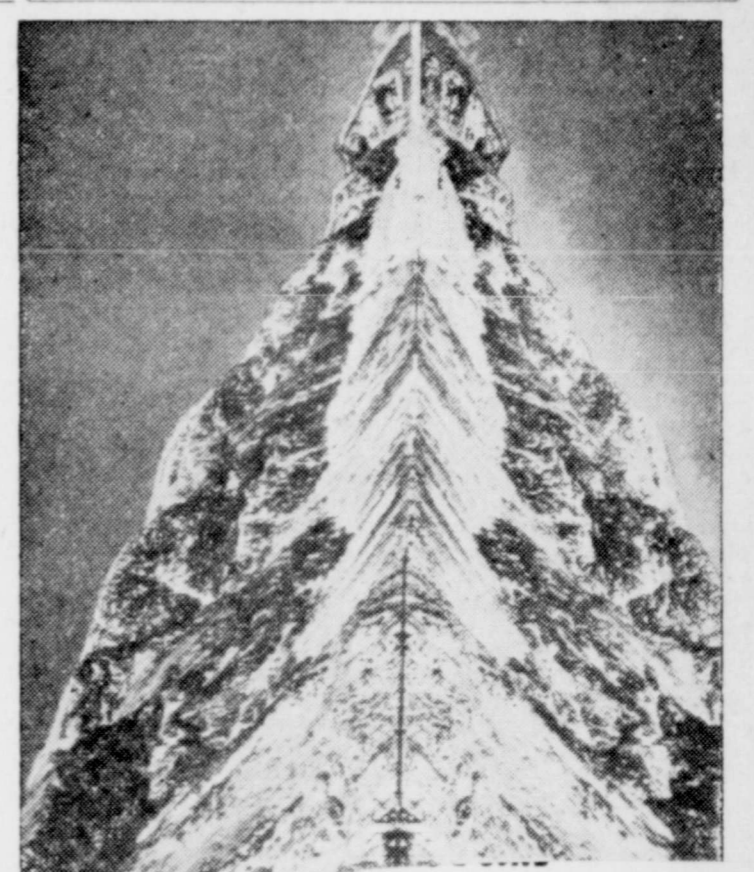
There probably are a dozen other reasons and bureaus that would block the path of a man intent on getting rich via the marriage route and the GI Bill of Rights, officials said.

The soldier said he believed he acquired the wives legally, because it was according to native custom.

"It's the way they do business in this tribe," he wrote. "The chief wanted fishhooks. I had fishhooks. He had too many women. I didn't. So we made a deal."

"Some Indians in the United States can have more than one wife, so why can't I?"

The Veterans Administration explained that some Indian soldiers do have more than one wife but benefits are paid to only one. Some Indian tribes recognize the right of a man to have more than one wife, said legal experts.

Typhoid Carrier is Found in Houston By Health Officer

HOUSTON, Jan. 4. — A Houston woman who recovered from typhoid fever 35 years ago is under provisional quarantine at the home of her daughter as a typhoid carrier, Dr. Austin E. Hill, city health director, said yesterday.

At least two, and possibly more persons contracted the disease from contacts with the woman, Dr. Hill said but her daughter is not in danger because she has had typhoid, but she will be vaccinated once a year.

Recalling the case of New York's "Typhoid Mary" who was a typhoid carrier for 30 years before she was discovered and quarantined, Dr. Hill said that the Houston woman's case was revealed by epidemiology.

While the woman will be allowed to visit friends and go about the city, she must submit her itinerary.

South Carolinian Tells of Cisco Man's Kindness

"I can tell you, I was utterly amazed at such hospitality, and it made me see why the west is famed for its open-hearted generosity," wrote a South Carolina service man, become civilian, in a letter to Mayor Edward Lee this week.

The writer of the letter was A. B. Crowder of Columbia, S. C. Last February he and his wife and baby were enroute to San Francisco. Eight miles west of Cisco, his letter relates, the ground cable on their car shorted out. They hailed a ride into Cisco and at the first service station the operator agreed to go back with them and see what could be done.

"Well, eventually, all was made right and then I was surprised! The man who so kindly helped us acted as though he hated to charge me and actually thanked me!"

"I hope the gentleman who helped us can read this in your local paper and perhaps he will recognize the incident. If he does read it, I want him to know my wife and I will always have reason for always remembering Texas, and more particularly Cisco and the kind deed he did for us."

Mr. Overall Emphasized Mental Value Basketball

Coach O. V. Overall, basketball mentor for Cisco high school, was the speaker for the Rotary club Thursday on a program presented by Lonnie Shockley. Mr. Shockley pointed out that interest in high school athletics is generally limited to football, although there are other sports, notably basketball, which are just as important in their influence upon the boys and should be liberally supported.

Coach Overall discussed the contributions which basketball makes to the physical and mental qualities of its players, contrasted its requirements with those of football and urged a development of basketball consciousness.

The lack of interest in the game is the most serious hindrance to the development of a good team, he said, but he expected to see a much improved sport in the Cisco school within the next year or so.

He laughingly gave his wife credit for the improved play of the Lobo quint in defeating Ranger after having dropped an earlier game to the Bulldogs in a poor exhibition.

"Tell the boys to put the ball in the hoop," he said his wife told him. The advice seemed to have good results, he said.

Principles of basketball coaching and the characteristics of the Cisco team were discussed by the coach in an interesting talk.

Child With Two Heads Died 50 Hrs. After Birth

BIRMINGHAM, Eng., Jan. 4. — A two-headed baby girl, born to the English wife of a former United States soldier, died last night after 50 hours and 35 minutes of life. Doctors said they would make a post-mortem examination today to determine details of her anatomy.

The infant was born New Year's Day to Mrs. Joseph Govro, 21, whose husband lives on a farm near Festus, Mo., 30 miles south of St. Louis.

Born four weeks prematurely, the baby weighed five pounds and 12 ounces and had been given oxygen continually.

Dr. Lindsay Park, gynecologist and obstetrician who attended the infant, said she had two heads and two necks joined at the point of the shoulder, two sets of lungs, two stomachs and two gullets—but a single trunk with two arms and two legs. The heads breathed, cried and ate independently.

The unusual anatomy was attributed to the incomplete fission of a single ovum.

Mrs. Govro was said to be recovering normally and to be feeling "quite fit." She said she was anxious to join her husband in the United States as soon as she could get passage.

Texas Democrats Put OK on Truman Radio Talk

DALLAS, Jan. 4. (U.P.) — Texas politics began the new year today with a love feast meeting of the Democratic State Executive Committee that held for further consideration a resolution pertaining to the Texas Regulars, though not by name.

At the opening event of a series of gatherings of state and nationally prominent Texas Democrats to honor House Speaker Sam Rayburn, the committee passed a resolution commending President Truman for his "sincere, courageous and clear-cut address to the people," last night.

The issue of the Texas Regulars—who tried unsuccessfully to steer the Texas delegation away from the Roosevelt-Truman ticket at the 1944 national convention — cropped up time after time as prominent political figures spoke to the committee and its guests. But never was the name "Texas Regulars" mentioned in so many words.

The resolution ordered held up from a vote of the committee was one which merely called for declaring ineligible to participate "in any precinct, county or state convention of the party," any qualified voters who have "heretofore sponsored, supported or voted for . . . any nominee for presidential elector or president of any political party or faction other than the nominees of the Democratic party."

US. Will Seize Packing Plants If No Other Way

WASHINGTON, Jan. 4. — The Labor Department forecasts that, if mediation and fact-finding fail to avert a threatened strike in the meat packing industry, government seizure will be a last resort.

This was made known Thursday night by Edgar L. Warren, chief of the Federal Conciliation Service, after a late afternoon conference with Secretary of Labor Schwellenbach.

Warren told reporters that the Labor Department will not recommend seizure of the meat packing plants, but that such a proposal might come from Secretary of Agriculture Anderson. On Wednesday Anderson said that the government could not permit a meat tie-up.

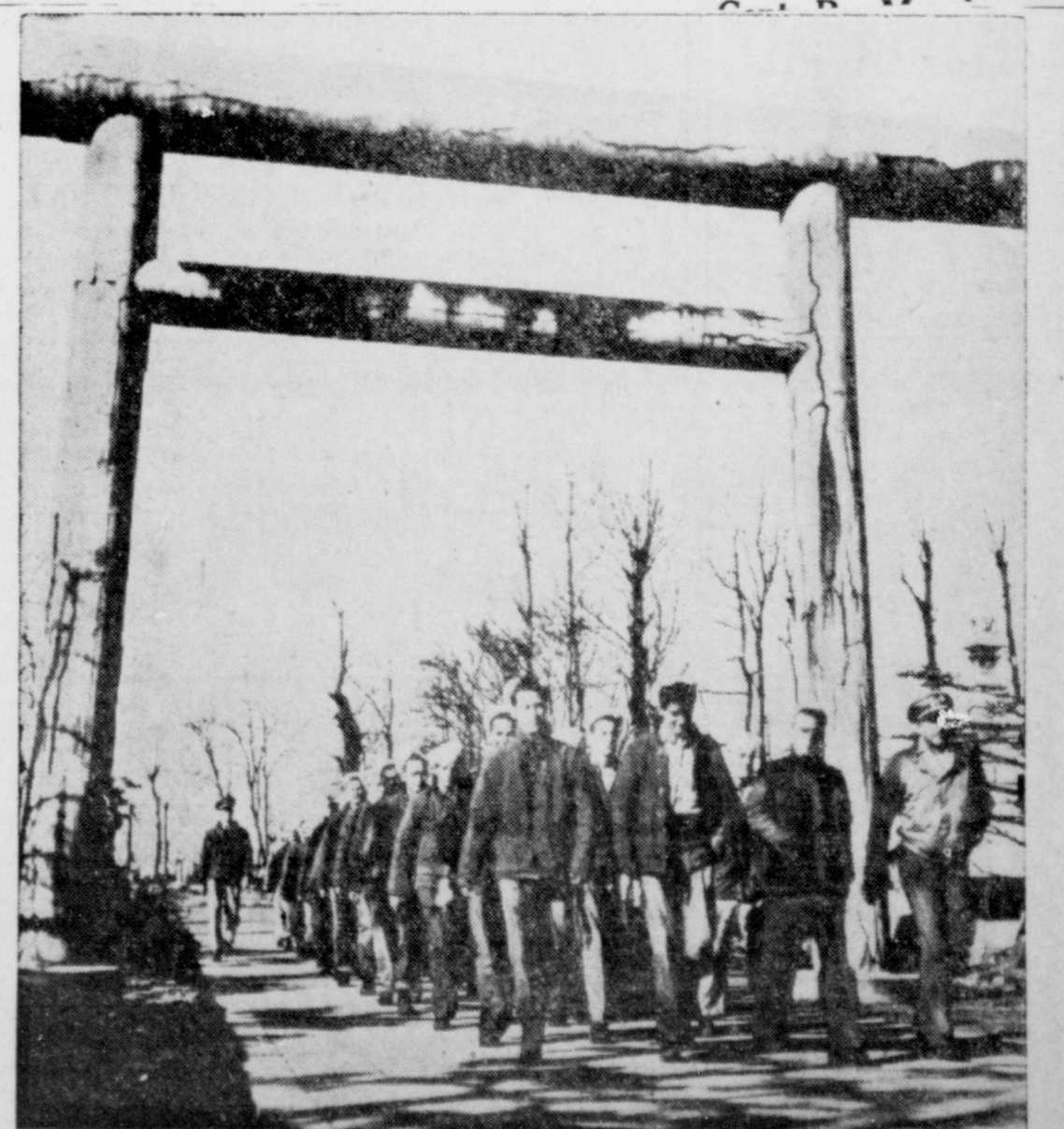
Girl Delinquency Much Higher Than Is That of Boys

FT. WORTH, Jan. 4. — Juvenile delinquency among girls, which Attorney General Tom Clark declares has risen much faster than that among boys, will be the chief objective of the nationwide drive he plans to start next month.

The former Dallas lawyer, who rose to the attorney generalship last year, said the percentage increase among girls has been much higher during war years than that among boys — as high as 350 per cent in six crimes.

"For that reason, we will seek to create more interest among parents, and try to get communities to exercise more control and give more attention to girls," he said.

"We have boys' clubs all over the country, and while we have the Camp Fire Girls, we don't have the fine girls' clubs and camps that we have for boys. We want to get public spirited citizens in various communities to sponsor summer and week-end camps."

WORK IS ALL THAT'S NEEDED.

It is probably true, as claimed, that too many people now have money "burning holes in their pockets" for lack of opportunity or intelligence to make better use of it; but this is a natural effect of wild war-time government spending and can't be helped until the spending spree has ended and the average man's pockets are near to empty.

But the chief danger to the future of America is the widespread, undermining thought that this sort of thing can be perpetuated by socialistic administrative ideas or the constant application of dreamy legislative cure-alls.

The whole productive system of this greatest of all nations should now be engaged in renewing its

normal procedure of producing goods of all kinds that are wanted by all kinds of people for all sorts of purposes — both at home and abroad.

Before long — if our political top sergeants do not "reason" or "think" us into civil war — there will be plenty of merchandise, better made than ever before, and enough new and desirable things to make people glad they didn't waste all their funds prematurely. The president did not stress it in his address last night, but what this country needs most, **RIGHT NOW**, is less "expert" opinion and more actual work of the sort that produces honest sweat.

Nothing else will dissipate the chaos that is rapidly enveloping us.

MAC ARTHUR'S PROTEST.

(Dallas News) General MacArthur's blunt statement that he was not consulted in the matter of setting up inter-Allied control in Japan is a continuation of the conflict that started between the State Department and the military command in Japan shortly after the surren-

der. It is a difference that ought to be composed, and promptly; for, however competent Mr. Byrnes may be in his position and General MacArthur in his, there can be no competence in the administration of the Japanese problem until there is understanding between the man in Washington and the man on the ground.

The Department of State is right in its reiterated statement that policy-making is its own function and that carrying out these policies in Japan is that of General MacArthur.

Yet, if the State Department went ahead and formulated the entire new plan without consulting General MacArthur, it is open to criticism.

According to one report by the State Department it kept General MacArthur informed; according to another, it did not.

Seemingly, the State Department is not entirely in step with itself.

Something ought to be done about administration of affairs in that section of Germany which has been allocated to us.

According to every report from that front there is no policy either within our own administration or between it and the British, Russian and French administrations.

We must not lose sight of the fact that the way in which we handle the problem of the defeated countries is going to have its very vital and long-term effect on the future peace, or lack of peace, in the world.

There is considerable need of improvement of our administration in both theaters of activity.

MUSICAL PROTECTIONIST.

(Philadelphia Bulletin) James C. Petrillo deserves high rank among American protectionists who wish to deprive the United States of the benefit of goods and services coming from abroad. Mr. Petrillo "requests" American radio stations to ban musical programs originating in foreign countries because their reception might mean fewer jobs for American musicians.

The Petrillo version of the protectionist doctrine is not content with a tariff or payment placed on foreign musical programs, but requires their absolute exclusion. The logic of such a demand if applied to composers of music would bar the works of foreign authors from American audiences. American writers of music have as much right to protection as musicians. Domestic music lovers can imagine their sorry plight if

American composers also had a Petrillo.

Such hidebound protectionists see no further than their own obvious interests. No account is taken of the stimulus to general musical education which the enjoyment of foreign musical programs might give. Anything which promotes a wider interest

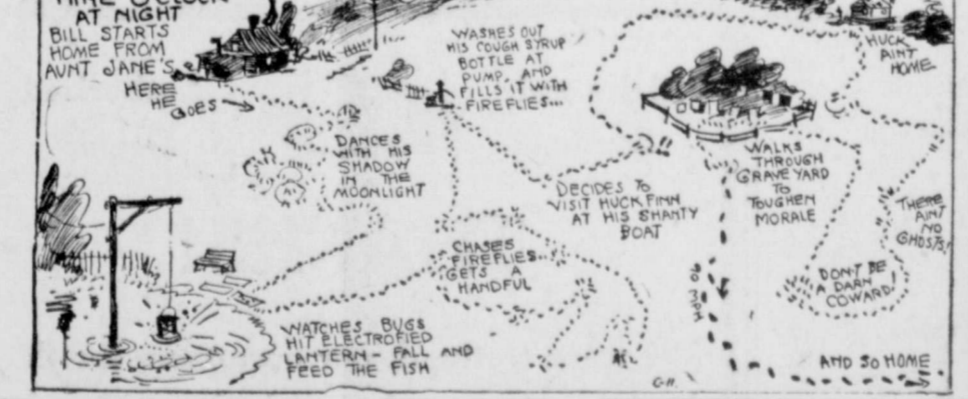
