First Disorder in Demobilization demand Bobs Up

Downie Is in Good Standing With His Dinner Club Again

Cisco Lions had no regular program at their luncheon today, but the session was rather busy and lively, nevertheless. At least Lion George W. Downie found it so.

Lion Downie, it seems, has not been attending the weekly luncheons regularly of late and so the taitwister, Charles Burke, and the attendance chairman, Charles S. Sandler, decided it was time to call for a showdown. Securing an antiquated horse-drawn hearse, the two Lions, accompanied by Hugh Brown, went to Mr. Downie's place of business, carried him to the vehicle and then conveyed him to the luncheon. After many promises that he would keep his attendance record in good shape hereafter, the Lion was declared to be "alive" again and in good standing. The same treatment will be accorded all derelict Lions hereafter, it was said.

Quick answer from O'Daniel to Wire Sent By Ciscoans

Quick response to a telegram signed by more than 50 Cisco citizens and urging him to resist enactment of any legislation designed to enforce the principle of "ability to pay" as a basis for wage adjustments in industrial disputes, has been received from Senator W. Lee O'Daniel.

"Telegram signed by you and others received," wired the senator. "Will do all I can for action along lines indicated."

The telegram from the Ciscoans insisted that the principle of "ability to pay" would "unlock the door to regimentation of industry — of both labor and capital — and eventually of the political rights of American citizens. Political control and economic control are inseparable. We insist that American economy should remain governed by the principles of free enterprise."

"This is not an issue of General Motors versus the CIO; it is an issue of bureaucracy versus American rights."

"We call on you to defend the principle for which so much American blood has been shed in a war to rescue humanity from the aggressions of dictatorial government."

Hopes of Averting Monday's Steel Strike Brighter

WASHINGTON, Jan. 9. (AP) — Hopes of averting a nationwide steel strike Monday were revived today when the United States Steel Workers — CIO — and the U. S. Steel Corp. agreed to resume collective bargaining negotiations.

Both Sides Firm.

NEW YORK, Jan. 9. (AP) — Company and union officials remained firm against making any concessions today as a strike of 7,000 Western Union Company employes in the metropolitan area entered its second day.

Each side waited for the other to make the initiative in reopening negotiations and there was little prospect of an early end of the walkout, which has cut all but 15 per cent of normal telegraphic communications between New York and the rest of the world.

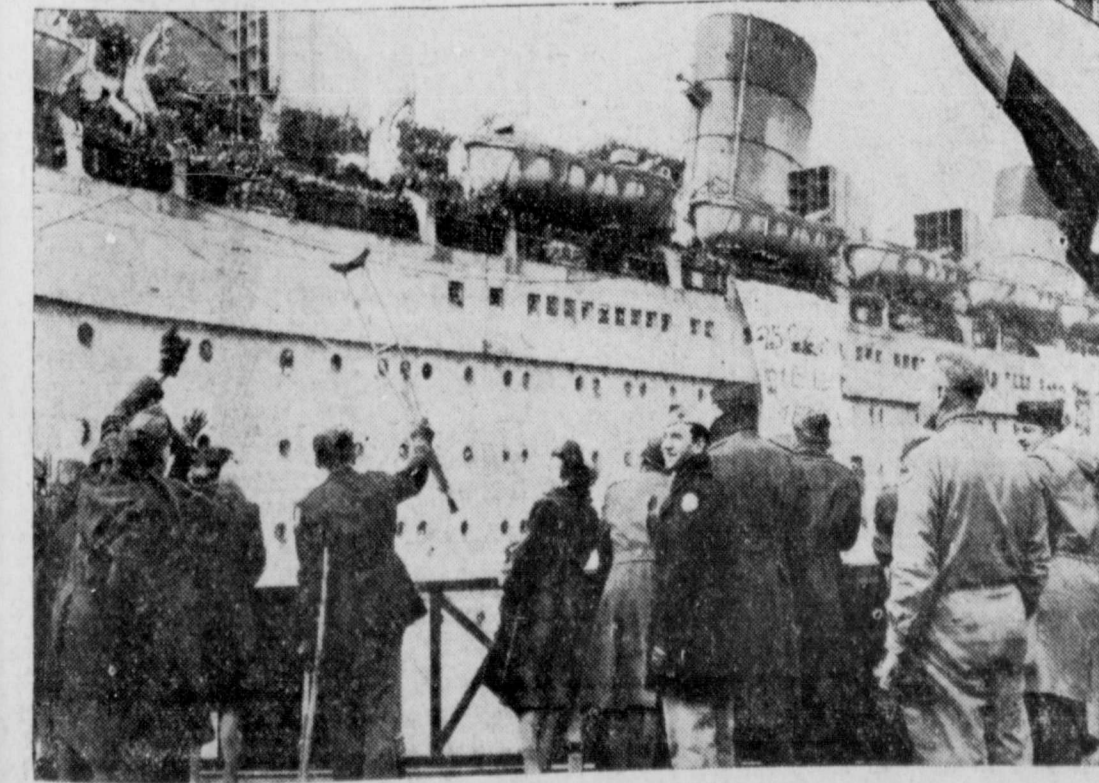

SAN ANGELO, Jan. 9. — Congressman O. C. Fisher of San Angelo was reported improved but still in a critical condition today from injuries received in an automobile accident near Ballinger. Dr. C. F. Bailey, Ballinger physician, said Fisher suffered numerous fractures of the pelvic bone and severe internal injuries when his automobile overturned on slick pavement. He had delivered an address at a luncheon club in Winters and was returning home.

JEW'S BACK PALESTINE.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 9. — The committee of inquiry on Palestine heard testimony today that at least \$45,000,000 in American private capital has been invested in Palestine and another \$110,000,000 has been sent as gifts by American Jews.

Use Audio-Visual Educational Aids Expands Rapidly

HOUSTON, Jan. 9. (AP) — In the public schools and the University of Houston, use of audio-visual education aids is expanding rapidly.

The success experienced by the armed forces in the use of audio-visual aids is credited largely with the increased interest here.

The large public school film library serves more than 100 clubs, churches and civic groups in addition to many classrooms. Last year some 985,000 persons saw these films. In 1938, the first year of the visual program, only 21,000 saw them.

Besides motion pictures, there are pictures, models, charts, phonographs, radios and recorders, Miss Lurine Gentry, assistant with the Houston program, said.

A student can learn up to 35 per cent more through visual aids. He can remember what he learned up to 55 per cent longer, Miss Gentry declared.

Bank Pilfering Thru 14 Years Went Undetected

DALLAS, Jan. 9. — A \$75-a-month bookkeeper in a Northeast Texas city bank who embezzled \$60,000 over a period of fourteen years was released on \$2,500 bond when arraigned Monday before United States Commissioner W. Madden Hill.

Married and with two children in school, the bookkeeper said he took \$500 in the years from 1931 to 1933 to pay delinquent grocery and hospital bills. In the succeeding five years, he took amounts ranging from \$50 to \$100 and spent it gambling in efforts to cover the original shortage.

From 1938 to 1945, he took about \$1,000 monthly to play the Chicago Board of Trade futures markets in cotton and grain, until his embezzlements reached the \$60,000 total.

"I could not sleep, and having learned to my sorrow that I could not cover by shortages on the exchange, I went to the bank and told the president what I had done," he said.

The bonding company which made good the embezzlement to the bank said that about \$10,000 had been turned back, including all the cash the bookkeeper had—\$12.

The bonding company also said that banking officials, after learning of the shortages, had told them the man charged with embezzlement had worn his suits until they were threadbare and patched, and often they had been tempted to speak to him about the necessity for bank employees to present a better appearance.

The man said that at the time of the original embezzlement he drew \$75 a month salary, and that when he reported the embezzlement in September, 1945, he was being paid \$115 monthly.

WOULD PLEASE MANY.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 9. (AP) — Rep. Clare E. Hoffman, R. Mich., suggested today that the government lend needy U. S. citizens as much as it lends foreign nations and spends on relief abroad.

Loans to needy Americans, he said, should not exceed \$10,000 and should be made under the same terms as the proposed loan to Britain — 50 years to pay at 2 per cent interest.

INCOMPETENT DOCTORS.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 9. (AP) — Gen. Omar N. Bradley plans an early removal of incompetent doctors in veterans hospitals, it was revealed today.

DISAGREE WITH TRUMAN.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 9. — Two senate critics of demobilization disagreed today with President Truman's declaration that the "armed forces have been reduced as fast as possible." Senator Revercomb (R-W. Va.), who has been demanding release of all drafted fathers, said military committees of both the house and senate "should look into demobilization as the first order of business when congress convenes again" next Monday.

American Cattle Now Practically Free Tuberculosis

AUSTIN, Jan. 9. — American cattle are now almost completely free of tuberculosis, says a report issued here by veterinary authorities.

"Twenty-five years ago, bovine tuberculosis caused tremendous financial losses to our farmers, and caused the spread of bone forms of tuberculosis to tens of thousands of children," today's report by the American Foundation for Animal Health declares.

"In contrast with this, a recent check at three important cattle markets showed that only one animal in 7,300 was condemned by veterinary inspectors because of this disease. In these same three markets twenty-five years ago condemnations for tuberculosis averaged one animal in every 80."

"The 25-year fight against this disease, led by veterinarians, government authorities, and farm groups, has paid tremendous dividends, both financially and in saving the lives of countless children who might have otherwise died of the disease."

HEREFORD PRICES GOOD.

SEYMOUR, Jan. 9. — Two animals sold for \$3,000 each and 50 head averaged \$765 in the Arledge Ranch Hereford sale at the ranch 10 miles west of here yesterday.

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FOREIGN POLICE JOBS.

Defeated Europe will obviously have to be policed for a long time in order to reap the fruits of American victory. There seems to be no tendency now to repeat the folly of the last war, when the job was only half done. Thousands of Americans will have to be settled there for considerable periods in armies of occupation. In order to make such tenure as tolerable as possible, the Army is inclined to let the families of our occupation forces go ahead to be with their men. Such at least is said to be present plan, and it would involve the transfer of nearly 100,000 American "dependents" to foreign countries in the next few months.

This is a reasonable and humane procedure, but obviously involves

difficulties of various kinds. Welcomed in many cases as a sort of lark and a fine opportunity to get acquainted with the Old World, it might turn out very differently from expectations. One thing to be remembered is that life abroad is not what it was before the war.

THE UNIVERSAL AUTO.

Automobile news these days seems to rate almost as high as less mercantile information, with car after car duly announced after the long wait caused by the war. It seems to a casual observer as if a surprising number of these cars are to be small, of the run-about sort, intended mainly for young people. Can it be that at last, after many years of evolution, the bicycle is really yielding whole-heartedly to the auto?

There will still be bicycles, of course, for the boys and girls and for the special usefulness of men riding cheaply to work. But there will also be, ere long, so many little cars rushing around and getting under foot that, even with due allowance made for their convenience and charm — if that's the word — thousands of people will lament their existence. And there may be no remedy except for the deplored themselves to adopt a defeatist course, and join the four-wheeled procession.

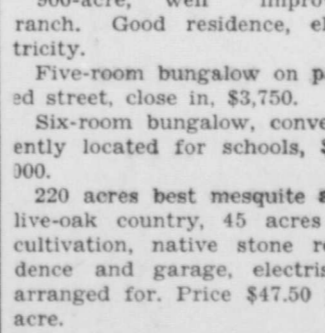
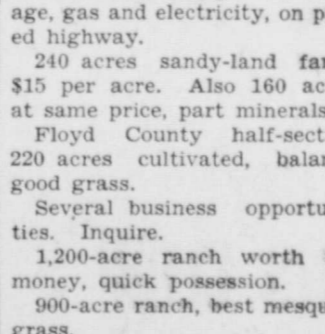
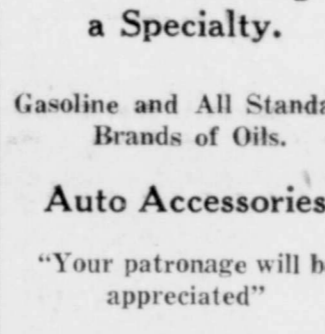
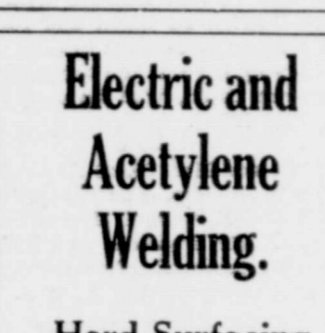
VISITOR HONORED BY COFFEE IN BYRD HOME.

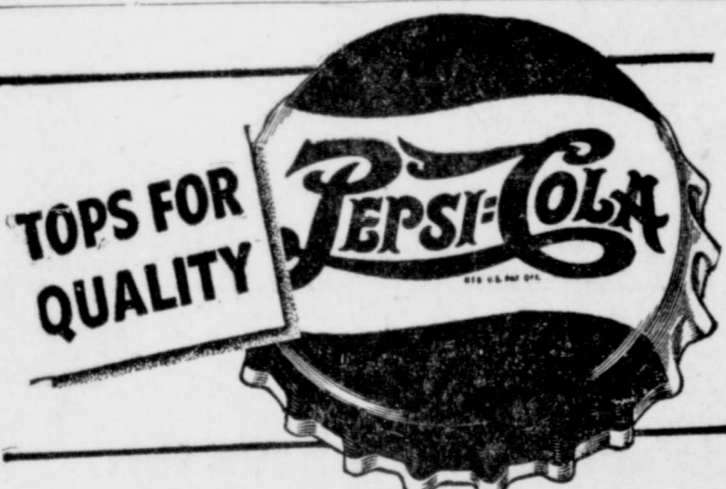

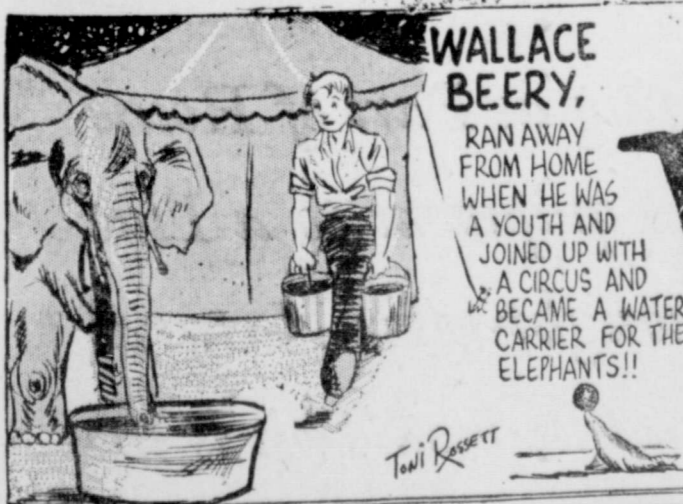

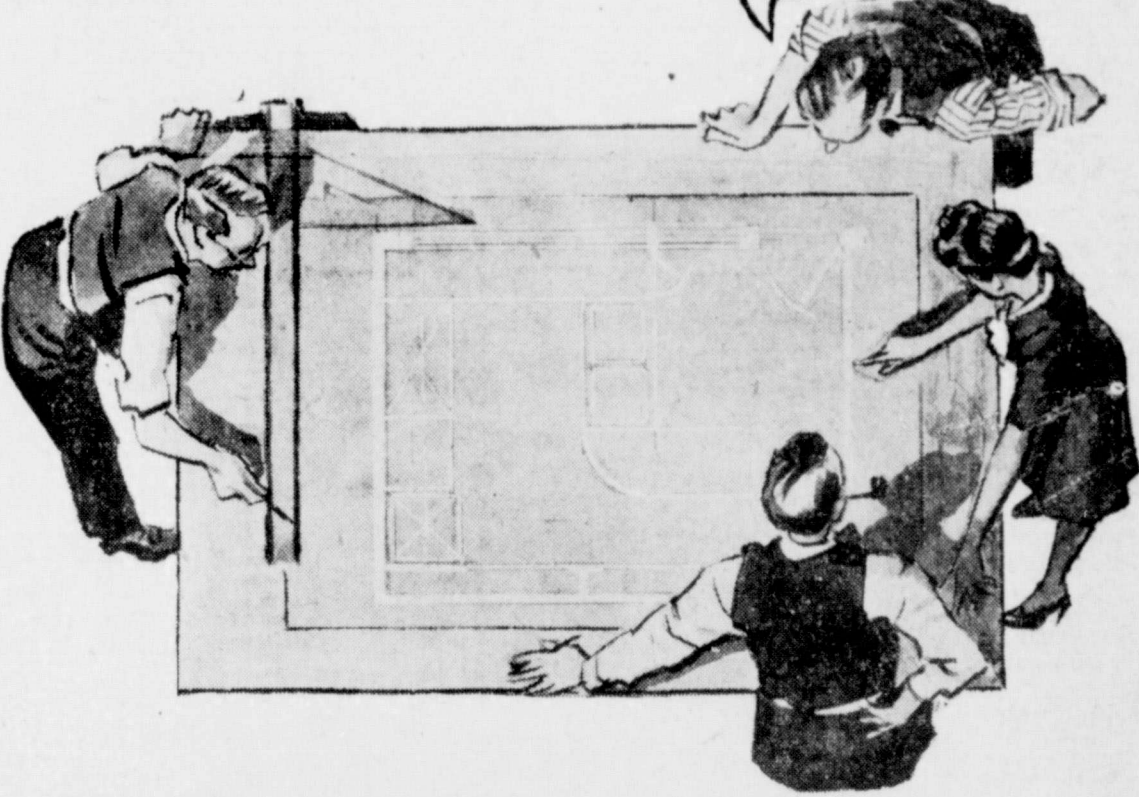
