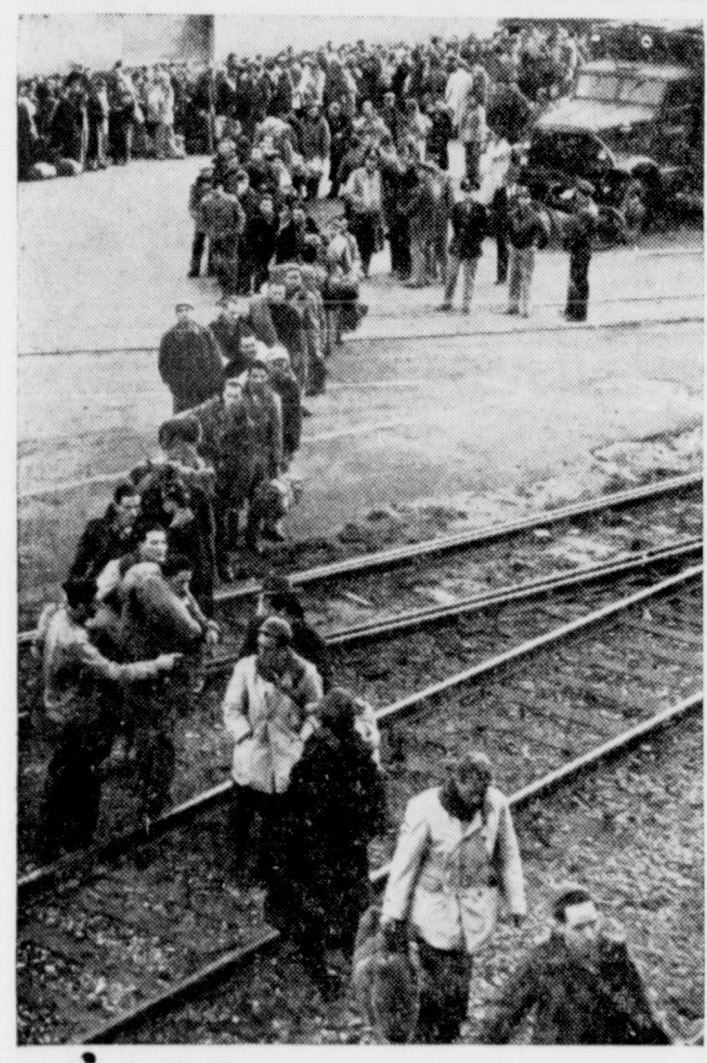

## CIO Meat Workers Vote to Stay Out Till Wage Raised

The labor crisis heightened today as CIO packinghouse workers decided not to return to their jobs when the government takes over the meat industry Saturday.

The union's wage policy committee voted unanimously to order its nearly 200,000 members to remain on strike until assured of "substantial wage increases."

The action came as cutbacks and shut-downs caused by the steel strike sent the number of strike-idle American workers soaring toward the 2,000,000 mark.

In another labor development at Miami, John L. Lewis and the United Mine Workers came back into the American Federation of Labor.

The AFL executive council voted Lewis and his UMW back into the AFL fold and gave the burly mine chief a seat on the council. Lewis also becomes the 13th vice president of AFL.

At Washington, C. E. Wilson, president of the strikebound General Motors Corp., denounced President Truman's proposed fact-finding legislation and called instead for a "principle-finding" board. He also said he was opposed to any anti-strike legislation.

A contract session between Ford Motor Company and the CIO auto workers ended today with both sides still committed to wage stands two cents per hour apart.

## Filibusters Per-Short Told 'Stand mit FEPC Moder-Pat' One Day, Discharging Amendments charged the Next

WASHINGTON, Jan. 25. (AP)—Sen. Homer E. Capehart, R., today introduced five moderating amendments to a bill to establish a permanent Fair Employment Practice Commission.

There was no indication, however, that they would have any effect upon the anti-FEPC filibuster by Southern Democrats now in its second week. Earlier, the long-talking Southerners had given themselves a breathing spell by letting a pro-FEPC colleague make a speech for the bill.

## Five Texas Packing Plants Are on US. Seizure List

FT. WORTH, Jan. 25. — When the U. S. Department of Agriculture goes into the packinghouse business at 12:01 a. m. Saturday, it will seize five installations in Texas, three of which have no current labor troubles.

Acting under presidential order, the USDA take charge at the Swift & Co. plants in Dallas, San Antonio and Fort Worth, and Armour & Co. and the Rathig Pure Foods Products Co. at Fort Worth. The latter is a canning plant of the Armour & Co.

No mention has been made of Federal action against the Fort Worth stockyards, which became strikebound Jan. 16.

**HE DESERVED IT.** FT. WORTH, Jan. 25. — A 30-year penitentiary sentence was imposed in criminal district court Thursday upon Dan Lee Hope, 27, charged with pandering. A 16-year-old girl was the principal witness.

**WAGE HIKE REFUSED.** HOUSTON, Jan. 25. — Striking steelworkers indicated today they would turn down a 15 cents an hour pay increase offered by the Hughes Tool Co. The offer was two and one-half cents above the company's last offer.

## Schools, Old - Age Eschew Money For Pensions Get Big Homelands, Spiritual Savings from Liquor

AUSTIN, Jan. 25. — Liquor has produced \$91,608,063 in revenue for the state and public schools, old-age assistance and other funds have been enriched by \$81,836,664 during the last ten years, Bert Ford, administrator for the Liquor Control Board, announces.

During the period from Nov. 16, 1935, through Dec. 31, 1945, the state's revenue from liquor taxes, licenses, permits and other sources has shown a steady increase. The revenue derived last year exceeded that of 1944 by \$1,878,527.

During December, 1945, alone, revenues amounted to \$1,218,609. Of that amount, \$38,085 was for stamp sales at the international bridges between Texas and Mexico.

The old-age assistance fund was the biggest beneficiary of the liquor revenue. During the ten-year period, \$30,709,184 has been allocated it. The state available school fund received \$18,519,906. The general revenue fund was allocated \$526,304 and money paid into other state funds totaled \$52,078,254.

While the State Liquor Control Board collected an average of more than \$9,000,000 annually, its expenses amounted to an average of \$819,000.

The board's enforcement section reported a total of 340 criminal complaints filed during December. There were 315 convictions resulting in twenty-one jail sentences and fines totaling \$50,782. Cases dismissed totaled nineteen.

**COLDER WEATHER SLATED.** Much colder weather is said to be on its way to Texas. The up-set in springlike temperature is forecast to occur in the Panhandle and South Plains tonight, with snow flurries and stiff winds. It may reach Cisco early Saturday morning.

**BODIES OF 17 FOUND.** BATAVIA, Jan. 25. — The Dutch news agency Aneta said the bodies of 17 European men and women, their hands tied behind them and one beheaded, were found Thursday in the Antjol Canal by workers repairing that waterway between Batavia and its port, Tandjoeng Priok. Aneta said two of the victims apparently had been killed recently.

**MAGEE SERIOUSLY ILL.** OKLAHOMA CITY, Jan. 25. — Carl Magee, pioneer Southwestern editor and inventor of the parking meter, is seriously ill at a hospital here.

## King Has Had Ex-Star Be Host to citing Life Since Legion Convention Cisco School Days February 16, 17

Major and Mrs. Walter S. King and son Walter Lee have returned to their home in San Antonio after an extended visit with his mother, Mrs. J. T. Stuteville of route four, Cisco.

Major King, who attended Cisco high school in 1937, arrived in the states November 30 after serving over two years in the Pacific theater as commanding officer of the 89th squadron of the famous Grim Reaper third attack group, a unit of the Fifth air force.

During that period he piloted the Douglas A-26, A-20 and the Mitchell B-25 in action against the enemy.

The major wears the distinguished flying cross, one oak leaf cluster, the air medal, two oak leaf clusters, the purple heart, presidential unit citation ribbon and the American Southwest Pacific and Philippine campaign ribbons. Also eleven battle stars showing participation in eleven major battles.

The former Ciscoan is on recuperation leave and does not know where he will be stationed. He expressed a desire to remain in the states for awhile and to fly jet propelled planes.

## Giles Says He Took His Medicine Straight

DALLAS, Jan. 25. — Land Commissioner Bascom Giles said in filing for renomination Thursday that he had voted a straight Democratic ticket in 1944, including presidential electors.

State Democratic Executive Committee Secretary W. H. Kittrell Jr., announcing Giles' application for a place on the primary ballot, said the statement was in anticipation of action by the state committee asking that such statements be made by candidates.

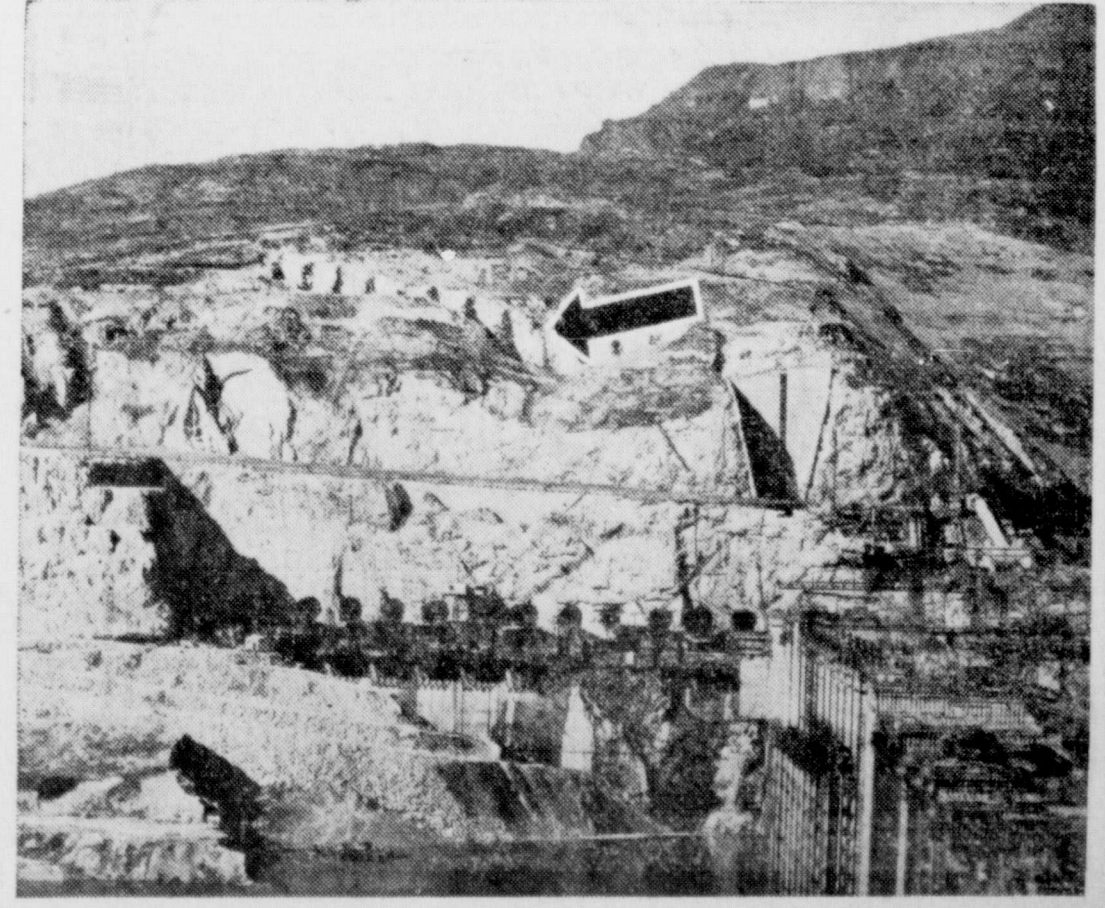
The petition stated that both bride and groom are only 19 years of age.

**TEXAS HAD ONE POLIO CASE OUT OF EACH THIRTEEN** AUSTIN, Jan. 25. — The State Department of Health reported today that Texas was "especially affected by poliomyelitis" during 1945. Of this the 13,733 cases reported in the entire United States, 996 were from Texas, a ratio of about one to 13.

The early symptoms of infantile paralysis, said State Health Officer Dr. George W. Cox, are usually a moderate initial fever accompanied by headache and gastro-intestinal disturbances such as vomiting and constipation. These symptoms are usually followed by drowsiness, stiffness of the neck or spine and finally paralysis.

**BYRNES PREDICTS.** WASHINGTON, Jan. 25. (AP)—Sec. of State James F. Byrnes predicted today the first United Nations assembly in London would complete its work about Feb. 7.

**NAZIS TO GO HOME.** WASHINGTON, June 25. (AP)—President Truman announced today that all German war prisoners will be sent home from this country by the end of June. This new date represented an extension of 60 days in the time scheduled for the return of prisoners.

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#### STRIKE LOSSES ARE TERRIFIC.

It is estimated that strikes are costing about \$60,000,000 a day. In the General Motors Corp. strike-bund since Nov. 21, not only the 175,000 workers involved at the strike outbreak are losing wages, but an additional 200,000 who by now would have been employed at increased production planned for the manufacture of hundreds of passenger and trucking vehicles. Wage loss to this group has been more than \$75,000,000 from the strike onset to the middle of January.

With a general steel strike under way, the loss is far greater. About \$21,000,000 worth of steel was turned out every working day in 1944, the wages bill approximating \$100,000,000 a month in more than 400 plants. The packing industry, also strike-bound, runs to six billions in products annually, about 75 per cent of which is returned to farmers for animals slaughtered. In the electrical strike, 200,000 workers and an output of \$1,700,000,000 are concerned. A labor report shows 35,000,000 man-days of work lost in 1945, with an estimated wage loss of \$280,000,000.

These figures are impressive. But the strike casualty is more wide-spread than statistics can indicate. For example, there is nothing to show the vast army of automobile salesmen and dealers without products to sell. No graph shows how greatly transportation is curtailed for business which is ready to expand, but unable to do so without new trucks or cars. There is no estimate possible of depleted savings accounts or downward-revised living standards forced on the families of strikers.

The general public, which by far outnumbered all the labor and management groups, will eventually demand that total cessation of work in essential industries be strictly taboed. Even the United States, rich and powerful as it is

cannot afford the luxury of wide-spread strikes.

And we must not depend too much upon political officeholders in the search for an intelligent solution of the strike menace. It can only be worked out by practical and honest-minded members of the labor and management groups, with the general public as referee and final judge of what is fair to the nation as a whole.

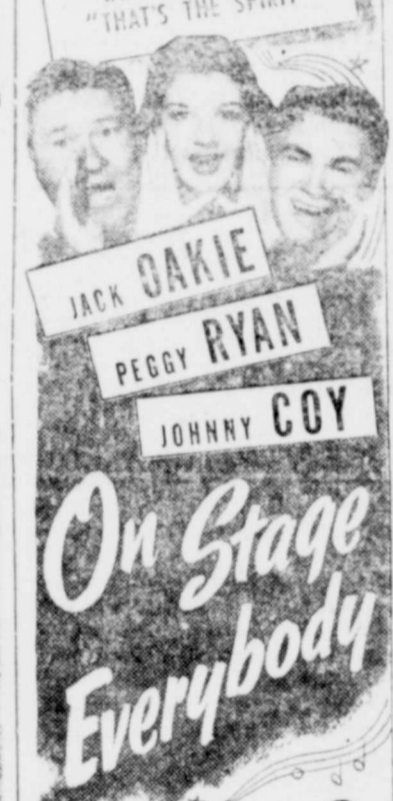
