

The labor crisis heightened today as CIO packinghouse workers decided not to return to their jobs when the government takes over the meat industry Saturday.

The union's wage policy committee voted unanimously to order its nearly 200,000 members to remain on strike until assured of "substantial wage increases."

The action came as cutbacks and shutdowns caused by the steel strike sent the number of strike-idle American workers soaring toward the 2,000,000 mark.


