## Murray Says Steel Strike Is Now Up to the President

### Horror Package Gives No Hint of Child Killer

CHICAGO, Jan. 31. — Police studied a scrap of greasy paper and a cardboard box today, hoping to learn if the fiend who butchered six-year-old Suzanne Degnan and the sadist who sent a human ear through the mail were the same person.

A small home-made box containing an adult human ear was mailed to Mrs. James Degnan, mother of the slain child. Scrawled on the inside cover was the threat:

"Will cut your ear next."

Chief of Detectives Walter Storms said investigators were comparing the handwriting on the box with that of the \$20,000 ransom note which the slayer left in Suzanne's bedroom when he kidnaped her Jan. 7.

He said the writing on the box apparently had been disguised, as was that on the ransom note.

Meanwhile the War Department reported that Sgt. Seymour Sherman, whose name and serial number corresponded with laundry marks on a handkerchief found near the Degnan home, was overseas at the time of the slaying. Police hoped to interview Sherman, however, to learn whether the handkerchief belonged to him, and, if so, where he could have lost it.

Sherman's father, David, said in New York that his son was expected to arrive there soon.

Storms said police were convinced that Suzanne's slayer was either a physician, medical student, "very good" butcher, embalmer or perhaps a livestock handler. He said Suzanne's body parts, which were found in sewer catch basins near her home, had been dismembered in an expert fashion.

### MINISTER BEATEN.

FT. WORTH, Jan. 31. — Rev. George F. Kornegay, 66, Methodist minister, was recovering this morning at his home here from injuries inflicted on him Tuesday night by five young hoodlums who beat and robbed him on Highway 377, a few miles this side of Cresson. The thieves took his overcoat, about \$15 in cash and his watch. They also took tools and other equipment from the auto, leaving only a Bible belonging to Rev. Mr. Kornegay.

## SWEEPING STRIKE LAW INDICATED

WASHINGTON, Jan. 31. (U.P.) — The House gave clear indication today that it favors sweeping legislation to control strikes of the kind which have been stalling re-conversion of the nation's basic industries.

It voted more than two to one — 258 to 114 — to consider a strong measure offered by Rep. Francis Case, R., S. D., as a substitute for a watered-down, admittedly ineffectual version of President Truman's proposed face-finding legislation.

The House vote specifically was on whether to approve a rules committee action in permitting Rep. Case to introduce his substitute.

The result was overwhelming approval.

Actual vote on the Case bill itself will not come until next week, probably on Tuesday.

The Case bill, backed by a group of Republicans and Southern Democrats, would make labor unions liable in the courts for damages resulting from violations of their contracts.

It also would ban violence by pickets and would provide an automatic 30-day cooling off period in serious labor disputes.

## Cunning Leaders of CIO-AFL Control USES Policy

AUSTIN, Jan. 31. — The CIO and AFL, through members who are employees of the United States Employment Service, control its practices to keep thousands of undeserving persons on compensation rolls and for that reason labor does not want the employment service returned to the control of the states.

That charge was made by Claude A. Williams of Austin when he appeared before the National House committee on labor to represent the Texas Trade Association executives during a hearing on a bill which would again give the states control of employment services.

"The real issue in this controversy is over who is going to control the referral policy of the employment services — labor in Washington or the citizens of the 1,001 communities of this great nation," Williams told the committee.

"Labor is putting up a last-ditch fight to retain control of this all-important function. The fact that thousands of jobs are going begging while thousands of unemployed are drawing unemployment compensation can be attributed only to this control.

"The employees of the USES who are members of the CIO and AFL unions ignore the 'suitable' work provisions of the state laws and make referrals in line with the policy designated in Washington by the labor bosses."

### FOG COVERS BIG TOWN.

NEW YORK, Jan. 31. — Heavy fog, accompanied by a chilly drizzle, covered the New York area today, disrupting air line service at La Guardia Field and ferry traffic in the harbor.

The steel strike was tossed back to the White House today by CIO President Philip Murray who said at Washington that "we have done all we can" to settle the dispute and "it's up to the President now."

Murray made the statement as pressure for relaxing of price controls increased, with industrialists warning that higher prices could not be paid without government approval of price raises.

Murray, also president of the CIO United Steel Workers, said the union would make no further overtures to the steel industry.

At the same time, Cudahy Packing Co. attorney, Frank J. Madden told a fact-finding panel in the capital that this firm must be allowed "100 per cent price relief for any wage increases." The committee is investigating a wage dispute which caused a 12-day strike and resultant seizure of packing plants by the government.

Murray, the CIO leader, made his statement after conferring an hour and a half with Secretary of Treasury Fred M. Vinson. He and CIO Counsel Lee Pressman, Murray said, discussed with Vinson refund provisions of the revenue laws. He has charged that struck industries, under these provisions, are in effect compensated for loss of production by means of tax refunds.

President Truman told reporters late today that seizure of the steel plants is not now under contemplation.

## Bilbo to Filibuster Against Loan to Great Britain

WASHINGTON, Jan. 31. (U.P.) — Theodore G. Bilbo, D. Miss., currently filibustering against Fair Employment legislation, said today he hopes to use the same tactics against the British loan.

"I am willing to filibuster against the loan if I can get some help," he said. "I am willing to be a cousin to the British, a friend, but I am tired of being Santa Claus."

Bilbo said his filibusters in the past had saved the treasury at least 500 millions in appropriations. But now, he said, he hopes to save the country \$4,000,000,000 — the overall amount of the projected loan.

## Church Pastor Admits Poisoning Daughter of 17

GRAND RAPIDS, Mich., Jan. 31. — Kent County Prosecutor Menso R. Bolt announced today that Rev. Frank E. Stiple had admitted giving poison to his daughter, Dorothy Ann, who died in 1939 at the age of 17.

Rev. Mr. Stiple 52-year-old pastor of the Southland Park Church of God, made the admission, Bolt said, when confronted with a report from State Toxicologist Clarence W. Muehberger that an examination of the girl's vital organs revealed the presence of arsenic.

The body was exhumed for the examination.

Stiple now is awaiting trial on a charge of assault with intent to kill an elder in the church, Lyle Doan, 42, with a 14-inch iron pipe.

The pastor's daughter, a high school graduate, died July 31, 1939. Her death certificate listed coronary thrombosis and nervous vomiting as the cause of death.

The prosecutor said Stiple told him he had given the girl the poison "because she was mentally incompetent and I didn't want her to go to an asylum."

## Ford Says Federal Price Controls Must Be Ditched

DETROIT, Jan. 31.—Henry Ford II, president of Ford Motor company, was on record today with a demand that government remove price controls to clear the path for "the kind of operation" that Americans like best — finding a way to make money by beating competition to market with something better and cheaper.

Ford expressed his views in a telegram to John W. Snyder, director of the Office of War Mobilization and Reconversion in Washington, with a warning that unless his company could get steel promptly "we will have to shut down completely sometime this week."

He declared it would cost \$100,000 a day to maintain idle assembly lines and at "current OPA price ceilings, we are currently losing \$300 on every car we make."

"Time and time again," Ford said, "we have been forced to shut down operations because suppliers could not get us parts and materials for our cars and trucks. Some of them have stopped making our parts because they lost money at their ceiling prices."

The young company president declared "nobody wants 'run-away' inflation but if we continue to stifle American industry's ability to produce, that is exactly, in my opinion, what we are headed for..."

## Woman Victim of Freak Accident Was Buried Today

The funeral of Mrs. W. J. Cross, who died yesterday in a Cisco hospital as the result of a freak automobile accident Monday at Cross Plains, was scheduled for 2:30 this afternoon in the Methodist church at Cross Plains, her home city. Burial will be in the Cross Plains cemetery.

The victim, 51 years of age, and her daughter-in-law, Mrs. J. T. Cross, were standing in front of the Cross Plains postoffice when a truck struck another automobile and then hit the women as it crashed into the postoffice building. The daughter-in-law was only slightly hurt.

The provost marshal at Camp Barkeley, Abilene, said the truck driver was a soldier and had been identified as Senaido S. Trevino. He is now in the custody of camp authorities.

## Saturday Night Dance Proceeds States' Powers For Polio Fund

E. T. Thomas, city chairman for the infantile paralysis campaign, announces a dance at Cisco Country club for Saturday night, the net proceeds going to the infantile paralysis fund. The dance will be under the direction of the American Legion.

Mr. Thomas, now serving his third year as local polio chairman, says four Ciscoans were victims of the disease in 1945 and that all sufferers were hospitalized. This necessarily cut into the funds previously accumulated for that purpose.

Jars for the deposit of dimes or other sums of money can now be found at 24 local places of business.

The chairman added that larger cash contributions may be left with him or with Carlos J. Turner of Cisco Junior College, who was recently appointed county chairman of the infantile paralysis campaign.

Both the county chairman and Mr. Thomas are anxious that donations be made as early as possible, in order that the campaign may be closed.

## Col. Herring of Breckenridge Was Luncheon Speaker

Dr. C. E. Paul was program chairman at a joint meeting of Cisco Lions and Rotarians yesterday, at Laguna Hotel. Leon Paul introduced Col. Robert Herring of Breckenridge as the principal speaker, who spoke interestingly on the atomic bomb. The visitor was a member of the intelligence staff of Gen. Douglas MacArthur and was within 50 miles of Nagasaki, Japan, when that city was practically wiped out. He visited the scene two weeks later.

Colonel Herring's talk included an intimate story relative to the defense of Australia early in the Pacific war. In the speaker's opinion the Battle of Bismarck Sea was the turning point in the war against the Japs.

Speaking of Jap suicide attacks, Colonel Herring stated that approximately 75 percent of the Jap pilots who staged the attacks had been drugged before their planes took off.

As an intelligence officer, the colonel interviewed Kagawa, Japanese Christian leader. Kagawa stressed the need of Bibles, missionaries, food and clothing immediately as an aid to bringing the

Japanese into closer relation with Christianity.

A full turnout of both Rotarians and Lions heard the talk and were much impressed with it.

### SCUTTLE AND RUN!

There is something frightening in the let-down that has followed the war. It runs deeper than mere relaxation of weary people after years of strain.

Our military disintegration, the mass demonstrations of American troops in foreign lands, the lawlessness and strikes at home—they all add up to an abdication of individual responsibility that can mean the destruction of democratic government in the United States.

Referring to the present state of collapse in the Armed Forces, the New York Times says: "Peace apparently has brought a release from the feeling of individual responsibility that showed itself during the war at home as well as on the battle fronts—the feeling that what each was doing, even if it was only playing a small role, was a part of the whole national and international effort."

Now each apparently is willing to let the other do it. Each parent is willing to let some other parent's son stay overseas if only he can get his own son back.

Every possible influence is brought, every possible string is pulled, to secure preferred treatment. A recent report from a European command said that two officers were kept busy doing nothing else but running down inquiries from just one senator as to the status of the sons of his constituents.

Part of the fault for our southerly and run attitude lies with the policy of the government which sold millions of people to the idea that war was an investment rather than an expense. Were not war bonds sold on that basis? And how ingrained of settling into the harness.
