# Steel-CIO Pact Blasted the Reconversion Log Jam

WASHINGTON, Feb. 16.—The 24-hour-old agreement between the U. S. Steel Corporation and the United Steel Workers (CIO) appeared tonight to have blasted loose the nation's reconversion log-jam and generated an accelerating wave of strike settlements that promised to return 1,000,000 workers to their jobs in the near future.

Republic Steel Corporation signed an identical agreement in Cleveland today.

The U. S. Steel Corporation agreement covered 125,000 workers, Republic Steel 60,000. Other agreements reached today included—

Aluminum Company of America, Pittsburgh, 14,000 workers, 19-cent wage increase. Great Lakes Steel, Detroit, 8,000 workers, 18 1-2 cent increase.

Rustless Steel and Iron, Baltimore, 1,800 workers, 18 1-2 cents.

Pittsburg Steel Company, Pittsburg, 18 1-2 cent increase, 14,000 workers.

Philip Murray, president of the CIO and the USW, predicted the steel settlement would be followed by a quick end to strikes and disputes in the Automobile, Electrical and Shipbuilding industries.

**GM-Union's Saturday Sessions Did Not Bring Unity**

DETROIT, Feb. 16 (UP)—Hope for a quick end to the 88-day General Motors strike persisted today as top officials of the corporation and CIO United Auto Workers met in day-long conferences with federal mediator James F. Dewey.

Dewey declined to discuss progress of the talks during the noon recess, but he remarked earlier that prospects for a settlement were "very promising" in view of agreement in the nationwide steel deadlock.

Negotiating committees at today's session were headed by GM President C. E. Wilson and President R. J. Thomas of the UAW.

Wilson, leaving the conference room momentarily late in the day, refused to discuss the possibilities of a quick settlement, but said "we're moving."

Thomas did not share Dewey's optimistic view of the probable outcome of today's talks, asserting as he entered the conference room that he would be "awfully surprised if there's a settlement out of this meeting."

LONDON, Feb. 16 (UP)—The first asparagus of 1946 was a sell-out in a few luxury food shops today at \$13 a bunch.

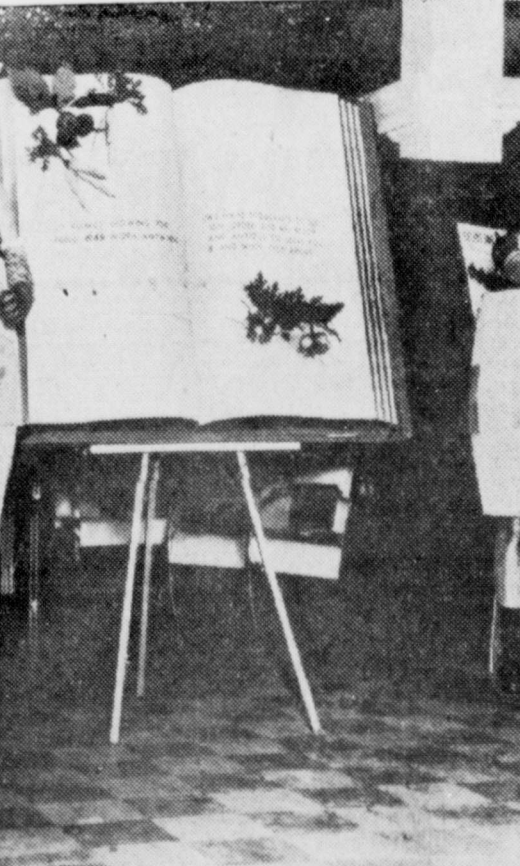
## 65 Ex-service Men Have Enrolled at Cisco Jr. College

The first of a series of four lectures in the second annual Institute of International Understanding, sponsored by Cisco Rotary club, will be presented at Cisco high school auditorium Friday evening, February 22, 8 o'clock, preceded by a 30-minute concert by the Lobo band.

All proceeds above actual expenses of this institute will be given to the Lobo band with which the band may purchase needed equipment. Members of the band are selling the season tickets.

In presenting this institute the Rotary club is bringing to Cisco some of the outstanding speakers of the nation on problems which are of immediate and serious concern to all thinking citizens.

The opportunity of hearing these speakers is one denied to the average small city and for that reason Rotary feels it is performing a distinctive service to the community and particularly to those citizens who are keenly aware of their responsibilities in these times of confusion and international uncertainty. Through such institutes these citizens are enabled to obtain a clearer perception and a better grasp of fundamental conditions.

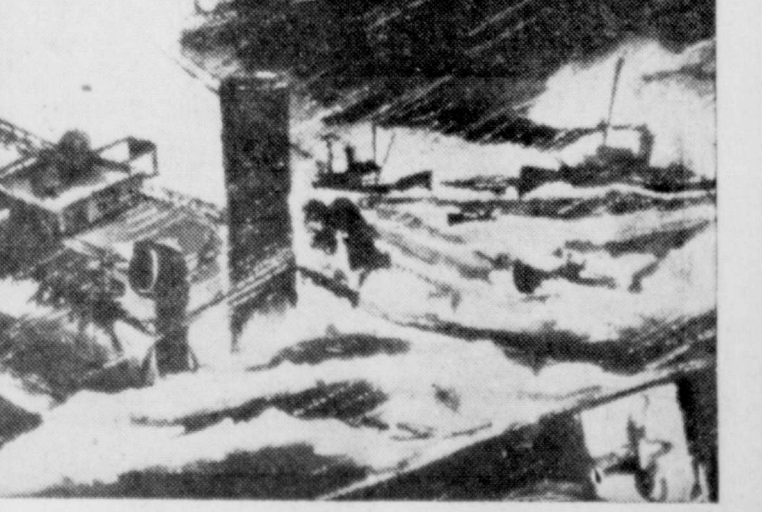
Subjects which will be discussed include "Making an International Organization Effective," by Morris H. Coers, minister, legislator and recently a director of American Red Cross field work in Africa, Sicily and Italy, where he spent 16 months in close contact with conditions in those troublesome areas. Mr. Coers will present the first lecture Friday, February 22.

Following him on successive Thursday evenings will be Geoffrey F. Morgan, writer, educator and lecturer who now manages the speakers bureau of the Douglas Aircraft Corp., in Santa Monica, California, and who will speak on "The Constructive Use of Air Transport;" W. Leon Godshall, writer, educator with many years of international service ranging from colleges in Shanghai, Canton, and Manila to American institutions, who will speak on "International Security in the Pacific" and Chester M. Tobin, private investment counselor of Chicago and student of world economic problems, whose subject will be "Maintaining World Trade and a High Standard of Living."

Season tickets for these addresses are being sold at \$2 each, including tax, and they are going rapidly. Already the members of the band have sold several hundred and indications are that much larger crowds than heard the lectures last year will hear the series shortly to begin.

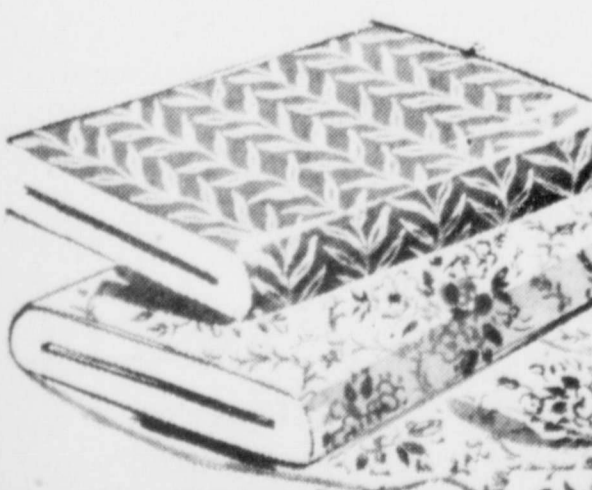

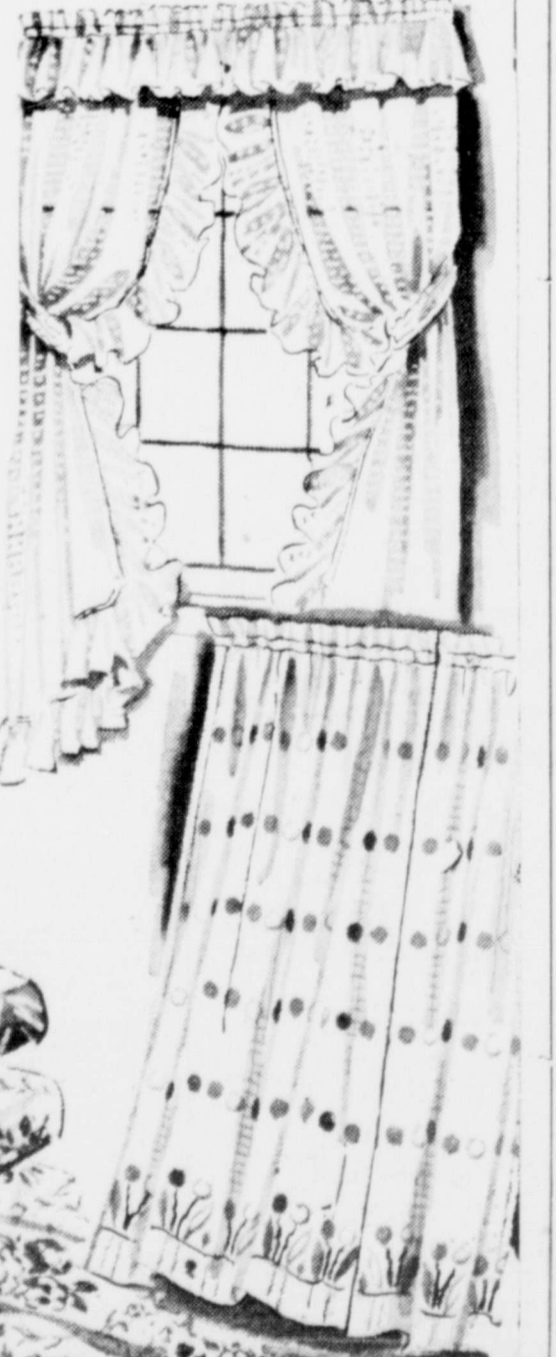
