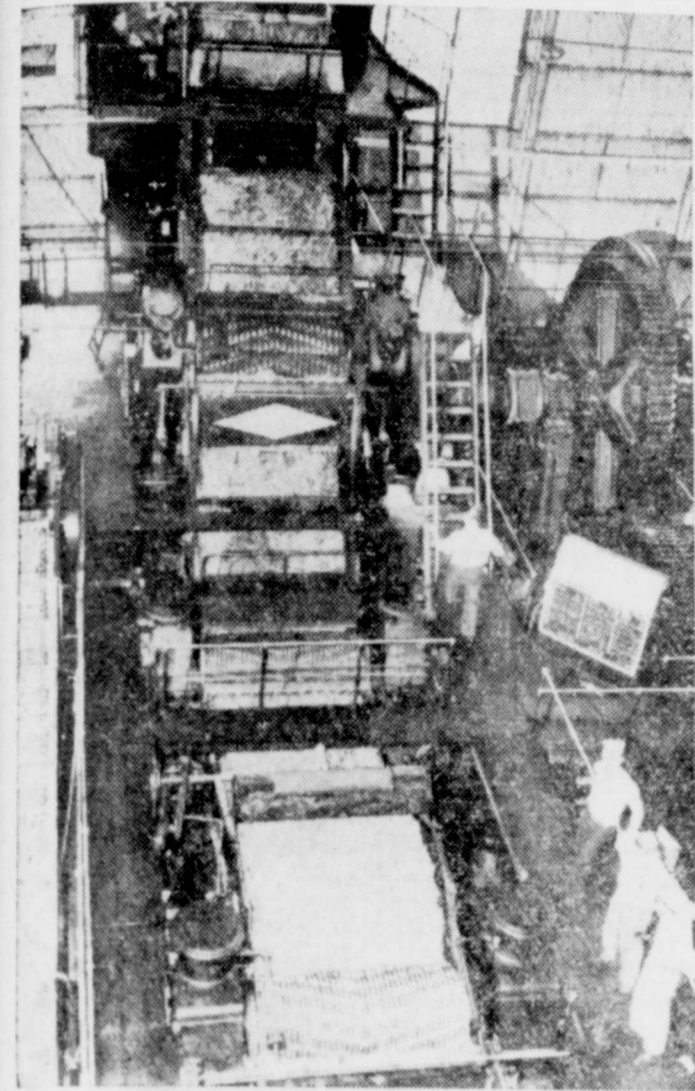

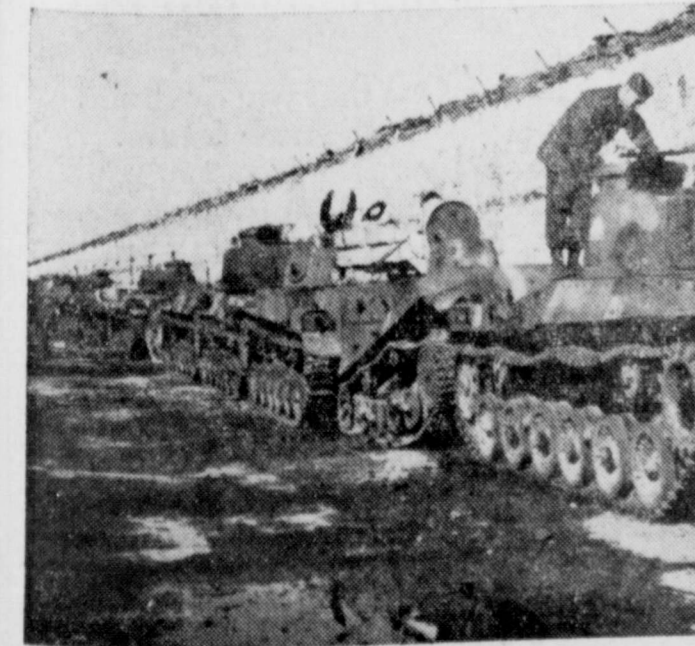

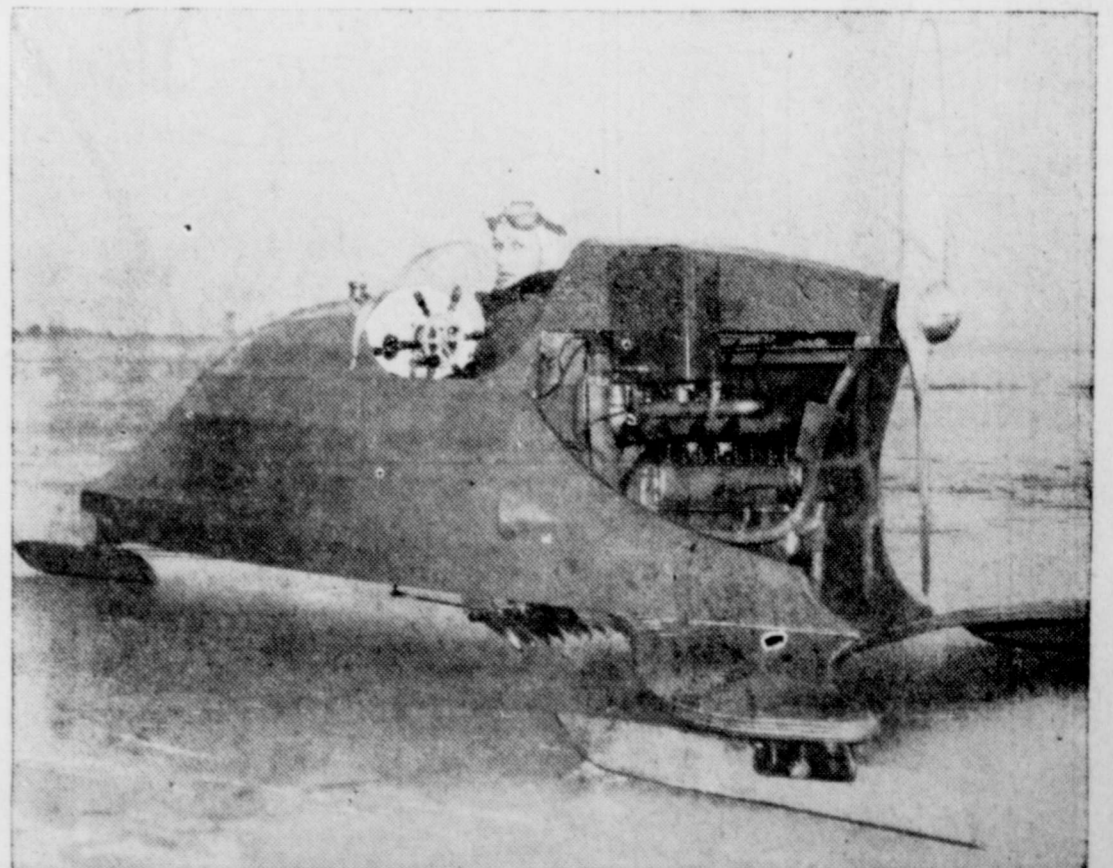

## FOR MOON TOURISTS.

There is more than the usual interest in the moon of late. Recently radar contact was announced. Now it's a moon map. And why not? Since rocket ships are a reality, if not yet practical for passenger traffic, the day may come when a road map of the moon might come handy. The moon is only some 240,000 miles away. If a rocket airplane can fly 1,500 miles an hour, it would be a journey of only six or seven days before a call could be made on the Man in the Moon himself. (Of course trifles like gravitation and lack of air still remain to be considered.)

Astronomers have the surface charted, or nearly so. That is, half the surface. The moon goes round in such a fashion that it keeps the same side turned always toward the earth. What's on the back of the moon nobody will know until someone gets there. But the half that is known shows deep craters, 60,000 of them, some 100 miles wide and a few at least 24,000 feet deep. There are many mountains on the moon, some higher than earth's highest. Man has named these for places on his world and from episodes in his literature.

Not only these depths and heights might make moon travel difficult, but there is the matter of something that looks like glass rivers pouring down the mountain

sides. It's a little hard to know from here just how to navigate them. But the scientists, men of magic, may figure this out, too, in time.

Tourist agencies will be glad to know that when earth-folk get ready to go a-mooning, a pocket map will be all ready.

## AFFORDING A WIFE.

The financial status of divorced men, says Judge Ralph Hamill of the Indianapolis Superior Court, ought to be examined before they are permitted to remarry. Then they would not incur the responsibilities of a new family while having all they could do to support the old.

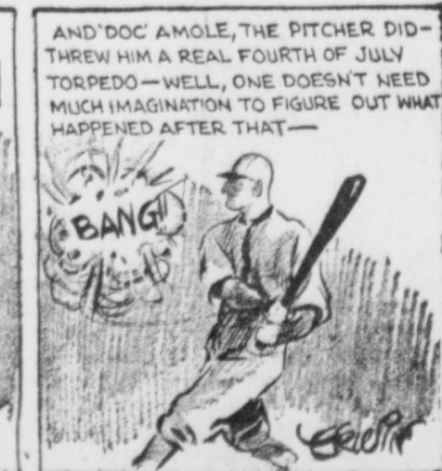

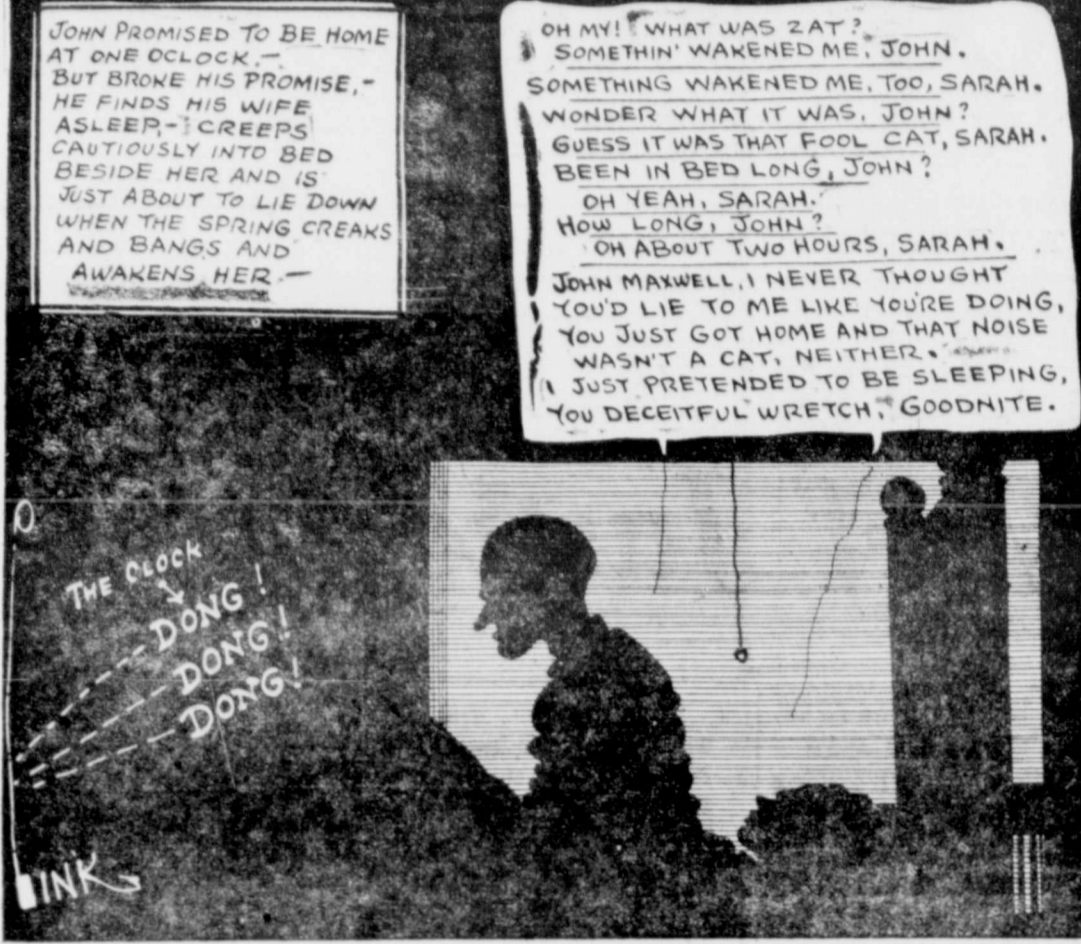
