FLASH (4:45 P. M.) — Ambassador Gromyko and other Russian delegates dramatically stalked out of the Security Council meet-when it became clear that the Iranian question would not be tabled until April 10, as Russia demanded.

A few minutes later seven members voted for an Egyptian motion to call Iran before the council to state her side of the Soviet-Iran dispute. Poland and Australia were the only dissenters.

NEW YORK, Mar. 27. — Secretary of State James F. Byrnes today accused the Soviet government of giving the United Nations Security Council inaccurate information about the status of the Soviet-Iran dispute.

Byrnes categorically stated that there has been no settlement of the Iranian-Soviet question.

This was in contrast to Soviet Ambassador Andrei A. Gromyko's assertion that there was an "agreement"—a statement he later changed to "understanding."

Byrnes continued his vigorous fight to get an immediate council hearing of the Iranian case and solemnly warned the council that if Iran was denied the right to appear before it "all confidence in the security council will disappear."

ATLANTIC CITY, N. J., Mar. 27. (AP)—Walter P. Reuther, 38-year-old vice president of the United Automobile Workers Union—CIO—was elected president of the union today, unseating R. J. Thomas, the burly tobacco-cheiving leader who had led the UAW since 1938.

Reuther's startling upset victory threw the UAW's tenth convention into a bedlam.

The official vote was not disclosed immediately.

## Texans Unfairly Penalized by U. S. Court Ruling

When a Texan dies, how can his wife inherit from herself?

Lawyers are scratching their heads about that, because the United States Supreme Court rules that a Texas widow has to pay an inheritance tax on her own half of the community property. Naturally Texas women are aroused about that.

When a Texas rancher and his wife start out in life, half of what they accumulate together belongs to him and half to her. Suppose it all adds up to \$120,000 when he dies; under the old law, he left only \$60,000, because the other \$60,000 belongs to his wife. He couldn't will her half away, if he wanted to. It is hers, Texas law says so.

Under the old Federal inheritance tax law, a \$60,000 deduction comes off the husband's estate of \$60,000, leading a taxable balance of zero. So the old tax took nothing from the widow. But the new tax law says the whole \$120,000 is the measure of the estate. The new law deducts \$60,000 from the \$120,000, and taxes the widow \$9,500 on the balance. In effect she is charged \$9,500 to be her own heir to her own property while she is still alive. The court doesn't put it so; but that is the way it figures out.

From a \$250,000 community estate, the old law would take \$10,500 from the husband's share alone. The new law takes \$47,700 from the whole estate. Here the widow pays \$36,800 to inherit her own half from herself!

On a very big estate (because the inheritance tax is graduated up to 77 per cent) a widow might be taxed out of the whole of her husband's bequest to her—and still owe a big payment besides. And in many of these cases, where the estate is not built up from wages, etc., the husband would be in like position at the death of his wife. He would have to pay the tax on two estates instead of one.

The Supreme Court seems to feel that a wife, as such, contributes nothing of economic value to the marital firm. Take the case of a Texas lawyer who accumulates in a lifetime an estate of \$500,000, all from legal fees. His wife doesn't do a thing except have four babies, rear them for him, manage his household, nurse him through illness (and save his life a time or two), look after his socks and shirts and see that there is no egg on his vest after breakfast. Under the new law, when that man dies, his estate pays a tax of \$126,500.

Now half of the community property of that couple belongs to the wife. Half of it, \$250,000, is hers by Texas law. Yet the federal law treats the whole \$500,000 as if it were the husband's. When he dies her half is taxed along with his. And, five years later, when she dies, her half is taxed again—a plain case of double taxation, as anybody except the Supreme Court can see.

Of course the court has its arguments and they are all very logical. But legal double talk by Congress and the Supreme Court work it out that a Texan can inherit from himself, although a New Yorker or a Kansan can't inherit from himself. And some Texas estates can pay death duties twice although the owner dies only once, seeing that in Texas deaths maintain an old-fashioned average of only one per capita.

No wonder the lawyers are scratching their heads.

## POSTMASTERS' CONVENTION.

Postmaster and Mrs. L. H. McCrea and children, Mary and Luther, returned home last night from Austin, where they attended the National Association of Postmasters convention, held in that city Sunday, Monday and Tuesday. About 400 persons from all portions of Texas were present, together with a number of prominent men and postoffice officials from the national capital. Included in the latter were Robert E. Hannegan, postmaster general; Jesse M. Donaldson, assistant postmaster general, and A. S. Har-grove, inspector in charge at Fort Worth. This was the first convention since 1941.

## 180,000 Old-age Pensioners Now on Texas Rolls

AUSTIN, Mar. 27.—Gov. Coke Stevenson said Tuesday he sees no way of voiding a cut in old-age assistance checks in April or May.

"John Winters, director of public welfare, is very resourceful, and James Marley, regional director for the Social Security Board, has been co-operative," Stevenson said, expressing hope they can find enough money to continue paying eligible claims in full.

Winters said, following the governor's comment, that he did not think the cut next month would be over 50c below the amount ascertained as needed by the individual pensioner. He said a cut is inevitable, but that it will not be in the proportion feared by many.

This month's average pension was \$24.93 and in April it will be approximately \$24.50 and go to some 180,000 old folks, Winters explained. The precise figures may be announced today so that pensioners will know what to expect in April. Winters was not estimating the May figures this early.

In the meantime Winters is readying himself to be in Washington next week for the hearings before the house ways and means committee to liberalize social security to include handicapped unemployables, the self-employed not now covered by the law's benefits, the decrepit of a married couple who is under 65, and, finally, changing the old-age assistance matching formula from even money to 60 per cent by the federal government and 40 per cent by the state.

ATLANTIC CITY, N. J., Mar. 27. (AP)—The United Nation's Relief and Rehabilitation Administration called upon the United Nations today to adopt food rationing and take other steps to prevent the threatened starvation of 500,000 persons throughout the world.

A food sub-committee asked the UNRA council to recess its meeting here briefly to allow food-supplying nations to act on a five-point program to relieve famine conditions in a large part of the world's area.

## NEED U. S. SUPPORT.

WASHINGTON, Mar. 27. (AP)—An oil industry representative urged the government today to give "strong and active diplomatic support" to American oil companies in foreign countries.

"The American government should promote and facilitate international agreements to further this objective," said A. Jacobsen, president of the Amerada Petroleum Corp.

## Let's Face the Facts About HOME BUILDING

In the confusion about the shortage of homes in America, one point stands out clearly:

### YOU CAN'T BUILD HOMES WITHOUT MATERIALS!

Lumber and building dealers and contractors obviously have a vital interest in obtaining materials for home building.

They report, nevertheless, that such materials are not flowing through the yards; that they have not been able to get them. Therefore, the Government's HH priorities offered to enable veterans and others to obtain homes, are simply home hunting licenses—for materials in quantity are not available.

As long as OPA continues its wartime control policy rather than a policy of adjustment to aid reconversion, it will neither be able to prevent an inflation or a deflation; it will only be able to prevent reconversion by discouraging production of needed home building items.

Here, for example, is an instance of OPA action that has resulted in increased production. After 6 months' delay OPA granted a 4% to 10% price adjustment that allowed 125 to 400 closed brick and tile plants to reopen. This price adjustment allowed these plants and 400 others that had been operating, to hire needed labor. As a result, in the next quarter production rose 35%.

But in hardwood flooring, siding, plywood, millwork, and construction lumber, OPA clings to its wartime formulas. Instead, OPA follows the unrealistic policy of allowing premium prices to mills for producing lumber for such things as export to foreign countries, and for items that were needed in wartime industry.

Today's question is not essentially one of price control — if there were plenty of homes, no price controls would be necessary. The important question is one of production and manpower.

So far, OPA and Government officialdom in general have contented themselves with controls, allocations and priority systems which at best can do nothing but juggle an insufficient supply of building materials—and at worst, delay and retard production and the employment of manpower.

Homes will not be built in the United States unless the Building Industry builds them. Whether they are labeled "Public Housing" or "Private Homes," the same materials, the same labor, the same building industry will build them.

Production can be unblocked by the removal or adjustment of OPA's wartime policies. But such a realistic approach cannot be attained as long as Government action is based on a philosophy of lack rather than a philosophy of abundant supply for peacetime prosperity.

The lumber dealers, builders and contractors stand ready to build or rebuild America. But it is up to the people to determine that the way be cleared for the production of materials for homes.



### Plane Talk

**G. I. Training.**

Five ex-service men, enrolled in Cisco Junior college, have begun flight training in connection with their classwork. The student pilots are Ernest Prange, George Burnette, A. J. Whitlock, Jack Wilkinson and Eugene Durden.


To be eligible for the training, students must be enrolled full time and take certain courses with flying as a related subject.

Concentrated courses in flying alone, requiring 30 weeks or less, are available to veterans under the G. I. bill. However, the big operators are already trying to capture all the business by bringing pressure to bear on state boards of education to raise the requirements in order to keep small schools from qualifying. In Texas they require that the school have a secondary rating, which requires an extensive outlay of shop and ground school equipment, as well as a minimum of three airplanes, regardless of the number of students or courses to be given. One state even reports that only airports with paved runways may qualify.


If this policy is allowed to continue it will be the same old story of big business "hogging it all" and little business left to starve.
