After Confab, Gromyko and Lange Attend Council

By United Press.

NEW YORK, Mar. 28.—Soviet Ambassador Andrei A. Gromyko and Polish Ambassador Oscar Lange held a strategy conference at the Soviet Consulate today just before the United Nations Security Council was scheduled to convene in secret session to discuss its crisis. Gromyko and an adviser left the consulate shortly before 3 p. m. and nodded yes when asked if they were going to the council session.

"We just want to find out what's on," Lange, former Chicago university professor, said with a smile when he arrived at the Soviet Consulate.

Lange was the only defender of Russia's attempt to postpone consideration of the Iranian case. He has accused the United States and Great Britain of "maneuvering" Russia out of yesterday's council meeting.

At the London council meetings and at this week's wild and hectic debates here, the Poles have sided with Russia on every issue.

Russia has lost every major vote on the Iranian case here by a 9 to 2 vote — the two being Russia and Poland.

The Lange-Gromyko conference came after the Russians denied that they had walked out on UNO, asserting that they were only absenting themselves from any meetings on the Iranian question until April 10.

The split between Russia and America remained wide open and there were no attempts this morning by either side to make a conciliatory move.

In Washington, President Truman said that Secretary of State James F. Byrnes had his full support in pressing for immediate consideration of the Iranian situation.

Vented Appliances Slaughter, Stark, To Be Shown at McCannies Only Lone Star Party Names on Ballot

The housing program contemplated for Cisco lends impetus to the need for vented gas heating equipment with its benefits of health and comfort, according to C. M. Burke, Cisco district manager for Lone Star Gas company.

Contractors and architects recommend that persons considering new construction plan heating as part of the house so the necessary flues for venting gas heating equipment can be installed when the house is built, Mr. Burke pointed out.

A display of vented gas heating appliances will be one of the features of Lone Star's open house Thursday, April 4, in its new office and warehouse in the south wing of the Laguna Hotel building. This equipment will include vented circulating heaters, floor furnaces, central heating plants and unit heaters. Information on the year-round gas air conditioner will be available and new gas ranges, Servel gas refrigerators and automatic storage type water heaters will also be on display.

The open house will start at 9 a. m. and continue 12 hours during which time coffee and cookies will be served. An information booth will contain material on home planning and kitchen designing and recipe sheets and cookery information will be distributed.

"Much of the health and comfort of the family depends upon the temperature and humidity within the home," Mr. Burke said. "One of the important considerations in the building of a new home or modernizing the present one should be the type of heating equipment selected and how it is installed. The time to attend to the selection and installation of gas appliances is during the planning stage."

"Vented heating is heating by means of appliances which are connected to a flue. The purpose of connecting appliances to a flue is to carry to the outside air the products of combustion which result from burning fuel, thus preventing release of these products into the room. When an open flame unvented room heater is used, the burning gas, combining with elements in the air, throws off water vapor and other products which are released into the room."

Benefits of vented heating equipment, as pointed out by Mr. Burke, follow: Vented heating prevents or reduces condensation of water vapor on walls, windows and furniture, commonly called "wall sweating;" prevents that

ABILENE, Mar. 28. — Pupils and pre-school children are to be given immunizations against four diseases Monday in North Park junior high school and Hamby school, the Abilene-Taylor county health unit, sponsors, said today. There will be no charge to the children.

Diseases included in the immunizations are diphtheria, whooping cough, typhoid and smallpox. The health unit is anxious to have pre-school children of the two school districts to receive this service.

stuffy condition which results from burning gas in an open flame heater; makes possible, when properly located, winter comfort throughout the whole house; reduces drafts and other conditions causing winter colds. Vented heating is planned, tailor-made heating designed to fit the conditions of each individual home, office, store or factory. It can be operated by thermostat so that the temperature desired for comfort is automatically maintained.

Mr. Burke pointed out that "wall sweating" has baffled many householders, explaining that the burning of any material produces water vapor.

"This is true of wood, coal, oil or natural gas," he said. "When wood, coal or oil is used, a flue pipe is required to carry away the smoke and partially burned particles, and the water vapor produced goes out the flue along with the smoke."

"However, natural gas is so clean and burns so completely, it can be used in appliances which have no flue pipes and the products of combustion are invisible to the eye. When gas appliances are used without flue pipes, the water vapor is released into the room and is distributed throughout the entire house, condensing on any cold surface with which it comes in contact, such as furniture, draperies, windows, walls, and ceilings, and clothes in closets."

"The solution then to the problem of 'sweating' and of stuffy air in the home is to carry off the moisture, bad air and other products of combustion by venting gas equipment to a flue."

Bud Tatom, Stalwart Citizen, 80 Died Last Night

Richard Abney (Bud) Tatom, retired farmer and 80 years of age, who came here from Brownwood ten years ago, died at 8:15 last night at his home on west Ninth street, after an illness of about one year.

Mr. Tatom, one of Cisco's most highly esteemed citizens, was born in Benton county, Tenn., Feb. 18, 1866. He served in the Spanish-American war as a private under General MacArthur, father of Gen. Douglas MacArthur, and participated in the successful expedition against Manila and in other battles.

Funeral service will be held at 4 o'clock this afternoon, at Thomas funeral chapel, with burial in Oakwood cemetery. Rev. Evan Holmes, assisted by Rev. G. S. Westbrook, will be the officiating ministers.

Survivors are the wife, four children by a former marriage — Mrs. T. A. Loyd, Post; Mrs. M. S. Smith, Strawn; Lee and Frank Tatom, California; three stepchildren — Mrs. Floyd Smith, Brownwood; H. E. Nance, Santa Monica, Calif.; O. A. Nance, Cisco. There are also 15 grandchildren and 13 great grandchildren.

Plane Talk

Air Safety.

One of the big questions in the minds of a non-flying person is what happens if the engine quits when you are "way up there." Many believe the plane falls like a brick tossed out a window.

The average light airplane has a glide ratio of 7 to 1. By that we mean that if the airplane is 1,000 feet above the ground it can glide 7,000 feet, or more than a mile, before being forced to land. A pilot then at that altitude has a choice of any field within the radius of a mile or more than 6 square miles.

To protect the residents of congested areas the C.A.A. has set the minimum of 1,000 feet for flying over towns, or high enough to glide clear.

The practice of "buzzing" towns is viewed with disfavor by airport operators everywhere. We all realize that to promote the growth of flying we must promote safety and public approval. Definite regulations have been set up to protect the public from reckless and careless flyers and state police have been given the power to enforce them.

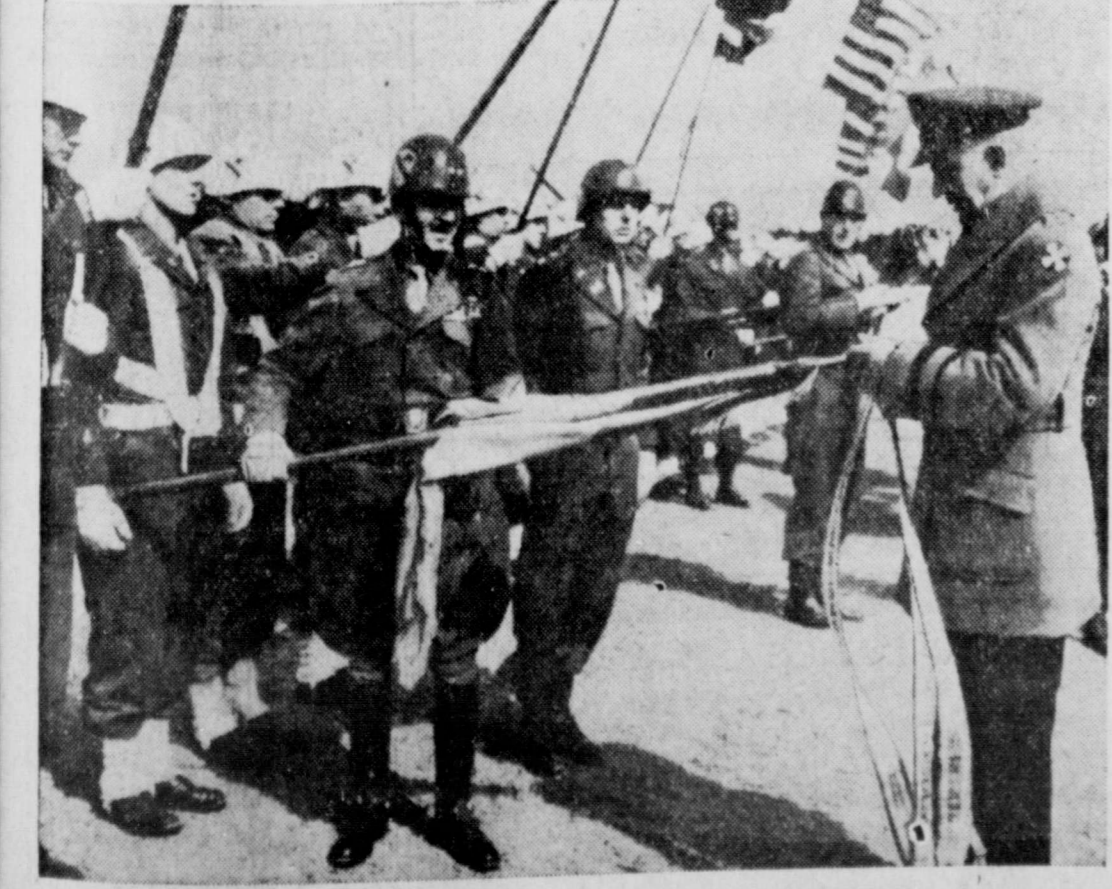

CONTROL COAL SHIPMENTS. WASHINGTON, Mar. 28. (U.P.)—The government today took iron-clad control of soft coal shipments in order to assure distribution to most essential users during the strike that is threatened for next week.

Let's Face the Facts About HOME BUILDING

In the confusion about the shortage of homes in America, one point stands out clearly: YOU CAN'T BUILD HOMES WITHOUT MATERIALS!

Lumber and building dealers and contractors obviously have a vital interest in obtaining materials for home building.

They report, nevertheless, that such materials are not flowing through the yards; that they have not been able to get them. Therefore, the Government's HH priorities offered to enable veterans and others to obtain homes, are simply home hunting licenses—for materials in quantity are not available.

As long as OPA continues its wartime control policy rather than a policy of adjustment to aid reconversion, it will neither be able to prevent an inflation or a deflation; it will only be able to prevent reconversion by discouraging production of needed home building items.

Here, for example, is an instance of OPA action that has resulted in increased production. After 6 months' delay OPA granted a 4% to 10% price adjustment that allowed 125 to 400 closed brick and tile plants to reopen. This price adjustment allowed these plants and 400 others that had been operating, to hire needed labor. As a result, in the next quarter production rose 35%.

But in hardwood flooring, siding, plywood, millwork, and construction lumber, OPA clings to its wartime formulas. Instead, OPA follows the unrealistic policy of allowing premium prices to mills for producing lumber for such things as export to foreign countries, and for items that were needed in wartime industry.

Today's question is not essentially one of price control — if there were plenty of homes, no price controls would be necessary. The important question is one of production and manpower.

So far, OPA and Government officialdom in general have contented themselves with controls, allocations and priority systems which at best can do nothing but juggle an insufficient supply of building materials—and at worst, delay and retard production and the employment of manpower.

Homes will not be built in the United States unless the Building Industry builds them. Whether they are labeled "Public Housing" or "Private Homes," the same materials, the same labor, the same building industry will build them.

Production can be unblocked by the removal or adjustment of OPA's wartime policies. But such a realistic approach cannot be attained as long as Government action is based on a philosophy of lack rather than a philosophy of abundant supply for peacetime prosperity.

The lumber dealers, builders and contractors stand ready to build or rebuild America. But it is up to the people to determine that the way be cleared for the production of materials for homes.

Any government program that does not FIRST remove the obstacle blocking production of materials will simply add additional difficulties to the problem facing the building industry.
