## Only the President Can Prevent Soft Coal Strike

### What Russia Intends Doing Is Still In Doubt

NEW YORK, Mar. 30. (AP)—Secretary of State James F. Byrnes returned to Washington today to consult President Truman tomorrow on the next United Nations move in the Iranian crisis, including the possibility that Russia might rebuff the Security Council's request for a statement on its position by 11 a. m. Wednesday.

Russian Chief Delegate Andrei A. Gromyko, who spent part of the day in his office at the Russian consulate general, broke his tight-lipped silence only to say that he was in constant communication with his government, sending messages and receiving them.

### Virginia Power Blackout Threat Has Been Averted

RICHMOND, Va., Mar. 30. (AP)—A state-wide power blackout was averted late today when union leaders agreed to call off a strike at the Virginia Electric Power company, scheduled for midnight Sunday.

The union's decision also relieved the necessity for a showdown with Gov. William Tucker, who had taken the drastic step of drafting the power workers into the state militia and had planned to order them to man the generators in the event of the strike.

### Two School Trustees to Be Chosen on April 6

Ballots for the Cisco school trustee election of Saturday, April 6, will contain four names unless others are filed with the school board secretary soon. The names and the order in which they will appear on the ballots are as follows:

F. E. Shepard, W. R. Huestis, E. L. Jackson, Charlie Burke. Two trustees are to be elected. The election will be held at city hall and the following women will be in charge of the voting: Mrs. L. A. Harrison, Mrs. J. S. Mobley and Miss Ruby Love.

Under state law, the polls open at 8 and close at 7 o'clock.

## COAL TIEUP HITS STEEL MEN HARD

WASHINGTON, Mar. 30. — Coal strike will be body punch to steel industry, only now recovering from its own shutdown. Steel producers will have to curtail coke oven operation immediately to stretch coal supply.

Basic steel production will come to a stop if strike is prolonged. Fabricators and processors, already scrambling for scarce steel, will feel early pinch. Whole success of reconversion hinges on large steel production for autos, refrigerators, other consumer goods.

Steel supply now is even lower than during four-week strike. Civilian production administration had close shutdown this week on restoring allocation controls, decided against it.

Coal settlement will involve more money for miners, hence higher steel-making costs. So, producers will demand another price increase; and fabricators will too.

Turmoil within CIO United Automobile Workers won't subside as result of Walter Reuther's election as president. Other three top officers will be ready to gang up any time against Reuther.

Defeat of R. J. Thomas and his shift to vice presidency leaves anti-Reuther faction still powerful.

Convention results are disturbing to motor managements because they prefer Thomas, fear Reuther can't root out factionalism. They foresee wildcat strikes stemming from union politics.

UAW leaders will try to persuade other big CIO units to withhold bouquets for Truman administration, hoping thus to force more favors.

But Phil Murray and Sidney Hillman will continue to back away from third political party movement suggested by Reuther. Reuther's expected bid for more power in national CIO affairs poses new problem for Murray.

Russia's walkout on United Nations Security Council is likely to last until April 10. Meanwhile, Council will avoid action which would provoke permanent rupture. Delegates feel first duty is to make organization work. They're caught between desire to keep Russia in council and necessity for firmness. Hence Byrnes' request that Russia and Iran clarify contradictions by Tuesday.

Iran will reply at once, standing on record already made. Russian reply is likely to be held up until April 10, date Moscow fixed for discussing case. Council meanwhile will shift to other business.

Russia attitude is summed up by top officials here: Moscow wants to stay in United Nations, Russian people are strong for it. But Stalin wants to extend Russian sphere — as far as he dares — while world conditions remain unsettled.

### POWERFUL TINY TIM

WASHINGTON, Mar. 30. (AP)—The armed services tonight lifted the curtain of wartime secrecy from their newest rocket weapons, including "Tiny Tim," a king-sized 10-foot rocket that gives a fighter plane the hitting impact of a heavy cruiser.

WASHINGTON, Mar. 30. — A nationwide strike of 400,000 soft coal miners starts on schedule at midnight tomorrow, threatening paralysis of industry if it turns out to be a long one.

Last-minute government efforts to avert the walkout collapsed. They failed despite personal intervention of Secretary of Labor Lewis B. Schwellenbach in the deadlocked contract negotiations between John L. Lewis' United Mine Workers — AFL — and the soft coal operators.

Schwellenbach announced at 5 p. m. that he had abandoned hope of preventing the strike. The government's objective now, he said, is to keep the walkout as short as possible.

He estimated coal supplies on hand are sufficient to last four to six weeks. But he said, shortages will develop earlier in particular places or industries.

Negotiations for a new soft coal contract started March 12. Lewis first demanded operator approval of health and safety program for mine workers, and declined to make specific wage demands until that issue was settled.

The operators this week offered a proposal of their own, including wage increases matching those of other major industries.

Lewis rejected it.

## Senators Demand President Ob-Cancellation ofjects to Farm Atom Bomb Tests Prices Increase

WASHINGTON, Mar. 30. (AP)—The battle over civilian vs. military control of this country's atomic energy program appeared near a compromise settlement tonight.

The compromise, hammered out by Senate Atomic Committee members and other top government officials, would place civilian representatives of the state, war and navy departments on a commission responsible for the program.

Meanwhile, another battle was shaping up over demands in the senate that President Truman cancel the tests scheduled to start July 1 in the Pacific of the atomic bomb's potency against naval vessels.

Sens. James W. Huffman, D. O., and Scott W. Lucas, D. Ill., sponsors of a resolution calling for cancellation of the once-postponed tests, indicated they would bring the issue up when the senate considers a bill to authorize use of navy ships as bomb targets.

### CALIFORNIA ALARMED

LOS ANGELES, Mar. 30. — Supplies of vaccine ran low in Pacific Northwest cities today as Seattle fought to curb an outbreak of smallpox that has taken five lives and her neighbor cities sought to bar their doors to the disease by large scale vaccination programs. Alarmed also, was California, with San Francisco reporting eight cases.

### FLEWELLEN NAMED

AUSTIN, Mar. 30. — Gov. Coke Stevenson has announced the appointment of L. H. Flewellen, former Eastland county lawyer and legislative representative, to the state industrial accident board. His appointment to the board is for a term continuing to Sept. 1, 1951. The Eastland countian has been serving as assistant attorney general.

### COMMUNIST THREAT

CHUNGKING, Mar. 30. — The semi-official Central Daily News today reported Communist troops surround Harbin and are waiting to seize the city the moment the Russians withdraw.

## Auto Dealers Protest Second OPA Cut in Profits Rogers, Patterson Hit Southern Democrats

WASHINGTON, Mar. 30. — Auto dealers took sharp issue with OPA today as auto industry wage increases boosted retail prices \$1 to \$51 for new cars built by Chrysler, Ford, Hudson and Nash.

To prevent a bigger increase, OPA ordered dealers' profit margins trimmed another two percentage points. They took a cut of two and a half points last November.

Lee W. Moran, executive vice president of the National Automobile Dealers association, termed the fresh cut a "cockeyed idea," and said his organization will continue to press its campaign to have congress outlaw the cost absorption principle.

## Mexico Releases Needed Water For Droughty Texans

WESLACO, Mar. 30. — Aid from Mexico has started off one of the most serious early-season droughts in the history of the Lower Rio Grande Valley.

By opening the flood gates of its giant El Azucar reservoir, Mexico has created a rise in the level of the Rio Grande sufficient to aid irrigation. Mexican officials said they would continue to release water until the drought period is ended.

Four upper valley districts were scheduled to continue on a rationing schedule for several days, since it will be that long before the river reaches a level to assure adequate irrigation.

### CIO CROWDING IN

DALLAS, Mar. 30. — An election to vote an 18 per cent pay increase for Dallas city employees receiving less than \$2,500 annually will be sought by the CIO.

### BONHAM FIGHT COSTLY

BONHAM, Mar. 30. — One person was dead and two more were in a Bonham hospital today as the result of an affray at the home of Mrs. Fannie Taylor Moore. Dead was John D. Moore, who was wounded in the left side in the affray which occurred at the home of his estranged wife, Mrs. Moore. The latter and Miss Johnny Tadlock suffered head injuries.

Names on the ballot will be those of W. R. Huestis, Tom Stark and J. W. Slaughter. The retiring commissioners are Charles J. Kleiner, H. S. Drumwright and A. D. Anderson, all of whom have served for a number of years and did not seek re-election.

The election will be conducted at the city hall, with the polls opening at 8 and closing at 6 o'clock.

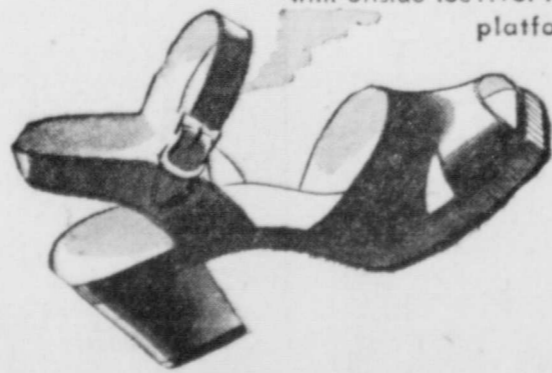

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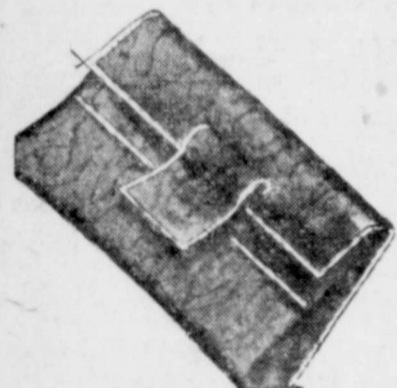
