## VISITORS TO MAKE HEAVY DEMANDS ON LAKE CISCO FACILITIES THIS SUMMER

Forrest Wright announces that a meeting of Lake Cisco Amusement company stockholders will be held at 7:30 o'clock tonight at the chamber of commerce rooms. Report of operations during the winter and for the past year will be made and one or more new directors will be chosen. Selection of a manager for this year will also be up for consideration, as well as plans for general improvement of the big swimming pool and other company properties. It is hoped to work out a general cooperative program with the city government, the local newspaper, Senior and Junior chambers of commerce and all other civic organizations, Mr. Wright stated, to the end that Lake Cisco attractions may be given the greatest aid and impetus possible through the summer months. Numerous inquiries concerning entertainment facilities at Lake Cisco are already coming in from various areas, Mr. Wright said. The latest is one from a Seventh Day Adventist youth organization in Fort Worth, which will bring approximately 125 boys and girls here for a stay of eight days. All in all, it looks like a big time at Lake Cisco this summer, and Cisco must find the way to meet all demands on its hospitality. Full cooperation of the citizenship will do it.

## Pearson Candidate for Second Legislative Term

L. R. Pearson of Ranger, now concluding his first term as legislative representative from the 107th electoral district (Eastland and Callahan counties), today announced his candidacy for re-election to a second term, subject to the will of voters in the Democratic primaries of July 27. It seems to be the general opinion that Judge Pearson made a creditable record at Austin during his first term which, his friends say, entitles him to full, unbiased consideration in his request for a second term. Pearson joined the late R. N. Grisham of Eastland, representative of the 106th district, in sponsoring the constitutional amendment passed by the 49th legislature and adopted by a vote of the people last August making the supreme court a nine-judge court instead of three judges and six commissioners. This amendment

strengthened the supreme court and met with almost universal approval. Also, Pearson introduced and piloted through the legislature House Bill 110, giving the district court authority to appoint a receiver for unknown and non-resistant royalty and mineral interests in land, for the purpose of executing an oil and gas lease thereon. This legislation has already resulted in the drilling of a number of wells in the 107th district, which otherwise could not have been drilled, due to inability to locate the mineral owners.

**Pearson's Platform.** When asked by the Daily Press if he expected to announce a platform, Mr. Pearson replied: "The 50th legislature will probably be the most important in 100 years of Texas statehood. The next legislature will be a reconvened session — the first since VE and VJ Days. A wide variety of legislation will no doubt be considered by the next legislature. It is next to impossible to embrace it all in a so-called platform. "With a healthy balance now in the general fund — the first in more than 20 years — I see no necessity for any new bills. My only promise is that if re-elected to a second term I will make a desperate effort to be reasonable and sensible, supporting all measures which are beneficial to Texas and the 107th district, and opposing legislation which I conclude is not for the best interest of my state and district. If in doubt, I will resolve the doubt against the bill. That, briefly, will be my platform."

### CAWLEY ENTERS BUSINESS.

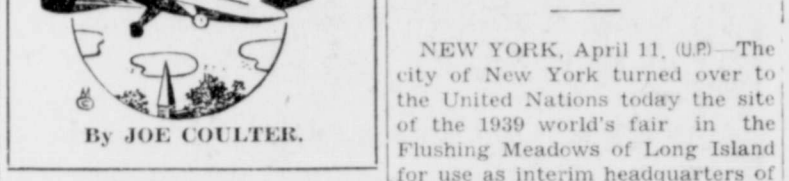

## Plane Talk

**Public Support.** Somewhere along the line the idea has sprung up that an airplane should be a self-supporting or revenue producing enterprise. For some reason many people believe that the use of the field by a plane owner should result in a direct payment to the owner of the field. This is a hold-over from the old idea of toll roads and toll bridges. In spite of the fact that roads and highways have always been supported by the public and it has become an acknowledged fact that this is the proper way to do it, we are reluctant to establish the same system for air transportation which is by far the most economical to the public per passenger mile. Few of us realize that the airplane uses the cheapest medium of transportation — free air. If you drive from here to Fort Worth you use 100 miles of concrete highway. If you fly, you use less than a mile of sod or concrete runway for the same trip. Even though forward-looking communities have gone ahead and established airports they should not be expected to bear the whole burden. A tax on aviation gasoline, collected by the state, could provide funds to aid in the construction and maintenance of airports where needed. The state of Nebraska has already adopted this policy and plans to double the number of airports in the state within the coming year. Here in Texas, where distances are great and flying weather is excellent, such a program would be even more practical. The southwest will have a greater use for air transportation than any other section yet little has been done to provide for its future.

WASHINGTON, April 11.—Rep. William O. Burgin of the eighth North Carolina district died early today at doctors hospital, where he had been under treatment for heart disease, Burgin was a Democrat and 67 years of age.

## New York Gives United Nations World Fair Site

NEW YORK, April 11. (U.P.)—The city of New York turned over to the United Nations today the site of the 1939 world's fair in the Flushing Meadows of Long Island for use as interim headquarters of the organization's general assembly.

Mayor William O'Dwyer offered to UN Secretary General Trygve Lie the municipal building at the world's fair grounds — now used as a skating rink — for use of the general assembly, which will meet Sept. 1. The offer was quickly accepted by Lie. UN will set up its general headquarters where the secretariat will function and the Council's committees will hold their meetings at the Speery Gyroscope plant in Nassau County, Long Island, about 10 miles from the fair grounds.

## Early Action Expected Against Franco and Spain

NEW YORK, April 11.—Russia was expected today to join in Poland's demands that the United Nations require Spain—accused of harboring Nazis devising new means of warfare—to act in accordance with the demands of international peace and security. Poland's indictment of Spain—characterized by the Spanish press as Russian-inspired—was brought before the security council late Wednesday under a United Nations charter provision which states that the organization "shall insure that states not members of the United Nations act in accordance with the principles of international peace and security."

### First Publicity.

MADRID, April 11.—For the first time, two of Madrid's three morning newspapers informed their Spanish readers today that Britain, France and the United States had advised Spaniards to get rid of Generalissimo Franco. The monarchist paper ABC and the Catholic paper Ya printed the news in a dispatch from New York by the official news agency EFE. The fringe newspaper Arriba did not carry the story.

## Too Many Oatmeal Sermons, Instead Beefsteak Talks

FT. WORTH, April 11.—There are too many "oatmeal" sermons and not enough "beefsteak" messages in our churches today, Rev. Thomas B. Lackey of Tulsa told Baptist revival leaders of Tarrant county at their daily breakfast at Broadway Baptist church today. "Too many members are weak in their faith because of the type of spiritual food we preachers give them," he commented. "If we would feed them on ham and eggs, or beefsteak, instead of oatmeal, they would have the strength and power to stand up better against the temptations of the world. "I have known of plain-speaking ministers losing their jobs, but we must do our duty, nevertheless," he concluded.

### ROCK THROWERS HURT.

FORT WORTH, April 11.—One youth was in a serious condition today and two others were suffering from minor gunshot wounds following, District Attorney Al Clyde said, a rock throwing incident at the home of their junior high school physical education teacher. Clyde said the students were wounded by blasts from a shotgun after stones had been hurled at the residence of S. F. "Smitty" Watkins. Watkins is under bond on assault to murder charges.

## Witnesses in London Guard House Afraid to Testify

LONDON, April 11. (U.P.)—Five prosecution witnesses refused today to testify in the Lichfield brutality court martial, saying they were "afraid" of what would happen to them in the London guardhouse if they did. All were held at the guardhouse, where an unwilling witness said the treatment he received caused him to balk at testifying.

### FBI NABBED HIM.

WASHINGTON April 11. (U.P.)—Director J. Edgar Hoover of the Federal Bureau of Investigation today announced the arrest in Knoxville, Tenn. of Earl J. McFarland, convicted murderer, who escaped from the District of Columbia death house last week.

### COMMUNISTS TAKE OVER.

CHUNGKING, China, April 11. (U.P.)—Government quarters charged today that "tens of thousands" of Communist troops are streaming into Manchuria and efforts to break the Nationalist-Communist deadlock over Manchuria again failed.

## Ranger Plans to Bring in Rodeo and Expel Rats

RANGER, April 11.—Hall Walker, president of Ranger's senior chamber of commerce, stated today that that group is 100 per cent back of the Jaycoes move to establish in Ranger a permanent rodeo organization. Walker stated that action to this effect was taken at a meeting held Monday night when it was also decided to cooperate with the state wide battle against typhus fever, by encouraging the eradication of rats in Ranger.

The chamber of commerce has been cooperating with the city in this effort and it was decided Monday night to accept the offer of the state to send a specialist here in an effort to educate the people with reference to the dangers surrounding the presence of rats in a community. Mrs. Jewel Green, secretary of the C. of C., said the state has written her stating that the man will be sent here in the near future. When the exact date of his coming is known, schedules for his appearance before clubs and schools will be worked out.

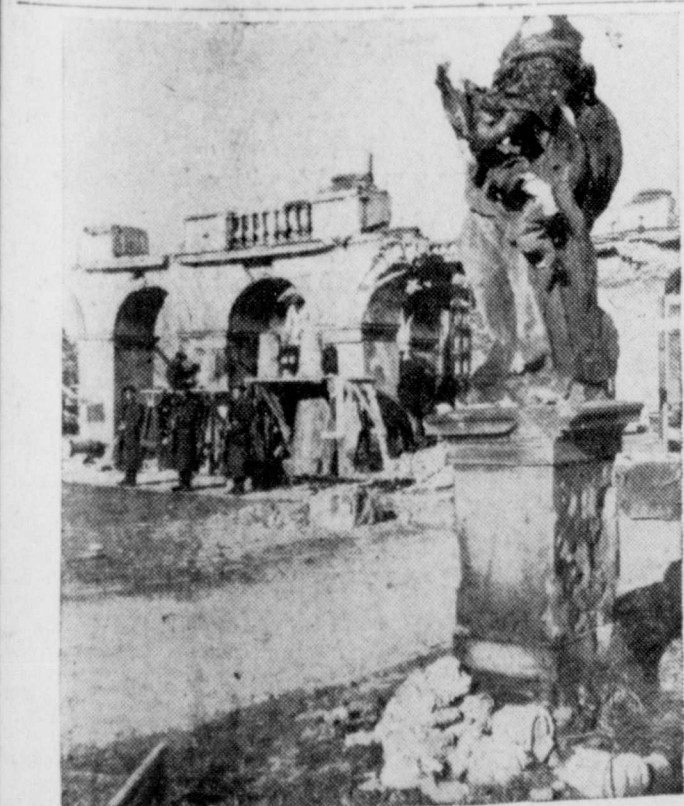
## Cisco Beat Ranger Margin of 18 Pins

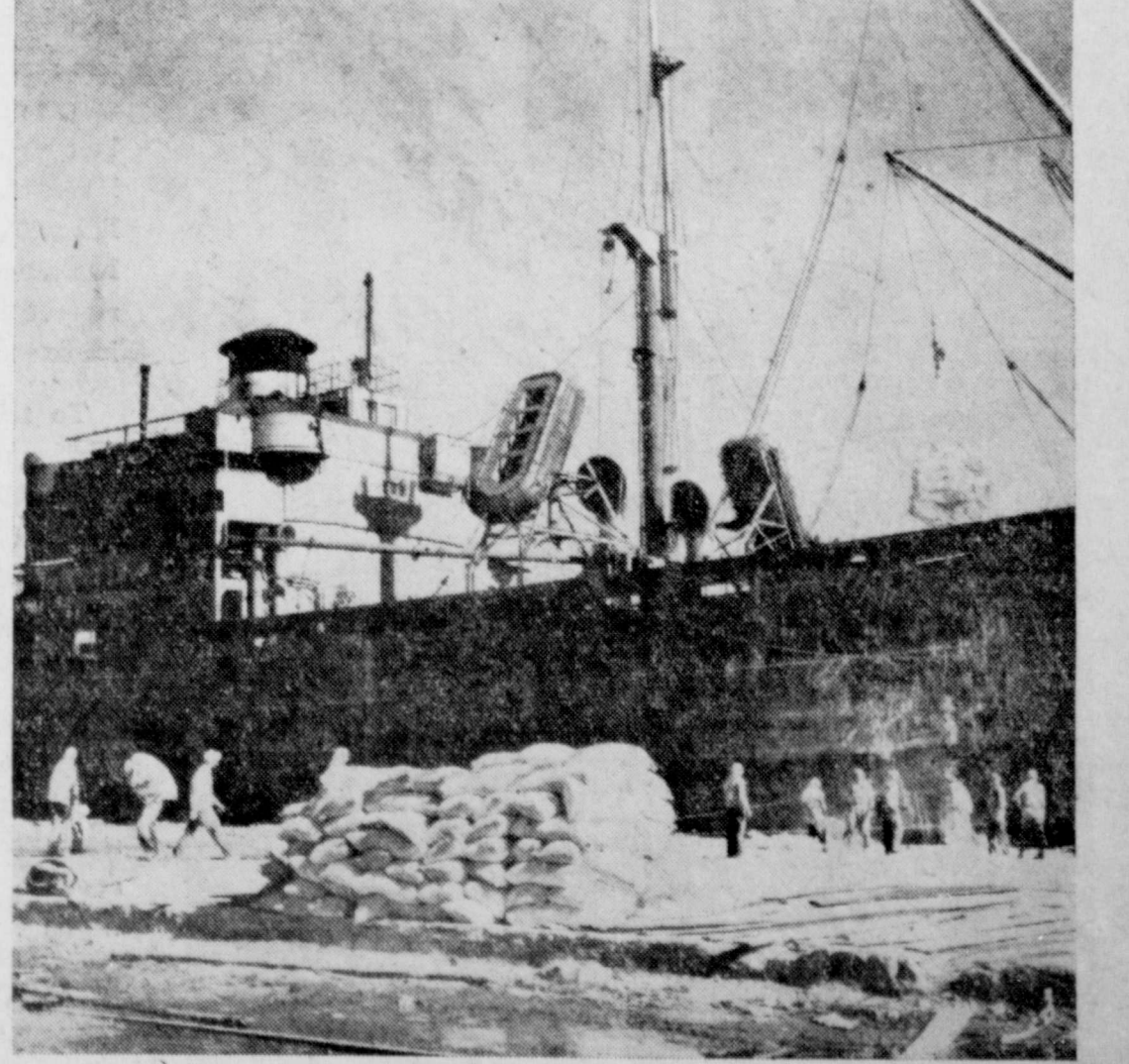
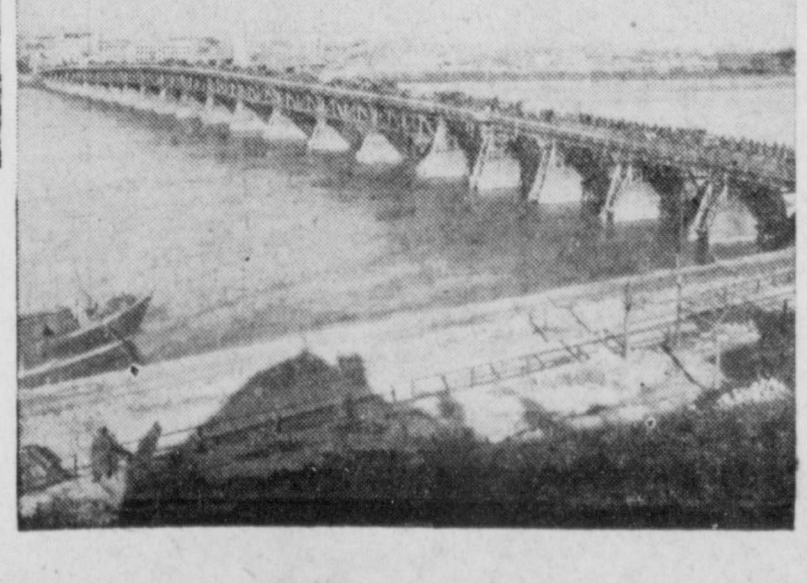
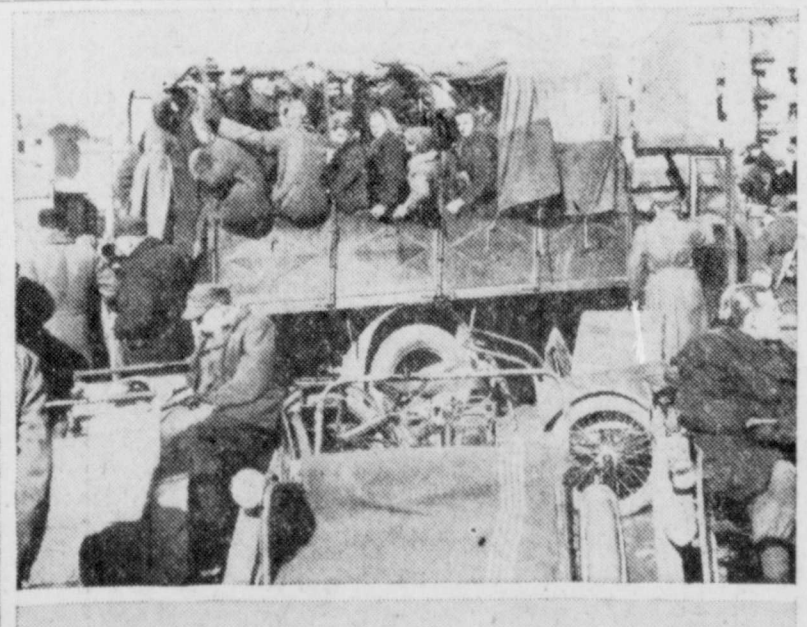

## WILL THEY HEAR?

Gen. Douglas MacArthur's appeal for all nations to renounce their "sovereign right to wage war," as it has heretofore been expressed, seems to mark a new stage of the possible progress which began with the production and military use of atomic bombs. It is a challenge of the ancient prophecy which foretold a time when mankind would turn his swords into plowshares and his spears into pruning hooks.

"Whether the world is yet ready," he says, "for so forward a step in the relations between the nations, or whether another and totally destructive war—a war involving almost mass extermination—must first be waged, is the great issue which now confronts all peoples."

It was a fitting appeal from a man whose profession is war, but whose heart, like the hearts of all normal human beings, yearns for peace. And a time has come now which morally compels peace, lest mankind as a whole perish.

## FOOLISH IDLENESS

An economic war, involving the forced idleness of production and distribution of the means whereby men live, may be almost as destructive as a shooting war, and as unnecessary. The time cries aloud for all the materials and products available in a great, rich

country, to restore the war losses and put the national economy on the march again. And there are men by hundreds of thousands who want to work and save, but are living in idleness and futility because they cannot agree about wages and other factors connected with our social system. The legendary man from Mars would doubtless find this very foolish. And indeed the man around the corner may be thinking the same way.

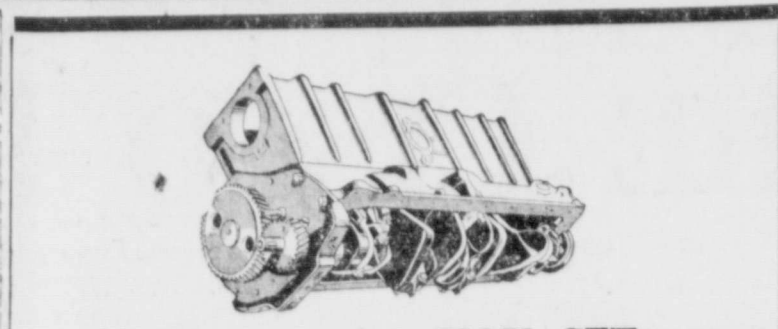

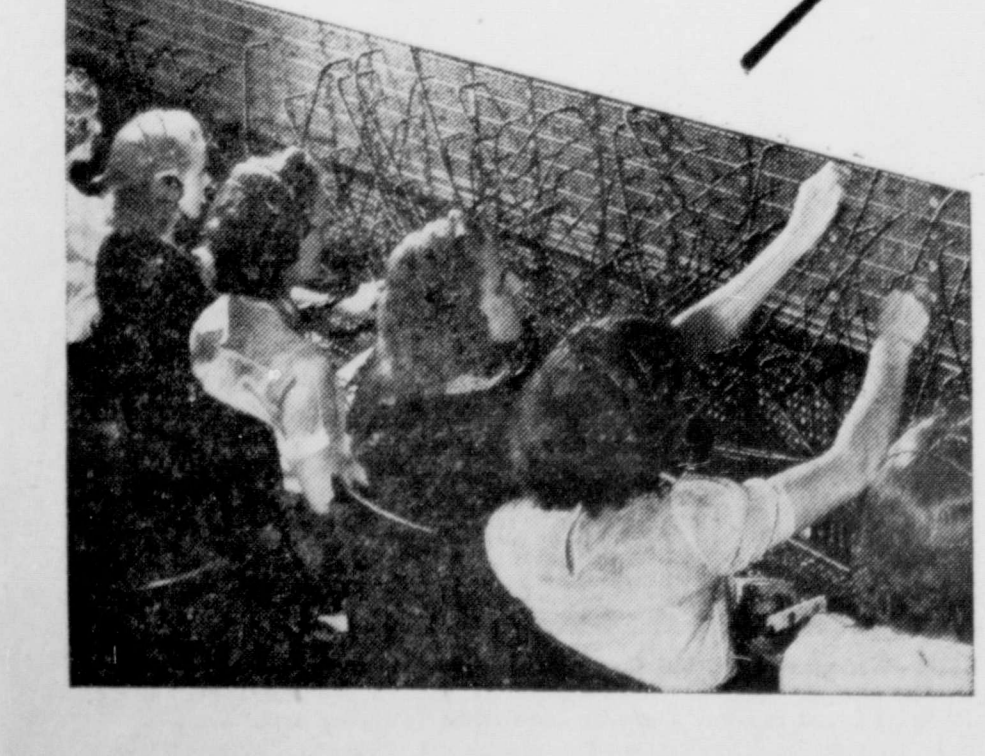

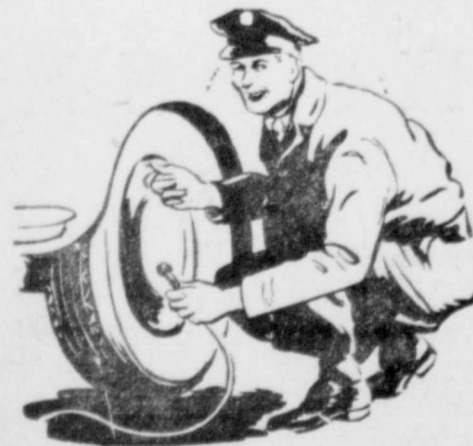
