## House Vote Against Induction Teenagers--195 to 96

### Homer Slicker, a Fine Man, Passes Suddenly; Was 59

Homer P. T. Slicker, independent oil operator and producer and a resident of Cisco since 1925, died at 12:15 Saturday morning at Graham Sanitarium, following a heart attack. He became ill about 9:30 o'clock Friday night at his home on west Tenth street.

Mr. Slicker, who would have been 59 years of age next month, was an unusually fine gentleman and was thoroughly respected and admired by a large circle of friends and acquaintances for his many excellent traits. He had previously enjoyed the best of health and always had a friendly smile and cheerful salutation for his friends and even for those whom he knew but casually. His sudden passing was a shock to all.

The funeral will be held at 11 o'clock Monday morning, at the family residence, 1011 west Tenth street. Rev. E. S. James, pastor of the First Baptist church at Vernon, formerly pastor of Cisco First Baptist church, will be the officiating minister and burial will be in Oakwood cemetery by Thomas funeral home. Pallbearers will be Roy Huffmyer, J. L. Thornton, B. E. Morehart, L. A. Warren, E. P. Crawford, O. L. Stamey, F. E. Shepard and Frank D. Pierce. Honorary pallbearers will be all friends of deceased and of the family.

Deceased, a 32d degree Mason and a member of First Presbyterian church, was born at Alum Rock, Pa., May 26, 1887. On February 27, 1917, he was united in marriage to Miss Jennie Keck, at Knox, Pa. They came to Eastland, Tex., the same year and resided there until their removal to Cisco in 1925.

Survivors include the bereaved wife, two daughters Mrs. Coy Warren and Miss Betty Slicker, Cisco; a son, Joe Slicker, Andrews, Tex.; his mother, Mrs. Henry J. Slicker; two brothers, Claude and E. E. Slicker and a sister, Mrs. P. G. Brown, all of Knox, Pa.

### Some Democrats at White Heat; May Ask Party Caucus

WASHINGTON, April 13. (AP)—Some house administration supporters feared today that Democratic demands for a party caucus might lead to requests for the resignation of Democratic National Chairman Robert E. Hannegan. More than 50 House Democrats protesting what they called the Democratic national committee's second recent big "boner," signed a petition yesterday urging an immediate meeting to discuss what they called the "incompetency and inefficiency" of the committee. A caucus must be held if 50 members request it in writing.

### Swimming Pool to Open About May 1; Swim Prices Set

At a meeting Thursday night of Lake Cisco Amusement company stockholders and directors, reports of operation and the present financial status of the organization were made and general plans for the opening of the swimming pool for the 1946 season were discussed.

The board of directors was increased from five to nine and new directors were elected, so that the present board consists of E. L. Graham, R. L. Ponsler, Charles J. Kleiner, F. D. Wright, J. H. Reynolds, Mrs. F. E. Harrell, Charles Spears, Paul M. Woods and W. J. Foxworth. W. J. Foxworth was elected president and F. D. Wright vice president.

Arrangements were made to secure a manager and assistant manager, for the immediate repairing and cleaning of the pool and bathroom and possibly painting the bathroom. A committee was appointed consisting of J. H. Reynolds, Charles Spears, R. L. Ponsler and W. J. Foxworth to go over the pool, building and equipment and determine the repairs necessary.

Prices for the 1946 season were fixed, as follows: Adults—Single swim, 35 cents; book of ten tickets, \$2.50; book of 25 tickets, \$5. Children—Single swim, 15 cents; book of ten tickets, \$1.25; book of 25 tickets, \$2.50.

It was also voted that members of Cisco fire department and their families be given season passes.

"Every effort," said a company official, "will be made to get the pool and bathroom in tiptop shape and thereby insure a successful season. The stockholders and directors desire to express their appreciation for the support the swimming pool received from citizens during the war and consequent gasoline shortage."

Appreciation was also expressed for cooperation accorded by the city commission chamber of commerce, Cisco Daily Press the civic organizations and others.

Numerous schools have made inquiry as to when the pool will be opened and what accommodations could be offered.

It is stated that the pool will be opened on or before May 1, or as soon as the necessary repairs can be completed.

### Junior Hi School Buses Forced to Quit at Austin

AUSTIN, April 13. — Special school buses for Austin junior high school students have ceased operation. Window smashing and seat cutting reached such proportions that the Austin Transit Company discontinued the service with Friday's runs, after complaints to the school board brought a reply that the board had no jurisdiction over students after school hours.

### 13-Day Soft Coal Strike Shows No Sign of Ending

WASHINGTON, April 13. (AP)—The House late today postponed until Monday a vote on draft extension legislation after tentatively approving a five-month induction holiday and prohibiting induction of teenagers and raising the draft age from 18 to 20 years.

The vote to suspend inductions from May 15 to Oct. 15 was 149 to 127.

The ban on teenage inductions was approved 195 to 96. Both proposals, offered as amendments to legislation to extend the selective service act beyond its May 15 expiration, may require roll call votes later for final approval.

Rep. Carl Vinson, D. Ga., sponsor of the draft holiday amendment, said it gave the Army and the Navy an opportunity to see whether they can meet their needs through voluntary enlistment. His proposal would permit the President to start induction again after Oct. 15, if necessary.

Rep. Dewey Short, R. Mo., opposed Vinson's plan, saying it would make Congress look like "a bunch of moral cowards," who didn't have the guts to stand up and face the issue."

### Shakeup in Armed Services if Merger Goes Through

WASHINGTON, April 13. — Truman's second year:

Some cabinet changes are likely. If merger passes, there'll be complete shakeup in armed services. In any case there'll be a new navy secretary. Chances are Schwelienbach will leave labor sometime this year. Congressional hostility to Hannegan is growing but he's likely to stay as long as he wants to.

Look for George Allen to be federal loan administrator as well as RFC chairman. Pauley will get another important job and Senate will confirm him, if necessary.

There's no immediate prospect of Truman regaining control of Congress. Anti-administration coalition will be cockier than ever after elections. Best guess is Democrats will keep nominal control of House—they're counting on full production, full employment next fall to work in their favor — but the Southern-Republican bloc will still rule roost.

Prices will keep on rising and there's nothing in sight to check black markets raging in building materials, rents, (secret illegal premium payments), meats, other foods. There'll be no food rationing before election—nor after, unless world crop failure make it inescapable.

Worst of labor troubles are over for present. Foreign policy will be improvised as we go—just as it has been in the past.

### TO GET BLACK BASS.

MINERAL WELLS, April 13. — The Texas Game, Fish and Oyster Commission has announced that they will place 250,000 black bass in Lake Mineral Wells within the next two weeks. In addition to the bass, the commission will stock the lake with 100,000 channel cat and 10,000 bream. The fish are fingerling and fry size.

### NEW OIL FIELD.

WICHITA, Kan., April 13. — Sedwick county's most important oil discovery in 10 years came in at the Beech Aircraft company's No. 2 Hine. The well was plugged at the pay horizon today after oil slopped over the top from a depth of 2926 feet.

### FOUR BURN TO DEATH.

WARREN TOWNSHIP, Mich., April 13. — Four children burned to death Saturday in a blaze which swept their three-room frame family home in Warren township.

### UN Members Hope Spanish People Oust Mr. Franco

NEW YORK, April 13. (AP)—United Nations Security Council members hoped tonight on the eve of the Council's reconvening that a full airing of Poland's charges against Franco Spain would encourage the Spanish people to get rid of Generalissimo Franco.

Council members who do not think the UN should take action against Spain, nevertheless support full discussion of the Spanish situation with the hope that it will—

1. Strengthen anti-Franco sentiment inside Spain.
2. Weaken Franco's position among the Spanish people and especially within the Spanish army.

This view was held especially by the Council members who do not agree with Poland and Russia that the Spanish regime now menaces world peace and consider it an internal matter. Notable among these are the United States and Great Britain.

### STUNTER IS KILLED.

CHICAGO, April 13. (AP)—An army photo reconnaissance plane, reported to have been stunting, crashed into a three-story apartment building today, killing the pilot and a passenger and injuring two others.

Until he became special agent of the Federal Bureau of Investigation, Burleson was active in church, fraternal and civic affairs in his own community and of the entire state of Texas. 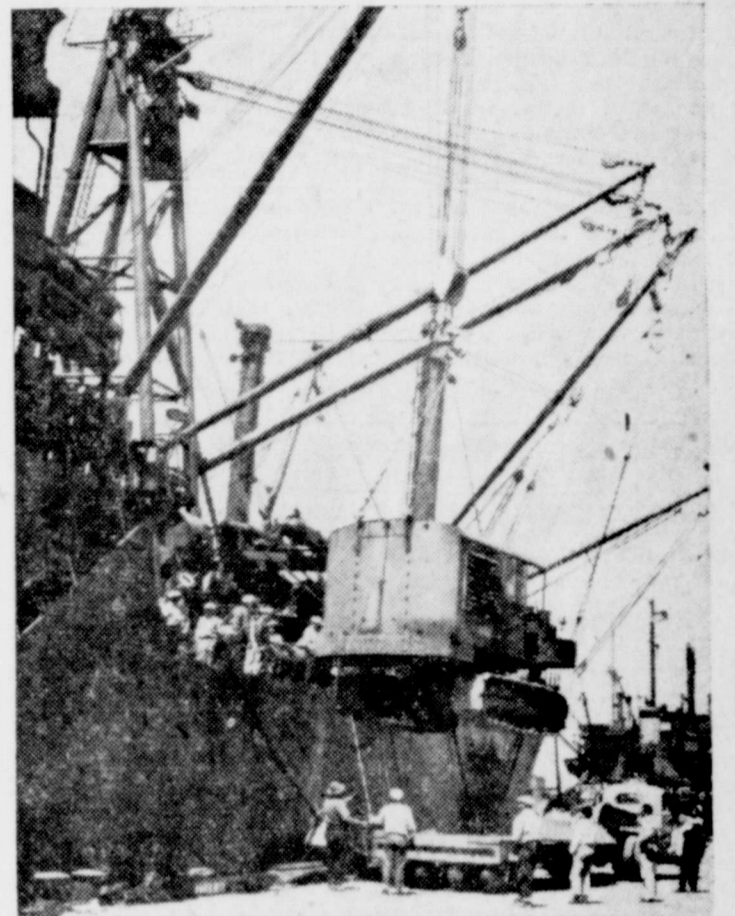
After approximately two years in Washington, Judge Burleson waived his exemptions, joined the navy and served three years. He returned to the states from Okinawa in December 1945 to end service in the Pacific which took him from New Guinea to Japan. In the earlier days of the war he was in the North Atlantic and later saw service in the Aleutian Islands area. At the war's end he was in the East China Sea in mine operational intelligence.

### Omar Burleson of Jones Co. Candidate for Congress

Omar Burleson of Anson, Jones county, launched his campaign for congress, 17th District of Texas, this week by authorizing the Daily Press to make his announcement.

Born in 1906, Burleson has spent his entire life in West Texas with the exception of two years in Washington, D. C., and his three years in the navy. After receiving his law degree in 1929, he married Ruth DeWeese, daughter of Rev. and Mrs. P. D. DeWeese. Mr. DeWeese was pastor of Anson First Baptist church in the early 1920s.

Burleson's political career began at 23 years of age, when he was elected county attorney of Jones county. After two terms, he was elected county judge and served for three terms unopposed. He became widely known in West Texas for his leadership in governmental, educational and civic affairs. As president of the West Texas County Judges and Commissioners association, he championed causes for the improvement of county government. His interest in civic and educational affairs was evinced by his selection as district governor of Lions clubs, chairman of the Texas Welfare association, member of the Freight Rate Equality Federation, member of his local school board of trustees and presently a member of the board of trustees of Abilene Christian college.

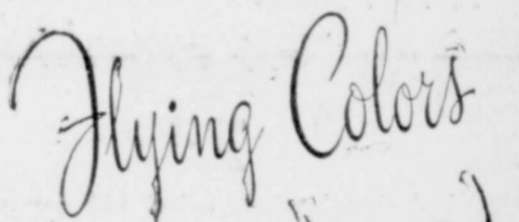

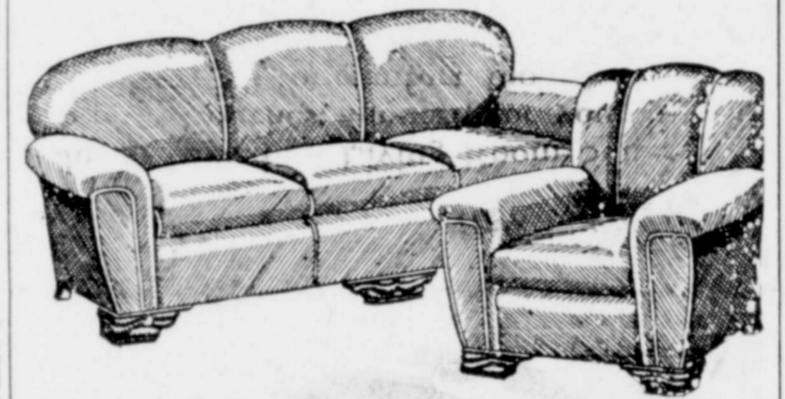
