## Fair Had Rapid Growth In 5 Years

The Castro County Fair has started from a very small beginning five years ago until it has reached the place as one of the best County Fairs in the whole of West Texas. Reasons for this statement are given as a result of the comments of the judge of the Castro county Fair, from year to year, who also judge the Fairs all over this section.

The Fair was started five years ago by a group of farm men and women, among them being Mr. and Mrs. Bill Hochstein, Mr. and Mrs. Barber Eubanks, Mr. and Mrs. Lester Gladden, Willis Brancum, Mr. and Mrs. Morgan Dennis. At the first Fair the livestock were tied to trees and arrangements were not as good as our succeeding Fairs, but this first Fair laid the foundation for the present Castro County Fair.

In 1941 a Fair association was organized with E. F. Harman being the first president, and he is still serving in that capacity. A large degree of the success of the Castro County Fair can be attributed to the work of Mr. Harman and the many business men of Dimmitt who have worked so hard to make the Fair a great success. The exhibits at every Castro County Fair have been larger and better each year and the quality of both livestock and food products on exhibition have shown much improvement as a result of the influence of the Fair.

The outstanding success of the Castro County Fair is due to the whole hearted support of the business men of Dimmitt, the Lions Club, the farmers who exhibit their stock, the Home Demonstration Club women and other women who all give much in time and thought and work to make the Castro County Fair one of the best in West Texas.

## Flower Show Is Fair Highlight

The annual flower show sponsored by the Dimmitt Garden Club will be held Wednesday, Sept. 27 as a part of the Castro County Fair. The exhibit will be shown in the lobby of the First State Bank.

Anyone living in Castro County who has flowers is urged to help make this show a success. Please remember that your neighbors blooms have suffered from insect and weather damage as well as yours, so bring flowers even though they are somewhat short of perfume.

Specimens, flower arrangements, artistic groups, winter bouquets, basket arrangements, pot plants etc., will be acceptable.

To aid the committee in preparing the display, please have your flowers at the booth by eleven.

To present your flowers at their best, cut early in the morning, cut stems long enough for graceful arrangements and plunge into deep water. Dahlias should be placed in about an inch and one half of very hot water until the ends are seared (at least two full minutes) and then placed in cold water. Each exhibitor is expected to furnish his own containers.

## CONTACT THE SOCIAL SECURITY BOARD ON YOUR 65th BIRTHDAY

In times like these all men are busy and many even forget when their next birthday rolls around, said James L. Farmer, Acting Manager of the Amarillo, Texas Social Security Board. When further questioned concerning his statement, the social security representative said that every wage earner covered by the old-age and survivors insurance law should contact his nearest Social Security Board office as soon after his 65th birthday as possible. He stressed the importance of the wage earner calling in person at the office or notifying the office by letter, in which case a Board representative will call on him. The wage earner need certain definite information concerning the filing of claims for benefits and the Social Security Board field office is the only place where authentic information on this subject can be secured; It does not pay, he emphasized, to take the word of your best friend regarding this matter since there are many technicalities that must be cleared up before a claim can be filed. The Amarillo, Texas, Social Security Board field office is located at 324 New Post Office Building.

## Soil Conservation News

The Castro County Wind Erosion District received a small quantity of blue panicum seed from the Soil Conservation Service this past Spring for trial plantings on co-operating farms in this locality. Blue panicum is a deep-rooted, perennial bunch grass, originally imported from Australia. It has been grown in several different localities with more or less success.

D. G. Axtell planted a small area of this grass last May. A heavy rain shortly after planting was responsible for a poor stand. It was too late to justify reseeding. This planting made a growth of approximately three feet and suckered quite freely. Some few weeks ago Axtell grazed this grass along with some sudan planted in the same field. It proved to be quite palatable

## Dimmitt Pilot Association Is Organized Tue.

Following preliminary preparations recently made by local citizens a Flying School has begun in Dimmitt. For the training of those who care to fly, both class room study and contact flying are under the supervision of Mr. C. J. Doris of Amarillo.

At the first class, which met Tuesday night at the High School building, Mr. Jess Wright, co-owner and manager of the Dimmitt Implement Co. was elected president, and Miss Martha Jo Wesson, local bank clerk was named secretary.

The ground school, within itself, is to be prized and everyone who is air-minded should avail him or herself of this opportunity of securing information on flying at a nominal fee. Those who wish to take the class room instruction course in flying are permitted to do so without actual flying instructions. The course consists of about 80 hours in CAA rules and regulations, meteorology and navigation.

The Dimmitt Pilot Association has secured the farm of W. R. McElroy, which is located one-half mile east of townsite, for a flying field. This is an excellent location and plans are underway for an improved airport. Until the CAA inspector examines the site, an improved landing field just south of the townsite, in Mr. Barron's pasture, is being used.
