CISCO GETS 2ND BRICK AND TILE CO.

Organization of a second company for the manufacture of brick and tile from Cisco clays, to be known as the Stout Brick & Tile Co., with a capitalization of upwards of \$100,000, was announced Saturday through Cisco chamber of commerce.

Machinery for the plant was ordered Friday. Delivery was promised within one hundred days and Forrest Stout, who will be general manager of the company and is one of the principal stockholders, said it was hoped to be in production by September 1.

The plant will have a capacity of 18,000 tile and 80,000 brick per day, although it will not reach capacity until sometime after it is put into operation.

Site for the plant has already been selected and negotiations are now under way with Texas & Pacific railroad for the construction of a spur.

The plant will be located on the N. D. Gallagher ranch, about one mile east of the city limits of Cisco. The site will adjoin that selected by the Cisco Clay Products Co., which was organized some months ago and which is now waiting for machinery promised by June 1. Mr. Gallagher is a principal stockholder in both companies. The Cisco Clay Products Co. is moving in material for construction of its building, and a spur from Texas & Pacific railroad has been laid out for early construction.

The Stout Brick & Tile Co. is purchasing the most modern machinery and will produce a product second to none in the market. Eventually it plans installation of a car tunnel kiln, which is the most advanced type of kiln and the most efficient ever developed.

The company does not intend to confine itself to the manufacture of brick and tile, but will develop other ceramic products for future production. It will employ an initial force of about 50 men increasing this force to 80 or 100 in line with future needs.

The clays which both of these plants will use have attracted the admiration of experts who have examined them and results of tests which have been made by competent laboratories are very favorable.

For instance, a compression test of a brick burned from this clay by the Pittsburgh Testing Laboratories showed a resistance of 5,250 pounds per square inch. A good brick normally tests from 1,500 to 2,000 pounds per square inch.

Mr. Stout, who organized the Stout Brick & Tile Co., is an Odessa, Texas, business man. He will move his family to Cisco as soon as he can find living accommodations, in order that he may supervise installation of the plant.

NEW YORK, April 20. — United States experts are working out a revised plan for a United Nations Security Council investigation of Franco Spain it was understood today.

The United States draft may take the form of suggesting changes in the plan of Australian Delegate Col. W. R. Hodgson or may develop into a complete substitution plan, it was understood.

John L. Lewis at White House for Talk With Truman

WASHINGTON, April 20. (U.P.) — President Truman entered the dead-locked negotiations in the 20-day old soft coal strike today, apparently seeking to prepare a way for settlement before industry becomes totally paralyzed for lack of fuel.

Mr. Truman talked over the situation for 15 minutes with President John L. Lewis of the United Mine Workers, Reconversion Director John W. Snyder and Secretary of Labor Lewis B. Schwellenbach.

The labor secretary brought Lewis to the White House in his private car for a surprise, unannounced visit.

OPA Has Granted Many Price Boosts Past Two Months

WASHINGTON, April 20. (U.P.) — Even if Congress should let Price Control Act alone, daily price boosts would be in the cards for the rest of the year, an OPA official said tonight.

Forecasting a continuing program of steady price increases, the official said OPA had granted more boosts in the past two months than ever before in a similar period since price control has been in existence.

But he insisted, price increases granted in an orderly manner by OPA are far less inflationary than the abrupt rises that would result if Congress insists on "cripping amendments" to the price extension legislation.

Draft Act to Expire May 15; Outcome is Doubtful

WASHINGTON, April 20. — The huge British loan is encountering more trouble in the senate than the administration anticipated. Leaders may have to lay it aside and take up draft renewal. The present draft act expires May 15.

Senators running for re-election this year are generally lined up against the loan. Leaders think this may indicate its defeat in the house, even if it passes senate, since all house members are up for re-election. Senate Republicans stand approximately 3 to 2 against loan.

As for draft extension: There's good chance the senate will extend the present law one year. It's only a chance though.

STRIKE SETTLED.

KETCHIKAN, Alaska, April 20. — The Longshoremen's strike which has blocked Alaskan ports for 18 days causing serious food shortages ended early today with an agreement between strikers and Alaskan shipping firms.

More Homes Must Be in Range of G I Pocketbooks

WASHINGTON, April 20. (U.P.) — Housing Administrator Wilson W. Wyatt tonight clamped strict controls on the veterans emergency housing program in order to get at least 50 per cent more of new homes into the range of the average G I pocketbook.

He issued a general order apportioning definite percentages of new housing construction into rental and low-cost homes. He warned that priorities for materials might be withdrawn from any locality where progress in reducing sales prices is unsatisfactory.

Talk of Gen. Eisenhower for President Continues

WASHINGTON, April 20. — "Eisenhower for President" talk persists. So does talk that he will resign this fall as chief of staff.

The two are connected. If the general decides to go into big league politics, he has to get out of the Truman Administration. If he runs it will be as Republican.

Eisenhower has visited most parts of the country since his return, has made many speeches. He's had big ovations; got more applause than Truman at Chicago on Army Day. His friends were hinting at political aspirations soon after V-E Day.

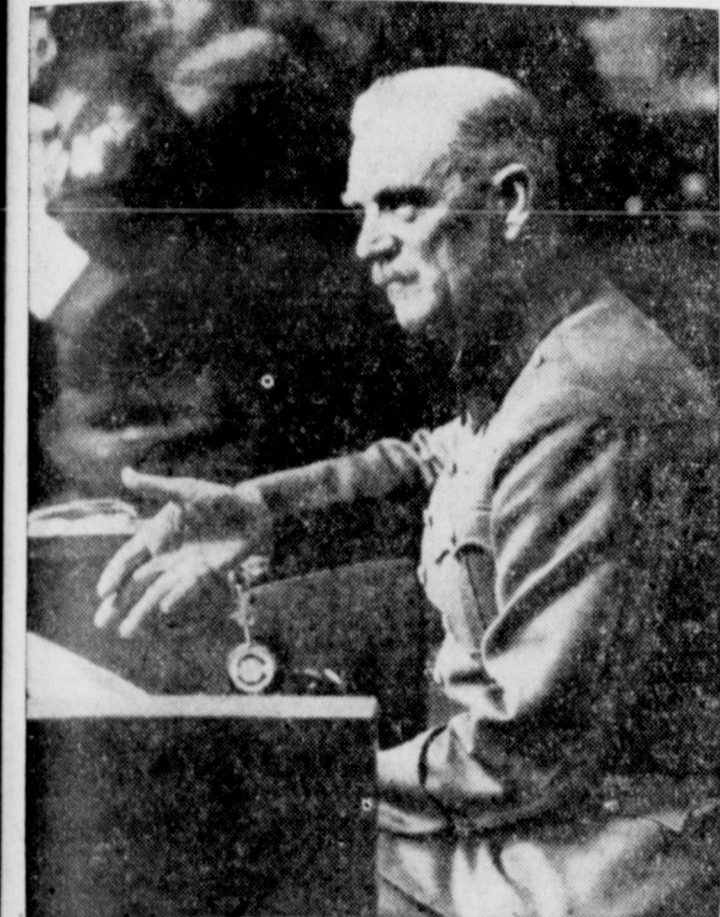
Big question is whether Republican convention would nominate him. If GOP politicians are sure they can win in 1948 they're more likely to choose one of their number — one who understands ins and outs of political machinery. They're wary of military men who don't control easily. GOP convention gave little consideration to MacArthur in 1944, even though it had Roosevelt to beat.

THOUSANDS GREET IKE.

DENISON, Tex., April 20. (U.P.) — Cheering thousands of Texans, from all quarters of this vast state descended upon Denison today to pay tribute to Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower as he returned to the scene of his birth. General Ike flew here shortly before noon, bringing with him in his plane, among others, Rep. Sam Rayburn of Texas, speaker of the house of representatives. Eisenhower was to leave Denison tonight for Texas A&M College where Sunday he will join the student body in its traditional "muster ceremonies" and will receive an honorary degree. The muster is a memorial to the more than 800 Texas Aggies who died in the two World Wars.

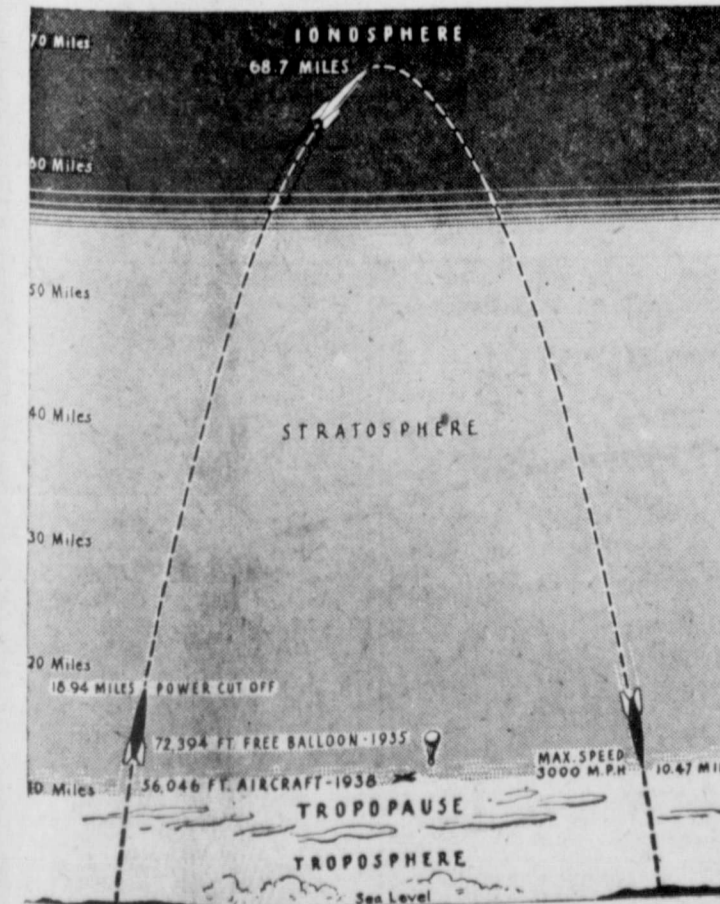
Waco Business Men Arrive Cisco At Noon Friday

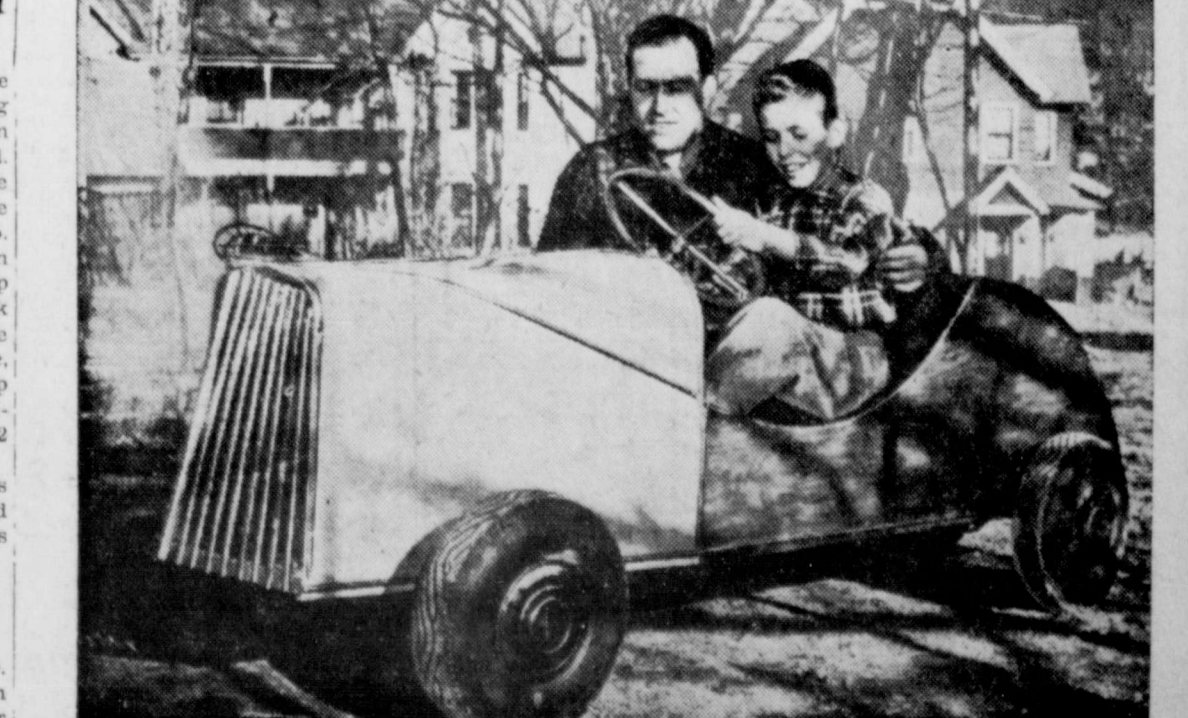
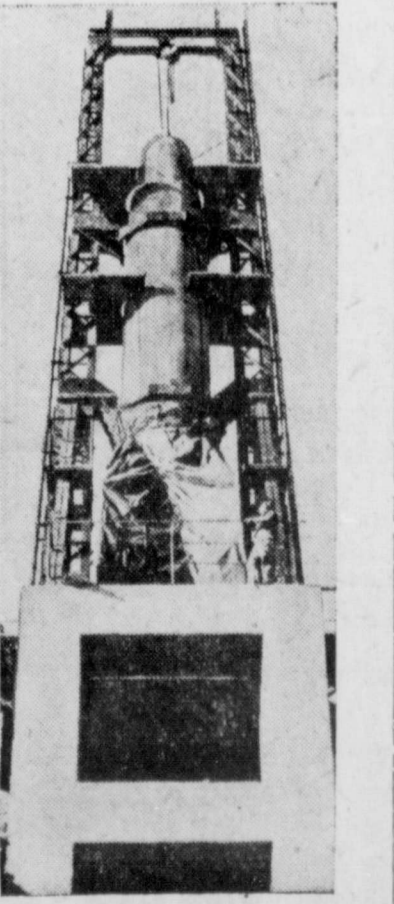
