Strike Threat of 65,000 Railway Men is Cancelled

Omar Burleson Cisco Almost Lost Issues Congressional Platform Night to Ranger

Omar Burleson of Anson, candidate for congress, issues the following statement which he says will constitute the basis of his platform:

Two years in Washington, D. C., in a position which afforded direct daily contact with congress, convinces me that reform in congressional procedure is necessary to meet the exigencies of our time. The committee system has pyramided itself until it is cumbersome and ectopus-like in its attempt at legislation. Further observation on the part of the entire nation shows us to be strangled in Bureau and department directives, orders, and regulations which are tantamount to law. It is physically impossible for congress, the source from which all law should emanate, to even intelligently become familiar with the provisions of all orders, regulations, and directives issued.

Experience gained as an agent of the FBI opened to me the strength and the weaknesses of our security system and federal law enforcement. Apathy toward National Security in peacetime is the force which would close the barn door after the horse has fled. Why not find out what other nations are doing before they are ready to do it? An idealistic attitude on the part of this Country in the past has caused untold suffering.

As a former county judge, I believe I have an understanding of local and state government which should give me insight into the continuous problems arising. Serving as chairman of the Texas Welfare association, I naturally became familiar with our welfare program at its inception. Comparative progress has been made, but there must be work and understanding to obtain maximum benefits.

As a former member of the freight rate equality federation, I became familiar with the inequities existing in rates between the industrial Northeast and the agricultural south-southwest. The tariff issue is one of the oldest political abuses of this Nation, and the greatest opportunity of our existence is upon us to secure a protected market for our products. Farm born and a farm owner, I think I have experienced those

CINCINNATI, O., April 24. — President George M. Harrison of the Brotherhood of Railway and Steamship Clerks — AFL — today cancelled the threatened strike of 65,000 railway express workers in compliance with President Truman's order that a fact-finding board study the dispute.

The strike deadline, set for 12:01 a. m. Friday, was cancelled as required by the Railway Labor Act, which gives the president's board 30 days in which to issue an opinion.

No strike can be called until 30 days after the opinion is handed down.

Miners Won't Budge.

HAZLETON, Pa., April 24. (U.P.) United Mine Workers' chief John L. Lewis reiterated his warning today that bituminous miners are not going back to work until operators agree to safety rules.

In an address at the opening of the anthracite tri-district scale convention, Lewis lashed out at the soft coal operators as "an aimless and ineffectual crowd as far as leadership is concerned."

Texas Now Has 9 Men in the Gubernatorial Race

DALLAS, April 24. — Gov. Coke R. Stevenson's name was put in the 1946 governor's race by Upshur county friends here Tuesday but Austin sources close to the governor would not divulge whether he would make the race.

Stevenson, showing some visitors around Austin Tuesday evening, could not be reached for comment.

Upshur county voters filed the application for a place on the July Democratic primary ballot and paid the \$100 filing fee.

A petition bearing the notarized signatures of twenty-six qualified voters of Upshur county was presented to State Democratic Executive Committee Chairman Harry L. Seay here Tuesday afternoon by W. A. McIntosh, Gilmer, Upshur county Democratic executive committee chairman. He also tendered a \$100 check to cover the filing fee.

The petition included signatures of twenty-three of the twenty-seven members of Upshur county Democratic executive committee, McIntosh said.

The petition to place Stevenson's name on the ballot, he said, was being backed by other petitions received by him from all over the state since his Upshur county committee had announced its intentions several days ago.

"A bunch of us feel that he ought to stay for another term," McIntosh said. "We don't think he's an indispensable man, but he's already on the job and we think he knows the job and can do more there under present conditions."

Acceptance of the petition by Seay brought to nine the number of candidates for governor thus far in the July 27 Democratic primary. Stevenson and the names of three other candidates were filed by petitioners. The other five candidates made applications.

Stevenson will be notified of the petition, Seay said, and will be sent a copy of the state committee's questionnaire to fill out.

Whether or not he will make the race depends still upon his own wishes. He may withdraw or his petitioners may withdraw his name any time up to the June 3 dead line for filing.

COMMUNIST MOVEMENT.

WASHINGTON, April 23. (U.P.) — Rep. John E. Rankin, D., Miss., said today that investigators of the House un-American Activities Committee are "checking up" on the CIO Political Action Committee. Rankin said the PAC is a "communist front movement."

AUSTIN, Tex., April 24. (U.P.) — Brig. Preston A. Weatherred of Dallas, ranking 36th division national guard officer, today was named commander of the 36th division.

The announcement was the first major move of General Fred L. Walker as commander of all Texas national guard units in post-war reorganization of the 36th division, which he has commanded overseas.

problems common to the average farmer. The farmer and rancher have been heard in Washington; he was saved from ruin by the farm program. He should be heard from now on in matters furthering the program, in protecting his market, and in receiving the benefit of adjusted freight rates.

Three years service in the U. S. navy in several parts of the world should have given me an understanding of the veteran and his interest in life.

Predicated upon the foregoing, I offer the following as the basis of my platform:

1. Reduce the 48 standing committees of the house of representatives to at least half and provide expert and specialized sources of information for regular operation bearing in order that legislation may be expeditiously handled and that the public may know what transpires in those committees. Likewise reduce the 33 standing committees in the senate for a like purpose.

2. Provide the strongest internal security measures for counter-espionage and protection against sabotage; provide espionage operation and give latitude to the FBI and our other intelligence services to determine the actions and policies in foreign countries; provide stringent measures to protect the confidences of this country against those elements inimical to it.

3. Return to the states their just rights and responsibilities. But in any program, whether it be education, social security, farm or other worthwhile enterprise in which the federal government participates with funds, federal control should not attach, and no obligation upon the state should be imposed.

4. Place full faith and confidence in the UNO. Although it is limited by reason of the veto power, it is our greatest hope for world peace.

5. If compulsory military training is enacted into law, determine the feasibility and practicality of administering the program through our senior and junior colleges, with specialized vocational training for those not candidates for regular college courses, in order that the youth's education may not be interrupted and that he may be brought under more favorable moral influences.

6. Remove regulations, orders, and directives from private business as rapidly as possible commensurate with the general welfare.

7. Opposed to the theory and practice of socialization and believe that an offer to federal control in private business is an offer of a "mess of pottage" for individual liberty.

8. Subscribe to the principle that no individual or group should be allowed to usurp the power of the majority.

9. Insure equality and uniformity of pensions and other social security benefits and work for a more economical administration.

10. It is not enough to simply understand the veteran's rights in matters of hospitalization, rehabilitation, education, and disability compensations — it is necessary to understand the veteran himself. I have that understanding.

11. Equality should be obtained between the industrial Northeast and the agricultural South and Southwest by adjustment of discriminatory freight rates; securing a better protected market for what the farmer and rancher has to sell; parities and subsidies as a temporary measure; further the farm program with expansion of soil conservation, farm to market roads, and improved farm living.

I believe in the United States of America. I believe in those principles which have made this Country great and take them as my political rule and guide. Without changing those principles, our time demands more efficient procedure and faster moving operation. A reorganization of our committee system, along with placing authority of law where it belongs by abolishing needless bureaus, is the greatest step toward that accomplishment.

The next years will be crucial. They will require the most careful efforts and judgment on the part of those who represent us in Congress. This definite promise I make you: to give unstintedly of my time, my energies, and my talents to meet every responsibility with courage and determination; to exercise my best judgment and to account to you for my actions. 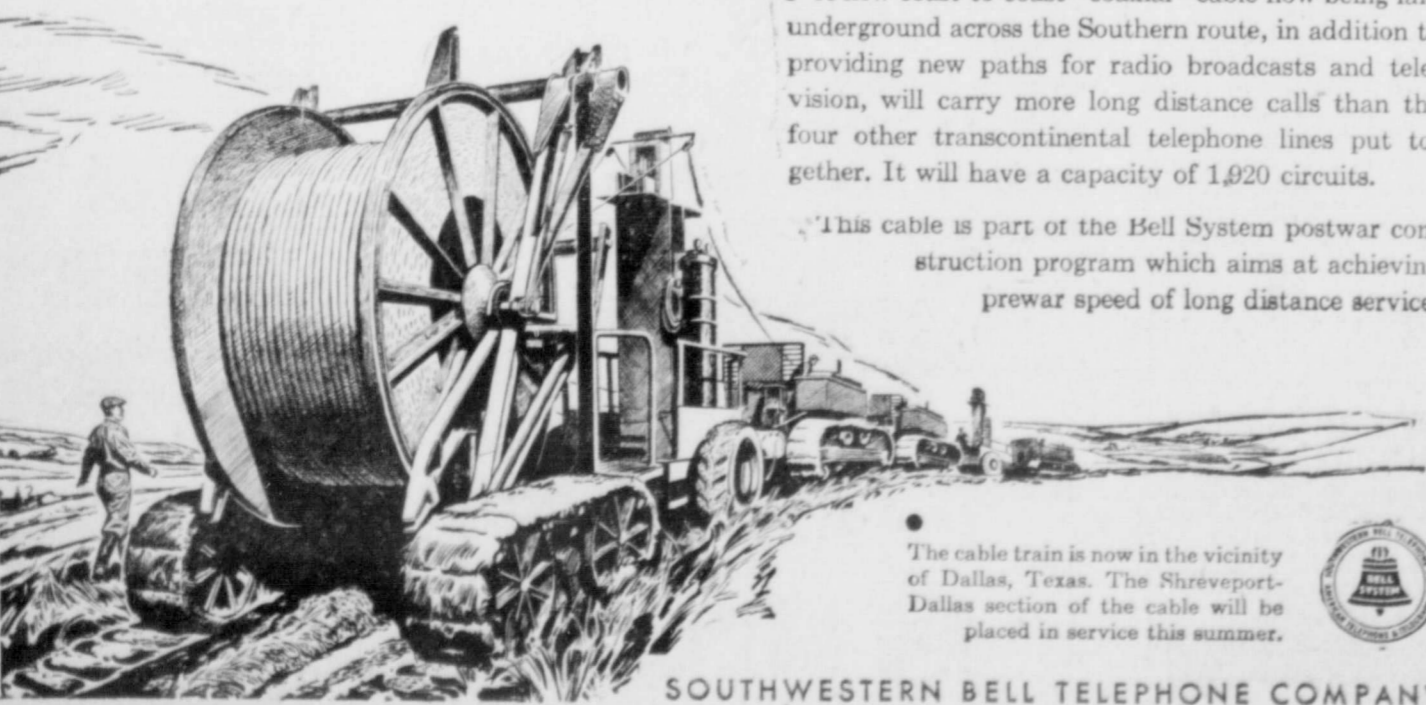

A new coast-to-coast "coaxial" cable now being laid underground across the Southern route, in addition to providing new paths for radio broadcasts and television, will carry more long distance calls than the four other transcontinental telephone lines put together.
