Lewis Offers to Send Coal Miners Back for 2 Weeks

By United Press.

Temporary relief from the coal crisis appeared in sight when John L. Lewis, president of the United Mine Workers, today ordered the soft coal miners back to work for two weeks.

A Civilian Production Administration spokesman indicated, however, that curtailment of electricity and manufactured gas would remain in effect.

It was also expected that railroad embargoes would be continued.

Lewis' offer was contingent upon acceptance by the coal operators.

He asked that any wage increase be made retroactive to cover the two-week truce.

The operators, in a hurriedly summoned meeting, were reported in disagreement over accepting the truce.

The CPA spokesman said two weeks' supply would hardly be enough to fill normal distribution lines.

ASK PRICE RELIEF.

WASHINGTON, May 10. — Charles O'Neill, spokesman for the soft coal operators, said today he would ask President Truman to guarantee sufficient price relief to pay any wage increases retroactively if the producers accept the United Mine Workers offer of a two-week truce in the 40-day strike.

Russia to Receive Wheat Crop Drops Heavy Reparations From the Italians

PARIS, May 10. (U.P.)—The Big Four foreign ministers virtually agreed today to hand over Italy's former colonies to a United Nations Trusteeship, administered by Italy.

In a turbulent three-hour session, the ministers reached virtual agreement on Italian colonies, Italian reparations and war criminals.

The date for a general peace conference was not discussed at the second session of the day.

The ministers reached a tentative agreement to give Russia \$100,000,000 in reparations from Italy. No global figure for total Italian reparations was fixed.

They reached virtual agreement on appointing Inter-Allied commissions to supervise the trial of war criminals.


Later, Mr. Saucier plans to operate a small business here.

UnAmerican PAC Seeks Scalps of 10 US. Senators

ATLANTIC CITY, N. J., May 10. — Thomas Burns of Akron, Ohio, CIO Political Action Committee assistant chairman, said yesterday ten United States Senators would be opposed by the PAC for re-election in 1946.

Burns told reporters that PAC state organizations would oppose the re-election of Senators Theodore G. Bilbo (Dem.) of Mississippi; Harry Byrd (Dem.) of Virginia; Burton K. Wheeler (Dem.) of Montana; E. P. Carville (Dem.) of Nevada; Kenneth McKellar (Dem.) of Tennessee; George L. Radcliffe (Dem.) of Maryland; Peter G. Gerry (Rep.) of Rhode Island; Henrik Shipstead (Rep.) of Minnesota; H. Alexander Smith (Rep.) of New Jersey; and William Langer (Rep.) of North Dakota.

Burns named the senators while PAC state directors took turns at microphones to tell the CIO Amalgamated Clothing Workers convention how they would carry on campaigns to try to defeat the lawmakers.

ANTI-STRIKE LEGISLATION.

WASHINGTON, May 10. (U.P.)—The Senate voted 66 to 9 today to take up anti-strike legislation.

WASHINGTON, May 10. — Representative Lanham of Fort Worth was among five Texas congressmen voting late Thursday against a proposal to include \$400,000,000 for premium payments in the emergency housing bill. Ten other Texans voted for the measure, and six did not vote.

ST. LOUIS, Mo., May 10. — The Missouri-Kansas-Texas Railroad System will not be affected by the Office of Defense Transportation embargo on freight operations, Donald V. Fraser, president said Thursday. Fraser said the Katy is a 100 per cent oil burning system and can give normal service on shipments of any kind which move exclusively on Katy lines.

Zionist President Says Arabs Will Finally Back Down

DALLAS, May 10. — Seeking to allay fears that the Arabs would succeed in starting a "holy war" against the Jews in Palestine, Julius Livingston, Tulsa oil man, asked Dallas Jews to continue their support of the Zionist program.

Livingston, who is the Southwest regional president of the Zionist Organization of America, spoke to a joint meeting of the Dallas ZOA and Hadassah organization.

Livingston, president of the Mazda Oil company, declared that if the United States and Great Britain stand firmly behind the recommendations of the Anglo-American Committee of Inquiry on Palestine, Ibn Saud and other Arab leaders will back down.

"Hitler had more strength than Ibn Saud and they stopped him," Livingston said.

The recommendations for immediate quotas placing 100,000 of Europe's displaced Jews in Palestine was praised by Livingston.

Livingston said this should be a starter toward getting the 1,250,000 Jews in Central Europe resettled in Palestine, where, he said, a Jewish agency should decide on how many could be absorbed.

Unlicensed Auto Drivers Threat to Law and Order

AUSTIN, May 10. — The Texas Highway Patrol has orders to file complaints against all motorists found driving without a license.

The order of Director Homer Garrison of the Department of Public Safety was announced by Assistant Director Joe Fletcher following the demand of President Truman that states bar "nuts and morons" from the public highways.

Garrison is attending the president's Highway Safety Conference, at which Truman spoke, as Governor Coke Stevenson's official representative.

Texas law requires a driver to have a license in his possession. However, Fletcher explained, the law is weakened by a stipulation that "it shall be a defense" if the defendant can produce a license valid at the time of his arrest, when he is tried on a charge of unlicensed driving.

County sheriffs and municipal chiefs of police are expected to file all such information in their possession with the state highway department.

Senate Puts OK on British Loan 46 to 34; Goes to House

WASHINGTON, May 10. (U.P.)—The Senate passed 46 to 34 and sent to the House today a resolution approving the \$3,750,000,000 British loan, after beating down nearly a dozen restrictive amendments.

Answering a plea from Democratic Leader Alben Barkley, members rejected crippling amendments. Some of the amendments could have killed the loan. Others would have closely defined Britain's responsibilities in relaxing trade restrictions, and would have called upon Britain to give this country the leased Atlantic bases.

Administration leaders asked for approval of the loan as a keystone to this nation's postwar economic policy. They maintained that it would avert a deadly trade war. They contended it would aid the United Nations effort to establish world peace.

WASHINGTON, May 10. (U.P.)—The nation's wheat crop prospects slumped during the past month.

The Agricultural Department today estimated the winter wheat crop at 742,887,000 bushels.

This new forecast, based on crop conditions May 1, represented a cut of 87,749,000 bushels from the April report.

ARREST 32 STRIKERS.

FORT WORTH, May 10. (U.P.)—Thirty-two Consolidated Vultee Aircraft striking machinists were arrested today in the downtown Texas & Pacific freight depot yards for interfering with the unloading of machinery for the plant. They were charged with unlawful assembly.

CRASH KILLS 30.

MUNSON, Fla., May 10. (U.P.)—Two four-motored Navy planes collided and crashed about six miles north of this tiny village today killing an estimated 30 persons.

Lewis Offers to Send Coal Miners Back for 2 Weeks

By United Press.

Temporary relief from the coal crisis appeared in sight when John L. Lewis, president of the United Mine Workers, today ordered the soft coal miners back to work for two weeks.

A Civilian Production Administration spokesman indicated, however, that curtailment of electricity and manufactured gas would remain in effect.

It was also expected that railroad embargoes would be continued.

Lewis' offer was contingent upon acceptance by the coal operators.

He asked that any wage increase be made retroactive to cover the two-week truce.

The operators, in a hurriedly summoned meeting, were reported in disagreement over accepting the truce.

The CPA spokesman said two weeks' supply would hardly be enough to fill normal distribution lines.

ASK PRICE RELIEF.

WASHINGTON, May 10. — Charles O'Neill, spokesman for the soft coal operators, said today he would ask President Truman to guarantee sufficient price relief to pay any wage increases retroactively if the producers accept the United Mine Workers offer of a two-week truce in the 40-day strike.

Russia to Receive Heavy Reparations 87,749,000 Bushels Since April

PARIS, May 10. (U.P.)—The Big Four foreign ministers virtually agreed today to hand over Italy's former colonies to a United Nations Trusteeship, administered by Italy.

In a turbulent three-hour session, the ministers reached virtual agreement on Italian colonial, Italian reparations and war criminals.

The date for a general peace conference was not discussed at the second session of the day.

The ministers reached a tentative agreement to give Russia \$100,000,000 in reparations from Italy. No global figure for total Italian reparations was fixed.

They reached virtual agreement on appointing Inter-Allied commissions to supervise the trial of war criminals.

Senate Puts OK on British Loan 46 to 34; Goes to House

WASHINGTON, May 10. (U.P.)—The Senate passed 46 to 34 and sent to the House today a resolution approving the \$3,750,000,000 British loan, after beating down nearly a dozen restrictive amendments.

Answering a plea from Democratic Leader Alben Barkley, members rejected crippling amendments. Some of the amendments would have killed the loan. Others would have closely defined Britain's responsibilities in relaxing trade restrictions, and would have called upon Britain to give this country the leased Atlantic bases.

Administration leaders asked for approval of the loan as a keystone to this nation's postwar economic policy. They maintained that it would avert a deadly trade war. They contended it would aid the United Nations effort to establish world peace.

Zionist President Says Arabs Will Finally Back Down

DALLAS, May 10. — Seeking to allay fears that the Arabs would succeed in starting a "holy war" against the Jews in Palestine, Julius Livingston, Tulsa oil man, asked Dallas Jews to continue their support of the Zionist program.

Livingston, who is the Southwest regional president of the Zionist Organization of America, spoke to a joint meeting of the Dallas ZOA and Hadassah organization.

Livingston, president of the Mazda Oil company, declared that if the United States and Great Britain stand firmly behind the recommendations of the Anglo-American Committee of Inquiry on Palestine, Ibn Saud and other Arab leaders will back down.

"Hitler had more strength than Ibn Saud and they stopped him," Livingston said.

The recommendations for immediate quotas placing 100,000 of Europe's displaced Jews in Palestine was praised by Livingston.

Livingston said this should be a starter toward getting the 1,250,000 Jews in Central Europe resettled in Palestine, where, he said, a Jewish agency should decide on how many could be absorbed.

"We want equal rights for Jews in Palestine as promised by the

Balfour declaration and other expressions of British and American policy following World War I," Livingston said.

AUSTIN, May 10. — The Texas Highway Patrol has orders to file complaints against all motorists found driving without a license.

The order of Director Homer Garrison of the Department of Public Safety was announced by Assistant Director Joe Fletcher following the demand of President Truman that states bar "nuts and morons" from the public highways.

Garrison is attending the president's Highway Safety Conference, at which Truman spoke, as Governor Coke Stevenson's official representative.

Texas law requires a driver to have a license in his possession. However, Fletcher explained, the law is weakened by a stipulation that "it shall be a defense" if the defendant can produce a license valid at the time of his arrest, when he is tried on a charge of unlicensed driving.

County sheriffs and municipal chiefs of police are expected to file all such information in their possession with the state highway department.


