## Connally to Stay in Senate; Other Names Filed

The names of Gov. Coke R. Stevenson and former governor Dan Moody were tossed into the United States senate race against Sen. Tom Connally today.

The names of Moody and Stevenson were filed by petition and check with the State Democratic Executive Committee in Dallas among the host of last-minute mail applications which flooded Executive Committee in Dallas.

It was not learned immediately whether Moody would make the race, but Stevenson flatly declined.

And some observers were of the opinion that friends of the two had filed their names just to have them in the race should Connally not run.

In Washington Connally said he would not accept appointment as U. S. Representative on the United Nations Council if it was offered.

"I have no intention whatever of accepting a diplomatic or other foreign service position," Connally said. "It is my intention to remain in the senate. I want to make this statement as emphatic as possible. I am and shall continue to be a candidate for reelection as United States senator."

### War and Navy Departments Find Eight-point Plan

WASHINGTON, June 4. (U.P.)—The War and Navy departments, unable to agree on a complete unification plan, have arrived at an eight-point plan for co-operative action, congressional sources reported today.

Congressional sources friendly to the naval point of view said that a bill is being drafted for introduction at this session of congress that leaves untouched the basic issues of a single department of national defense with a single cabinet officer, of three co-equal branches for army, navy and air force, of control of land-based navy aviation and of the form of the Marine corps.

**SOMEBODY STOP HIM!**  
ST. PETERSBURG, Fla., June 4. James C. Petrillo, fiery chief of the American Federations of Musicians, has threatened to halt all radio network broadcasts if the United States Supreme Court upholds the constitutionality of the Lea bill limiting the musicians' right to strike.

**WILL IGNORE BOARD.**  
CELEVELAND, June 4. (U.P.)—Headquarters of the Brotherhood of Railroad Trainmen announced today that it was supporting union trainmen of the Hudson and Manhattan railroad who will "ignore" the opening session Thursday of the presidential fact-finding board in the wage dispute that has idled H. & M. roads for six days.

**SANDERFORD A CANDIDATE.**  
AUSTIN, June 4. — Former state senator Roy Sanderford of Belton, one of the leaders of the anti-Roosevelt Democratic faction in Texas, confirmed Belton today that he has filed an application for a place on the ballot as a candidate for U. S. senator from Texas.

**LET SPAIN DECIDE.**  
NEW YORK, June 4. (U.P.)—Herbert E. Evatt, Australian minister of external affairs, expressed the belief today that the United Nations would not bar a Spanish constitutional monarchy — if freely chosen by the Spanish people themselves — as an eventual successor to the Franco regime.

**PROPERTY TAX HIKE.**  
SAN ANGELO, June 4. — The city commission convening Monday morning as a board of equalization granted the request of the board of education for increased revenue primarily to permit the raising of teachers' salaries by voting unanimously to assess property for taxation at 100 instead of 66 2-3 percent of its full value.

### Smith Says Rainey - Okayed Book Is a Foul One

AUSTIN, June 4. — John Lee Smith touched off this week's campaign fireworks with an attack on Homer Rainey's record as University of Texas president.

Speaking Monday night at Austin in behalf of his own campaign for governor, Smith said "it was a sad commentary that we witness our greatest school being made the political football of a politically ambitious man."

The attack came on the eve of Rainey's campaign opening at the Sherman-Denison baseball park.

The lieutenant governor hammered away at the two-year-old controversy over John Dos Passos' book, "U.S.A.," which Dr. Rainey has defended, under the theory of academic freedom, the right of the faculty to put such a book on the university reading list.

"I have no complaint with anyone who desires to read such murky stories of degeneracy," Smith declared. "But I vigorously protest that such a book ever be used in a university reading course for immature students."

Smith claimed the book was foul, that it upheld Moscow and denounced the American Legion.

The same university group that is attacking the appointment of Dr. T. S. Painter as president is endorsing Rainey for governor, Smith insisted.

### Ford Assembly Plant May Open Middle of June

DALLAS, June 4. — Reopening of the Ford assembly plant here is expected in about two weeks. A. E. Klemmenson, branch manager, said there had been no official word but that company officers in Dearborn, Mich., have told local officials to be ready to open about the middle of June.

Twelve hundred employees of the plant here have been laid off since May 8 because of a lack of materials and parts caused by the railroad, coal and steel strikes. Klemmenson estimated the loss of wages to employees as "at least \$275,000."

Klemmenson said it would probably take a week to get operations back to normal once the plant is reopened.

### Mrs. Earl Pross Buried in Oakwood Cemetery

Mrs. Earl J. Pross, former Ciscoan, who died at 9 o'clock Sunday night at her home in Sweetwater, was laid to rest in Oakwood cemetery this afternoon, following 4 o'clock services held at Thomas funeral chapel by Rev. Arthur Johnson, pastor of Cisco First Baptist church. She was highly esteemed by all who knew her and had been a member of the Baptist denomination since childhood. Mrs. Pross' maiden name was Sadie Mae Williamson and she was born November 9, 1904, in New Mexico. She was married to Mr. Pross March 13, 1923, at San Antonio. Practically all of their married life was spent in and near Cisco. Formerly popular manager here of the Goodyear Store, he was transferred to Sweetwater last January, where they have since resided.

Besides the bereaved husband, deceased is survived by a son and daughter — Davy Lee, 2 years of age, and Mrs. Charis Bartholomew of Cisco. There are also three sisters and two brothers, as follows: Mrs. W. L. Greenwood, Abilene; Mrs. Annie Mund, Segovia, Tex.; Mrs. C. W. Treadwell, Houston; Henry Williamson, Central, N. M.; Earl Brewster, Austin.

### Reds Hard to Understand; Bevin to Keep Trying

LONDON, June 4. — Foreign Secretary Ernest Bevin told the house of commons today that permanent peace in Europe could be guaranteed "only if Russia enters freely into the European settlement."

"But," he said, "all through Russian speeches and writings" runs the "idea that the Russian methods alone represent democracy and that certain other systems are either fascist or crypto-fascist."

"This is one of the greatest obstacles to peace," Bevin declared in a speech opening a full-dress debate on foreign affairs.

The debate will continue for two days.

The United States' new ambassador to Britain, W. Averell Harriman, sat in the gallery.

Bevin said he had always regarded as a tragedy the fact that Russia did not participate in the making of Europe's peace after the first World war.

"On the other hand, the United States fought in the last war, took part in the peace making and then withdrew into isolation," he remarked.

Bevin referred to his previous disclosure that he had offered to recommend extension of the 20-year Anglo-Russian friendship treaty to 50 years and said: "I regret that this was not taken more seriously at the time. But I am confident it will come. While I am foreign secretary, notwithstanding the rebuff, I shall still pursue it."

### Hereford Brought \$52,000, Breaking All Sales Records

FORT WORTH, June 4. — Real Silver Domino 44th sold for \$52,000 yesterday to break all Hereford sales records at the Silver Crest Hereford dispersion auction on the Dean ranch, 14 miles west of here.

A total of 242 Herefords sold for \$404,435 or an average of \$1,670. Fuller Calloway, textile mill operator and Hereford breeder, and owner of the Hills and Dale farms, La Grange, Ga., placed the record-making bid of \$52,000.

### OPA Amendment Might Up Autos, Farm Machinery

WASHINGTON, June 4. (U.P.)—The Senate Banking Committee today approved an amendment to the OPA bill which, if finally approved by congress, may result in higher prices for automobiles, refrigerators and farm equipment and some other things.

It would restore to dealers the same margin of profit that they had prior to 1942.

This, in effect, means that dealers would be allowed to return to the mark-ups of profit prevailing prior to 1942, and which the OPA from time to time has trimmed to hold prices down.

### Air Forces Will Endeavor to Beat Speed of Sound

WRIGHT FIELD, Dayton, O., June 4. (U.P.)—The army air forces today announced plans for construction of five new jet-propelled bombers and two new jet fighter planes, including flying wings and other unconventional designs.

The air forces disclosed simultaneously that "in the near future" a test pilot will take off in a new experimental plane designated the XS-1 in an attempt to exceed for the first time the speed of sound, 760 miles an hour at sea level.

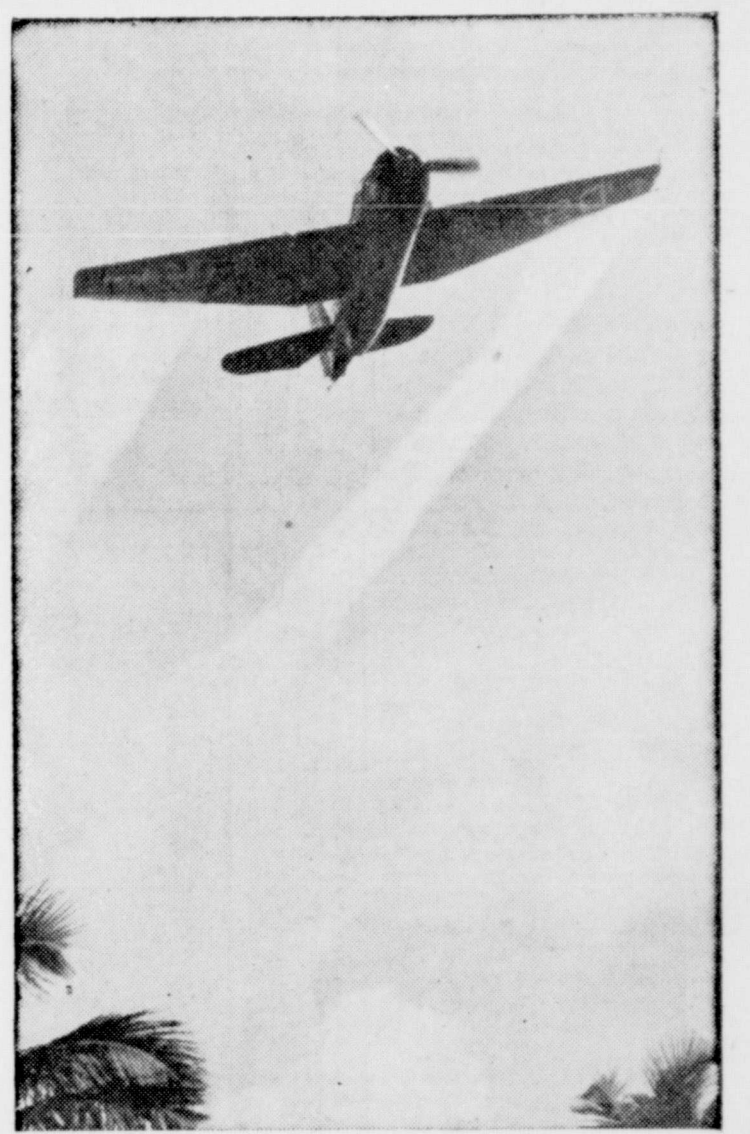
### Columnist Puts NY Police Force in Limelight

NEW YORK, June 4. — Police undertook today a sweeping investigation into charges that members of the department were accepting huge bribes from bookmakers in the "most cynical grafting spree in New York history."

The probe followed an order by Mayor O'Dwyer that the department "clean its own house" after Ed Sullivan charged that detectives are receiving payments from bookmakers ranging from \$1,700-per-bookmaker-phone-per-month-to \$3,000-per-month.

### Women Keen For Compulsory Military Service

AUSTIN, June 4. — There is no doubting what Texans think about the military training issue now before congress. The enormous majority of 81 per cent replied "yes" to this question asked in a statewide Texas Poll:

"In the future, do you think every able-bodied young man should be required to take military or naval training for one year?"

Furthermore, Texas is today more in favor of universal military service than the nation as a whole. The identical question above has been repeatedly asked by the Gallup Poll since Pearl Harbor, and the percentage of Americans in favor has ranged from 63 to 70. Last month Gallup found 63 per cent favoring the continuation of "the draft law for another year."

If a comparison may be made, Texans want compulsory training now more than they did before the war. The Texas Poll, which previously surveyed the state from 1940 to 1942, discovered in August, 1940, 74 per cent in favor of conscription, 26 per cent in favor of voluntary enlistments only. That was before the selective service law went into effect. A year later, August 1941, 71 per cent favored extension of the period of enlistment, which was subsequently passed in Congress by one vote.

In a few weeks the question of

continuing to draft men will again face congress. To date much of the debate has centered on the age at which young men should be taken out of civilian life and put into uniform. The plurality of Texans believe 18 — or just about the time boys are finishing high school — is the best age. The great majority would draft a man before he becomes of age.

"If we do have military training, at what age do you think men should be drafted for this training?" interviewers for the Poll asked. These were the results:

Women in this state favor conscription more than do men.

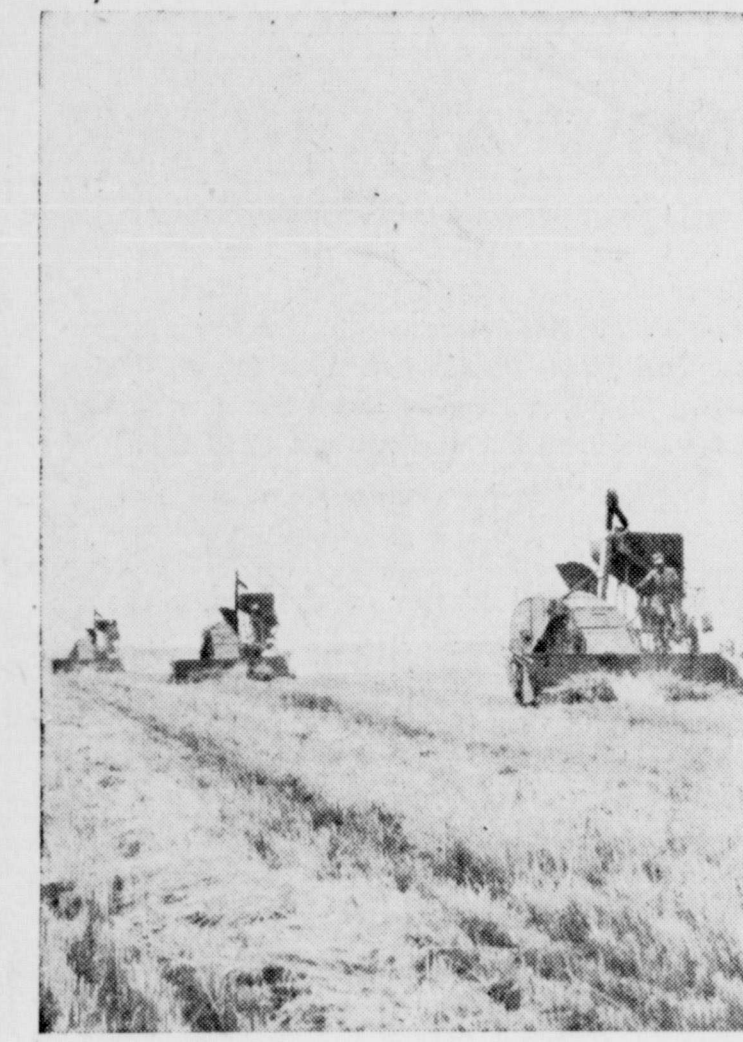

## SUCCESS.

It looks as if this nation, in its various excursions from the beaten path, is heading for an economic system in which most of us will be engaged in raising ourselves by our own bootstraps. This is an appealing system, which has been tried in various forms and countries; but as far as the record shows, it doesn't seem to have been very successful anywhere, for any length of time. The same old errors of human greed and misplaced economic law are sure to catch up with the economic gamblers in the long run, leaving cheaters themselves cheated.

When you get down to basic principles, you generally find that there are no miraculous ways by which a nation, a company or an individual can get ahead, with reasonable security, for any considerable length of time. The only sure way is to work hard and intelligently, and produce and sell useful things at a reasonable profit.

## GENTLEMAN FROM VIRGINIA.

Of all the eminent statesmen from Virginia, only one was ever secretary of the treasury, Carter Glass. He served under Wilson, after the close of World War I, resigning in 1920 to take the Senate seat which he has now vacated by death.

Had he accepted in 1933 President Roosevelt's offer to fill the post again, he would have been in a select class of three, the treasury secretaries who came back to the office after an interval. Hugh McCulloch of Indiana served under Lincoln and Arthur, and William Windom of Minnesota under Garfield and Benjamin Harrison.

The secretaries of the treasury have been almost as illustrious as the secretaries of state. The great-

est was the first, Alexander Hamilton. Later notables have included Albert Gallatin, James Guthrie, Salmon P. Chase, John Sherman and William G. McAdoo. Glass's service was too short to let him compare with these. In helping, however, to frame the Federal Reserve Act, he showed rare gifts as a financier, which, strangely enough, appeared seldom during his 26 years in the Senate.

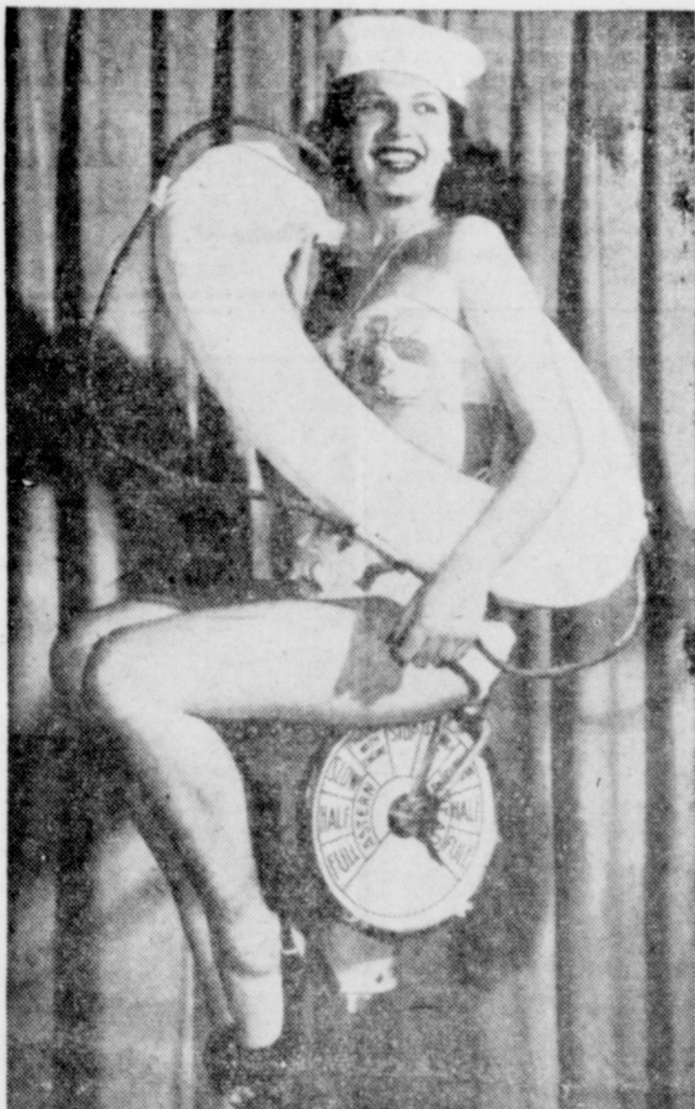

7. Option to retire at half pay for the rest of your life after 20 years' service—increasing to three-quarters pay after 30 years' service. (Retirement income in grade of Master or First Sergeant up to \$155.25 per month for life.) All previous active federal military service counts toward retirement.
8. Benefits under the GI Bill of Rights for men who enlist before October 6, 1946. A 4-year college, trade or business school course, with expenses paid, at the end of a 3-year enlistment.
9. Family allowances for the term of enlistment for dependents of men who enlist or reenlist before July 1, 1946.
10. Choice of branch of service and overseas theater (of those still open) on 3-year enlistments.
