## Truman Names Vinson as U. S. Chief Justice; Snyder Goes to Treasury

By United Press.

WASHINGTON, June 6.—President Truman today selected Secretary of Treasury Fred M. Vinson to be chief justice of the United States.

At the same time, he told a news conference he would nominate John W. Snyder, now reconversion director, to succeed Vinson at the treasury.

John L. Sullivan, assistant secretary of navy, was selected by the President to be undersecretary of navy.

### Aussie Minister Hot in Collar Over Mr. Franco

NEW YORK, June 6. (U.P.)—Australian Foreign Minister Herbert V. Evatt, denouncing the Spanish government as a fascist regime, told the United Nations Security Council today that now is the time to do something positive about getting rid of Gen. Francisco Franco.

### House of Savoy Begins Its Exodus From Italy

ROME, June 6.—Victorious Republican elements in Italy faced the future with confidence today and members of the deposed House of Savoy began an exodus to safe havens.

### Rusk Mayor Voted at Wrong Time, Sellers Ruled

AUSTIN, June 6.—The supreme court has refused to accept a request from the City of Rusk to compel Atty. Gen. Grover Sellers to approve a \$195,000 issue of bonds for a municipal electrical system.

### FACTS ARE LACKING.

CHICAGO, June 6. (U.P.)—Employees were called upon to check the start of the LaSalle Hotel fire, which took 58 lives, but failed because it spread too rapidly, hotel workers testified today at one of six fire investigations. Two elevator operators told of vain efforts to find extinguishers and bring them into play.

### WOULD BENEFIT RUSSIA.

MADRID, June 6.—The Falange Party newspaper Arriba, said in a first page editorial today that only Russia would benefit from a worldwide rupture of relations with Spain and asked if the United States and England "want the iron curtain to begin at Alegeciras."

### PACKER HORMEL DIES.

LOS ANGELES, June 6.—George Albert Hormel, 85, an immigrant's son who rose from butcher boy to millionaire packer, died Wednesday. He founded the George A. Hormel Packing Company at Austin, Minn., in 1892, retiring as president in 1927, when he came to California, but continuing as the board chairman.

### "IF PICKETING KILLS A MAN'S BUSINESS, THAT LOSS IS ONLY INCIDENTAL," SAYS UNIONIST

DALLAS, June 6.—The complete loss of a business as a result of a strike and picketing, even though its employees are not yet union members, would be only incidental to the labor-management dispute, James B. Turner, Teamsters Union representative, testified yesterday in the Forty-Fourth District Court.

Turner testified before Judge W. L. Thornton for the Teamsters Local No. 745 in the third day of the trial of a suit by Zanes Freight Agency which accuses the union of boycotting the agency and other allied firms in violation of Texas law.

The witness testified that he, at the request of Zanes employees, had not been admitted. But if a closed shop company had a dispute which could not be negotiated or settled, he would have to refer the matter to the International Teamsters Union headquarters, he said.

On cross-examination, Turner said he would not deny that he had threatened to break Zanes, but said he did not recall such a statement. Attorneys for both sides have indicated they would take the alleged boycott case to the United States Supreme Court, whatever the ruling of the local court.

### Canadian Square Flurry Over U. S. Wheat, New Here, Senate Race Was Attracts Notice Only Momentary

Nute Hart of the Bedford community, five miles northeast of Cisco, was in town today and brought with him excellent samples of a type of wheat new to the Cisco Country and known as Canadian Square.

Mr. Hart has 70 acres planted to Canadian Square and harvesting will begin Monday. Many have already spoken for quantities of the wheat for seed purposes, which will be sold for \$2 per bushel at harvest. If stored, cost of the wheat will necessarily be greater.

### WORKED AND SAVED.

PHILADELPHIA, June 6.—Rose Hagan, 82, who came to this country from Ireland 50 years ago and worked as a domestic for fashionable main line families, left an estate of \$73,000, the will disclosed. After making bequests of \$2,000, she left the remainder to the Society for the Propagation of the Faith.

### RESORT TO BOMBS.

CAIRO, June 6. (U.P.)—A bomb exploded in the movie theater of the British army's Empire Club to night and first reports said 20 Indian soldiers were killed.

### HUGE HARBORS BILL.

WASHINGTON, June 6. (U.P.)—The House today passed 208 to 68 and sent to the Senate a \$17,700,000 rivers and harbors authorization bill, the largest of its kind since 1941.

### COMPROMISE HINTED.

WASHINGTON, June 6.—House and Senate braced today for a tug of war over resuming the teen age draft. But there were hints of a compromise making 19-year-olds eligible and exempting those 18.

### 62,000 SEAMEN NOISILY URGE ACTION

WASHINGTON, June 6. (U.P.)—Partial paralysis gripped American shipping today when 62,000 AFL seamen began a demonstration walkout that may be a prelude to a threatened nationwide shipping strike set for June 15 by seven other unions.

Congress promptly stepped into the troubled situation. The House Labor Committee voted an investigation of the mounting maritime dispute. A seven-man subcommittee begins its inquiry tomorrow.

At the same time, the seven maritime unions — six CIO and one independent — threatening a June 15 strike, reaffirmed their determination to go through with the walkout unless their demands for higher wages and shorter hours are met.

The AFL walkout burst upon the nation's maritime scene at a moment when efforts were being made to avert the scheduled strike of the other seven unions.

### Ready to Quit.

NEW YORK, June 6.—A noisy, shouting crowd of 4,000 AFL seamen voted unanimously today at a "work-stoppage" meeting to authorize their union officials to prepare plans for a shipping strike.

### Florida May Be Able to Place Petrillo in Jail

ST. PETERSBURG, Fla., June 6. (U.P.)—States Attorney Chester B. McMullen today said he was investigating to determine if James C. Petrillo violated a Florida sedition law in his speech Monday attacking the radio network.

McMullen said if his investigation reveals that the state statutes were violated that he would issue a warrant for Petrillo's arrest "probably within the next 24 hours."

### Texas Roadside Council Has Far-Reaching Program

Cisco members of the Texas Roadside Council, which is sponsored by the Texas highway department, are Mrs. Alex Spears, chairman, Mrs. A. D. Anderson, Mrs. W. F. Brown, Mrs. George P. Fee, Mrs. E. L. Graham, Mrs. W. C. Hogue, Mrs. Edward Lee, Mrs. Leon Maner, Mrs. John Shertzer, Mrs. Theresa Weddington, Mrs. Paul M. Woods and Mrs. Bill Mitcham.

At a recent meeting of the Eastland county council, of which Mrs. James Horton of Eastland is chairman, it was voted to plant the pecan as the honor memorial tree and the abelia as the shrub for the Eastland county area.

"The idea behind the creation of the Roadside Council," said Mrs. Spears, "is that the highway department hopes to develop public recognition of the benefits of a proper cleanup and beautification program in the areas adjoining and within view of state and federal highways, and of the business routes of those highways through our cities. Since the highway commission itself has jurisdiction only of the actual highway rights-of-way, the state highway department felt that a program for the areas adjoining the rights-of-way could best be carried out by a citizens' non-political group, which group could carry on an educational program on a statewide basis. Our program in general now includes the following:

1. Encouraging citizens who live along our highways and the business men who own property adjoining the business routes of those highways through our towns and cities, to clean up and beautify those properties. This phase contemplates the straightening of fences, gates and approaches, the straightening up of shacks and outhouses, the removal of structures which are no longer of any use and are dilapidated, the painting of all structures and the planting of shrubs, trees and grasses.

2. The second part of the program is that of attempting to implement the suggestions made by the state highway department to the last session of the legislature, through concurrent resolution No. 15, in which the legislature resolved that each county adopt some particular flowering shrub or tree as a "Living Honor" memorial to all the citizens of that county who served in the armed forces during the recent war, and the encouragement of all property owners of each county to plant as many of the particular flowering shrub or tree selected for that county in their individual yards and public grounds, as a people's program.

3. Part of our program contemplates a re-study of the historical and interesting spots in our state, at which spot proper highway markers should be placed (an excellent start was made in this direction by the Centennial Commission in 1935-36, and this part of our program will be a continuation of that start).

4. The fourth phase of our program is that of making a careful study of recommending some control to correct the present indiscriminate use of advertising signs along our highways.

5. A study is being made with a view of recommending some form of control of junk yards along the highways of Texas, having particularly in mind the present unsightly lots along those highways now devoted to the storage and sale of old and wrecked automobiles.

"You can see," Mrs. Spears concluded, "that this is an ambitious program and one which cannot be accomplished in a short time; but it is nevertheless one on which we can concentrate and try to get as much as possible accomplished this year."

## HISTORIC CHAIN.

Times may be troublous now-days, but at least the United States has been spared a renewed outburst of chain letters, cluttering up the mails and taking time that could be put to better uses.

This reflection came from a historical scholar who was examining the records of the Russian Foreign Office, which the Bolsheviks gave to the world soon after they came to power. To his astonishment he learned that in 1899 the Chinese government used the chain letter device to incite the people against Europeans and Americans. A handbill was distributed, reciting the crimes of the "foreign devils."

The person who reads this script and quickly distributes six copies, will save a family from distress. He who distributes ten copies will save an entire street from suffering. He who sees this sheet and does not distribute it shall pay with his head.

Out of this incendiary document arose the Boxer insurrection, in which many Europeans, chiefly missionaries, were killed in Peking, and which caused the intervention of Allied troops, including German and American.

Most chain letters do not have consequences so pernicious, but they are nothing to encourage.

## PARENTAL RESPONSIBILITY.

Children are now more of a problem in this country than at any other time in American history.

There are fewer of them in proportion to population, but those few seem harder to take care of. There are so many landlords who object to having children in the house, and also so many tenants who don't want children.

From the way many people talk—both parents and non-parents—it often seems as if they regard

offsprings as an intolerable imposition and outrage, instead of the blessing they were once supposed to be.

Really there should be a new deal in this business of begetting and raising children, a better understanding of what children are and how to take care of them, and a wiser adaptation of fathers and mothers to what should be their most important jobs and their greatest glory of life.
