## Seeks Constitutional Amendment to Oust 4 From Supreme Court

### Mun Water Plant Operators From 12 Towns Met Here

A district meeting of municipal water plant operators from Albany, Mineral Wells, Strawn, Graham, Ranger, Throckmorton, Breckenridge, Haskell, Lueders, Abilene, Rule and Cisco was held last night at Lake Cisco Tourist Lodge.

D. C. Goforth of Strawn, president of the association, presided and Luke Baker of the Cisco water department served as secretary. The session lasted from 8 until 10:30 o'clock.

Following a thoroughly enjoyable fish fry, interesting and informative talks were made by a number of speakers.

The principal talk was by Reuben Wende, son of E. J. Wende of Cisco, who is attached to the state board of health and located at Houston. The former Cisco young man discussed diseases controlled by laboratory water tests and his remarks were well received by the 35 visitors present. Among the guests was Guy Caldwell of Albany.

### Softball Field at Grammar School Ready for Players

Buck Overall, director of the American Legion's Recreational program, announces that the softball field at Cisco grammar school has been completed and that softball teams can now be organized and playing schedules arranged.

Overall says that all children, both boys and girls, who are interested in playing softball this summer, should be at grammar school at 9 o'clock Wednesday morning. Mr. Overall will be present and will have all the necessary equipment.

Overall also stated that hard ball teams are practicing every afternoon at Chesley Field and that more players are needed.

Games are now being scheduled with Eastland, Breckenridge, Albany and other neighboring towns, he added.

WASHINGTON, June 18. — A constitutional amendment that would remove from the U. S. Supreme Court four of the late President Roosevelt's appointees and prevent any future president from packing the court was proposed in the Senate today.

The amendment was offered by Sens. James O. Eastland, D., Miss., and Styles Bridges, R., N. H.

It was prompted, Eastland said in a Senate speech, by the present state of affairs on the Supreme Court as evidenced by the recent open feuding between Associate Justices Robert H. Jackson and Hugo L. Black.

### Bowles Seeking Would Give Military Strong Voice in Atomic Control

WASHINGTON, June 18. (AP)—The House Military Affairs Committee today voted to insist on giving the military a stronger voice in the control of future atomic energy development.

Committee members said the group adopted amendments to Senate-approved legislation to insist that at least one, but not more than two, members of a five-man atomic energy commission be from the armed forces.

### JEOPARDIZE RELIEF.

WASHINGTON, June 18. (AP)—Acting Secretary of State Dean Acheson said today the U. S. famine relief program would be jeopardized by the threatened revision of OPA price ceilings on meat, dairy products and poultry.

### ELECTRIC POWER LOBBYISTS.

WASHINGTON, June 18. (AP)—Sen. James E. Murray, D. Mont., today called for a congressional investigation of electric power lobbyists. He charged they sought to "emasculate" the interior department appropriation bill.

### GAS INDUSTRY TO FIGHT.

WASHINGTON, June 18. (AP)—A spokesman for the Natural Gas Industry Committee today voiced opposition to any attempt at federal regulation of the production and gathering of natural gas.

### HOME-BUILDING THREAT.

WASHINGTON, June 18. (AP)—The breakdown in price controls proposed in the present legislation to extend the OPA would set back the nation's low-cost home building program by two years, Housing Expediter Wilson W. Wyatt said today.

### LOBOS AND LONE STAR.

Cisco Lobos will play the Lone Star softball team at Eastland tonight, 8 o'clock. The Lobos have won six consecutive games and are getting better as the weather warms. Tonight's game should be a thriller, said Elbert Tipton, Lobo reporter, since both of these teams have defeated the Eastland high school team by about the same score. Tipton urges that all Cisco fans turn out tonight and give the Lobos all the support possible.

### SCOUTS MEET TONIGHT.

Boy Scout Troop 101, S. E. Hittson, scoutmaster, will meet at First Presbyterian church tonight, 8 o'clock. This is deemed a very important meeting, said Jay Warren, reporter, since arrangements for the July 5-12 encampment will be completed. The encampment will be held at the junction of San Saba river and Brady creek, Warren said.

### Teachers Who Put Loyalty to AAUP Above Loyalty to UofT, Should Quit

SAN MARCOS, June 18. — Continuing his attack on the American Association of University Professors for its recent censure of the University of Texas, Beauford H. Jester, candidate for governor and a former chairman of University's Board of Regents, declared here in a speech Monday night that faculty members who place loyalty to the AAUP above loyalty to the University of Texas, should resign.

In commenting on the recent action of the AAUP, which levelled charges of politics against the administration of the University, Jester stated "it's always customary at this time of the year for some teachers to take promotions and go to other institutions. I don't think many have resigned for political reasons.

"The public ought not to consider these as protests." If there are faculty members who are resigning as a result of the politically-timed rebuke by AAUP, and they consider their allegiance to AAUP above their loyalty to the University, it is just as well that they do resign."

Jester had previously charged that the AAUP censure of the University was a political move, adroitly timed to inject the University into the campaign for governor.

He further claimed that while many fine, patriotic Texas educators hold membership in AAUP, the group was organized in the north and its widespread national membership included Communist sympathizers and Fellow Travelers.

### Austin Hotel Operators Lease the Daniels Hotel

Mr. and Mrs. J. A. Henson of Austin have leased the Daniels hotel for five years and are now in charge.

Considerable remodeling of the 64-room hotel is planned by the lessees, who have spent 25 years in the hotel business in various cities from Dallas west, as well as the Plaza Hotel at Austin, which they are still operating.

The new residents are members of the Presbyterian church and are favorably impressed with Cisco and its evidences of stability and steady growth.

### HIKE PRICE OF TIRES.

WASHINGTON, June 18. (AP)—The OPA today authorized a temporary 3.3 per cent increase in the retail ceiling prices for passenger car and motorcycle tires.

### JEWIS HUNT TROUBLE.

JERUSALEM, June 18. (AP)—Three British officers were kidnapped at Tel Aviv today and an attempt was made to assassinate two Britons in Jerusalem as casualties in three days of Holy Land violence mounted to at least 18 dead and scores wounded. Continued outbreaks attributed to Jewish underground forces took on the aspects of a full fledged campaign against the British.

### BIG FOUR DEADLOCKED.

PARIS, June 18. (AP)—The Big Four Foreign Ministers Council deadlocked today over Italian reparations, with V. M. Molotov of Russia and Ernest Bevin of Britain taking firm stands on widely divergent viewpoints.

## JOHN LEE SMITH HITS FEPC, CLOSED SHOP; SAYS LATTER AN INSTRUMENT OF HITLER

NACODOCHES, June 18. — Lt. Gov. John Lee Smith formally began his ballot-hunt in the governor's race here Saturday night with a platform speech bristling against practices of organized labor, the FEPC and the threat of "foreign and subversive forces" in schools.

In a summary of his views on a host of political subjects, Smith also asserted he opposed new taxes and favored payment of pensions only to the needy, adequate pay for schoolteachers, legislative redistricting, revamping of the pardon and parole law, establishment of a commission to assist veterans in finding jobs and new businesses, and the return of free enterprise.

Smith devoted more time to an exposition of his conservative labor views than to any other issue. He called for legislation to banish any compulsion that an employee must join a union and termed un-American the closed shop, although he said labor should have the right to organize and bargain collectively.

### HITLER'S CLOSED SHOP.

"We should not forget that Hitler enforced the closed shop (politically) in Germany," Smith said. To permit it to be fostered here, he declared, would be a monstrous betrayal of the veterans who fought against "this evil doctrine of selfishness and hate."

Labor differences should be settled by law, as are contract differences between individuals, the lieutenant governor said.

Wartime strikes were acts of treason, he charged, which prolonged the conflict and caused the deaths of many American fighting men.

His proposed labor code would safeguard "both the employer and the laborer against the labor racketeer — and this time-serving parasite is at the bottom of most of our labor troubles," he said.

"Political fear" has prevented earlier creation of a labor relations court, Smith claimed.

### FEPC AN INSULT.

The anti-new deal candidate blistered the administration-sponsored Fair Employment Practices Committee as "a studied insult by practical theorists to the white people of the southern states. It is a breeder of racial friction and will result in evil to both the white and Negro races."

His white southern neighbors—not the "northern agitators of racial strife"—are the Negro's best friends, Smith asserted.

The public schools should be protected "from the foreign and subversive forces that would destroy our form of government and corrupt our social order," the candidate said, and warned against the infiltration into schools of foreign "isms that would wreck and ruin our way of life."

### Joe Donaway, Dothan Stock Farmer, is Candidate

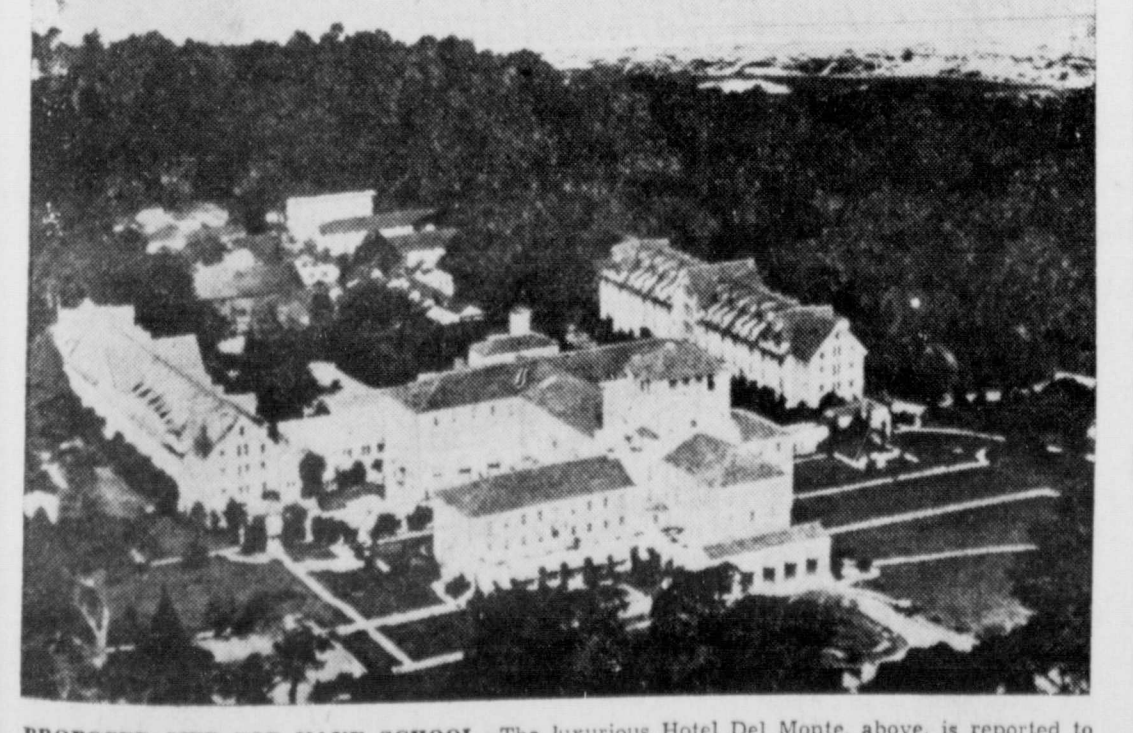

## THE GREAT PLAN.

The plan for international atomic control is one of the greatest opportunities ever offered mankind. Here is the chance to outlaw war. Here is the chance for peace. Here is a plan as important for the world as design for a United States offered a little group of colonies. These few little colonies have become many great states under the plan of the pooling of part of their sovereignties into one great sovereignty. They have scrapped and vituperated, once some of them tried to break the Union. It took bitter trouble to close that rift. But for 160 years the United States have been one nation and none of them would forego the advantages of union.

It is true that under the Baruch plan for atomic control some fraction of the individual sovereignties of the nations would have to be turned over to a central sovereign group. But is not a fractional loss of sovereignty better than loss of existence?

Nor does this plan provide any sentimental give-away. It is a tight, strong design of give and take, with the atomic secrets held by ourselves until the whole plan is set and working. It is probably perfect. Few plans are.

But the Baruch plan deserves the sincere, open-minded, concentrated attention of every American and probably it ought to have one good try.

Bernard Shaw once said, the only trouble with Christianity was

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that it had never really been tried. Peace hasn't been tried, either, on a scale taking in the whole world. Small samples of peace have always been approved. Why not take a long breath and put in an order for a whole peace, every where and enduring?

## ANCIENT WISDOM.

Sometimes people think the ancient scriptures, such as the Bhagavad-Gita of the Hindus, the Old and New Testaments of the Jews and Christians, are out of date, behind the times, simply because they are old. But books stating eternal verities have a way of turning up with bits singularly expressive of modern problems. It has occurred to more than one discouraged seeker of a home that Jesus of Nazareth said: "The foxes have their holes, and the birds

their nests, but the son of man hath not where to lay his head." Sometimes, too, a weary housewife, turning away from an empty counter, does not gripe, but finds a sudden comfort in the memory that "Man shall not live by bread alone, but by every word of God." Remembering, she smiles, and drops the coins not spent for bread into the Emergency Food Collection for the hungry overseas.

(Continued From Page One) support every fraction of state government, Smith declared, and said he would oppose any new revenue-raising measures.

Categorizing the full payment of old-age pensions as an outstanding issue in the race, Smith said he would need the legislature's full co-operation to enact a law providing that only the needy should get pension benefits. He sniffed at candidates of other years who made similar promises, but did not fulfill them.

**SOCIALISTIC PLOTS.** name, or groups, Smith warned that powerful forces were at work "whose aim is to wreck this land . . . and to build in its stead a huge socialist state that controls the people instead of being controlled by them."

In the next breath, he said he had nothing personal to say against his opponents, assuming they were gentlemen and "worthy of your respect."

In suggesting assistance to veterans, including priority on all jobs, Smith took another swing at labor. "But the CIO is opposed to this. They want these boys to join up with their union and pay an initiation fee before they get a job."

"If we can create a huge commission to aid the oil industry we should not refuse to set up an agency to aid our ex-servicemen and women," he said.

Texas needs a new pardon and parole system, Smith observed, because under existing procedure too many undeserving convicts have obtained clemency and in many cases the plans for rehabilitation and reform "have not functioned."

He mentioned whims of the pardon board and political pressure as forces operating against sound administration of the present law. Smith deplored failure for more than fifteen years to observe the clear mandate of the Constitution with reference to the legislative redistricting, and said it should be one of the first orders of business of the next Legislature.

The United States Employment Service should be returned to the state, Smith said, because "Washington bureaucrats are too far away from Texas to know our problems and our needs."

While calling for conservation practices, especially with regard to timber, the candidates said he was opposed to federal control because it would lead to government ownership.

He also announced his stand for an adequate farm-to-market road program.

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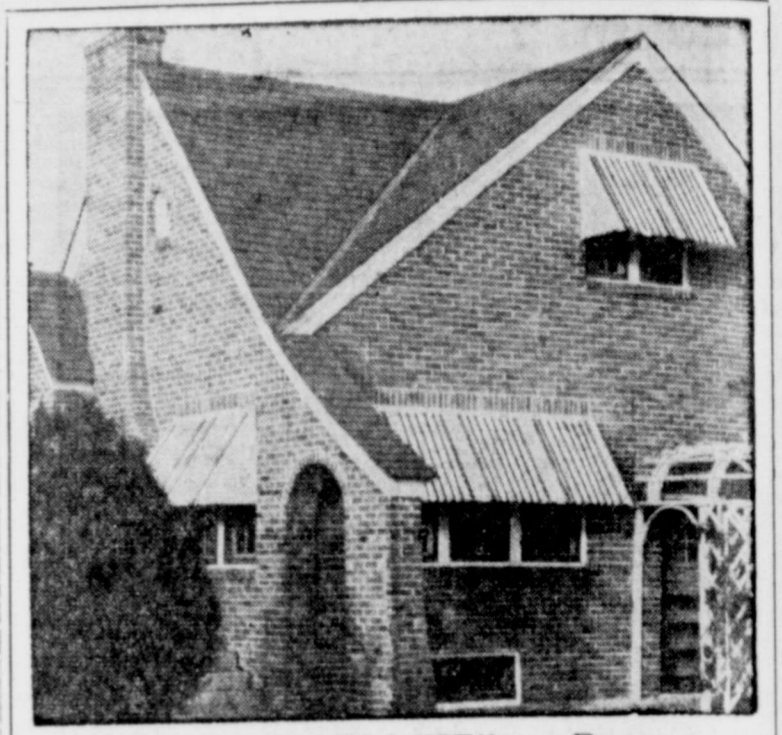
