Russia Wants Treaty to Outlaw Atomic Warfare

New WAA Field Service of Im-Loboes Defeated Lone Star Softballers, 18 to 7

A new field service that will mean much to veterans of War II throughout Eastland county is announced by Hamilton Morton, regional director of War Assets Administration, Fort Worth.

Thursday, June 27 and Friday, June 28, two representatives of the veterans division of the Ft. Worth WAA office will be in Abilene to certify veterans and provide them with information concerning purchase of surplus property.

Clay W. Smith and Finis Brown, both War II veterans, are the WAA representatives to be in Abilene next week. Headquarters will be at American Legion hall, First and Cedar streets, 9 a. m. to 5 p. m. each day.

Bob Morris, VFW commander, J. F. Warren, post service officer of the Legion, Z. O. Robertson of the Veterans Administration, and John Owens, VFW service officer all were contacted regarding the new plan and have expressed full approval.

Veterans of War II should bring with them their honorable discharge or certificate of satisfactory service in order to enable Finis Brown to complete the necessary papers certifying the veterans for the surplus property they desire.

All veterans today hold a number two priority, second only to federal government agencies buying for their own needs on all consumer goods. In addition, many items such as trucks, tractors, farm and construction machinery and medical, dental, surgical and veterinarian equipment are on a "set aside" list exclusively for veterans.

NEW YORK, June 19. — Russia today formally proposed that the United States destroy all its atomic bombs and halt their further production within 90 days after ratification of a treaty outlawing atomic warfare.

The Russian plan was placed before the United Nations Atomic Energy Commission by Soviet Delegate Andrei Gromyko, who made no reference to earlier United States proposals for placing atomic energy under international control.

Gromyko submitted a draft agreement for banishing atomic warfare from the world by an iron-clad treaty under which contracting nations would pledge themselves—

1. Not to use atomic bombs under any circumstances.
2. To forbid the production of atomic bombs or storage of such weapons.
3. To destroy within three months after ratification of the agreement all existing atomic bomb stocks.

Union Heads Vote to End Canadian Loggers' Strike

VANCOUVER, June 19. (AP)—Union officials voted today to end a 33-day loggers' strike, announcing that 37,000 woodsmen would return to their jobs in mills, box factories and lumber operations by 11 a. m. tomorrow.

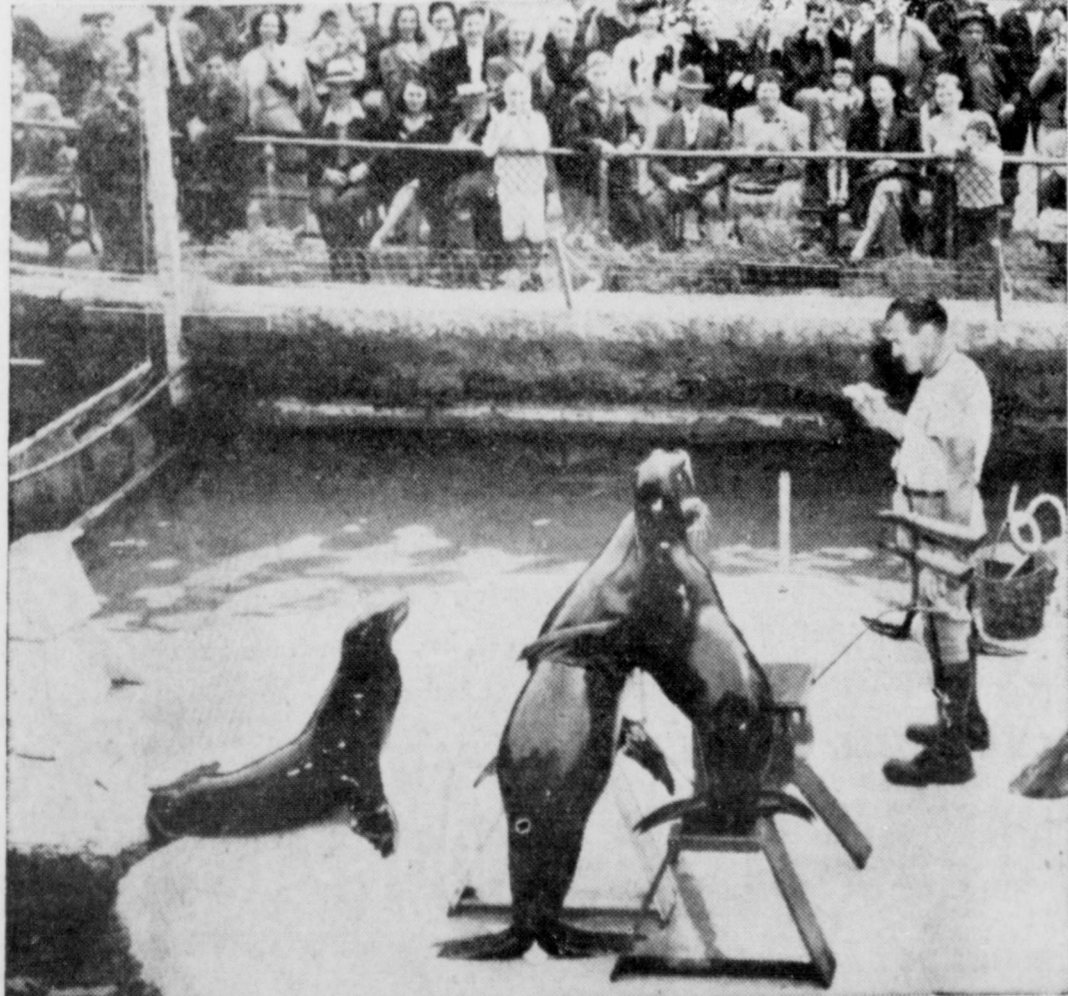
tion program for young Americans in Cisco.
