## Conferees Still Tangled Over Price Control Bill

### Baseball This Afternoon, 2:30, at Chesley Field

### Control of House to be Decided in Key Areas This Fall

Two local hardball teams will meet at 2:30 this afternoon for a game at Chesley Field, says Elbert Tipton. One team will be composed of Junior American Legion boys and the other is to be made up from the softball team that is now leading the Eastland county league.

The baseball diamond has been surveyed by Whitey Moore and is said to be in good condition generally.

The American Legion lineup will probably be as follows: Robert Rendall, catcher; pitcher, yet to be named; Bill Tabor, second base; Jackey Leach, shortstop; Bobby Travis, third base; Stanley Sharp, right field; Jim Farnsworth, center field; Wayne Hayes, left field.

WASHINGTON, June 22.—Control of house will be decided in approximately 40 key districts this fall.

Republicans are optimistic, cocky. To win control they have to hold present seats, gain 27 more. Primaries have encouraged them.

Democrats, on other hand, think they'll gain a few, lose a few, keep control by about present margin. They start campaign well-heeled. On May 31, Democratic national committee's report to congress showed a balance of \$893,282. Its contributions March through May were \$388,916, including receipts from Jackson Day dinners.

Republicans still say they'll pick up three or four seats in Connecticut, six to eight in Pennsylvania, four or five in California. Democrats won't talk about individual districts, but laugh privately at California claim. Their hope is they might lose one seat there, gain three.

Republicans expect, also to win back all seats lost in Roosevelt fourth-term victory. This includes three in Ohio and two each in West Virginia, Washington, Illinois and Minnesota. They count on Stassen for this last job. One more Wisconsin seat is sure, they think, because Rep. Hull, Progressive, runs this year as Republican.

Republican optimism extends to these fields also: New York, two or three seats; Delaware, one to three; Missouri, one to three; Utah one.

Meanwhile, CIO politicians say shift of five per cent or less from 1944 returns could swing 101 house seats. These "marginal" districts are now divided 57 Republican, 44 Democrat.

Forty-nine of tem voted to override Case veto and 44 voted to sustain it.

### Police Mark Parking Spaces in the Business District

In an effort to afford more parking space in the business district, the Cisco police department, cooperating with the street department, has marked the principal avenues and streets. Spaces are marked to conform with national safety regulations and the 40-degree angle and eight-foot width between spaces allows auto drivers to easily park within the lines.

M. L. Perdue, police chief, requests all drivers to conform to the new regulations. For a time, he says, or until the public becomes familiar with the plan, his department will issue only courtesy tickets for parking infractions.

Employees of D avenue business places, it is stated, can render great service by using certain alleys, side streets, E avenue and vacant lots that have been turned into parking lots.

Just a thought: "If that transient can easily find a parking place, he may spend money with one or more D avenue merchants."

WASHINGTON, June 22.—With time rapidly running out, Senate and House conferees failed again today to agree on four major phases of price control extension legislation and recessed until Monday night.

They called it a day after approving an amendment that would make consumers foot the bill for price increases granted to manufacturers and knocking out the OPA's maximum average price regulation, which is designed to spur production of low-cost clothing.

They also agreed to give the secretary of agriculture authority over price and decontrol policies on agricultural products.

But, with just a week to go before the present price control law expires, they still remained deadlocked on these major questions—

1. Abolishing price controls on specific items such as meat, poultry and dairy products.
2. The length of time OPA should be extended.
3. Creation of a decontrol board.
4. Subsidies.

### Vet of War II Was Eighth Victim of Baker Hotel Fire

DALLAS, June 22.—A 28-year-old wounded veteran of World War II became the eighth victim of the Baker Hotel tragedy today as doctors fought to save six others critically injured when a flash explosion rocked the 18-story luxury hotel in downtown Dallas.

James W. Thomas, war veteran hired by the hotel from the Burns Detective Agency, died of his injuries late today at Parkland hospital. The hotel said the young father was drawing full compensation for shrapnel wounds received in the war.

Three Dallas hospitals still had 26 of the 41 injured hotel employees under observation. Six were listed in critical condition.

### FACES MURDER CHARGE.

PADUCAH, June 22.—Mrs. R. G. Compton, Paducah, about 39, has been charged with murder before Justice Mrs. Bud Barron in the death of her husband, R. G. Compton, 40, who was found dead on a blazing mattress in the family home here May 31.

### WORK BE HELPFUL.

FT. WORTH, June 22.—Parents of three youths who smashed 15 windows at Oaklawn elementary school have agreed to have their sons earn enough money this summer to pay for damages.

### ACTRESS MURDERED.

LONDON, June 22.—Nude and with legs bound, the body of a dark-haired English film extra, Mrs. Margery Gardner, was found in a West London hotel room amid evidence of a violent struggle. The mother of a 2-year-old daughter, Mrs. Gardner was reported by neighbors to have been well known in the Chelsea artists district.

### FIVE-YEAR TAX PROGRAM.

WASHINGTON, June 22.—Congressional tax experts are working on a revolutionary five-year tax program designed to replace the traditional year-to-year tax programs, it was disclosed tonight.

### REDS MUST EXPLAIN.

WASHINGTON, June 22.—The state department has asked Russia to explain why four American newspapermen have been reported admission to Bulgaria, in apparent violation of the Potsdam agreement.

### BONDS FOR AIRPORT.

MEMPHIS, Texas, June 22.—Memphis taxpayers Friday voted 234 to 18 for a \$15,000 bond issue to buy land for a municipal airport.

### Bilbo Urges That Negroes be Barred From Primaries

JACKSON, Miss., June 22.—Sen. Theodore Bilbo, D., Miss., tonight demanded that "the red-blooded men" of Mississippi bar Negroes from voting.

His demand came a few hours after a Negro army veteran charged that he had been beaten and flogged by four white men when he sought to register.

In one of his strongest white supremacy statements of his current campaign for renomination, Bilbo said at Laurel that if a few Negroes vote in the Democratic primary this year, more will vote in 1947 "and from then on it will grow into a mighty surge."

### Critics charge Waa With Unnecessary Delay in Site Sales

WASHINGTON, June 22.—Look for charges of favoritism and inefficiency against War Assets Administration and other surplus property disposal agencies when newly created slaughter committee starts hearings soon in the house. Maritime Commission, as well, is target of many complaints. Investigators have started checking.

Meanwhile demands increase for replacement of Lt. Gen. Gregory, War Assets head, with an outstanding merchant—like Donald Nelson.

War assets, stung by criticism, is rushing plans for site-sales. Only 13 per cent of surpluses—costing \$16 billion—have been sold so far. With more than 900 sites scheduled for early fall, War Assets hopes to double or triple present rate of disposal.

### NURSES ARE NEEDED.

FT. WORTH, June 22.—A 22-month-old boy today was diagnosed as a polio sufferer at City-County hospital, bringing to 33 the number of reported cases in Tarrant county this year. Meanwhile, Miss Ruth Hardy, director of nursing, issued another plea for registered nurses to help the hospital where 27 polio patients have been admitted this year.

### WILL ASK AFFIDAVIT.

DALLAS, June 22.—Dallas county ex-servicemen will be asked to sign an affidavit as to their voting qualifications, come the July 27 Democratic primaries, County Democratic Chairman Arthur Stevenson said the use of affidavits is a safeguard against what could be a "wide open gate for multiple voting and fraud in the primary."

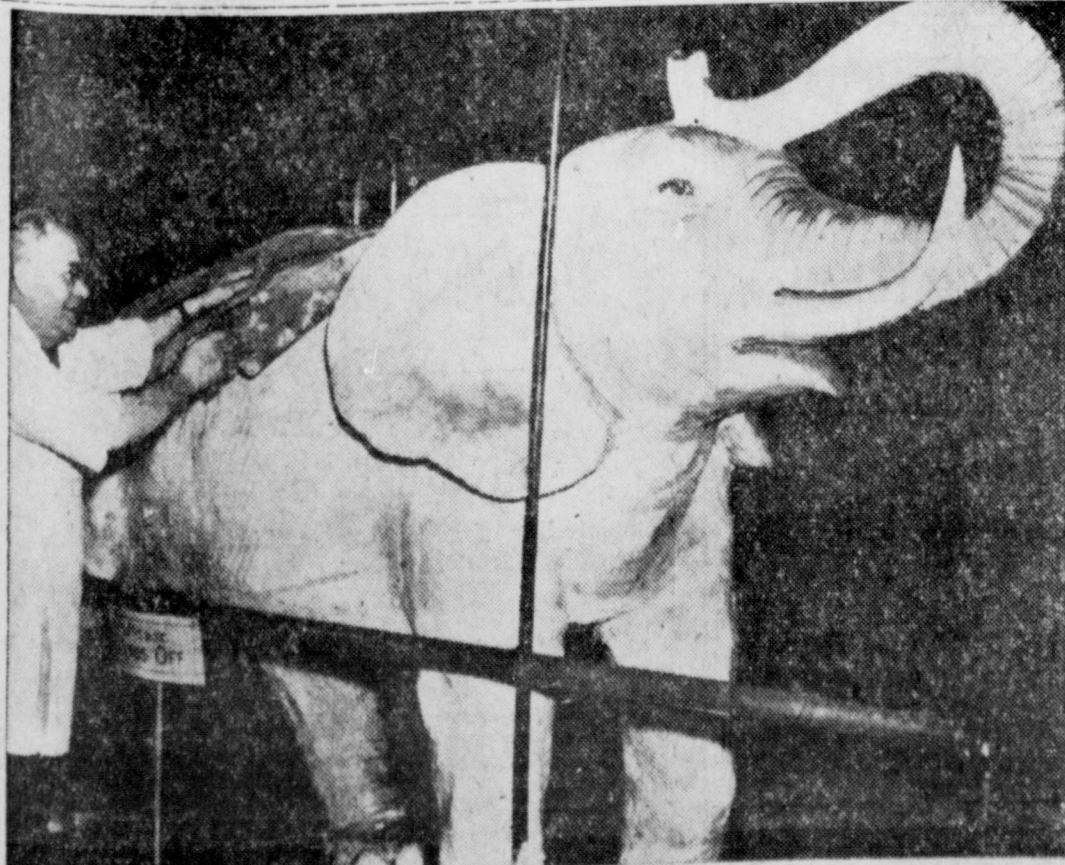

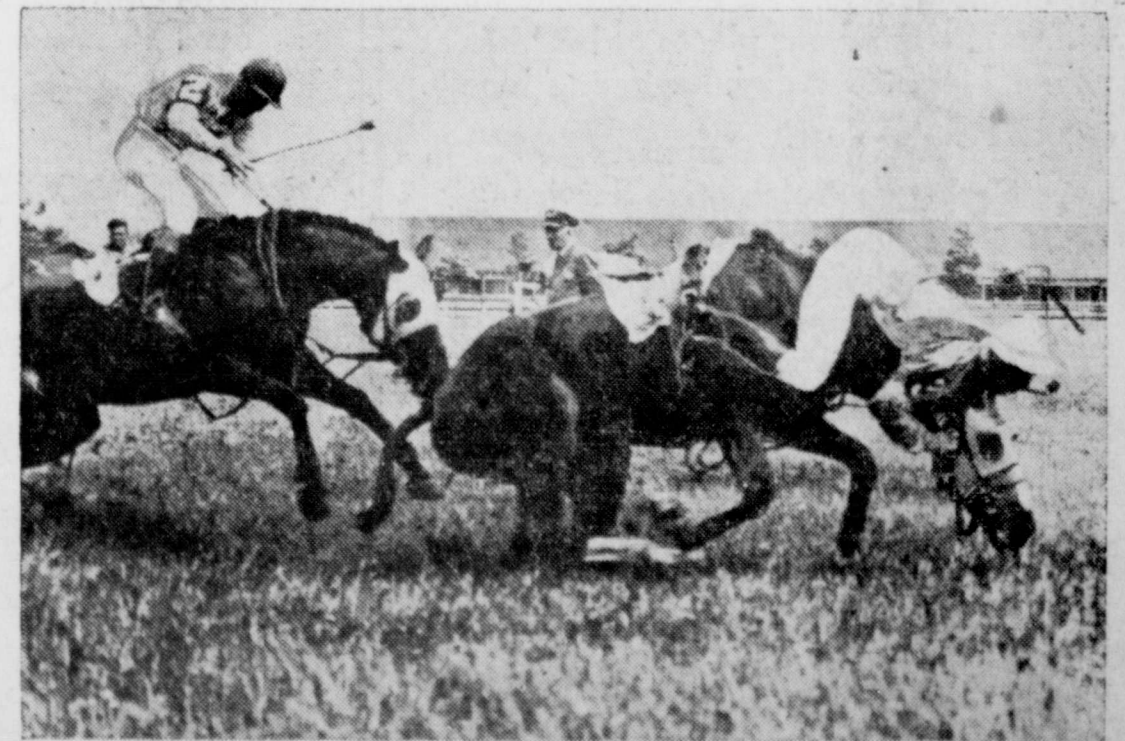

### Can Force Drunk Driver to Take a Second Exam

AUSTIN, June 22.—The state department of public safety is authorized to require an examination of a person who has been convicted of driving while intoxicated before permitting him to drive an automobile again, the attorney general ruled Saturday.

The ruling was given in an opinion to M. E. Gates, Walker county attorney. The attorney general held that in instances where drivers' licenses have been suspended for specified periods, the department must return the licenses at the end of the suspension period.

But, said the attorney general the person whose license has been suspended is subject to an examination, if the department thinks it advisable, before he can receive his license back. In the event the person failed the examination, his license could be withheld, the attorney general said.

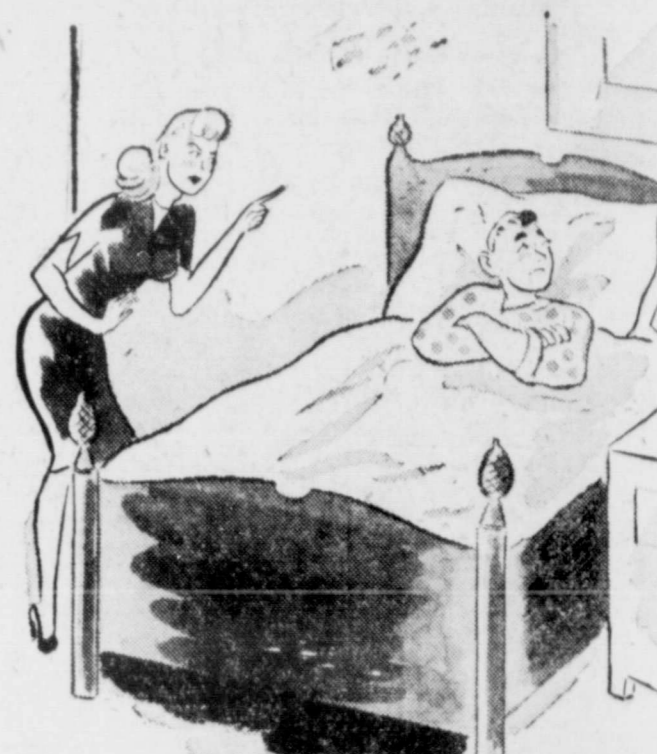
