FIRM IN THE RIGHT.

Ex-kings and ex-prime ministers may decline in prestige, but the United States respects its only ex-President.

So Americans listened when Herbert Hoover in Rio De Janeiro the other day said "the Communist party in every country is trying to hamper the world's efforts to provide food for the hungry."

Attacked by the Communist press on his arrival in Brazil on the ground that he came to take food from the people, Mr. Hoover replied by urging Moscow to establish a new party line in the press of the world, saying that in Brazil, as in the other 37 countries visited on his food mission, he was impressed with the "unity of Communist press opposition."

He added that now, as after World War I when he organized South Russian famine relief at the Soviet's request, "millions of Communists have received their full share and indeed were saved from starvation."

The Brazilians, he said, contrary to the Communists are eager and able to furnish rice, beans and corn.

The job of gathering food for

famine areas of the earth must go on, and will, whatever Communists or any other opponents say.

By making this perfectly clear, the United States and other co-operating nations will demonstrate to Russia and to all nations that there is such a thing as world brotherhood.

Perhaps, after a while, the Soviets will realize that it is better to be part of such a union than out of it.

of this year will be two years ahead of ourselves in the payment of our indebtedness.

"All indications point to the fact that the tax rate for 1947-48 will be even lower, probably not more than 50 cents per hundred valuation, and if we are permitted to continue this delinquent tax program, there should be no reason for our tax rate being more than 50 cents per hundred at any time in the future, unless additional bonds are voted for some purpose by the people.

"We must bear in mind, however, that these low rates cannot continue if the job is to be abandoned in the middle of the stream in order that fair play to all alike be had and full benefit of the results be gained for the entire citizenship.
