Big 4 Ask Truman to Sign Opa Bill When He Gets It; "It is This or Nothing!"

M. D. PASCHALL JR. OF CISCO WILL BE ON USS. BLUE RIDGE WHEN A-BOMBS FALL AT BIKINI

EDITOR'S NOTE—Cisco people will be interested in learning that Marion Paschall, native of Cisco and grandson of Mrs. M. D. Paschall of this city, is attached to the USS. Blue Ridge as radar technician, second class. His father, M. D. Paschall, now lives in Corpus Christi.

ABOARD U.S.S. APPALACHIAN, June 28.—It will be safely first and results second in the Bikini atom bomb test, scheduled for July 1.

Vice-Admiral W. H. P. Blandy, commander of Joint Task Force 1, has said that the lives of personnel, which must be endangered in war to accomplish military objectives, cannot be endangered in peace in Operation Crossroads.

He has 12,000 lives on his hands and unique dangers against which to safeguard them. Task Force spokesmen aboard this official press ship of the expedition outlined some of the dangers and the elaborate precautions that are expected to assure safety to all hands, though dangers from the bomb explosion itself are expected to be of short duration and to be confined to an area of three and one-half nautical miles.

No man-bearing airplane or ship will be allowed closer than ten miles at M hour, time of the actual detonation.

Those whose presence that close to the target area is not essential to success of the experiment will be nearer to twenty-miles away. Dangers to eyes of observers, both official and press, and operating personnel will be eliminated by use of high-density goggles. These were thoroughly tested in the first atom explosion near Alamogordo, N. M., last July.

Persons whose duties will not require them to look at the explosion have been ordered to face away from the target area, close their eyes, hide their faces in the crook of an arm.

After the explosion, they may watch the mushrooming cloud of radioactive material, smoke and flame that will tower into the air for a dozen miles without endangering their eyesight. This cloud, which may retain its shape for hours as it drifts away with the wind, will be highly lethal. It will be tracked by B-17 aircraft of the

By United Press.
WASHINGTON, June 28.—Administration leaders in Congress today urged President Truman to sign the OPA Extension Bill when it reaches him.

Senate Democratic Leader Alben W. Barkley of Kentucky said he and the other three of the congressional "Big Four" had urged President Truman to sign the measure "on the ground that it is this or nothing."

Barkley called the Senate into session an hour earlier than usual to speed final action on the bill, but debate still was going strong at mid-afternoon.

Barkley, however, clung to his hopes that the measure would be passed by nightfall.

President Truman called the "Big Four" to the White House one hour before the senate renewed debate on it.

Quick Senate passage of the OPA Extension Bill was expected, following the collapse earlier this morning of the one-man filibuster of Sen. W. Lee O'Daniel of Texas, against it.

The congressional leaders said President Truman did not indicate whether he would sign or veto the measure.

House Passes Bill to Kill Truman Reorganization Plan

WASHINGTON, June 28.—The House today approved and sent to the Senate legislation to kill President Truman's program for reorganizing and reshuffling federal agencies.

The program, embraced in three reorganization plans which Mr. Truman submitted to Congress on May 16, would automatically become effective within 60 days on July 15—unless both the Senate and House pass legislation disapproving the program.

Opponents of the three plans centered their fire on provisions to consolidate into a single office all the permanent and wartime federal housing agencies and to abolish the U. S. Employees Compensation Commission.

5,341 WERE ADMITTED.
CHICAGO (UP)—A total of 5,341 candidates who appeared before examining boards in 1945 were admitted to medical practice, the American Medical Assn. reports. At the same time, 588 graduates of foreign or unapproved schools were not accepted, the AMA said. Approximately 3,800 physicians and surgeons died, bringing the total increase to the physician population to approximately 2,000, the AMA said.

Tyler Officer is Killed Because of Jim Crow Law

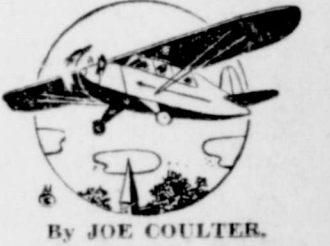
TYLER, June 28.—Twenty-six negro passengers on the city bus in which plainclothes officer M. J. Buie was stabbed fatally in trying to enforce the Jim Crow law were held in jail today for questioning as to the assailant's identity.

Contributions of award money for capture of the slayer began coming in as 75 officers participated in Smith county's biggest man-hunt, but so far no definite clues had been obtained and it began to appear that the Negro killer had made good his escape.

Sheriff Bill Webb offered a \$100 reward, Tyler filling station employee headed by Frank Uzzel, former deputy sheriff, offered \$100 and it was announced that the city police department will make a donation, the amount of which has yet to be determined.

Webb C. Crow, exalted ruler for the Tyler Elks lodge No. 215, said the lodge has started a fund for Buie's family.

Federal Airport Act.
The Federal Airport Act, passed May 13, authorizes the appropriation of \$500,000,000 for airport aid over a seven-year period. Of this, Texas will receive the largest amount going to any state, \$24,442,789.

At first glance it appears that every town and village in the state will soon have a huge airport with paved runways and large hangars, but such will not be the case. In the first place the object of the act is not to build airports, but to aid in their building. The city or state must bear 75 percent of the land cost and 50 percent or more of the construction costs.

Neither is the federal aid available for the building of hangars, shops or structures other than an administration building.

The idea of paved runways will be out of the question for most small cities, when you consider that the paving alone on an airport the size of ours would cost more than \$30,000 not to mention the grading and drainage.

For small cities to benefit from this act they must get over the idea that the federal government is going to build their airports for them.

They should make plans NOW for the type of airport the city will need and CAN AFFORD.

If they intend to take advantage of the aid being offered, they must take a long-term view of the future needs and must expect to finance the construction on long-term loans, so that those who benefit in the future can help bear the expense necessary now.

NEW YORK, June 28.—A 27-year-old veteran, whose relatives said objected to his wife's night club dancing career, shot and killed his wife and then committed suicide with a German luger souvenir pistol early today police reported.

Acting Deputy Chief Inspector William Reynolds identified the couple as Edward Becker, 27, a plumber's helper, and his wife, Clemence, 25, known in night club circles as Clemence Wyda.

The couple met at the World's Fair where Miss Wyda was a dancer in Billy Rose's Aquacade.

Reynolds said the double death was discovered by Becker's sister, Mrs. Augusta Ferla, when she heard shots in a bedroom of her Brooklyn home, which the couple shared.

NEW LABOR PLANS.

The Committee for Constitutional Government, Inc., has been running a full-page advertisement in metropolitan newspapers, beginning "Save Your Government from Labor-Boss Dictators" and calling for nine "minimum reforms."

These go much farther than the Case bill which President Truman vetoed, or even the more drastic Case bill which the House passed and the Senate modified. No. 9 reads, "Prohibit closed shop and checkoff of dues without separate individual consent of each employee."

The compulsory open shop has not been advocated by any political party, or so far as known, any congressman. Other demands are "Give courts review power over Labor Relations Board findings of fact" (not law, mind you, but fact) and "Give courts equity jurisdiction in labor disputes by repealing Norris-La Guardia Act."

The committee's backers should lay the cards on the table, and let the country know who they are and what they are after.

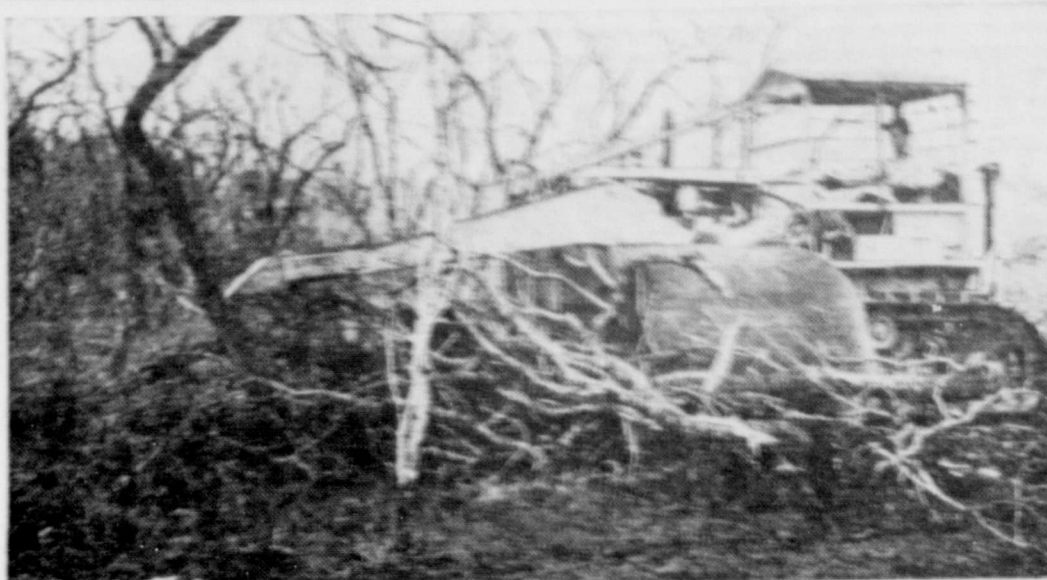
