## OPA Price Controls End Tonight Following Clash of Truman and Congress

WASHINGTON, June 29. — President Truman and Congress today clashed in a historic battle that doomed all price and rent controls at least temporarily.

All present OPA controls, including wage controls, will expire at midnight tomorrow.

There is no chance of reviving them — in whole or in part — until at least Monday.

The unprecedented situation developed when the Senate recessed for the weekend after this swift sequence of events —

1. President Truman vetoed the amendment-riddled OPA Extension Bill on grounds it would legalize inflation and bring economic disaster to the nation.

2. The House sustained his veto.

3. Single objections in both the House and the Senate blocked efforts to act immediately on a simple extension resolution that would have extended OPA as is until July 20. This forced administration leaders to send the resolution to committee and delayed action until Monday — after the present controls expire.

Unanimous consent was blocked in the House by Rep. Jesse P. Wilcott, R., Mich., and in the Senate by Sen. W. Lee O'Daniel, D., Tex., who on Thursday night conducted an eight-hour filibuster against the OPA.

After O'Daniel raised his objection, the Senate recessed until 11 a. m. (EST) Monday.

This ended any hope of obtaining action on a temporary extension until at least then.

Until Congress acts, there will be no price, rent or wage controls under the stabilization act after midnight Sunday.

Mr. Truman is powerless to act in the crisis. He cannot by executive order extend any of the controls.

Congress was expected to act Monday.

After the Senate quit for the weekend, the House Rules Committee cleared the way for House consideration Monday of a simple resolution extending the price control act until after July 20, pending action on permanent legislation.

Plans to act on the resolution in the House at once were abandoned when the Senate recessed.

House Speaker Sam Rayburn of Texas said he would call up the resolution Monday. There will be two hours of debate.

Only a simple majority vote will be needed for passage.

A similar resolution has been offered in the Senate. It will go to a vote on Monday, also.

Even though controls are certain to lapse tomorrow midnight, stabilization officials said any ensuing price rises could be brought back in line when and if Congress acts to reimpose and extend controls.

### Texas Panhandle is Harvesting 50 Million Bu. Wheat

AMARILLO, June 29. (UP) — A three-day survey trip through the Texas wheat country — where nearly 50,000,000 bushels of grain are being harvested for a hungry world — disclosed definitely today that rumors of an organized effort to hold back the wheat are not true.

Newsmen who visited farms and elevators in the wheat-rich Texas Panhandle learned firsthand that few if any farmers are carrying out threats to dump the grain on the ground or store it.

The wheat, the newsmen learned, is moving to market in orderly fashion.

### Byrnes Has Molotov on Griddle; Asks More Time

PARIS, June 29. (UP) — Secretary of State James F. Byrnes, impatient over two weeks of nearly fruitless talk, exploded tonight and asked Foreign Minister V. M. Molotov how long Russia intends to veto the peace of the world.

Byrnes said he put his question squarely to the Russian and Molotov asked for two or three more days before giving an answer to an American demand for a full-scale peace conference this summer.

#### TO UPROOT ANARCHY.

JERUSALEM, June 29. — Britain began large scale military operations in Palestine in the Jewish Sabbath at dawn Saturday in what an official called a drive to wipe out "a state of anarchy." Troops and police occupied buildings in Jerusalem and Tel Aviv used by the Jewish Agency, long recognized by the British and the Palestine government, as the official representative of Jews in Palestine. The British clamped a curfew on wide areas of the troubled Holy Land.

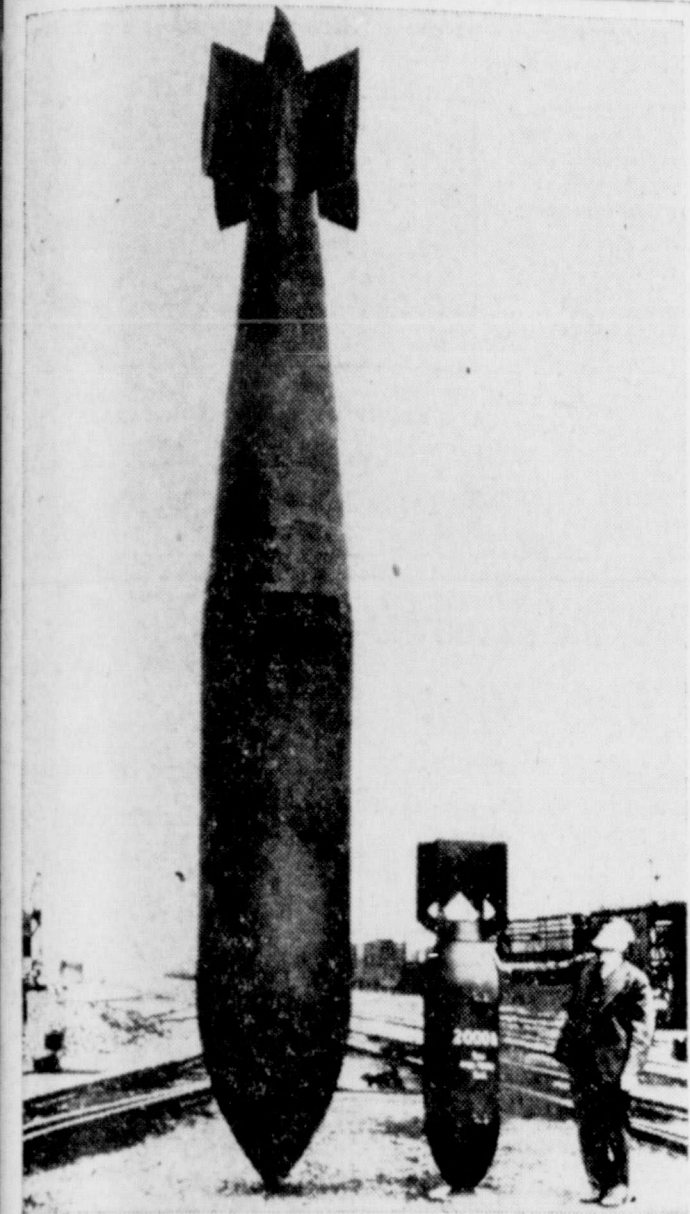

### Vets May Enter Jr. College Now or in the Fall

Veterans who wish to avail themselves of the opportunity of attending Cisco Junior College under the terms of the GI Bill of Rights were advised this week that they can either enter summer school now or make an application to enter the college with the opening of the fall term.

College officials urged that ex-service men who plan to enter the school this fall, fill out notice of their intentions to do so at once. The reason for this is that it will require some two to three weeks for the papers to be processed by the Veterans Administration, so that payments to the veteran and the school can begin promptly after actual enrollment and attendance takes place. This will speed up the process and eliminate delay in the payments.

The college is offering two years of college work, including terminal courses and courses preliminary to professional training in the universities. Students contemplating studying medicine, pharmacy, education, engineering and

other professional courses will be able to obtain all the necessary preliminary work at the local school, thus saving them two years expensive studying away from home before beginning actual professional study.

Students who desire terminal courses — courses which may be completed at the college and provide them with sufficient training for taking jobs in industry or business — will find these available in the field of auto mechanics, general accounting and business training and manual training in related jobs. In each of these fields there are a variety of opportunities which may be investigated at the college.

Veterans interested in enrolling for any of these courses, or who would like to make further investigation of the training program, are invited to go to the college Monday morning between 8 and 12 o'clock.

#### FARLEIGH TO CHICAGO.

Jack Farleigh, 18, who joined the navy last March, wired his parents, Mr. and Mrs. John Farleigh, Saturday, that he was being transferred from San Diego, Calif., to the Great Lakes Naval school at Chicago, where he will continue his studies as radio technician. The young man was born in Cisco and is a graduate of Cisco high school.

### Teenage Group of Mid-Texas Presbytery Camped Here

The Pioneer camp of the Mid-Texas Presbytery, which opened at the Presbyterian encampment grounds at Lake Cisco Monday, closed Saturday.

There were 82 Pioneers and ten adult helpers present through the week — the Pioneers being made up of 48 girls and 34 boys between the ages of 12 and 14 years.

Rev. N. P. Wilkinson of Itasca was director of the camp and Rev. Winston Bryant of Ft. Worth was the business manager. Both men told the Daily Press that they considered the encampment a thorough success and that the young people present from all areas of the presbytery were also well pleased with their visit here.

Each morning the girls and boys were divided into quest groups for Bible and nature study and at 10:45 the entire camp visited the big swimming pool just below Williamson dam, where many forms of amusement and healthy exercise were found.

Rev. Stuart Curry of Haskell spoke each evening at the vesper service.

Cities and towns represented by the 82 Pioneers included Ft. Worth, Sweetwater, Itasca, Abilene, Comanche, Ballinger, Roscoe, Rule, Hillsboro, Handley, Filea Valley, Brownwood, San Angelo, Cleburne, Haskell, San Saba and Graham.

The Senior group of the Presbytery — 15 to 17 years — will open camp at the lake Monday, said Rev. Stuart McC. Rohre of Cisco First Presbyterian church.

Rev. E. E. Wood of Hillsboro will be the director and Mr. Rohre will serve as business manager. Rev. B. O. Wood of San Angelo will be the vesper speaker each evening.

#### TEXAS SCHOOL BUILDINGS.

AUSTIN, June 29. (UP) — A thorough examination of safety of Texas school buildings before Fall opening of schools was indicated today.

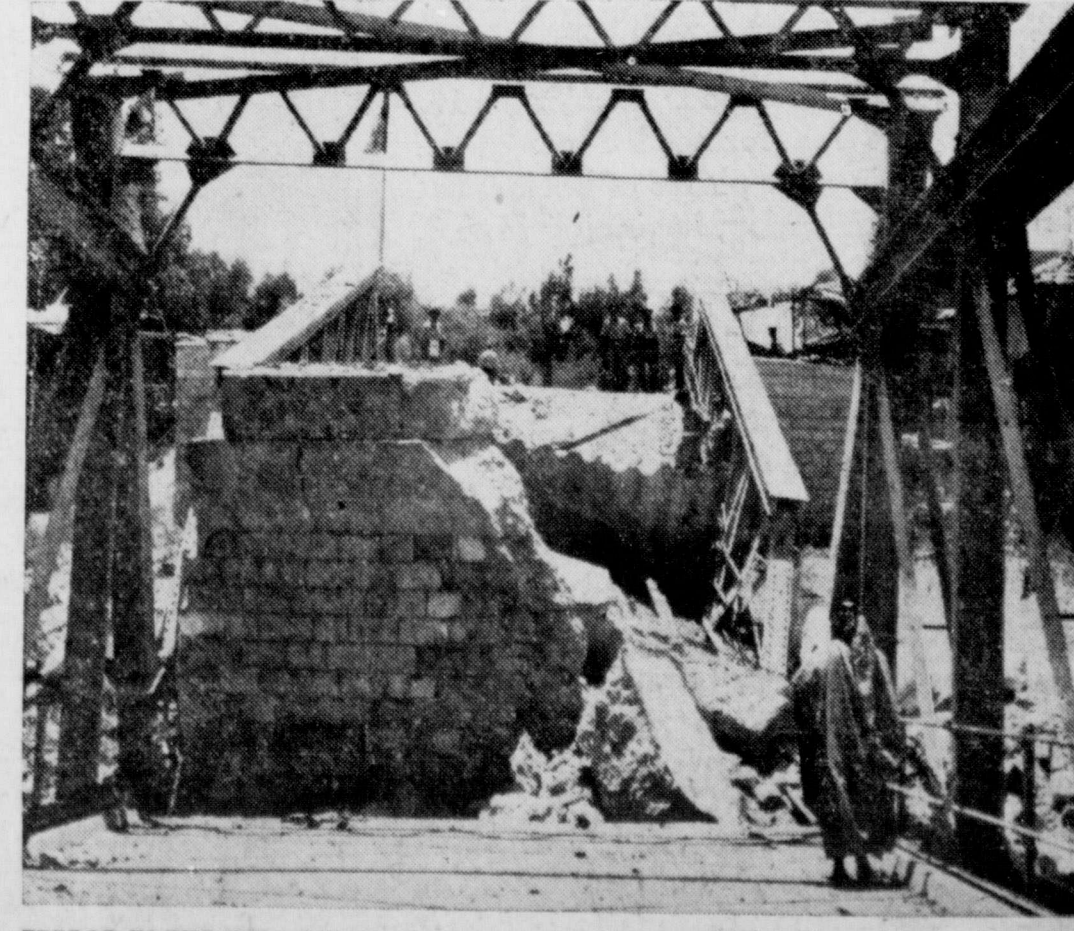

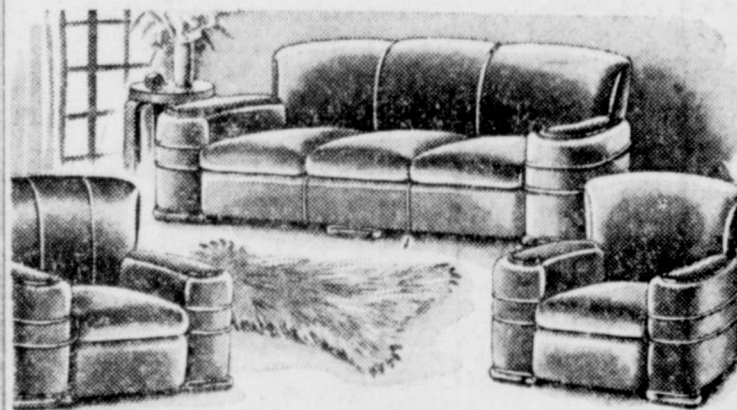
