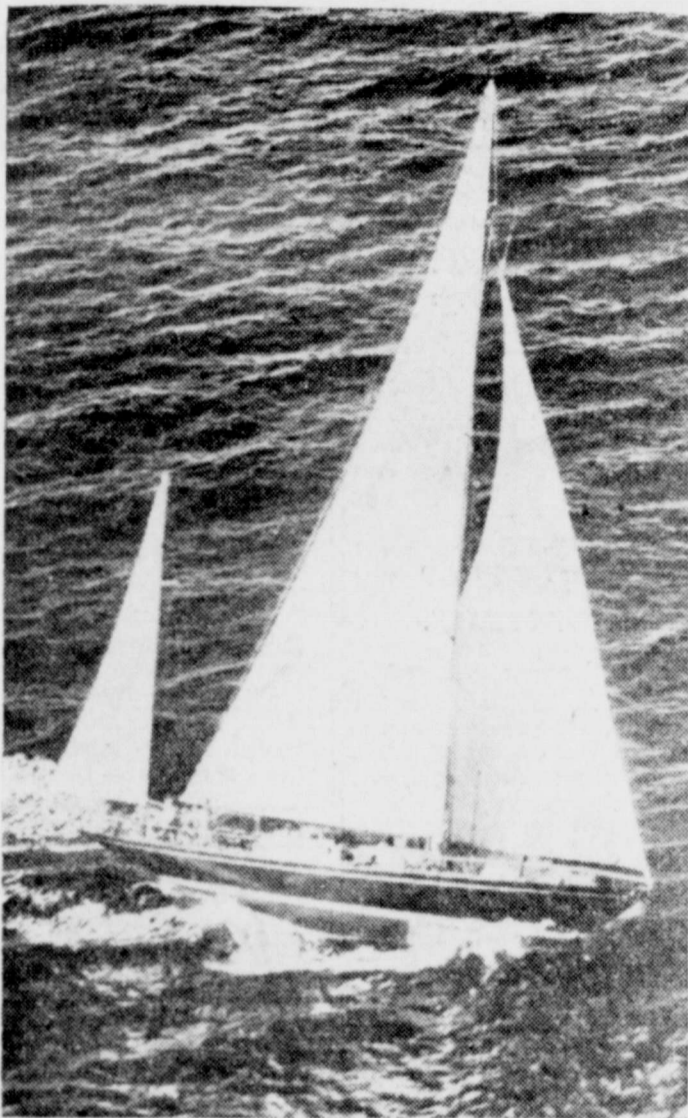

Big British Loan is Up to Truman; He Will Sign It

Mrs. Alvey, 100 Years Old May 31, Died Friday

Mrs. Sarah Elizabeth Alvey, Cisco resident since 1881, who celebrated her 100th birthday on May 31 of this year, died at 5:23 Friday afternoon at the home of her son, John W. Alvey, 309 west Eleventh street.

The aged woman, who collapsed in the afternoon of May 31, after enjoying a good dinner and meeting a large number of the many friends who called in her honor, had been steadily failing since then.

Funeral was held at Cisco First Methodist church at 4 o'clock Saturday afternoon, with burial in Mitchell cemetery, ten miles south of Cisco, beside her husband, who died January 3, 1937. Rev. Otis Brown, Methodist pastor at Bangs, assisted by Rev. C. A. Warden of Cisco, were the officiating ministers. Thomas funeral home was in charge of the body.

Plenty Money to Do the Needful Sans New Taxes

BROWNWOOD, July 13. — Beauford Jester, candidate for governor, detailed a state tax and revenue plan here which, he insisted, justifies his opening campaign announcement that Texas needs no new taxes.

The railroad commissioner's program is based upon the state's present general fund surplus, plus increased state revenue.

He said the 1946 state revenue will be \$60,000,000 greater than in 1942.

Pointing to a surplus in the general fund, which will approximate \$25,000,000 by the close of the year, Jester said legislative action should be forthcoming next January to appropriate this money to useful purposes.

He said only through legislative action could this money be put to work for the welfare of the people.

Mrs. Alvey was born May 31, 1846, in Arkansas, and was married to A. P. Alvey March 8, 1874, in Dallas. They came to Cisco early in 1881. She had been a devout member of Twelfth-st. Methodist church for half a century.

Survivors of this fine woman are two sons, J. W. Alvey of Cisco; J. P. Alvey of Apache, Okla.; nine grandchildren, 20 great grandchildren and one great great grandchild.

"Yet the money is in the state treasury" to pay the full amount as soon as it is authorized.

Jester said available school fund revenues were sufficient to increase scholastic aid payments \$6 per year from the present \$30. This money, he said, could be used mainly to raise teachers' salaries.

Revenue for next year will exceed total appropriations by about one million dollars, he said.

Jester said taxable value of property for state ad valorem purposes had increased more than a billion dollars in the past 10 years. Additional revenue in the years ahead for maintenance of expanded state expenditures could be anticipated from further increases as reflected in building permits.

Six major cities of the state this year will have building permits \$40 per cent above the average for the past 17 years.

"It will be 301 per cent greater than the biggest boom year of all time — 1929," he said.

Price Daniel Cisco Visitor in Interest His Candidacy

Price Daniel of Liberty, candidate for attorney general of Texas, carried his hard-hitting campaign to Cisco Saturday afternoon.

Daniel, out of the army only eight weeks, regretted that he was unable to see everyone in Texas personally during the time remaining before the primary election. He pointed out that this is the run off in the attorney general's race, as only two candidates are filed.

The 35-year old former speaker of the Texas house of representatives stated that he was running on the record he built up while practicing county law in Liberty county, as a legislator for three terms, and as speaker of the house, the job he left to enter the army as a private in 1943.

Daniel pledged that as attorney general of Texas he would carry into that office a deep personal feeling for attempting to solve the growing juvenile delinquency and crime problem.

Daniel is married and has three children. His wife is the great-grand daughter of Sam Houston.

Following a tour of Cisco, Daniel departed for Baird and Abilene.

WASHINGTON, July 13. — The House today put the final stamp of approval on the \$3,750,000,000 loan to Great Britain, largest peacetime credit ever extended by one nation to another.

The vote was 319 to 155.

The measure, which squeezed through the Senate by a 46 to 34 vote on May 10, now goes to the White House for President Truman's signature.

Congressional approval of the loan gave Mr. Truman one of his biggest legislative triumphs.

House approval came after it rejected, 219 to 154, a motion to send the bill back to committee.

Regents Add 112 Teacher Jobs and Raise UT Salaries

AUSTIN, July 13. — More teachers and better salaries were provided Saturday in the University of Texas enlarged budget for the next long term.

The \$5,495,844 budget for 1946-47, approved by the regents Saturday, is a 30 per cent increase over the budget originally approved for the current fiscal year.

The new budget, effective Sept. 1, provides:

A \$100 increase in the base salaries of full-time teachers for the nine-month long session.

Addition of 112 full-time teaching positions to care for growing enrollment.

An upward adjustment of salaries for non-teaching personnel.

Addition of 54 new non-teaching full-time positions.

Expanded maintenance of the physical plant.

Extension, research and library expansion.

Income from all sources for the year was estimated at \$5,618,994, an excess of \$123,150 over budgeted expenditures.

Under the new increase, teachers' salary brackets beginning Sept. 1 will be:

Instructors, \$2,200 to \$2,700; assistant professors, \$2,800 to \$3,400; associate professors, \$3,500 to \$4,100; professors \$4,200 to \$6,000.

The regents appointed more than 50 new faculty members for the 1946-47 long session and accepted 16 resignations.

GASOLINE MAY GO UP.
HOUSTON, July 13. — Gasoline may go up a cent a gallon as a result of the proposed price decontrol in oil, Glenn H. McCarthy, Houston independent oil man, said today.

"Right now oil producers figure on producing future oil at \$1.50 a barrel and selling it at \$1.30," he explained. "This 30 cent loss naturally discourages future production of oil and the oil industry depends on future production."

WON'T FACE CHARGES.
WASHINGTON, July 13. (U.P.) — The Senate War Investigating Committee today accused Rep. Andrew J. May of declining to "face and explain" testimony linking him with a Midwest munitions combine and said it found no alternative to the conclusion "that you admit those facts to be true."

House Has Drastically Curtailed OPA Bill in Lap

WASHINGTON, July 13. — A drastically curtailed OPA Extension Bill today was tossed by the Senate to the House, which delayed action until Tuesday.

The measure, approved by the Senate in the early morning hours on a 62 to 15 vote, would revive OPA until June 30, 1947, but slash its powers severely.

Democratic Leader John W. McCormack announced that the House will consider atomic energy control legislation Monday.

Technically, the Senate acted on a House bill that would have merely extended OPA for 20 days while a permanent bill was being worked out.

Thus the House could vote Tuesday to override the rules committee recommendation that the bill go to conference and could vote to concur in or reject the Senate amendments.

Price Administrator Paul Porter meanwhile called for prompt restoration of "uncompromised" price and rent control.

Administration leaders were doubtful that President Truman would sign the bill unless many of the Senate's restrictions are eliminated.

Neither was the bill pleasing to Sen. Robert A. Taft, R., O., leader of anti-OPA forces in the upper chamber. Taft blamed President Truman for what he termed failure of the revised bill to encourage industrial production.

Prices of 28 Basic Commodities Are Up 22.7 Pct.

CHICAGO, July 13. (U.P.) — In two weeks without OPA controls, prices of 28 basic commodities have increased 22.7 per cent, the Bureau of Labor statistics said tonight, and consumers in many cities demonstrated against the higher cost of living.

However, prices generally appeared to be leveling off at new higher rates set since price control expired, and in some instances, they remained at old OPA ceilings.

Buyers' strikes begun in several cities last week were reported in additional communities as the nation awaited decisive congressional action on controls.

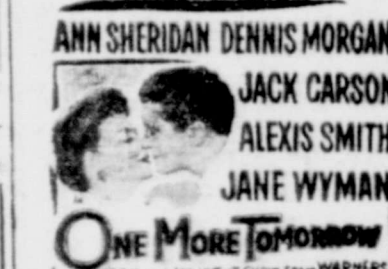
