## Congress Conferees Dilly Dally With the OPA Bill

### LIST OF STATE AND COUNTY CANDIDATES AS THEY WILL APPEAR ON JULY 27 BALLOT

Oscar Lyerla, county Democratic chairman, has furnished the Cisco Daily Press with a list of the candidates for state, district and county offices, and arranged as they will appear on the Eastland county ballots to be voted in the July 27 primaries.

The county chairman reminds that any person who at the time of such election or within 18 months prior to the date of election was a member of the armed forces of the United States, is entitled to vote without having paid a poll tax; however, a service man or veteran must meet the qualifications required of other voters, except in so far as payment of poll tax is concerned.

He must have resided in Texas one year and in the county six months. He does not have to show his discharge papers. If he is challenged, or the election judge is not sure, he will require him to make an oath as to his qualifications, the same as made by the citizen losing a poll tax receipt.

It is also reminded that any man or woman who has passed the age of 60 is entitled to cast a ballot without a poll tax or exemption certificate, if qualified as to length of residence.

WASHINGTON, July 17. —Congressional conferees met for two hours on the OPA revival bill today but took no action on administration demands for restoration of price ceilings on meat, grain, dairy products and other commodities.

They arranged to resume their deliberations later in the day after a morning session devoted to a general discussion of pricing provisions for manufactured goods.

One conferee said about all there was to report was that there was "no chance" that they would put into the bill the controversial Taft Pricing Formula, which President Truman opposed so strongly in vetoing the previous OPA bill.

### Russian Naval Lt. Found Innocent of Spying Charge

SEATTLE, July 17. (U.P.)—Russian Naval Lt. Nicolai G. Redin was acquitted today by a federal jury of charges of spying against the United States and promptly thanked jurors "for the fair trial I have received in this country."

Redin, 30 and handsome, was found innocent of one count of conspiracy and four counts of espionage.

The Federal Bureau of Investigation arrested him last March and charged that he attempted to learn and transmit to Russia radar and fire control plans from the new 14,000-ton destroyer-tender U. S. S. Yellowstone.

### Woman Described Her Employers as Bunch of Crooks

WASHINGTON, July 17. (U.P.)—The former secretary of the Washington office of a midwest munitions combine now under congressional investigation today described her former employers as "a bunch of crooks."

The witness, Mrs. Eleanor Hall, used the phrase when Chairman James M. Mead of the Senate War Investigating Committee, asked if she had quit her job because she was "emotionally upset."

"I was emotionally upset," she said. "After all, when you're working for a bunch of crooks, it does get you emotionally upset."

At the same time she testified that officials of the Illinois combine put in telephone calls to Rep. Andrew J. May "Every other day" when the congressman was at his home in Prestonburg, Ky.

Hotels or tourist courts will charge their regular rates and reservations must be made well in advance.

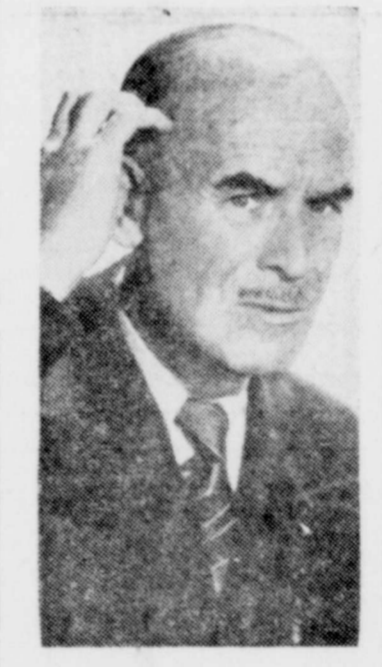
### Senator Wheeler of Montana Concedes His Defeat

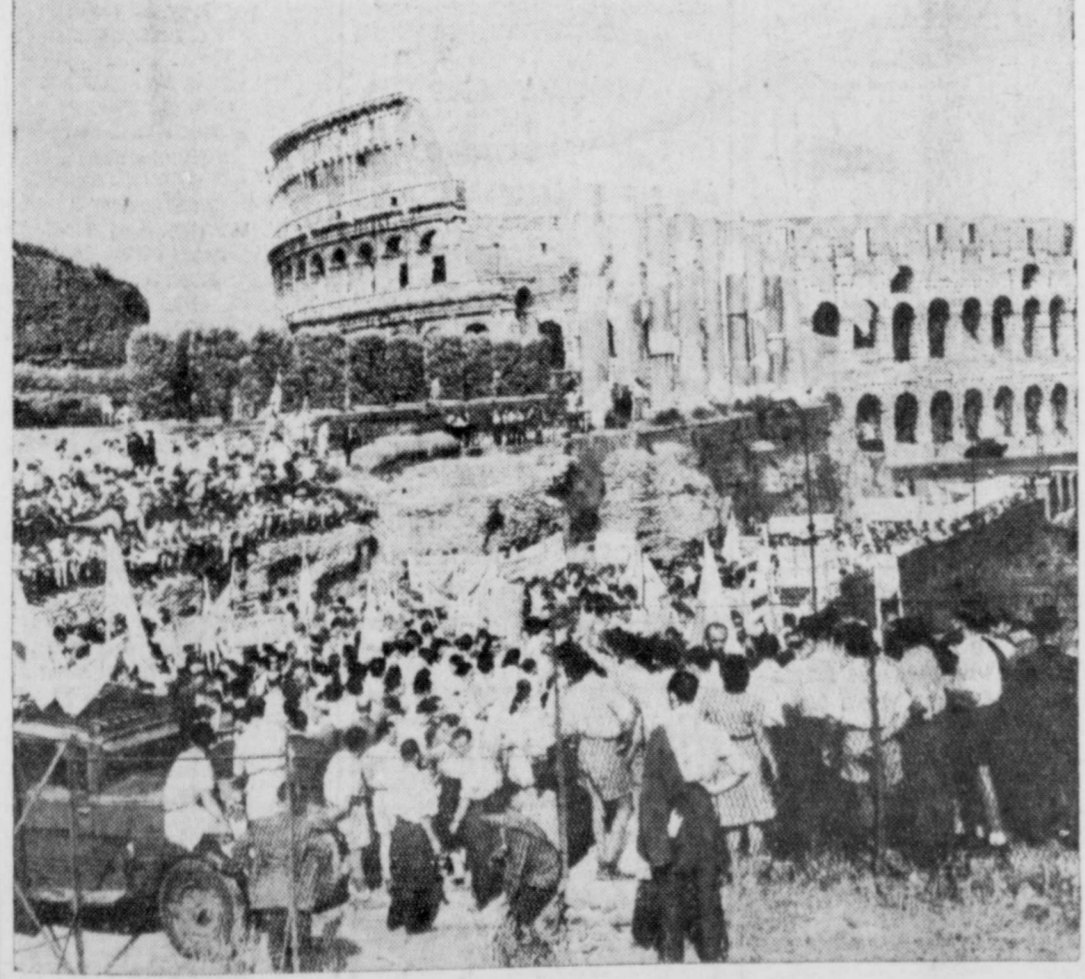

Sixty guests registered their names in the guest-book and a number of gifts were sent by others who could not be present.

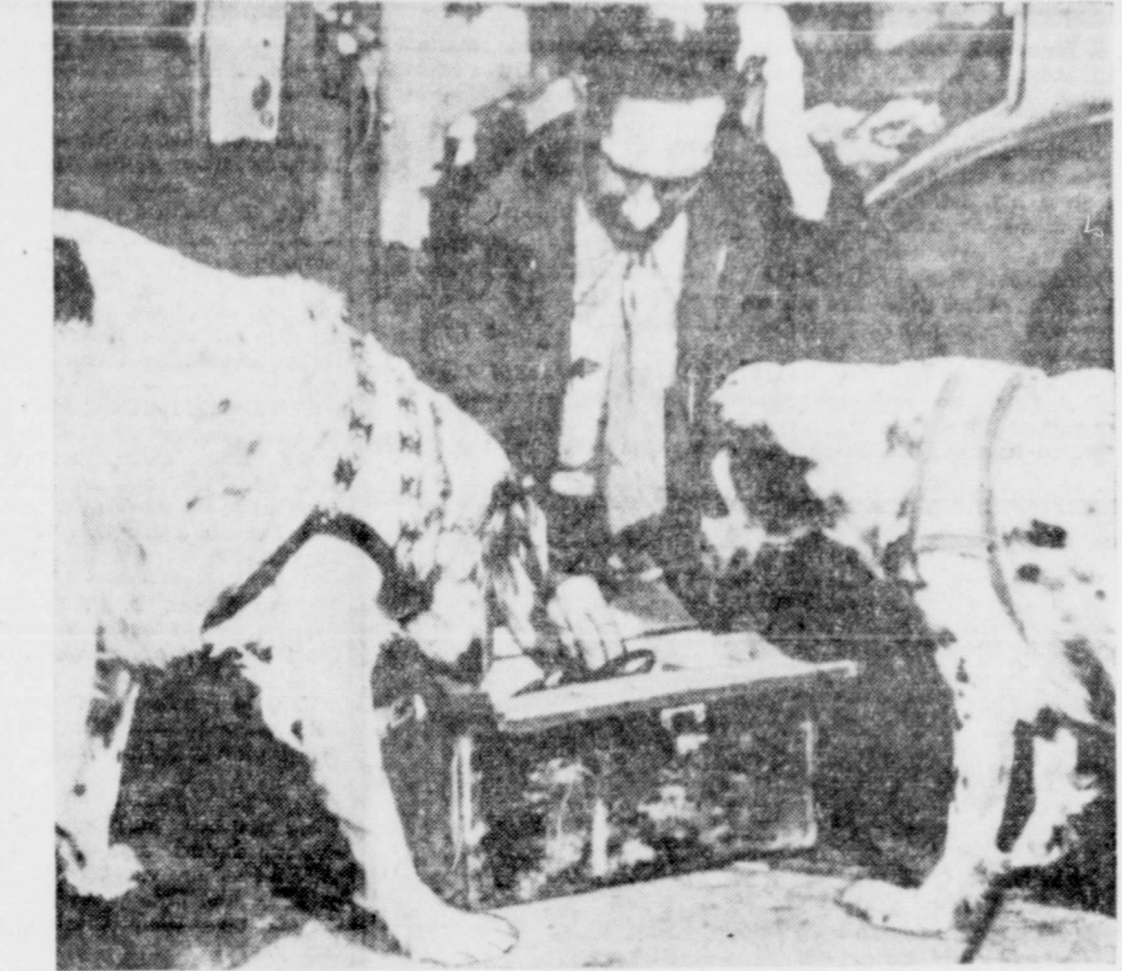
