### Miss Mary Jobe to Be Buried Tomorrow at Scranton

The body of Miss Mary Lee Jobe, 75, who died in Austin at 4 p. m. Wednesday, arrived in Cisco today in care of Thomas funeral home.

Miss Jobe, who had been living in Austin the past year, sustained a broken hip earlier this year and had not recovered.

Funeral will be held at 2:30 p. m. Friday in the Scranton Baptist church. Burial is to be in Scranton cemetery. Officiating ministers will be Rev. Harvey Bingham and Rev. Arval Reese of Scranton.

Pallbearers will be Will Allen, Arthur Reese, Drew Spralls, Ples Ray, Walker Morgan and Marvin Snoddy.

Deceased was born July 30, 1871, in Johnson county, and moved to Callahan county in 1876 with her parents. She lived in Abilene in 1920 and 1921, but had lived at Scranton most of the time since.

Besides two sisters, Mrs. M. F. Richardson and Mrs. J. E. Burnam of Abilene, survivors are four brothers S. D. Jobe of Baird, W. H. Jobe of Sweetwater, Charnell of Lamesa and John Jobe of California; and a sister, Mrs. W. E. Faires of Fort Worth.

### Coleman Gets 3 2-Story Barracks From Berkeley

COLEMAN, July 25. — Coleman has been allotted three two-story barracks for the surplus property at Camp Barkeley in Abilene by the Federal Public Housing authority, it was revealed today. The barracks, which are to be converted into 20 two-bedroom apartments, were allotted to Coleman to help meet the housing shortage.

The barracks are 29.5 feet wide and 80 feet long. Two will be converted into six unit apartments and the third will be lengthened to 87 feet and made into an eight-apartment unit. The government will pay for the construction, said city officials.

The first thing Coleman has to do is to provide a suitable site for the buildings, which must be on a paved street. The city also has to install the utilities. Rent from the 20 apartments will go to the city to defray the expenses of installation, it was stated.

### Sweetwater Will Vote on \$525,000 Bond Issue, Sept.

SWEETWATER, July 25. — Sweetwater citizens will vote Sept. 10 on a bond issue to finance civic improvements totaling approximately \$525,000 as the result of action taken by the city council Wednesday night.

Included in the projects to be financed by the three-percent interest bearing bonds are hospital expansion, public library and parks improvements, police and jail building improvements, and extensive water and sewer system improvements.

City Manager R. C. Hoppe said he believed the total issue could be handled without an increase in the present tax rate of \$1.60.

### Hart Tells Why First Bomb at Bikini Missed

WASHINGTON, July 25. (AP)—Sen. Thomas C. Hart, R., Conn., former commander of the Asiatic fleet, charged today that the first atomic bomb at Bikini missed the target because the army air corps refused "to be left out and thus miss the chance for publicity."

The slight, gray-haired former admiral made the charge in attacking proposed merger of the armed forces in a Senate speech.

### CRASH KILLS TWO.

DALLAS, July 25. — Charles E. Clay, 48, owner of the American Chemical Company here, and his secretary, Miss Jane Thompson, 25, were killed last night when their light plane failed to come out of a steep bank and crashed nine miles south of Dallas. Clay is survived by his widow, his mother, Mrs. Elizabeth Beth Parkinson, and a daughter, Mrs. Edna Sesler.

### DENTON TAX RATE.

DENTON, July 25. — Denton's tax rate to meet city and school expenses for the coming year has been set at \$2 per \$100 valuation. This is a 30-cent reduction from this year's rate, but rendition values were \$4,000,000 higher, the total being \$11,520,000.

### Indictments Soon Against Heirens For Two Murders

WASHINGTON, July 25. — OPA is back. President Truman today "reluctantly" signed into law a battered compromise bill reviving price controls after a 25-day lapse that followed his scorching veto of the first OPA extension bill.

Mr. Truman's signature on the bill extending OPA until June 30, 1947, meant automatic restoration of OPA controls over rents, most manufactured products and some food items.

OPA planned to restore generally the price ceilings that prevailed last June 30. However, there will be numerous exceptions to this basic policy.

Mr. Truman announced his decision to a news conference a few minutes after he put his signature on the measure in the presence of top government economic officials.

Later today he will send a message to Congress explaining why he approved the bill and, as he told reporters, answering every question about his action.

At the same time he will request additional funds for the administration of the compromise price control law.

Mr. Truman told reporters he thought he would be able to announce within a day or two the three members of the decontrol board provided for in the measure.

### Cows Stronger; Other Cattle and Calves Steady

FT. WORTH, July 25. — Cattle and calves were steady in most sales at Fort Worth today. Cows regained recent losses, selling 20c or more above Wednesday's price to an active demand.

Common to medium steers and yearlings cashed at \$10 to \$15.50 with a few good yearlings to \$16 and above. Medium and good fat cows brought \$10 to \$14 with cutters and common cows at \$8 to \$10 and canners at \$6 to \$7.75. Bulls ranged from \$8 to \$13.

Good and choice fat calves sold at \$14 to \$16.50; common to medium calves at \$10.50 to \$14, and cull calves at \$8 to \$10.

Stocker calves and steer yearlings brought \$11 to \$15.25. Stocker steers and heifers cashed at \$9 to \$13.50. Stocker cows went back to the grass at \$7.50 to \$9.

Butcher hogs were taken by packers at mostly 50c higher prices than prevailed Wednesday. Good and choice butcher hogs weighing 180 pounds and up cashed at mostly \$21, the day's top. Good and choice hogs averaging 150 to 170 pounds turned at \$19.50 to \$20.50. Sows sold largely at \$19. Stocker pigs brought \$18 down.

### Natural Gas Under Steam Boilers as Efficient as Coal

WASHINGTON, July 25. — Fuel for industry and particularly for electric power would be much higher in Texas, Louisiana and Oklahoma if it were not for the economical heating value of natural gas, the industry counsel maintained before the Federal Power Commission yesterday in the testimony of S. Barry Flagg, engineer.

Contradicting the previous testimony of witnesses for the coal industry, Flagg maintained that gas under steam boilers is just as efficient as coal.

### MacARTHUR THANKED.

TOKYO, July 25. — Representatives of three big Tokyo newspapers and the Kyodo nationwide news agency met with General MacArthur Thursday night and expressed their thanks for his conduct of the occupation.

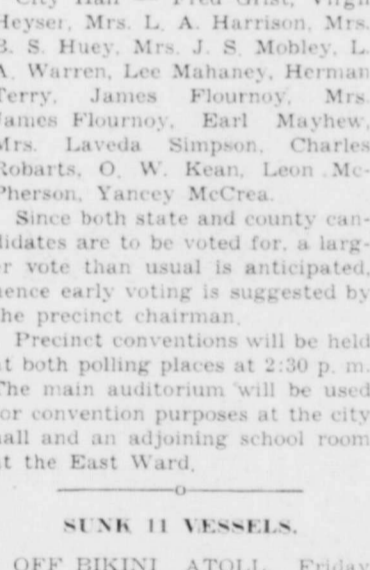

### Wholesale Price Index Rose 2.9 Pct. Last Week

WASHINGTON, July 25. (AP)—The Bureau of Labor Statistics reported today that its wholesale price index rose 2.9 per cent last week, making a total increase of 10 per cent for the first three weeks after the lapse of price control.

Rising agricultural prices, particularly food prices, were described as the principal cause of the boost in the index.

### Delegations From 7 Counties Heard Jester at Lufkin

LUFKIN, July 25. — Beauford Jester struck out at such political antics as "for-men-only" meetings and promised here last night that women would have a prominent part in the state government when he is governor.

Speaking before a large crowd of Lufkinites and members of big delegations from seven surrounding counties, Jester commented that: "All my meetings are just like this one, open to men, women and children."

"All my literature is readable by everyone and will cause no embarrassment to women and children," Jester continued, obviously hitting Grover Sellers for his for-men-only session, at which excerpts of the book, "U.S.A." are read.

Jester then declared that he intended to appoint many of the fine women of Texas to office when he is elected governor.

The railroad commissioner-candidate reiterated his often-repeated tax platform, explaining to East Texans that he was confident no new levies would be necessary to carry out his extensive program of development. He also asserted that a low tax rate would encourage industries to move to Texas and thus enrich the state.

The candidate also asserted he was the logical man to mediate between capital and labor.

"I have proved in my dealings with the laboring man while on the railroad commission that I understand his problems," Jester said. "Not a week has gone by during the last few years that I have not had railroad men bring me their

problems and I have settled them to their satisfaction."

Jester was introduced to the large crowd assembled in the Lufkin high school athletic stadium by J. J. Collins, an attorney.

The rally, boosted as Jester's "East Texas Victory Rally," was arranged by C. L. Dupuy, motor-car dealer of Lufkin.

Refreshments were served the entire crowd by girl members of the 4-H club.

John Boles, radio and screen entertainer with several songs and members of the Jester family were introduced.

DALLAS, July 25. — Homer Price Rainey was given endorsement in a labor ticket being distributed by post card here Wednesday.

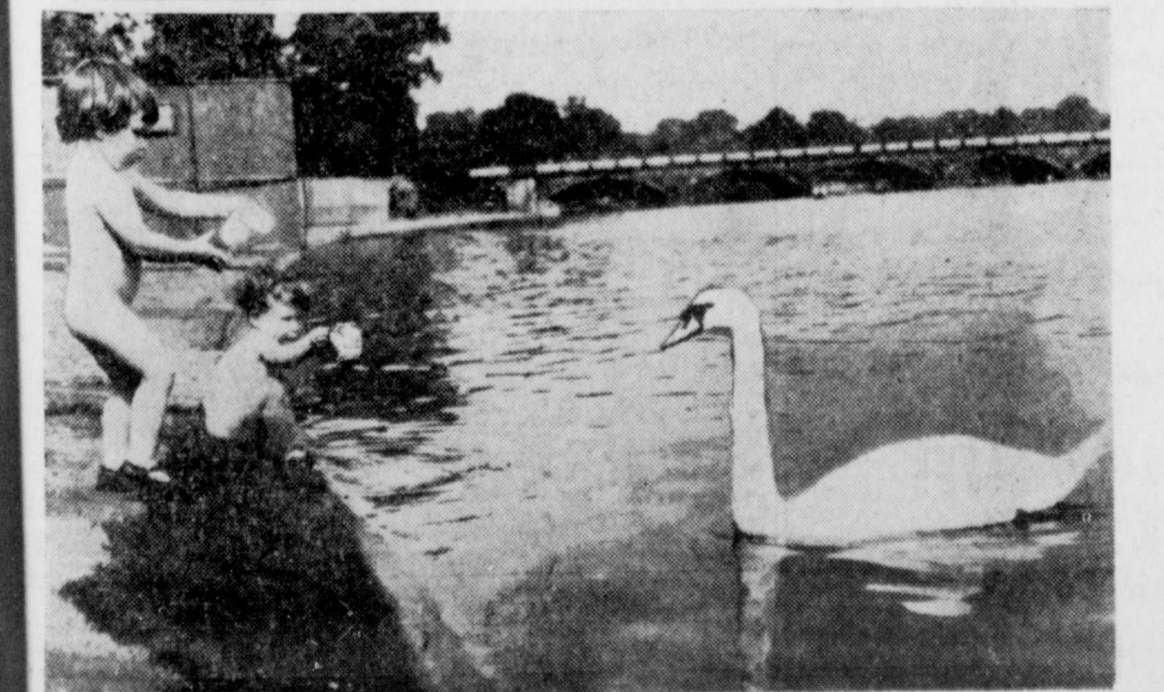
The cards were distributed as the political ticket of the Dallas Central Labor Council.

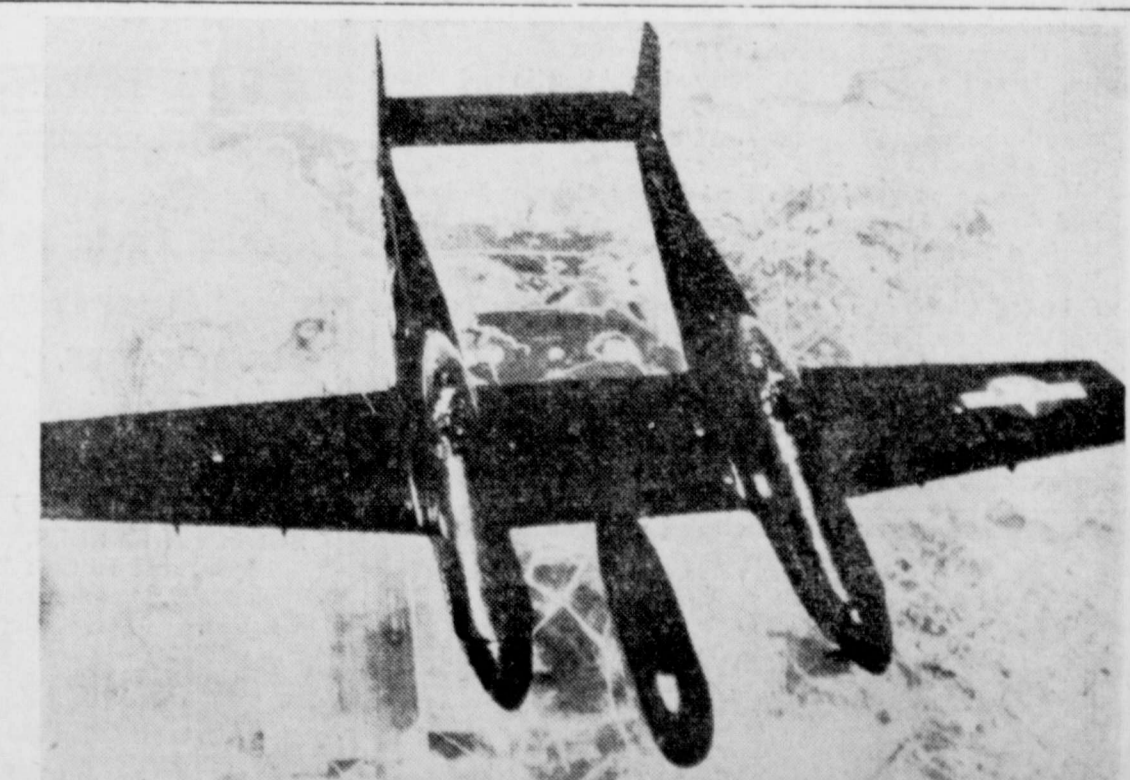


