Income Tax Reports of May and Others Be Scrutinized

4 Negroes Waylaid and Shot to Death By Georgia Whites

AUSTIN, July 26. — A public hearing on higher education for Negroes will be held Aug. 8 at the Texas capitol, as the first step by a seven-member biracial committee which will recommend legislation on the subject.

Both whites and Negroes are invited generally, and special invitations will be sent to Texas college educators and to leaders of Texas Negroes.

Mark McGee of Fort Worth, committee chairman, requested especially that editors of Negro newspapers be invited to attend, as well as Negro educators.

The hearing was suggested by W. R. Banks, principal of Prairie View University, the only state Negro supported college.

Governing boards of the University of Texas and A. & M. College have recommended establishment of a first-class university for Negroes, preferably at Houston, and development of Prairie View as a first-class agricultural and mechanical college.

Banks, for twenty years head of Prairie View, described as "nervous" the present situation regarding improvement of college facilities for Negroes. He expressed an opinion that the greatest difference among Texas Negroes concerns the location of a university.

"Don't think for a moment that any of our people want to attend the University of Texas," he told a questioner.

Herman Sweet, Houston Negro, applied for admittance to the university law school. He won a court decision, suspended for six months, entitling him to enroll at the university unless the state provides equal facilities elsewhere.

Dr. M. L. Edwards, a Negro physician from Hawkins and also a member of the committee, said all his people want is a university with the standards equal to first-class white schools.

"We just want somewhere decent to get an education, and I am sure we will have co-operation among our people," said Dr. Edwards.

House Changes position on Control of Atomic Energy

WASHINGTON, July 26. (U.P.)—The House approved today and returned to the Senate legislation to give a five-man civilian commission almost complete control over domestic development of atomic energy.

Passage was by voice vote.

The House thus receded from its previous position that at least one or two members of the commission itself be members of the armed forces. It accepted instead a compromise permitting the armed forces to manufacture fissionable materials at direction of the president and under authority of the civilian commission and to have a military man at the head of the commission's military application division.

JEWISH TREK SLOWS.

WARSAW, July 26.—The flight of Jews from Poland across the Czech frontier appeared to be slackening today, a fact which leaders among 100,000 Jews in lower Silesia attributed to the news of recent disorders in Palestine.

Bill to Hike Salaries Congressmen in Truman's Hands

WASHINGTON, July 26. (U.P.)—The Senate today passed and sent to the White House a congressional reorganization bill increasing congressmen's salaries and sharply reducing the number of congressional committees.

The bill raises each congressman's salary from the present \$10,000 a year to \$12,500 and provides an additional tax-free \$2,500 a year for expenses.

The Senate, by voice vote, approved the measure as amended by the House. House action was completed yesterday.

MONROE, Ga., July 26.—A band of armed white men waylaid a white farmer and four negroes on a secluded northeast Georgia road late yesterday. Sheriff E. S. Gordon said today, and while holding the white man at gun point, shot the negroes to death.

One of the negroes, Roger Malcolm, 27, the sheriff said, had just been released from jail under \$600 bond on charges of stabbing his employer, Barney Hester, a farmer.

The sheriff identified the other negroes as Malcolm's wife, and George Dorsey and his wife.

The stabbing of Hester occurred July 14, the sheriff said, when the farmer remonstrated with Malcolm for abusing his wife. Hester's condition was reported "good" today.

Building Material, Coal and Shoes to Advance Sharply

WASHINGTON, July 26. (U.P.)—Ceiling prices came back today after a 25-day lapse, and the OPA began immediately to boost dozens of them and completely discard others.

The agency sped back into operation with a steady stream of new, higher maximum prices and a long list of other items no longer harnessed by price regulations. The decontrolled articles ranged from low-backed chairs to household television sets.

Higher prices were authorized for coal and other solid fuels, higher priced shoes, many building materials and a variety of other articles.

Jester and His Friends Confident They Will Win

HOUSTON, July 26. — Imbued with confidence by "friends who tell me that I will win this race, probably without a run-off... I will be in it and will win it," Beauford Jester this morning said he had gained perfect assurance from more than 200,000 good Texas citizens to and with whom he talked during his campaign.

"I am glad to tell you that while the good old Texas sun has been hot, and tempers short, Beauford Jester never has had to resort to the mud-slinging, abuse and hatred resorted to by his other candidates," Jester said in his state-wide broadcast here.

"I will go into office as governor with no hatred in my heart and no slime or mud on my hands.

"I stand for harmony among Democrats and Texans, that we should all pull together for a greater Texas, rather than perpetually wrangle and fight to our common detriment," he declared.

Jester said when he started his campaign he took some positive hands about state business which must have been good because his opponents copied a lot of them.

He went on to outline vital planks in his platform — no new taxes, farm-to-market roads, better teachers' salaries, expanded public health education, payment of old age pensions, redistricting and other things.

He advised Texans of two ways by which he said the Democratic

party could be kept on an even keel — first, by electing officials who are not sympathetic to theories of government which conflict with the democratic system; and second, by taking an active part in the precinct, county and state party conventions.

Jester urged every qualified voter to cast his ballot Saturday.

Long Needed Hike in Crude Oil Announced, Humble

HOUSTON, July 26. — The Humble Oil and Refining company yesterday increased its price for crude oil on an average of 25 cents per barrel, with some hikes as high as 30 cents.

H. C. Wiess, president of the company, today said the advances were "to a level that OPA should have authorized long ago." He attributed their necessity to what he said were great cost increases since 1941.

New price control legislation, approved yesterday by President Truman, released petroleum from regulation.

Panhandle crude was increased 28 cents and Stratton crude 30 cents. All other postings were made on a 25-cent basis.

The new schedule became effective at 7 a. m. yesterday.

Wiess, in announcing the increases, said the changes were made at a level repeatedly recommended by several government committees and agencies several years ago. The recommendations, he said, were ignored by OPA.

CAESAR AND THE ATOM

The writer of Topics of the Times in the New York Times is not too disturbed by pessimistic predictions based on the splitting of the atom. He reminds his readers that about 2,000 years ago Titus Lucretius Carus wrote a book "About the Nature of Things," in which he said that although the great forces of nature had been held in balance heretofore, there was no reason to think they would not, by the very nature of the differences of earth, sea and air, just as soon or later with a final bang and that would be the end of the universe. Things were pretty bad in Rome in the last fifty years of the old era, and probably a good many gloomy souls thought the smash couldn't come too soon. The writer goes on:

...butish man, getting on in years, was busy carrying Roman law, order and enlightenment to the outermost bounds of Gaul, whence it was to pass to England and eventually to America. He wasn't worrying about the end of the world. He had work to do.

Today we can congratulate ourselves that Cato the Elder was not hindered in his job by any fears about the end of the world.

This is not a bad subject for meditation these days. The gloominess of this world have some uses — they sometimes act as a brake on the ill-considered impulses of the headlong folk. But they do not really get people or nations anywhere. To progress it takes the people who believe their own lives and those of people in general can be made better if they put their shoulders to their own wheels, and who do just that while the warrens keep on worrying.
