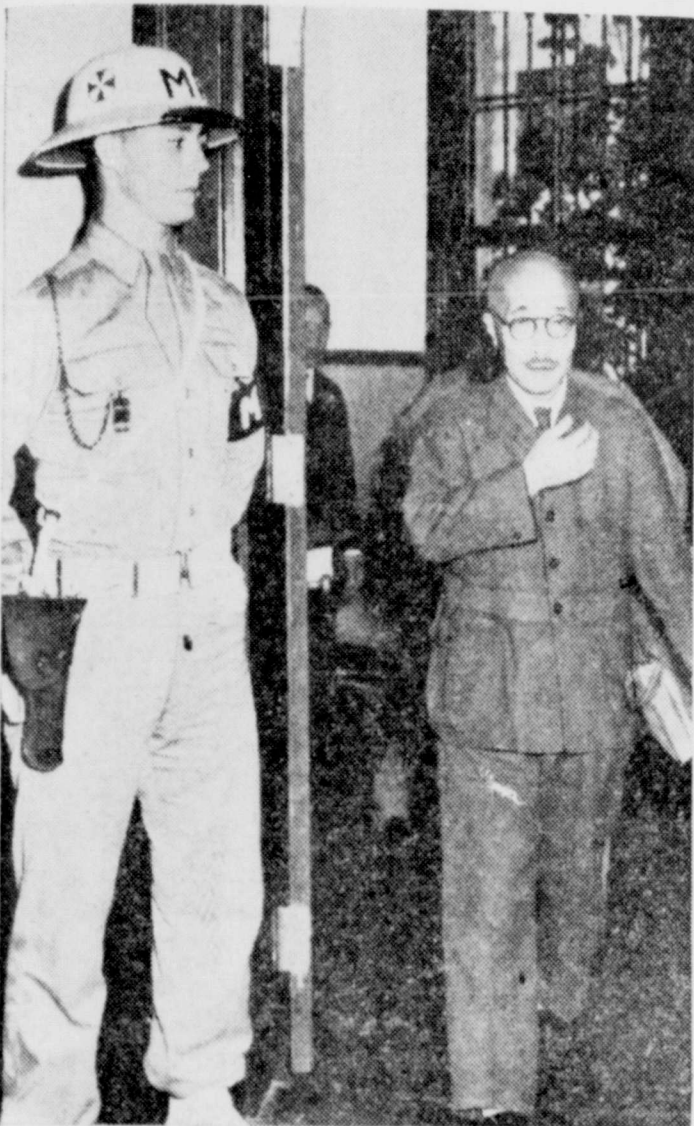

U. S. Will Do Its Part in Making Treaties Stand Up

Joe Coulter to Be Manager of Large Oklahoma Airport

Joe Coulter, popular and capable manager of the Cisco airport since last October, will depart from Cisco before September 1 to accept a position as permanent manager of a large airport in Oklahoma. Mr. Coulter's new duties will not involve flying, but he will be responsible for the management and maintenance of the airport.

He came to Cisco immediately following his release from the army, and both local flying and transient business here has increased over 100 percent during the past six months. Two privately owned planes are now based at the airport.

The Eastland county primary election of Saturday, while very close in many instances, was decisive in the final analysis in all except three of the county contests—that of sheriff and the two legislative races.

Omar Burkett and T. M. Collie, 106th legislative district, were only 313 votes apart and must enter the runoff. Burkett led in the voting Saturday.

In the race for floratorial representative, Eastland and Callahan counties, Pearson and Blackburn will fight it out. Pearson led his opponent by 1,137 votes.

W. W. Eddleman led J. B. Williams in the sheriff race by only 51 votes, and they, too, will again submit their candidacies to the voters on August 24. John C. Barber trailed Mr. Williams by 138 votes.

PARIS, July 30. — Secretary of State James F. Byrnes warned the 21-nation peace conference today not to let a futile search for perfection weaken the future security of Europe and promised that this time the United States would do its full share in carrying out peace treaties.

Byrnes promised the conference that, though the United States would stand by agreements on treaty drafts which the Big Four foreign ministers made before the conference started, he would do his best to obtain approval of any contrary agreements which the peace conference reached by a two-thirds vote.

This was an assurance to all small nations that America would give any attempt to make the conference a rubber stamp for Big-Power agreement.

1,918,795 Votes Counted in Race For Governor

Blanton, Burle - B. F. Speegle of Son in Congress Scranton Died at Runoff, August 24 His Home Sunday

ABILENE, July 30. — Omar Burleson of Anson is the running mate of William W. (Bill) Blanton of Albany in the August 24 runoff in the 17th congressional district— if unofficial results completed by the Reporter-News last night are borne out in the official canvass of votes.

Complete unofficial totals gave Burleson, with 8,595, a lead of 286 over Ted Miles of Stamford, who was third with 8,309.

Late reports Monday also put Blanton over the 10,000 mark, with a total of 10,389.

Completion of the unofficial results still did not positively remove uncertainty as to the second man in the race. There still can be some variation in totals when Democratic party leaders in each of the 12 counties canvass results and declare them official.

On the basis of the complete unofficial returns, totals for the other candidates are:

Fourth, Robert R. Herring, Breckenridge, 8,019.

Fifth, J. Bryan Bradbury, Abilene, 7,000.

Sixth, Bob Wagstaff, Abilene, 5,678.

Eighth, Mrs. Headrick, Sweetwater, 2,662.

The total vote was 55,754.

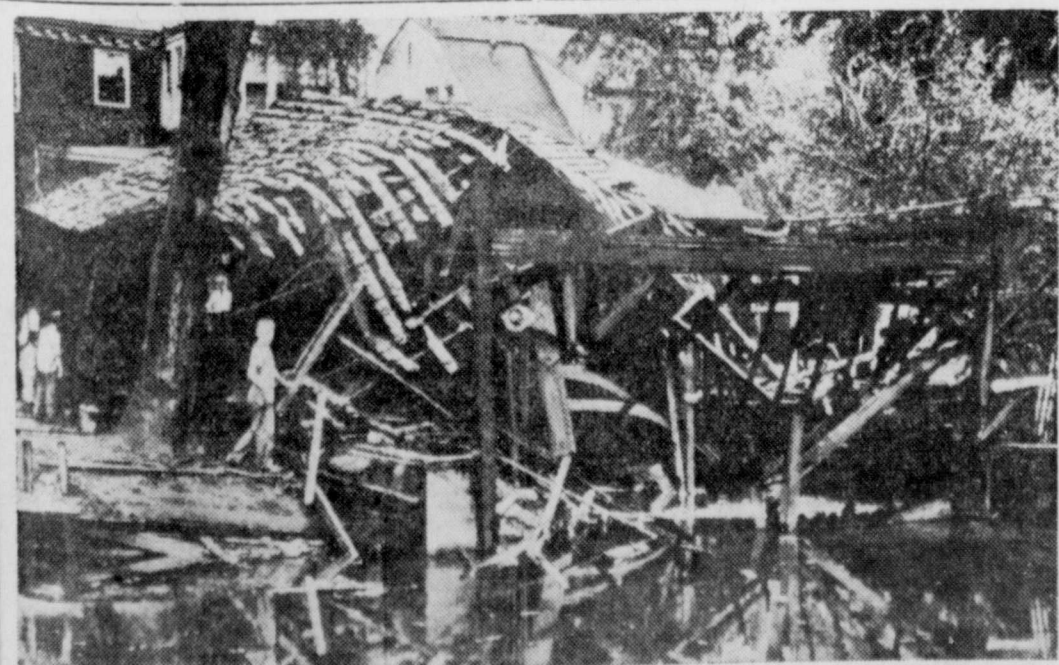
Total prizes in the thirteen classes in the first post-war show here will amount to \$225. All of the classes, with one exception, are limited to fruit growers who are not nurserymen.

BUSINESS-LIKE FARMING.

The shortage of farm labor continues to be acute, because few of the farmers and hired hands who left the land to go into industry or into the armed services have returned.

The sons of farmers, as a class, are the men whose return would be most appreciated. Any farmer would prefer his own son's help to that of two or three hired men whose only interest in the work would be the amount of cash they could take to town on Saturday night. But most young men would like to have some tangible return for their labor, some future security to work toward. Their real love for the farm where their forebears have labored is a feeling which is tempered by the natural desire to get ahead financially.

This desire is being satisfied in many cases by an arrangement now becoming popular, the "father-

son contract." In most of these plans the father, who has accumulated land, tools, and equipment, is given a capital return on these, and as the son adds to the resources by new purchases and improvements, they become part of the son's capital, together with an agreed equity in the land. Then, with a definite salary agreement for both father and son, the way is clear for future development for the ambitious young man.

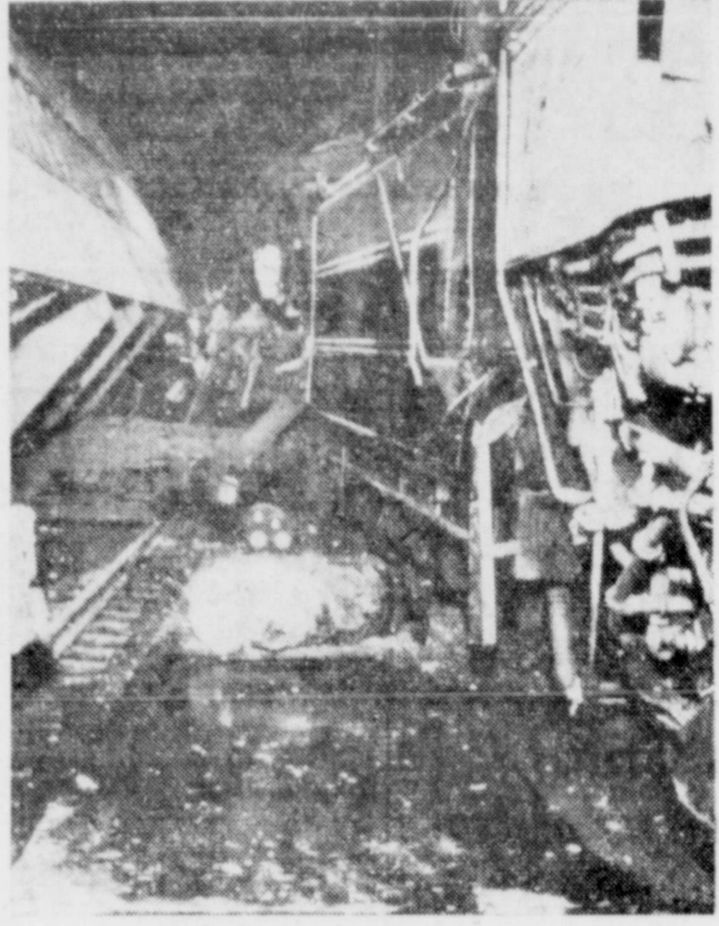
Like any other business, farming will be a happier and more profitable enterprise when put on a sensible basis.

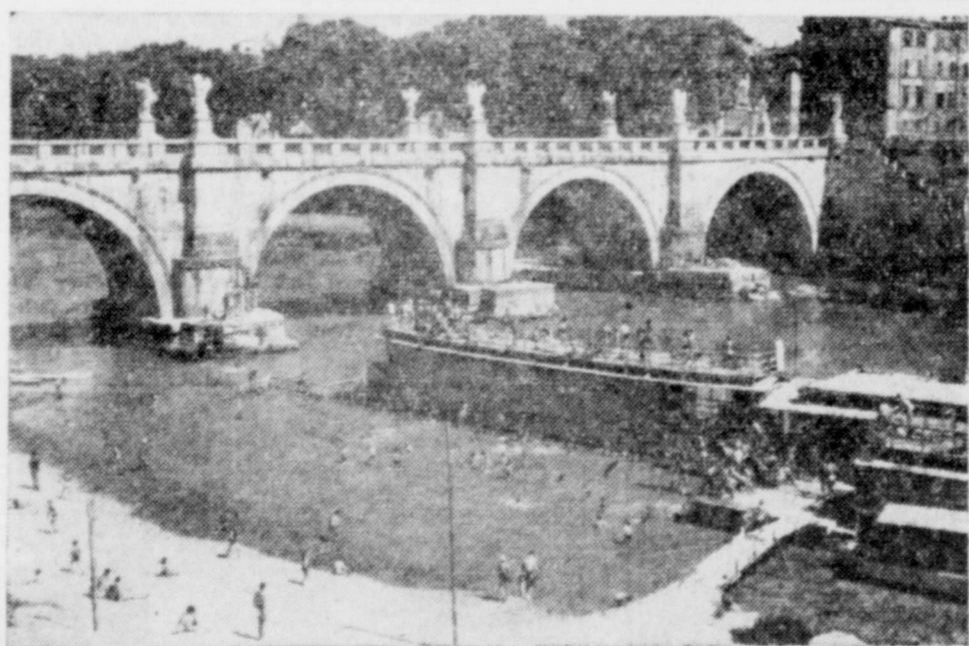

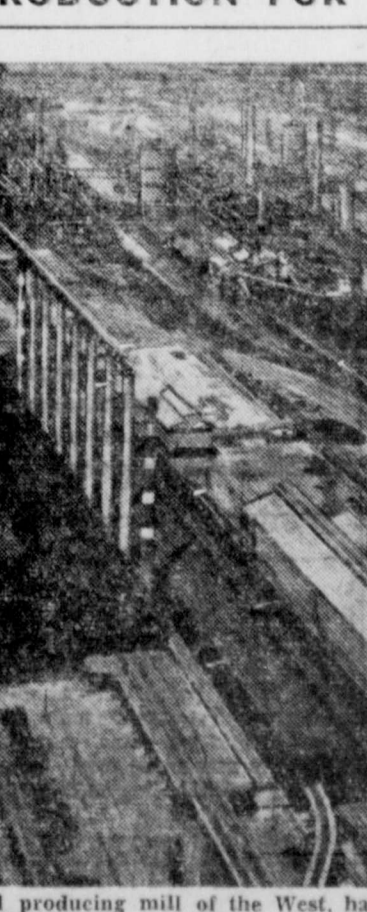

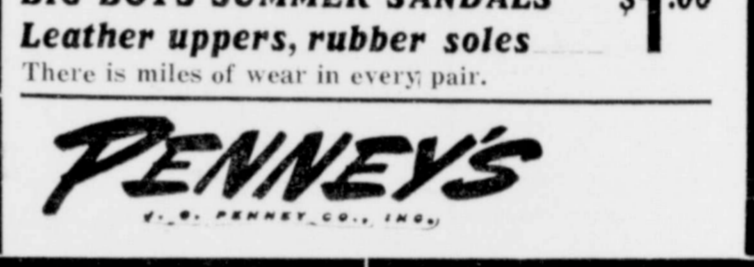
