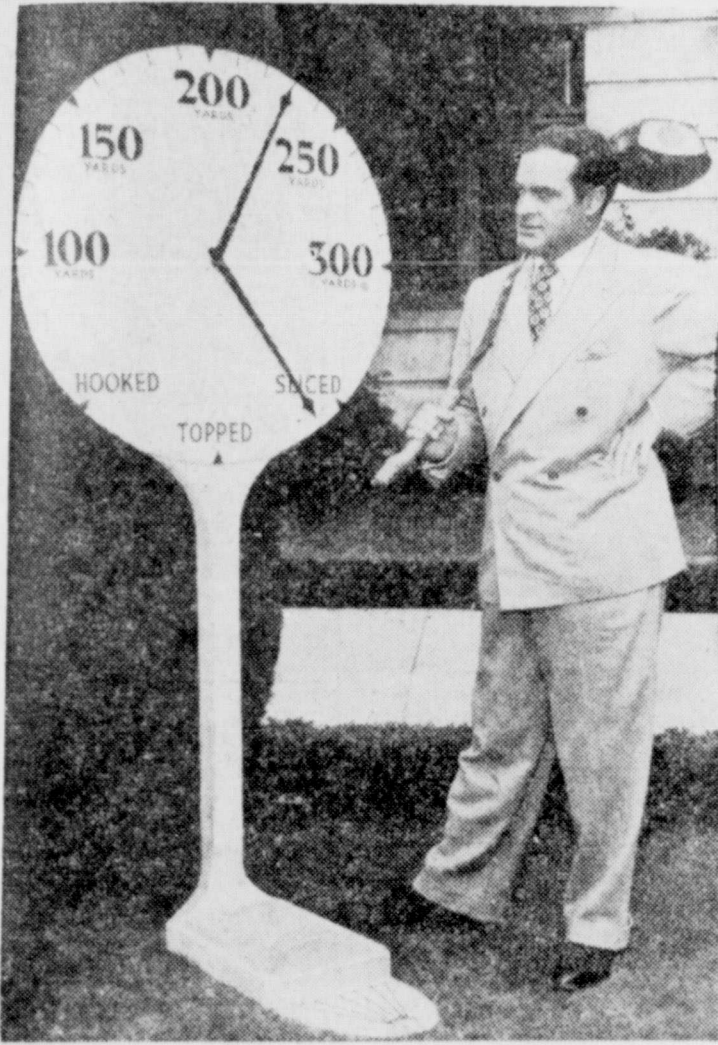

## Reds Say Trickery Being Used at Peace Conference

### JESTER AND RAINEY DECLINED DEBATE IN FIRST PRIMARY; THERE'LL BE NONE IN RUNOFF

#### Texan Won \$188,500 in Dice Game; Uncle Sam Got Big Slice

DALLAS, July 31. — Fred Merrill, Hunt county rancher who lives in Dallas, won \$188,500 in a Reno night club dice game July 10-11. Tuesday he received final payment of \$141,375 from F. L. (Dub) McClanahan, Dallas oilman and one of the night club owners.

Payment was made in McClanahan's Republic National Bank Building offices. The club's check was brought here by one of the "silent" partners of the club.

Merrill said he was on a vacation trip through Nevada and dropped in the club and took some interest in the do-and-don't dice game. His luck was with him and soon he was shooting a \$30,000 bet. The game lasted for twelve hours and in the last stages spectators were roped off to watch the Texan shoot.

His last bet, involving more than \$30,000, brought a four for his point. Four, or Little Joe, is one of the hardest points of the game to make, but Merrill made it.

Gambling is legal in Nevada. McClanahan said that the Frontier Club, like all gambling houses there, maintains a limit, which was lifted when Merrill got so deep into the newly opened club.

He said that Merrill's luck stayed with him and the club had now settled the account. The winnings were a fortune, but Merrill will have to account to Uncle Sam. He is already in touch with Herbert E. Arnold, internal revenue collector in Dallas, pending clearance of the check deposited Tuesday afternoon.

"The amount of his tax is dependent upon many things. Besides we can't discuss a taxpayer's business in any shape or fashion," Arnold said.

"However, I can say this: That if a man were married and if he were to pay tax on \$141,375, the payment would be approximately \$83,000."

DALLAS, July 31. — Beauford Jester, candidate for governor, wound up two days of runoff strategy conferences in Dallas Tuesday and hopped a southbound train after:

1. Flatly rejecting a proposal from Dr. Homer P. Rainey that they hold a series of joint meetings over the state: "When you have a fellow out, there's no use getting him back into the ball game."

2. Declining the invitation of a Houston radio station for a joint debate on runoff issues.

3. Setting a second primary campaign opening speech for Thursday at 8:30 p. m. The address will be broadcast from San Antonio over a network which Jester advisers in Dallas said would virtually blanket the state.

Jester turned down a telegraphic suggestion from Rainey that they make joint appearances "so the voters may have a chance to compare our ideas and programs." In a biting statement, Jester said he did not "feel it necessary to abet and encourage his (Rainey's) futile efforts to impress upon the people of Texas that any change is necessary in our democratic processes by any joint debate such as he refused in the July campaign."

"Results of the voting indicate clearly that the people of Texas have little interest in my opponent's program of government with which he would replace our Texas way of doing things in a democratic manner."

"In the runoff campaign, I shall continue to discuss the issues with the people just as I did in the first primary. Results of that primary show these issues are clearly drawn and that the people understand them completely. Less than one fourth of the voters favored the theories of government, as expounded by my opponent, which would make the people subservient to the state rather than the state to the people."

"Since the electorate so overwhelmingly rejected a program which has its origin among radicals who would overthrow our democracy, I cannot see how any good purpose could be served in discussing it instead of my People's Path, which is designed to serve all the people rather than a few."

"The people have already voiced their preference for democracy over government founded on foreign isms, doctrines of hate and revolutionary theories which would set class against class in lieu of harmony and unity among the people."

"I think the people of Texas realize now, more than ever before, that Texas must present a solid Democratic front. National political trends of recent weeks are positive evidence that Texas democracy must be solidified against the threat of radical encroachments such as the CIO Political Action Committee, which right now is struggling so desperately to control our Texas government."

"Therefore I will not embarrass my thousands of friends and supporters by asking them to attend any point discussion in which they would be subjected to discussion of theories which completely controvert our democracy."

"Let my opponent gather his own crowds if he is able to do so. Instead, I shall visit as many communities as possible between now and Aug. 24 to tell Texas how I propose to advance the welfare of all of the people through the program outlined in my People's Path, which is after all, simply a blueprint for a better Texas."

Jester's prepared statement was released as he boarded a train for Houston, where he will confer with Southeast Texas advisers Wednesday. He will go to San Antonio

PARIS, July 31. — Russian Foreign Minister V. M. Molotov today called for equal voice in the Paris Peace Conference for all 21 nations, although he charged that backers of a majority vote plan were trying to line up voting strength against Russia by trickery.

Speaking at the third plenary session, Molotov said the powers must not impose their will on the small nations. To do so, he said, would be to imitate Hitlerite Germany.

Molotov renewed Russia's warning that Franco regime of Spain constituted a threat to world peace and hinted that the United Nations might soon bring about the end of that regime.

### War Contractors Can't Contribute to Candidates

WASHINGTON, July 31. (U.P.) — A high justice department official said today the \$2,500 check given Rep. John M. Coffee by Contractor Elvind Anderson might be in violation of federal laws which prohibit contributions by war contractors to political candidates.

Coffee in Tight Spot.

WASHINGTON, July 31. (U.P.) — Willard A. Rushlight, Portland, Ore., contractor, testified today that Elvind Anderson, Tacoma, Wash., contractor, once told him he had made a "campaign contribution" to Rep. John M. Coffee, D., Wash.

Rushlight testified at the Senate War Investigating committee's inquiry into a \$2,500 check given to Coffee by Anderson.

Coffee had told the committee that the \$2,500 was a "campaign contribution," but Anderson had testified that it was for "services" in connection with a \$1,000,000 contract awarded him for construction of a hospital at Ft. Lewis, Wash.

CALLS SPECIAL ELECTION.

AUSTIN, Tex., July 31. (U.P.) — Gov. Coke R. Stevenson today ordered a special election to be held on November 7, two days after general election day.

JEWISH-ARAB PROBLEM.

WASHINGTON, July 31. (U.P.) — President Truman today ordered the U. S. delegation OOW discussing the Palestine situation in London to return to Washington "to discuss the whole matter" with the chief executive "in detail."

JACKSON COMING HOME.

NUERNBERG, Germany, July 31. — Justice Robert H. Jackson, chief U. S. prosecutor, said today he would leave for the United States late today and return here "in the first days of September" for the verdict of the international military tribunal in the war crimes cases.

### Cisco Optometrist Signally Honored By Profession

WASHINGTON, July 31. (U.P.) — The Senate today refused to limit debate on anti-poll tax legislation, virtually killing the measure for this session. After his petition to limit debate was defeated, Senate Democratic Leader Alben W. Barkley obtained unanimous consent to lay aside the poll tax bill.

INVESTIGATING KLAN.

WASHINGTON, July 31. — The justice department disclosed today that it is investigating Ku Klux Klan activities in seven states to determine whether federal laws are being violated. The department said court action will be instituted against the Klan if such violations are uncovered.

I want to thank everyone from the bottom of my heart for the fine plurality given me in the first primary.

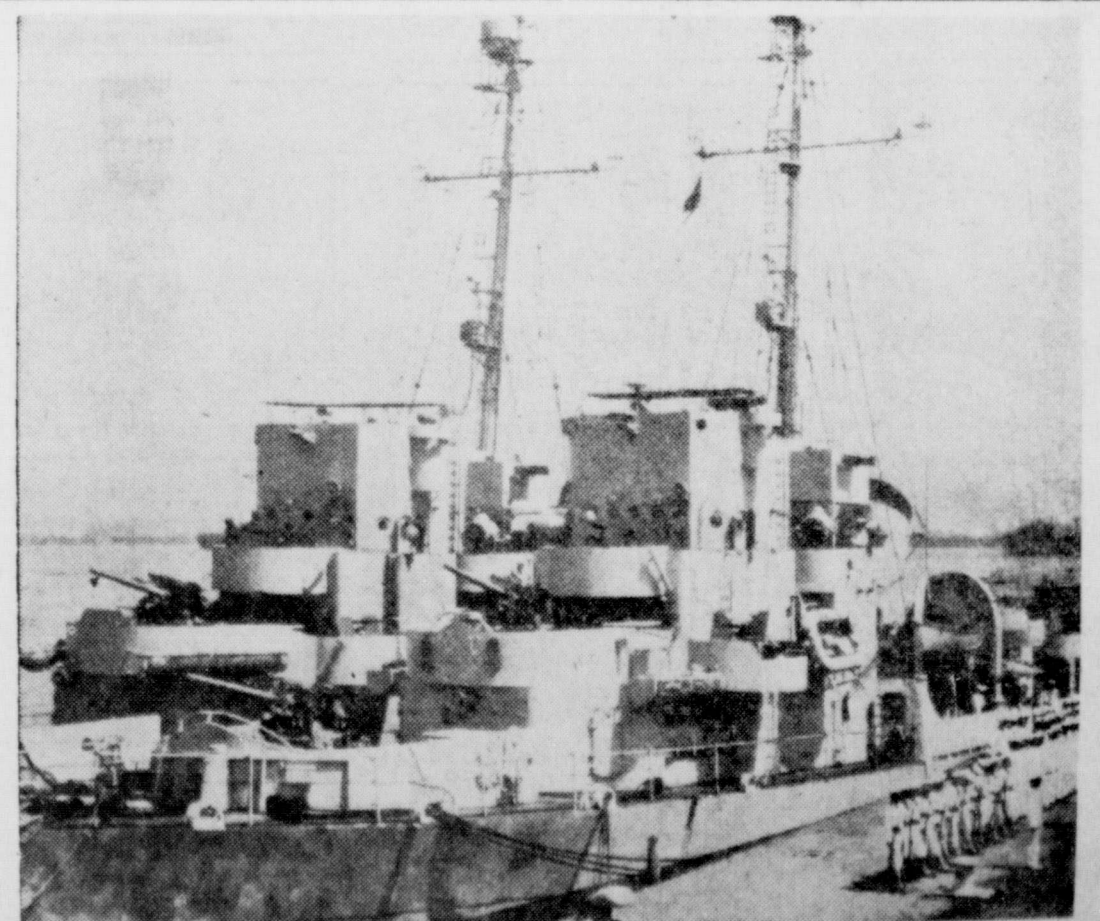
I am glad that my opponents received such good votes, too, because they are fine people, who worked hard and ran a clean race. They deserve every vote they got.

### STRANGE FRENCH SCHEME.

Confusion, worse confounded would be most Americans' idea of the new legislative scheme proposed in France. This calls not for a two-house body, as in the United States and Great Britain, or for one house only, as the Communists would like, but for four chambers. There would be a national assembly of 500 to 600 members, a Council of the Republic with 300 to 350 members, a Council of the French Empire to handle colonial matters, and an economic council for business and financial affairs. This complicated scheme is advanced by Premier - President

Georges Bidault's party, the Popular Republican Movement.

This sounds like an excellent way to scatter responsibility and to keep things from getting done. Americans in a hurry to secure new laws which they want, sometimes find a two-house Congress or legislature exasperating. Four would probably be more than twice as bad.

### CASEY JONES.

He rode with Casey Jones. This is the title to fame of John Eubanks, who was Casey's fireman on the Illinois Central railroad and has just died. He escaped the fatal ride, being off duty that day. For that matter the fireman, John Luther Jones, who replaced him on

April 30, 1900, the day of the famous ride into "the promised land," lived at least 40 years after the crash. Casey, then, and the other features of the song were historic. A monument to him at Cayce, Ky., records the fact. This is a comfort in days when historians are all taking the joy out of life by insisting that the most picturesque stories of history are simply not true. It is good to know that there really was a Casey Jones.

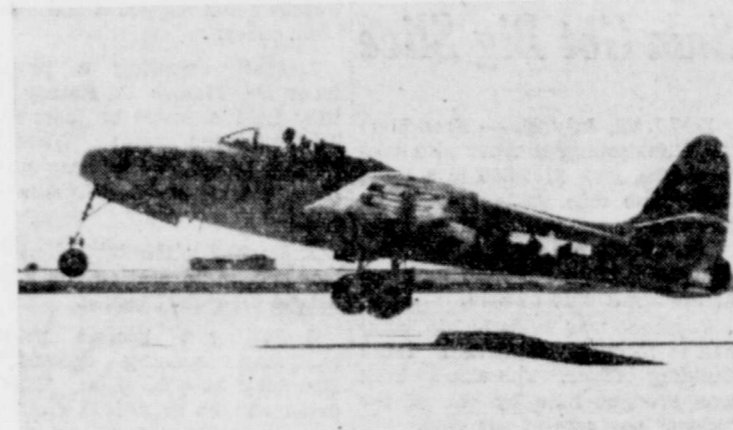


Orville Wright, bicycle maker turned airman, is the father of powered American aviation.

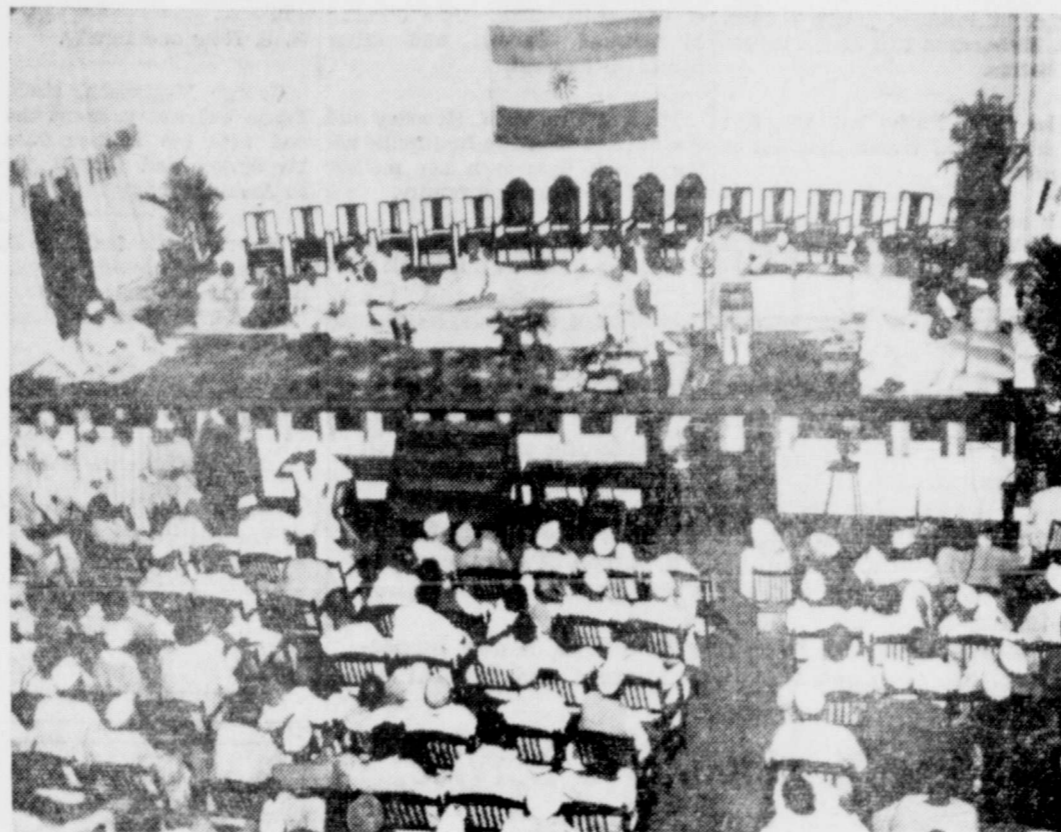

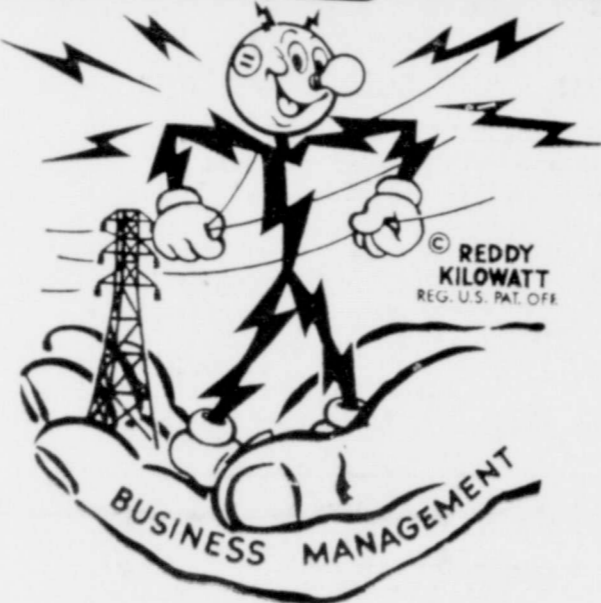
