### Bryan Hatten Dies in New Mexico; Burial in Cisco

Bryan Hatten, about 49 years of age, died at his home in Las Vegas, N. M., Friday night. He had been in failing health for several months.  
Mr. Hatten, son of the late C. A. and Rebekah J. Hatten, pioneer residents of the Cisco area, was born in Eastland county, October 15, 1897.  
Funeral arrangements were incomplete Saturday, but it was stated that the body would be buried here.  
Survivors include two brothers, Joe and Kelley Hatten, Cisco; six sisters, Mrs. W. P. Coldwell, Mrs. Reed Young and Mrs. Rhoda Burkett, Cisco; Mrs. Lillian Wright, Kermit; Mrs. Mattie Wheat and Mrs. Fannie Frost, Eastland.

### NEED FOR FULL-TIME FACULTY AND MORE HOUSING FOR CISCO JUNIOR COLLEGE IS FORESEEN

A full-time faculty for Cisco Junior College was in prospect this month as indications for an enrollment far exceeding that of any previous were seen. Whether or not this is a reality by the time school opens in September depends upon whether sufficient teachers are available for the positions offered, President R. N. Cluck said.  
Other favorable factors clustering about the prospect for a highly successful term at the school are:  
Several new courses will be offered as the demand grows, including courses in journalism, speech arts, public school music, public school art, sociology and others.  
The flying program for veterans will be enlarged at Cisco airport.  
Twenty-eight veterans emergency units awarded the school by the Federal Public Housing Authority will probably be ready for occupancy early in September, the FPHA at Fort Worth having assured Mr. Cluck last week that work would begin on these units this week with the prospect of completion shortly after September 1.  
Since the demand for these apartments has been so much greater than the college anticipated, the college has made a supplementary application to the FPHA for allocation of enough additional lumber and building material from Camp Barkeley to build forty or more additional apartments.  
An expansion of extra-curricula activities is planned, including the organization of an orchestra and choral club, a well-rounded physical education program, including boys and girls basket ball teams and other athletic teams. Through the efforts of former Registrar Carlos Turner and the Cisco Lions club material is already on ground for the construction of concrete tennis courts, which the college expects to have ready for play by September.  
The college is grateful for this contribution, President Cluck said.  
Among the plans for future enlargement of the college activities, which will be pushed in the immediate future, is the provision of shops for mechanical training. It is planned to utilize the foundations of the old girls' dormitory for this building, which are admirably adapted to the purpose. Only a roof and windows and doors will be required to make this structure usable for the purpose.  
Veterans who plan to enter college this fall, either in the academic or vocation departments, are urged to make their applications as quickly as possible in order that plenty of time may be had to process their applications through the Veterans administration. By doing this at the earliest, they will be able to receive their first education checks promptly at the end of the first month of school.  
In order to clarify a confusion which has existed in the minds of some people, it was pointed out that the Cisco Junior college veterans' training program, as well as the academic work, is in no way related to what is known as "on the job training," which is another and entirely distinct phase of the government's veteran's re-education program.

### John D. Higgins Is New Manager of Cisco Airport

John D. Higgins Jr. came back to Cisco last week to take up where he left off to do a tour of duty with Uncle Sam in half a dozen foreign and domestic theaters. He assumed charge this week of the Cisco Municipal Airport, arriving with two of his planes Saturday morning, ready to start flying Sunday morning.  
With him after September 1 will be Pop Gaither, A&E mechanic for 25 years and the builder of the first cotton duster plane, who will operate an A&E shop, and a staff who will assist in plane repair and in flying, passenger hopping and flight instruction.  
Young Higgins, who worked with Reg Robbins as an instructor here during the early days of CPT training, returns to his old stand after an impressive war record of flying for the AAF principally in the India-Burma-China theater where he flew the hump, the most dangerous and gruelling route in the world. The kind of flying he did for the army is reflected by an impressive list of awards which he holds, headed by the Distinguished Flying Cross.  
His qualifications for civilian flying and instructing are no less impressive. He is a CAA flight examiner for private pilots, fixed base unlimited. His license covers airplanes, single and multi-engine from zero to 1,800 horsepower. He is also licensed as flight instructor and instrument flight instructor. Courses in primary and advanced flying and instrument flying will be offered by him and his staff at the local port.  
By the first of September Mr. Higgins expects to have his A&E shop, in charge of Mr. Gaither, in full swing ready to serve the needs of aviators in this area. Mr. Gaither, incidentally, is a veteran of both World War I and World War II, holding a captain's commission in the last. Two of his sons were also in the service.  
The two planes which are now at the field are a Stearman 220 hp and a Vultee B-T 13 440 hp. A Cub J-3, 65 hp, primary trainer will arrive within a week or ten days to be used in training beginners.  
Cisco people, especially those who are interested in flying, were invited to visit the field tomorrow, to meet Mr. Higgins and acquaint themselves with the new management.  
"We are going to give Cisco a port that will be second to none in the quality of instruction, flying service and repair service that is offered," he said. "I think Cisco has a wonderful opportunity and a port that can be developed into a real credit to the community. I am sure that the people will cooperate with us to this end and if so we will 'go to town' in a big way."  
Announcement that Mr. Higgins and the city had signed a contract whereby he becomes manager of the municipal airport succeeding Joe Coulter, was made Saturday by Tom Stark, airport commissioner.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 10. — The new three-man Price Decontrol Board starts Monday on its gigantic task of deciding — within eight days — whether a big share of the nation's food will go into the house wife's market basket at ceiling prices or with no controls at all.  
By August 26, the board must decide whether meat, grain, milk and livestock products, cottonseed and soybeans should be under price control.  
Under the new OPA law, all these products automatically will be returned to control on August 21 unless the board decides otherwise.  
But poultry, eggs, tobacco and petroleum will remain ceiling-free unless and until the board specifically directs that they be controlled.  
Board Chairman Roy L. Thompson announced that all 82 organizations which asked to be heard have been allotted time for oral presentation.  
Witnesses concerned with grain and livestock will be heard on Monday and Tuesday.  
On Wednesday and Thursday those interested in what is done with cottonseed, soybeans, milk and dairy products will speak.  
Five organizations interested in five commodities have been allotted 30 minutes each, instead of the usual 15, to discuss all of them.  
These are the CIO, the AFL, the National Grange, the American Farm Bureau and the National Council of Farmers' Cooperatives.

The weekly construction news publication said contracts actually put under construction in July reached the all-time high for that month of \$55,464,997. Data indicated, however, that the number of contracts did not rise proportionately to the cost.

PARIS, Aug. 10. (UP)—The peace conference today heard the most undiplomatic language yet uttered in its Luxembourg Palace meeting rooms when Yugoslavia accused Greece of proposing to carve up Albania and Chairman Georges Bidault banged a loud gong in a futile attempt to choke off a speech by Russia's Andrei Vishinsky.

### 20 Girls Will Enter Contest for Queen at Festival

A feature of the Cisco Peanut Festival to be held Sept. 13, at the new Livestock show ground here, will be the selection of a Peanut Queen from among girls representing various rural communities in the Cisco area.  
Each of the girls will be sponsored by a Cisco organization or firm. A large number of these have already agreed to sponsor a girl in this contest and the chamber of commerce committee in charge of the festival has requested that others desiring to do so notify the chamber of commerce immediately.  
It is expected that some twenty girls will be entered in the contest. No entries will be allowed from Cisco or any other urban community in the county.  
Only girls from rural areas will compete.  
Sponsors of the girls will be required to furnish an appropriate costume, cost of which will be limited by the committee. Committee is headed by J. J. Callaway, chairman.  
A very interesting and elaborate program has been arranged including exhibits of all characters pertaining to farm culture in the county, lectures by agricultural experts and possibly horse races.

The camp was recreational in nature, it was said. At the Thursday night program, Dr. C. M. Barnes of Cisco talked on preventing disease.

Veterans' Administration doesn't like the idea, but may have to allow it anyway. It's considered doubtful, legally, whether congress had power to put any strings on rights of policy-holder to money in insurance fund.

### BUYERS STRIKE SET

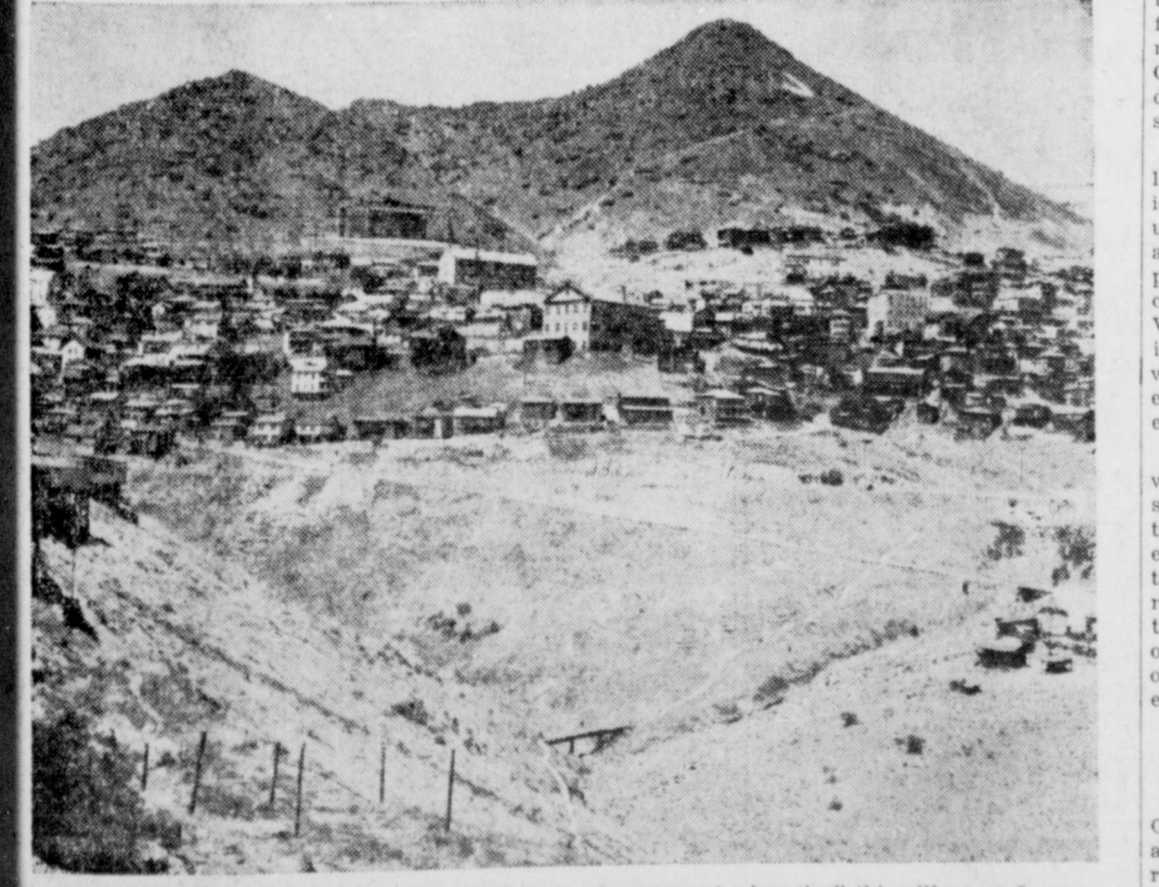

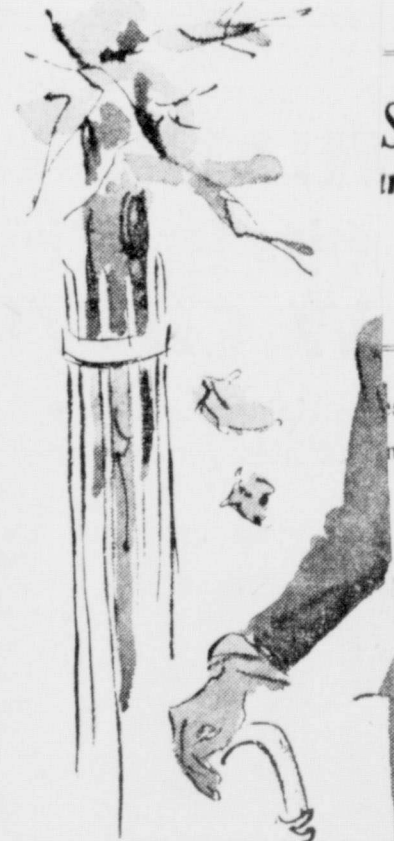
