CIO Slowly Halting Flow of Vital Ore, Coal, Grain

3 Erath Prison-Cisco Youth Reverses Lock Jailer to Be Unusual Event Here

STEPHENVILLE, Aug. 17. — Three prisoners in the Erath county jail here Saturday morning overpowered Deputy Sheriff W. H. Young, locked him in their cell and fled the building.

Late Saturday afternoon Sheriff Turnbow said a large party of men were combing the creek section near town, but that no trace of the men had been found at that hour.

The men were held on theft charges. They are 23, 24 and 25 years old. One wears a small black mustache, another is six feet tall and weighs only 108 pounds, and the third has light brown hair.

Mrs. Carl Turnbow, wife of the sheriff, was in the downstairs living quarters and said she heard the scuffle upstairs and went for help. Sheriff Turnbow and Jailer Don Roach were out of town.

Mrs. Turnbow said by the time she returned to the building with aid, the prisoners were gone. No guns were reported missing.

Young said the prisoners unexpectedly yanked him into the cell, slipped out and relocked the door after he had unlocked it to give them breakfast.

Two other prisoners in the cell did not make the break.

Federal Airport Chances of Having Act Be Discussed in Polio After Aug. 26, Abilene Age 20 Are Small

Under the Federal Airport Act, approved May 13, 1946, the Civil Aeronautics Administrator is directed to prepare a National Airport Plan outlining the development of public airports in the United States which is justifiable from an aeronautical viewpoint and estimated to be required within the next three years. This National Airport Plan will be the basis for establishing construction programs within the limitation of funds appropriated by congress.

A public meeting will be held at 10 a. m., August 26, 1946, at Windsor Hotel, Abilene.

At this meeting a representative of the Civil Aeronautics Administration will explain the provisions of the act and will welcome data and information concerning the aeronautical needs of this area, which area is comprised of Kent, Bonevill, Haskell, Throckmorton, Scurry, Fisher, Jones, Shackelford, Stephens, Palo Pinto, Mitchell, Nolan, Taylor, Callahan and Eastland counties.

The attendance of all interested officials and persons is requested.

VETS CHOOSE ABILENE. WICHITA FALLS, Aug. 17. — Members of the Lost Battalion in business session at their second annual reunion here this morning voted to hold the 1947 meeting in Abilene. Maj. J. B. Heinen of Dallas was elected president of the reunion to succeed Col. Blucher S. Sharp of Amarillo.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 17. — If you have a child under 10 years of age, the chances are only 3 in 1,000 that he will suffer a severe attack of infantile paralysis, even during an epidemic.

There is one chance in a thousand he will be crippled for life.

The risk of a severe attack lessens sharply after a child passes 10. Beyond 20 there is only about one case in every 100,000 population, even during extensive outbreaks.

These facts about infantile paralysis — or poliomyelitis — are set forth by Dr. Howard A. Howe of the Poliomyelitis Research Center, Johns Hopkins University. Howe acknowledges there is small comfort in them.

"For that one child in a thousand who may be crippled for life," he says, "poliomyelitis still is a great tragedy."

"In 1914 the severe polio epidemic permanently handicapped some 5,000 American children — too large a number for any nation to regard complacently."

Why do adults rarely suffer a severe or recognizable attack? Dr. Howe says that science believes the vast majority of people must have had a mild case of infantile paralysis and gained a practical immunity without ever being aware of it.

DETROIT, Aug. 17. — Joseph Curran, boss of the CIO National Maritime Union, predicted today President Truman "probably would try to break the NMU's great lakes shipping strike which slowly was halting movement of vital ore, coal, grain and fuel boats on the inland waterway."

Curran said he expected the President to act, "as he did with the railroads," when Mr. Truman returns from his 18-day vacation.

The prediction came as the union announced negotiations would be renewed Monday with two of 17 Great Lakes shipping companies hit by the three-day walkout. The companies are Standard Oil of Indiana and Bethlehem Transportation company.

Curran said he had received reports that unqualified men were being put to work on lake ships and claimed that at Ashland, O., members of the Lake Carriers' Association were employing boys 14 to 15 years old in an attempt to keep their ships moving.

At Milwaukee, the NMU said, seamen who operate railroad car ferries across the lakes had been asked to strike as a test of whether they come under the National Railroad Labor Act, which forbids walkouts without 30 days notice.

Curran claimed a total of 117 ships of various types, some of them unorganized, were shut down in the three-day walkout by some 4,000 seamen of the union's estimated 5,000 membership.

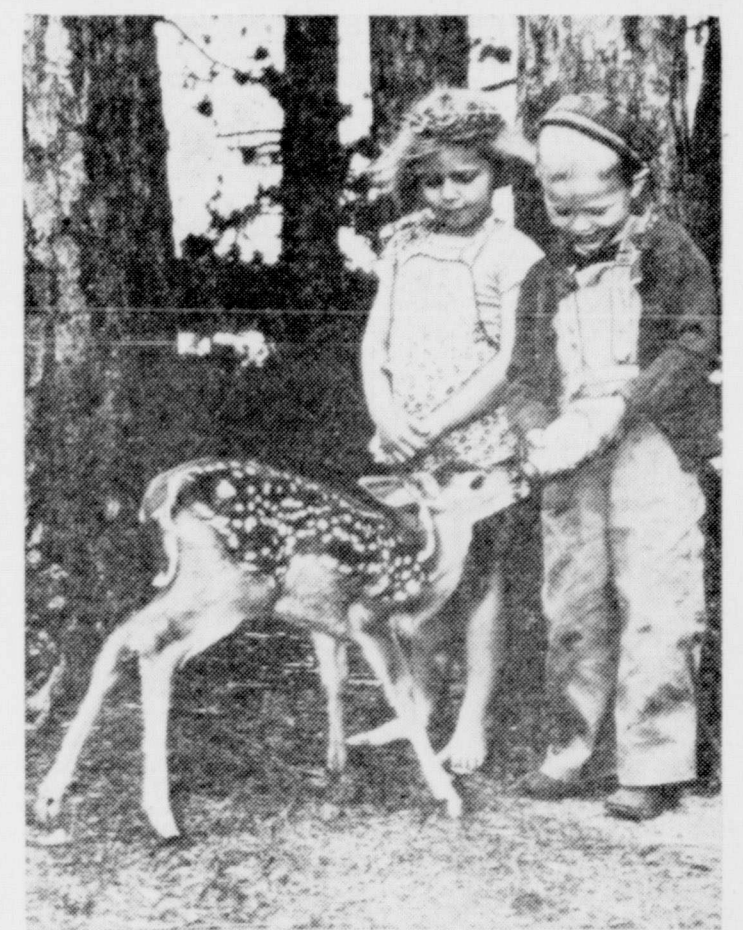
Price Decontrol Board Might Drop "De" From Name

WASHINGTON, Aug. 17. (UP) — American housewives got the said news today.

Prices of meat and dairy products can't be pushed back to June 30 levels, even if the price decontrol board decides to restore controls on those foods next week.

Price Chief Paul A. Porter explained that drastic reduction in food subsidies voted by congress make it impossible to restore June 30 ceilings on food items specifically exempted from control — at least temporarily — under the new OPA law.

He did not say at what levels prices will be pegged on such items if the decontrol board decides that meat, livestock, milk, butter and other dairy products, grain, soybeans and cottonseed should be put back under controls. The board will announce its decision Tuesday night.

Signs Are Dark if Atlantic Jaunt They Are Not Immediate Threat to Truman

WASHINGTON, Aug. 17. — Tensions and confusion at beginning of second peace year hint at possible crisis building up.

Relaxing Washington wants to avoid it. Truman has gone vacationing, cabinet members drift out of town, congressmen have gone home to campaign.

But signs are dark, if not immediately threatening. Tension grows at Paris "peace conference" and Byrnes sent hurried call for senatorial advisers, Connally and Vandenberg.

Truman called in high military, as well as state department, officials for secret conference just before trip. Conferees are said to have discussed Palestine, Dardanelles, among other matters.

President got gloomy report about Russia this week from Nuremberg's U. S. Prosecutor Jackson.

Washington talks about rebuilding Navy, as result of atom-bomb tests. Announcement at this time of deadly secret weapons is no accident. (Latest, this week is said to be defense against enemy atom bombs or rockets.)

TOO MUCH RAIN. ST. LOUIS, Mo., Aug. 17. — Relief was promised today from the week-long rains which broke all records in the 109-year history of the local weather bureau. The official weather forecast predicted brief thundershowers today and tonight followed by clear weather.

At least two persons were believed dead and 2,000 families left homeless in the St. Louis area as a result of flash floods caused by the rains.

ABOARD THE USS WEISS, Aug. 18. (UP) — President Truman, "completely relaxed" after the first day of an 18-day vacation cruise on the Presidential Yacht Williamsburg, headed out into the Atlantic tonight from Delaware Bay.

The Williamsburg pointed south into Delaware Bay this afternoon after slipping through the 11-mile long Chesapeake-Delaware canal connecting the tops of Chesapeake and Delaware Bays.

White House Secretary Charles Ross told reporters aboard this escorting converted navy attack transport that Mr. Truman was "completely relaxed."

Ross said that the first 24 hours of the projected 18-day cruise had "done a lot of good already" for the president, who was getting away for his first extended vacation after 18 months of presidential cares.

SOVIET VOTED DOWN. PARIS, Aug. 18. (UP) — Secretary of State James F. Byrnes is willing to hold simultaneous sessions of the 21-nation peace conference here and at the United Nations assembly in New York, it was understood tonight after strenuous and delaying Soviet Russian moves were voted down again in a conference session.

ONE-POUND BABE. NEW ROCHELLE, N. Y., Aug. 17. (UP) — A two-day incubator baby was delivered by doctors today to be the smallest in medical history to survive. The infant was too fragile to be weighed but nurses estimated his weight at one pound.

Fear of OPA-Bred Wildcat Strikes May Be Warranted

WASHINGTON, Aug. 17. — Philip Murray's veiled threat of another round of wage strikes unless prices are rolled back is complicated by fact that few large CIO contracts with employers immediately can be reopened without breaking them. One CIO authority lists only rubber workers and employees of Chrysler as having contracts subject to immediate renegotiation. Steel, which formerly had 30-day cancellation arrangement, now runs to next February. General Motors and Ford have definite-term agreements.

However, with OPA daily hiking the cost of so many necessities of life, a strong possibility exists of widespread wildcat strikes, with rank and file taking control from union officials.

Many Red Divisions Massed on the Iran Border

TEHRAN, Aug. 17. — An official foreign source said Saturday that cabled reports from the northern frontier indicated that the Russian Army had massed "15 to 25 divisions" along the Araxes River, boundary line between Iran and Soviet Russia.

The informant said the reports came from qualified military observers. He declared the troops are typical Red Army mountain units, with the average division 5,000 strong but with mechanized divisions probably slightly smaller.

DOCTRINE OF DOOM.

Sixty thousand of Jehovah's Witnesses met in Cleveland last week. They impressed the city with their efficient organization, the competent way they handled their housing, the neatness of their tent and trailer camp, the speed with which they operated their cafeteria service. The residents found them a bit thick on the sidewalks in their zeal to spread the Word via Watchtower literature, but any convention city is used to crowds.

But when the Witnesses got up in meeting and started denouncing the United Nations, their hosts didn't like it so well. George R. Phillips, "branch servant" from South Africa, said the UN is "a part of Satan's organization." "Do not believe in the propaganda in favor of the United Nations," he said. "At the final battle of Armageddon, it will be like wax before the fire and those who rely upon it will suffer destruction."

Well, maybe. The Witnesses are intent upon a day of doom, which they believe only they will survive. Armageddon or no Armageddon, the rest of the world would like to survive, too, and a good many people think the United Nations can help.

The Witnesses have a poor record to show for getting along with people during the war, because they consider themselves untouched by many laws. Now that others are working for peace, they show the same lack of interest.

It is the privilege of the organization to follow their own religion and believe anything they like about the end of the world. But they don't make themselves very popular by preaching against the doctrine of world peace now being pursued by 21 nations in Paris.

It is true that reports from Paris are often discouraging, but we must keep trying to work out intelligent peace plans. Those who do not work and hope, are already lost.

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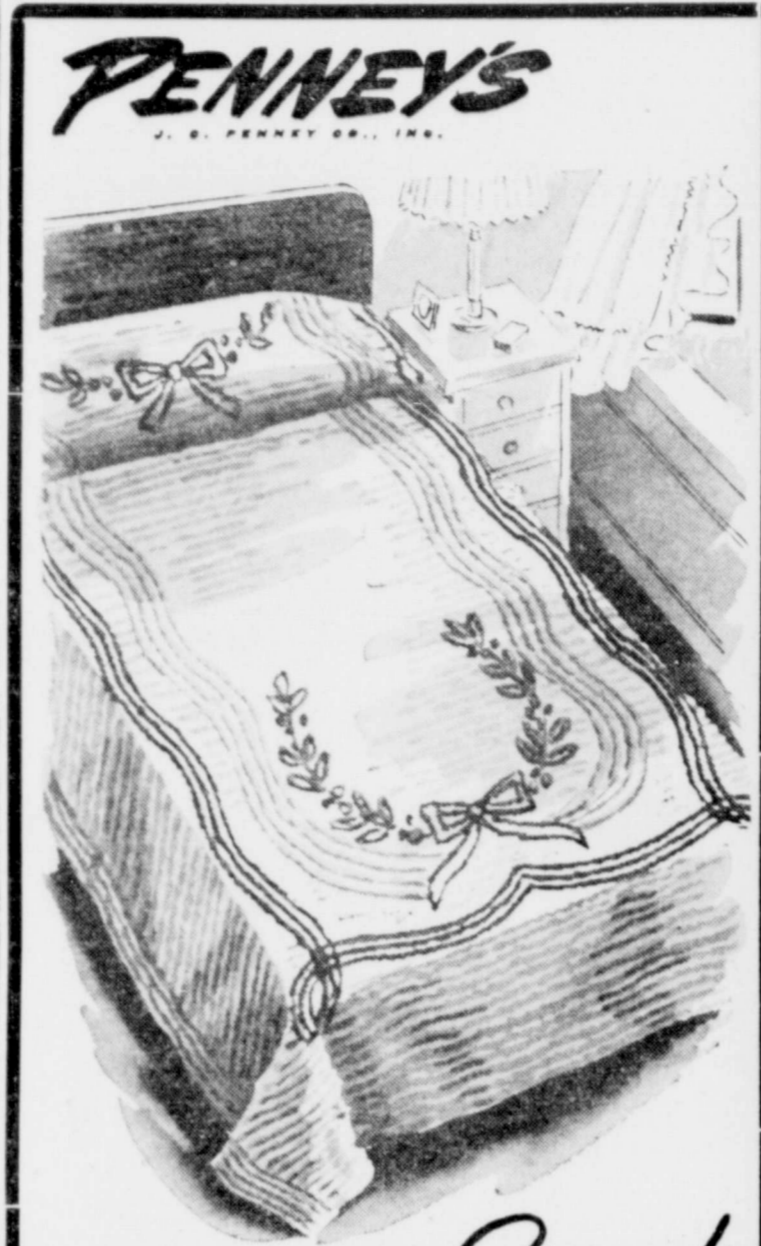

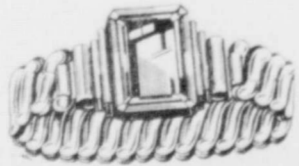

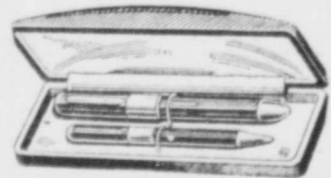
