## Yugoslavia Admits Shooting Down U. S. Planes; Would Do It Again

### REDS CAN'T CONTROL DARDANELLE

### CISCO LOBOES TO CLASH WITH CLEBURNE TWELVE DAYS HENCE, SEPTEMBER 13, AT CLEBURNE

It takes no more than a casual glance over the field of District 9AA football teams to reveal that anybody venturing to pick a 1946 champion is either ignorant of football or slightly batty. For Class AA competition has come back to its historic arena in a measure to satisfy the most sanguinary fan.

Only Breckenridge, long time king of the district, will not return to the gridiron with a veteran team. But viewing the past record and the habits of the Buckaroos, this cannot be taken as discounting the probable part they will play in determining the outcome of the season.

The note was couched in careful diplomatic language, but served notice on Moscow that the United States is deeply concerned over Soviet expansionist moves in the Near and Middle East and is ready now to take a strong hand in that troubled zone.

An authoritative Washington source said the entire American government from President Truman down believes that the future peace of the world may hinge on this issue and that it is too vital to permit further appeasement.

The United States flatly rejected Russia's contention that control of the strategic waterway should be vested solely in the Black Sea Powers — Russia, Turkey, Romania and Bulgaria.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 21. (UP)—The United States rejected Russia's bid for military control of the Dardanelles today in a cool diplomatic note bearing the plain implication that this government regards the issue a fundamental one on which it will stand firm at all costs.

Two hundred and sixty-five Eastland counties have cast absentee ballots for the second primary, said Virgil Love, county clerk, today. He added that absentee ballots cast in the first primary totaled 251.

### Entire Starting Line of '45 Loboes to Be Back First Primary

Included in the roster of veteran Cisco Lobo football players who will report to Coaches Harold Fischer and O. V. Overall on September 2 to begin 1946 season practice are 14 lettermen and more than three reserve lettermen.

The entire starting line of last year's team will return to the 1946 eleven, with the exception of Baum at guard. None of the 1945 starting backfield will be back, however.

At this distance the probable Lobo starting lineup for 1946 will be:

King, 165 and Pence, 170, ends; Penn, 179 and Noble, 180, tackles; Rendall, 158 and Hill, 175, guards; Fields, 160, center; Williams, 168, Cleveland, 155, G. Smith, 150 and Johnson, 130, backfield.

There is plenty of argument with respect to backfield positions, especially, and there is nothing official about this lineup. Other backfield prospects include S. L. Smith, 138; Watts, 140; Whitaker, 240; Miner, 130, and Roger Henderson, 135.

Reserves for the line, with possible backfield implications, include Maxwell, end, 150; Padgett, tackle and center, 170; Jackson, tackle, 165; W. Hays, guard, 170; Woods, guard, 160; Carrothers, guard, 150; Jack King, end, 150; Durwood Smith, end, 125.

All of these will probably see plenty of action during the season.

By United Press. PARIS, Aug. 21. — Secretary of State Byrnes said tonight he had talked to Dean Acheson, acting secretary of state, by trans-Atlantic telephone and teletype on the Yugoslav situation and that a statement would be issued at once in Washington.

### Yugoslavs Defiant.

PARIS, Aug. 21. — Secretary of State James F. Byrnes, delegated his routine peace conference duties to subordinates today and took personal charge of a diplomatic crisis developed from the deliberate shooting down of two American army planes by Yugoslav fighting forces.

Byrnes summoned Yugoslav Vice Premier Edward Kardelj to his headquarters to explain his country's attitude toward the United States in view of its deliberate attacks on unarmed American planes.

Yugoslavia admitted in a note that even detailed the attack on one plane, indicated that three American soldiers burned to death in the flaming wreckage and implied that any other plane which ventured over Yugoslav territory would meet a similar fate.

Ramification of the attack, and of the attitude taken generally by the Communist-dominated countries of southeastern Europe, extended to American civil aviation when Pan-American Airways suspended its Vienna-Istanbul service.

Rome dispatches indicated that the two American planes may have been shot down by United States Mustang fighter craft, fueled by UNRRA gasoline.

### Dean Says Scholarships Would Attract Teachers

AUSTIN, Texas, Aug. 21. — A million dollars worth of scholarships to attract outstanding high school graduates into the teaching field is suggested by Dr. B. F. Pittenger, dean of the University of Texas college of education.

Higher salaries for teachers also are essential, but this inducement might not show sufficient results for several years, said Pittenger.

A speedier method of attracting high school graduates to study for the teaching profession has been adopted in Florida, where the legislature appropriated \$400,000 a year for scholarships to 1,000 selected high school graduates.

The program has increased enrollment greatly in teacher-training institutions, Dr. Pittenger reported.

"Possibly the Florida plan is the solution for the immediate problem," he added. "Probably a million dollars a year spent in Texas for scholarships for prospective teachers would be more productive in the immediate future than the same amount of money would be if spent in any other way."

Dr. Pittenger reported that qualified high school teachers have been easier to find during the last twenty years than good elementary teachers. English, social science and foreign language teachers have been plentiful and physical science, mathematics, industrial arts and home economics teachers have been scarce, he added.

### Gunman Took \$15,000 From Levelland Bank Today

LEVELLAND, Tex., Aug. 21. (UP)—A lone gunman, armed with a sawed-off shotgun, today robbed the Levelland State Bank of an estimated \$15,000.

The man entered by the back door of the bank during the rush noon hour, pointed the gun at four employees and ordered them to lie on the floor.

### East Texan Says Reds and CIO Are Backing Rainey

DALLAS, Aug. 21. — CIO letters in support of Dr. Homer P. Rainey were read Tuesday night by Bascom Gist of Tyler, speaking in behalf of Beauford Jester's candidacy for governor.

"The CIO and the PAC throughout the United States are interested in Dr. Rainey," Gist declared in a radio speech. "They not only have come into Texas to tell you present governor who should be the president of the University of Texas, but they now have the gall to undertake to tell the people of Texas who shall be the next governor."

Letters read by Gist were addressed to Gov. Coke Stevenson during the university row that ended in Dr. Rainey's dismissal as president. One of the letters, protesting the firing of Rainey, was said to have been signed by George E. Rice, regional director, United Construction Workers (CIO). Another letter, Gist said, was from Grant W. Oakes, international president of the United Farm Equipment and Metal Workers (CIO). Governor Stevenson received, according to Gist, complaints over Rainey's dismissal from CIO organizations in Fort Worth, Denver, Memphis, Tenn., Jacksonville, Fla.; Port Arthur, Newark, N. J.; San Francisco, Calif.; Albany, N. Y.; Philadelphia, Pa.; and other points outside the state.

"I wonder if that does not answer the question as to whom the CIO is supporting in this race for governor?" Gist asked.

An attempt is being made, he insisted, in behalf of Rainey to divert the people from the real issues "by use of abuse, smear sheets, anonymous letters and whispering gossip."

Gist also charged that the Communist party is supporting Rainey.

He read from the Worker, Communist newspaper published in New York, as follows: "The present political struggle in Texas is reflected in the gubernatorial race. Homer P. Rainey has the support of the Texas Federation of Labor, the CIO-PAC, the bulk of the Negro people's or-

ganizations, church and civic organizations and certain small business groups including some local Texas capital."

The last paragraph in the Communist paper, Gist said, read as follows: "The party is calling for a huge turnout of the vote July 27, in support of Homer P. Rainey."

Gist criticized Rainey for comparing his campaign to that of Gov. Jim Hogg.

"Can you imagine anonymous letters being sent out in Jim Hogg's campaign?" he asked. "Can you imagine him publishing a smear sheet for last-minute distribution. I, who was reared with in a stone's throw from the place of his birth, resent such a comparison."

### Ask Education Crusade Against Communism Trend

MIAMI BEACH, Aug. 21. — The 2,000 delegates attending the annual convention of the Knights of Columbus here heard Supreme Knight John E. Swift of Boston call for a "crusade of education in our American way" to halt the spread of Communism.

He described such a crusade as the only way to preserve "our American ideals" and to prevent the collapse of Christian civilization in the face of Communism spreading from Russia.

The delegates also heard Rev. James M. Gillis of New York, editor of the Catholic World, strongly denounce Russia.

### POLICE USE CLUBS.

DULUTH, Minn., Aug. 21. (UP)—Police used their clubs today to clear a path through pickets of the National Maritime Union — CIO — who were allegedly blocking the entrance to the Duluth, Missabe and Iron Range ore docks.

### ALDERMEN RESIGN.

TEXARKANA, Texas, Aug. 21. — Three Texarkana, Texas, city aldermen, indicted on charges of accepting a bribe, resigned yesterday and thereby automatically brought about the resignation of Mayor W. M. Harkness. The aldermen were indicted on charges of accepting bribes in connection with a street extension.

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L. A. WOODS STUBS HIS TOE.

L. A. Woods, long-time state superintendent of public schools, who was unopposed in the July primary, thus being tendered another term in that responsible position without effort, has made a fatal mistake in jumping into the gubernatorial campaign in support of Homer P. Rainey, deposed president of Texas University and admitted enemy of constituted authority.

Should Mr. Rainey, by some freak of chance, land in the governor's office, Texans may rest assured that the public schools of Texas will, as far as possible, be conducted along the lines favored by Mr. Rainey in the conduct of the University of Texas. The Rainey-Woods coalition can mean nothing else.

Mr. Woods has long been suspected of being the head of one of the smoothest political machines in the state, but it has heretofore been difficult to put a finger on him because of the quiet manner in which the machine was operated.

The state superintendent of public schools has no business setting himself up as a political dictator, and especially when the people of Texas have so long handed him that office by huge majorities.

However, there is every reason to believe that the Rainey-Woods combination will prove a fizzle, with Beauford Jester receiving approximately 70 percent of the votes to be cast for governor in Saturday's election.

THE PALESTINE PROBLEM.

Americans in general know very little about Palestine. Certain groups of Jews in this country are vociferous in wanting it declared a Jewish state. Other groups of Jews, equally well-meaning, think the "return to Zion" idea a mistake. They believe Jews, like people of other religions, should find themselves at home in any country where they happen to establish themselves. Both points of view sound reasonable when laid down by their advocates. But the currents, cross currents and counter-currents of nationalism, British imperialism, Islamic, French interests in Syria and Lebanon, and oil, are too much for the average citizen to untangle. Nor is it easy for the experts.

W. C. Lowdermilk, expert on irrigation and soil conservation, believes it would be a geographical error to separate the states of Palestine and Trans-Jordan. He wants to see a Jordan Valley Authority established, with dams and irrigation projects for the advantage of all - Arabs, Christians and Jews. He says Greater Palestine is like Southern California, with plenty of land suitable for irrigation, and not enough water unless provided by some such project as a JVA. He makes, also, this interesting point:

"When people are drawn together in working out a common project for their daily bread, and other essentials of life, many ideological differences fall away unless such differences are worked up from outside for ulterior purposes. When people get down to work in constructive undertakings with forward-looking objectives for their present and future welfare, there is less possibility of differences."

The suggestion that these differences are being fomented from outside is not a new one. Whether or not it is true, this much is certain: Hundreds of thousands of Jews cannot be allowed to wander about Europe from pillar to post till they die. Somewhere they must settle, make a living and get along with their neighbors.

One thing at least is doubly certain - the people of the United States do not wish to see America thrown open to all the dissatisfied

peoples of Europe, as has been suggested by some of our political leaders.
