Cost of Many Necessaries Upped by Opa Price Fixers

WASHINGTON, Aug. 23.—The OPA today boosted prices of auto tires, building materials, eye glasses, toilet tissue, paper towels and metallic lead products as it strove to meet the congressional deadline for price hikes.

Another increase announced by OPA was a 20 per cent jump in the retail ceiling price of cotton bedspreads, table cloths and table napkins and a five percent hike for cotton hosiery and anklets.

Other items affected in the same action include cotton handkerchiefs, cotton and wool blankets, rope, twine, yarn, cord and tobacco seed-bed covers. Increases on these items were not specified, but distributors were authorized to add their March 31 percentage mark-ups to their purchase costs.

Retail prices of tires were jumped 2 1/2 per cent.

Other increases were expected during the day as the agency carried out a congressional directive to make adjustments. Under the Wherry amendment of the new price control law, the adjustments must be made within 30 days after renewal of the price act, or by Sunday.

42 NEW WELLS

TULSA, Okla., Aug. 23.—Oklahoma oil men brought in 42 producing oil wells during the week with an estimated initial daily crude output of 6,290 barrels. Sixteen other wells proved dry, and five came in gassers with 37,949, 600 cubic feet of gas production.

TOO LITTLE ACTION

WASHINGTON, Aug. 23.—Rep. Leo E. Allen, R., Ill., resigned today from the house committee on campaign expenditures because "I am unwilling to be a party to what may turn out to be a political travesty." He submitted his resignation to Speaker Sam Rayburn in a strongly worded telegram criticizing the inactivity of the committee.

Jester Will Get 69 Pct. of Vote Cast Tomorrow

AUSTIN, Aug. 23.—As the campaign for governor of Texas went into the home stretch the first part of this week, the Texas poll directed by Joe Belden gave Jester a majority that foreshadowed victory over Rainey in tomorrow's runoff election.

These are the final results of the statewide survey conducted Monday, Tuesday, and Wednesday: Beauford Jester 69 percent. Homer P. Rainey 37 percent.

In the race for lieutenant governor, 21 percent of the voters were undecided when the poll was taken, a number too large to allow any one safely to say either Allan Shivers or Boyce House has the race cinched. This is made clear by the poll, however:

Shivers is leading House just as he was two weeks ago in another Texas poll, but when the present survey was conducted Shivers no longer held a majority of all the votes.

House has apparently increased his following during the last two weeks, and if he has established a trend he may well give Shivers a close race Saturday.

Army Colonel Gets Sound Advice from San Antonio Judge

SAN ANTONIO, Aug. 23.—To an Army colonel who claimed another man was bothering his wife, District Judge Robert W. Terrell gave this advice:

"Take a 12-gauge shotgun and finish off the man in Texas style."

Col. John F. Guillett, commander of Goodfellow Field at San Angelo, had asked an injunction restraining a San Antonio man from visiting and telephoning his wife. The colonel said Mrs. Guillett had met the man six months ago and since then had been getting "20 to 30 telephone calls a day" from him.

Judge Terrell Thursday declared his court had no intentions of making itself look "ridiculous" by granting an injunction and then suggested "there are two courses open to Colonel Guillett. He can take a 12-gauge shotgun and finish off the man in Texas style or he can withdraw this foolish case."

Rainey Suggests Special Session to Hike Pensions

At the request of a Cisco supporter of Dr. Homer P. Rainey, the Daily Press today reprints excerpts from a speech he made at Corpus Christi, August 13, as follows:

Friends and Fellow Democrats: How would you like to live on \$23.43 a month? You wouldn't like it. 185,258 old people are existing on pensions of \$23.43 per month in Texas, while the treasury is overflowing with a surplus of \$25,000,000.

The purchasing power of that \$23.43 has gone down 25 or 30 per cent.

Out of this the old folks have to pay rent and buy food and clothes at ever-increasing prices.

A very interesting news story came out of Austin last week. It says that the state government is very "prosperous" with this surplus of \$25,000,000. The story adds, however, and I quote: "News for the old folks was not good."

Those 185,000 old people had their pension checks cut \$2.30 per month!

And the treasury is running over with money!

This was not the first cut in pension checks.

It was not the second nor the third nor the fourth.

The old folks have had their pension checks cut so many times they've lost count.

Just last August, under the guise of giving the old folks \$40 per month, the most deceitful political trick ever perpetrated was pulled off by the legislature and the corporation lobbyists who are supporting my opponent.

They got up a constitutional amendment and propagandized the people to vote for it on the theory that they were raising pensions from \$30 to \$40 per month.

Hidden in the amendment, however, was a provision that not more than \$35,000,000 could ever be spent for old age pensions, for aid to the blind, and for aid to dependent children.

That joker, hidden out in the amendment, was a fraud.

My opponent has the same joker in his platform.

YUGOSLAVS ARE STILL ACTING UP

LONDON, Aug. 23.—The Yugoslav government broadcast from Belgrade tonight an announcement that Marshal Tito had rejected the American ultimatum as being "irrelevant," since those aboard a transport plane forced down had been released.

The official statement broadcast from Belgrade made no mention of the shooting down of a second U. S. transport plane in the same area Monday, with an apparent loss of five lives.

The U. S. government is not yet satisfied that Yugoslavia has complied with the American ultimatum, Acting Secretary of State Dean Acheson said in Washington. He said the government could not form its final views on the matter until it knew what happened to the occupants of the second plane.

The 48-hour ultimatum expiring some time tonight, so far as could be determined, called for the release of those aboard the Aug. 9 plane and communication with the survivors of the second transport, if any.

To Hold Property. WASHINGTON, Aug. 23.—The United States present disposition is to hold on to Yugoslav river craft in American zones of Germany and Austria until Russia guarantees freedom of navigation on the Danube, it was learned today.

FAST MAILS.

Same-day delivery of mail from coast to coast and for a three cent stamp, is the aim of Second Assistant Postmaster General Gael Sullivan.

First will come a five-cent air mail coast October 1. Long-range air transports will be augmented by use of local helicopters, already operating in Los Angeles and Chicago. Sullivan, once a school teacher, dreams of all first-class mail being flown. It would take ten times the 600 planes now flying the mails to achieve this. But post office and aviation authorities see this coming, soon.

Of course there's a lot of mail a person wants to get as soon as possible. But there are other communications that can wait—bills, income tax forms and the letter from the relatives wanting to spend their vacation with you. Sullivan needs get himself worked up into a lather over these.

FOR THE DROWNING.

Artificial respiration for victims of drowning as taught a few years ago is obsolete now. A new method of reviving the water-logged, attributed to the British Navy, is

now the official system used by the Coast Guard and is approved by the United States Navy.

The rescued person is placed on a tilting stretcher and seaweaved back and forth at a 40 to 50-degree angle. This forces the water out of the lungs and admits more air than the old chest compression and relaxation method that many first aiders found so strenuous. The new system requires at least a plank and saw horse or bar to rest it on, and an air tube slipped into the windpipe helps. But the method is quicker, more generally successful and easier on both victim and rescuer than the old way.

Of course, if there are no means at hand for this, the old system had better be followed with dispatch. The most important is to start some kind of artificial respiration immediately and keep at it steadily.

A BOOST FOR BILL BLANTON

... From Home Folks Who Know Him.

NOBODY ASKED BILL BLANTON TO RUN FOR CONGRESS. When he decided to run, he was on the other side of the world, a GI in the Burma jungles. He didn't know whether he would get home, but if he did there were a lot of things he wanted changed.

WE ARE GLAD HE IS RUNNING. We know Bill. We know his character, his ability, his democratic outlook, and his sincerity of purpose. We know we need men like him in Congress now.

BILL'S CHARACTER is what we want our Congressman's character to be. He is fair to everyone. He not only believes in the right things, but has the courage of his convictions. He is an active church member, and was treasurer of his church before he entered the Army. He is married to one of our fine Shackelford County girls.

BILL'S ABILITY as a progressive, civic-minded citizen, and as a lawyer and a judge, has been proved to us many times over. We were glad to have him take over again as our County Judge when he returned from overseas. Besides his professional and civic attainments, we think it is to his credit that he has always laid his hands to any job that needed to be done, and that he is a good carpenter, stonemason, bricklayer and cowhand. He has followed the thrasher, worked cattle, worked roads, dug postholes, cut concrete, and done all manner of manual labor.

Instead, he chose to enter the Army as a buck private, as others had to, and did his KP, guard stands, and other details with the rest. As a GI, he despised the system of aristocratic pretensions and privileges which were copied from the British and embodied in the officer caste system.

BILL'S SINCERITY OF PURPOSE shows in everything he has said to us here since he returned from Burma and India. It comes from his natural earnestness and determination, heightened by his experiences of the last few years. You will see it in his platform.
