**New Yorkers Pick Mead and Dewey as Gub. Nominees**

ALBANY, N. Y., Sept. 5. — Democrats nominated U. S. Senator James M. Mead as candidate for governor of politically potent New York state yesterday, while Republicans designated Gov. Thomas E. Dewey as his opponent in the November election.

The formal, long-expected selections were made by unanimous acclamation of parading, wildly demonstrating delegates at the Democratic state convention here and the enthusiastic GOP conclave at Saratoga Springs.

Indicating Dewey's mastery of the Republican organization in New York, the GOP convention unanimously nominated the high command choice, a fifty-year-old State Assembly Leader Irving M. Ives, as candidate for Mead's senate seat.

Ives' nomination followed an eleven-hour withdrawal of Mayor Gen. William J. (Wild Bill) Donovan, whose supporters had carried their pre-convention fight to Saratoga Springs.

Donovan bowed out shortly after Ives' name was placed in nomination, thus suddenly dissolving prospects of a convention floor fight.

His campaign manager, George Sibley, told delegates the withdrawal was made to promote party solidarity and expressed Donovan's hope that the nomination of Irving Ives will be made unanimous.

As Ives' rival in the senatorial race, Democrats named Herbert H. Lehman, 68, four-time governor of New York and former UNRRA head.

Democrats, fighting to regain control of New York with its forty-seven electoral votes, also sought to break the four-year reign of Dewey, who, when elected in 1942, became the first Republican governor in twenty years.

## 80 Pct. of Texans Agree With Their Governor

DALLAS, Sept. 5. — Gov. Coke R. Stevenson crossed swords with AFL music czar Petrillo Wednesday by favoring the appearance of Mexico's Tipica Orchestra at the State Fair of Texas next month.

Petrillo's American Federation of Musicians told the State Fair of Texas Wednesday if Mexico's Tipica Orchestra plays, Tommy Dorsey and other AFM bandmen won't. W. J. Harris, president of the local union, passed the ultimatum to Fair General Manager W. H. Hitzelberger.

In a statement for publication, Governor Stevenson said: "My attention has been called to the fact that the Tipica Band of Mexico City has been invited to play at the coming State Fair of Texas and has tentatively accepted the invitation. It appears that this arrangement does not meet with the approval of one James C. Petrillo, a non-resident of Texas.

"My opinion is that the State Fair of Texas is very fortunate to secure the services of this splendid band from the neighboring Republic of Mexico. I believe it would be offensive to the sentiments of the fine citizenship of Mexico if one of their leading musical organizations should be denied the privilege of playing for the State Fair of Texas simply because of

**ROUGHNECK SOLDIERS NOW FACE SERIOUS CHARGES.** RICHMOND, Va., Sept. 5. (AP) — A wild ride across half of the United States ended here yesterday for an 18-year-old Sulphur Springs, Tex., girl and the arrest of two soldiers who admitted forcing her at gun point to drive them to Virginia from Texas.

The girl, Miss Ruth Teague, was unharmed. The soldiers were arrested after a high-speed chase last night on U. S. route 1, near Ashland, in which police shot a rear tire off the car in which the soldiers were riding.

Troopers E. R. Callis and O. C. Trice, who made the arrests, identified the soldiers as Frank Valentine Famular, 20, of Jersey City, N. J., and Clarence F. Kummert, 19, of Pittsburgh, Pa.

The troopers said the pair admitted being AWOL from Camp Hood, Tex.

## High School Cadets Train With War-time Tools

DALLAS, Sept. 5. — Dallas ROTC officials have requisitioned a supply of rocket launchers — bazookas — and light and heavy machine guns, to assure modern warfare training for high school cadets.

The heavy weapons, ordered for crew training, are expected to arrive this month.

Also in store for this year's trainees are new Springfield rifles, shorter and lighter than the 1917 model Enfields formerly used. The new rifles also will be available this month.

Another innovation for the 1946-47 school year will be cotton uniforms for spring.

For the first time, junior ROTC cadets may work for senior credit. Three years of high school military training will entitle a man to a year's credit in college, according to a recent War Department directive.

An intensive recruiting campaign for ROTC trainees has been launched by Fourth Army headquarters at San Antonio, seeking 100 per cent enrollment of male high school students.

Approximately 3,000 cadets are expected to enroll in the military program of the seven high schools of Greater Dallas, Capt. Charles H. Goddard, on temporary duty at ROTC headquarters, estimated. This number is the average pre-war enrollment, he said.

Sergeant instructors and high school commandants will return this week from orientation and training courses at Fort Benning, Ga.

## Vets Can Buy as Many as 2,000 Rubber Half-Soles

FORT WORTH, Sept. 5. — Here's surplus property which you can have immediately. The War Assets Administration announced today that there are available for immediate delivery 1,600,000 pair of men's rubber half-soles, all products of nationally known manufacturers, declared surplus to the needs of the army.

Located at the Fort Worth Quartermaster Depot, this huge stock is being offered to priority claimants and commercial dealers concurrently. Veterans of World War II can purchase at a rate of 15c a pair with a minimum of 2,000 pair. Small retailers will pay 20c a pair with minimum order 2,000 pair, while large retailers and wholesalers can place orders for no less than 15,000 pair at 10c and 15c respectively. Orders may be sent to the WAA office, T&P Building, Fort Worth.

RICHMOND, Va., Sept. 5. — A wild ride across half of the United States ended yesterday for an 18-year-old Sulphur Springs, Tex., girl and the arrest of two soldiers who admitted forcing her at gun point to drive them to Virginia from Texas.

The girl, Miss Ruth Teague, was unharmed. The soldiers were arrested after a high-speed chase last night on U. S. route 1, near Ashland, in which police shot a rear tire off the car in which the soldiers were riding.

Troopers E. R. Callis and O. C. Trice, who made the arrests, identified the soldiers as Frank Valentine Famular, 20, of Jersey City, N. J., and Clarence F. Kummert, 19, of Pittsburgh, Pa.

The troopers said the pair admitted being AWOL from Camp Hood, Tex. She said she had not been mistreated during the long ride from Texarkana to Richmond but that she had been permitted to eat and sleep very little.

(U.P.) — British delegate Sir Alexander Cadogan angrily assailed the Ukraine's charges against Britain and Greece here today, characterizing them as part of an incessant Russian propaganda campaign against the British commonwealth. He said the charges were simply a "re-hash" of Russia's unsuccessful attempt to indict Britain in the UN earlier this year.

### New Yorkers Pick Mead and Dewey as Gov. Nominees

ALBANY, N. Y., Sept. 5. — Democrats nominated U. S. Senator James M. Mead as candidate for governor of politically potent New York state yesterday, while Republicans designated Gov. Thomas E. Dewey as his opponent in the November election.

The formal, long-expected selections were made by unanimous acclamation of parading, wildly demonstrating delegates at the Democratic state convention here and the enthusiastic GOP conclave at Saratoga Springs.

Indicating Dewey's mastery of the Republican organization in New York, the GOP convention unanimously nominated the high command choice, fifty-year-old State Assembly Leader Irving M. Ives, as candidate for Mead's senate seat.

Ives' nomination followed an eleventh-hour withdrawal of Mayor Gen. William J. (Wild Bill) Donovan, whose supporters had carried their pre-convention fight to Saratoga Springs.

Donovan bowed out shortly after Ives' name was placed in nomination, thus suddenly dissolving prospects of a convention floor fight.

His campaign manager, George Sibley, told delegates the withdrawal was made to promote party solidarity and expressed Donovan's hope that the nomination of Irving Ives will be made unanimous.

As Ives' rival in the senatorial race, Democrats named Herbert E. Lehman, 68, four-time governor of New York and former UNRRA head.

Democrats, fighting to regain control of New York with its forty-seven electoral votes, also sought to break the four-year reign of Dewey, who, when elected in 1942, became the first Republican governor in twenty years.

### High School Cadets Train With War-time Tools

DALLAS, Sept. 5. — Dallas ROTC officials have requisitioned a supply of rocket launchers — bazookas — and light and heavy machine guns, to assure modern warfare training for high school cadets.

The heavy weapons, ordered for crew training, are expected to arrive this month. Also in store for this year's trainees are new Springfield rifles, shorter and lighter than the 1917 model Enfields formerly used. The new rifles also will be available this month.

Another innovation for the 1946-47 school year will be cotton uniforms for spring.

For the first time, junior ROTC cadets may work for senior credit. Three years of high school military training will entitle a man to a year's credit in college, according to a recent War Department directive.

An intensive recruiting campaign for ROTC trainees has been launched by Fourth Army headquarters at San Antonio, seeking 100 per cent enrollment of male high school students.

Approximately 3,000 cadets are expected to enroll in the military program of the seven high schools of Greater Dallas, Capt. Charles H. Goddard, on temporary duty at ROTC headquarters, estimated.

This number is the average pre-war enrollment, he said. Sergeant instructors and high school commandants will return this week from orientation and training courses at Fort Benning, Ga.

### Vets Can Buy as Many as 2,000 Rubber Half-Soles

FORT WORTH, Sept. 5. — Here's surplus property which you can have immediately. The War Assets Administration announced today that there are available for immediate delivery 1,600,000 pair of men's rubber half-soles, all products of nationally known manufacturers, declared surplus to the needs of the army.

Located at the Fort Worth Quartermaster Depot, this huge stock is being offered to priority claimants and commercial dealers concurrently. Veterans of World War II can purchase at a rate of 15c a pair with a minimum of 2000 pair. Small retailers will pay 20c a pair with minimum order 2,000 pair, while large retailers and wholesalers can place orders for no less than 15,000 pair at 19c and 15c respectively. ### 80 Pct. of Texans Agree With Their Governor

DALLAS, Sept. 5. — Gov. Coke R. Stevenson crossed swords with AFL music czar Petrillo Wednesday by favoring the appearance of Mexico's Tipica Orchestra at the State Fair of Texas next month.

Petrillo's American Federation of Musicians told the State Fair of Texas Wednesday if Mexico's Tipica Orchestra plays, Tommy Dorsey and other AFM bandsmen won't. W. J. Harris, president of the local union, passed the ultimatum to Fair General Manager W. H. Hitzelberger.

In a statement for publication, Governor Stevenson said:

"My attention has been called to the fact that the Tipica Band of Mexico City has been invited to play at the coming State Fair of Texas and has tentatively accepted the invitation. It appears that this arrangement does not meet with the approval of one James C. Petrillo, a non-resident of Texas.

"My opinion is that the State Fair of Texas is very fortunate to secure the services of this splendid band from the neighboring Republic of Mexico. I believe it would be offensive to the sentiments of the fine citizenship of Mexico if one of their leading musical organizations should be denied the privilege of playing for the State Fair of Texas simply because of

an objection by a non-resident of Texas.

"It is my hope that the arrangements will be completed and that we will have this further evidence of good will and friendship on the part of the Mexican people by the appearance of this splendid musical organization for the pleasure and delight of the music-loving people of Texas, thousands of whom will attend the Texas State Fair of Dallas.

"We ought not permit this happy arrangement to be frustrated by one who has no interest in the welfare of the people of Texas."

## PEACE RIVER PIONEERS.

In the Peace River Valley of the Province of Alberta, more than a thousand Canadian veterans will soon embark upon a farm and homestead project. The country is wilderness, living in the same general latitude as the southern panhandle of Alaska, but it is fertile and believed suitable for diversified agriculture.

The Alberta government, which owns the property now, will clear it with bulldozers and tractors. Each veteran who qualifies will be given 320 acres, and also a grant of \$2,320 for equipment from the dominion government. To earn title to the land, he must stay on the property for 10 years and contribute one-third of his crops to the province for seven years.

The plan is reminiscent of the American depression project in Manitoba Valley, but the Canadians apparently will place more responsibility on the individual veteran farmer. To the young men who fought so long, this chance to earn their own land far from cities and armies, and the prospect of building a profitable farm must seem very desirable.

## RUSSIA GOES FORWARD.

Russia is to spend about \$8,020,000,000 in a five year plan for reconstructing, modernizing and extending its railroads. The plan

launched this month on Railroad Day, was celebrated throughout the USSR with banquets, parades and festivals. Locomotives and new cars were displayed in the big cities. Extended freight facilities to accommodate proposed increases in industry and agriculture were stressed, as well as use of the newest technical knowledge.

This enthusiasm for railroading has led to children's railroads which run for several miles. They are built and manned by children picked for good school marks and supervised by expert mechanics and operators. In Russia women occupy responsible posts as railroad executives and engineers, combining their rail careers with family responsibilities, according to the weekly information bulletin issued by the Soviet embassy in Washington.

In any country the development of transportation facilities is of first importance. Since the end of the war there has been agitation around the world to rebuild and improve railroads, for both passengers and freight.
