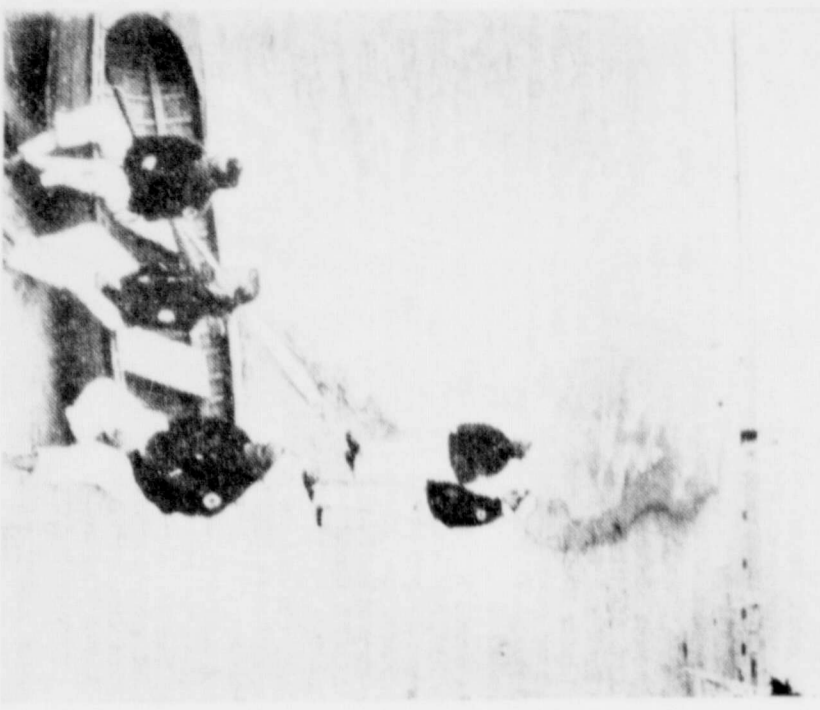
The advantage of building materials has reached a point where every home, every mill, every acre of roofing counts. All over the country, as houses partly built, their construction stopped for lack of materials.

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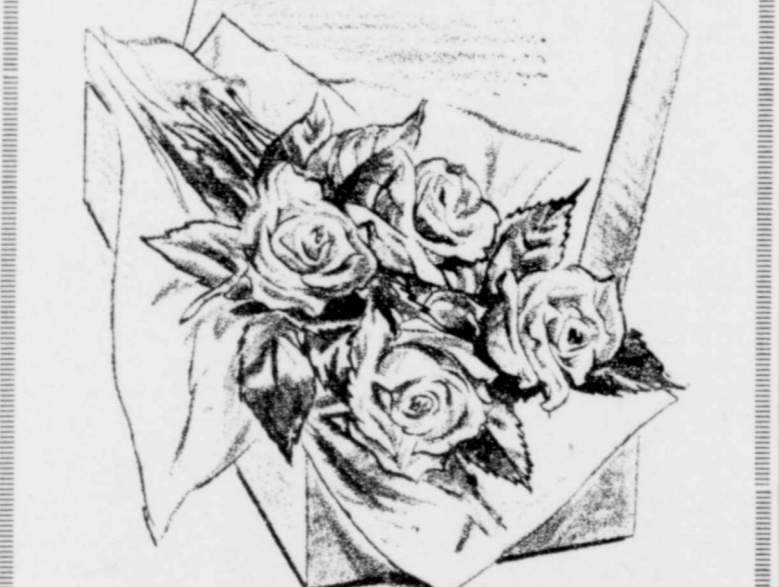
