OPA Says Flour Hike Will Not Affect Bread Costs of Colony, Dies

WASHINGTON, Sept. 12.—Flour millers were granted a price increase of 20c per 100 pounds yesterday and OPA said the result would be a retail increase of 1c to 2c on a five-pound package of flour.

OPA officials said the millers' increase is temporary and should not increase retail bread prices.

Earlier the price agency raised its ceiling on work gloves, certain cotton rugs, and window and picture glass.

It also abolished price lids altogether on a widely-assorted list ranging from razor blades and television sets to baby carriages and motor scooters. In addition, it prepared to increase sugar prices soon.

The flour increase—third since June 30—was granted because millers are under producing white flour and so are required to buy and use more wheat.

Retail bread prices should not rise, OPA explained, because they are under a temporary increase of 1c a loaf granted in August.

The agency said the flour boost applies to all millers and brings increases since June 30 to a total of \$1.45 a hundred pounds for Pacific Coast areas, and \$1.38 for all other areas. Part of the increase results from elimination of government subsidies formerly allowed millers.

News has been received in Cisco of the death of John H. Holliman, who passed away Wednesday at a hospital in San Benito. He had been making his home with his daughter, Mrs. Ed C. Reeves, in San Benito.

The body will be brought to Eastland, where burial is expected to take place Saturday afternoon.

Mr. Holliman was about 87 years of age and with his family formerly resided at Colony, five miles north of Ranger. He was a retired farmer.

Survivors in addition to Mrs. Reeves are the widow, Miss Loyce Holliman, daughter, and a son, Clyde Holliman.

CONNALLY PLENTY BUSY.

PARIS, Sept. 12.—Senator Tom Connally (D-Tex.) bowed out today as a possible successor to the post of chairman of the war investigating committee. In a cable to Senator James Mead, the committee chairman, he said "my duties at the Paris conference and later at the United Nations general assembly will prevent my acceptance of chairmanship of committee to succeed yourself. The committee is free to make such election as it may desire."

Smallest Cotton Crop Since 1889 Seen For Texas

AUSTIN, Sept. 12.—Adverse August weather reduced the prospect for cotton harvest in Texas by 125,000 bales, leaving the possibility that this year's crop will be the smallest since 1889, the United States Bureau of Agricultural Economics reported.

The Sept. 1 forecast indicates a 1,775,000-bale crop, compared with last year's 1,794,000 bales and a 1935-44 average of 3,137,000 bales.

Abandonment of 4.5 per cent this summer leaves 6,064,000 acres to be harvested, the bureau said. The average yield of lint per acre is estimated at 141 pounds, compared with 146 pounds last year and a ten-year average of 166.

Union Meat Cutters Ask Truman to "Chuck" OPA

CHICAGO, Sept. 12.—The OPA in the last two weeks has "almost wrecked" the nation's meat industry, say officials of a national meat workers union, making idle 25,000 workers and threatening to add another 25,000 to the ranks of the unemployed in another week.

The officials, E. W. Jimerson, president, and Patrick E. Gorman, secretary-treasurer, of the AFL Amalgamated Meat Cutters and Butcher Workmen of North America, said in a statement "the whole OPA program is a dismal failure. It has been successful only in the control of rents."

In a telegram to President Truman the union leaders urged immediate removal of ceilings and controls, which went back into effect Tuesday. They proposed the president "demand that congress chuck it (the OPA program) completely out of the window" with the exception of rent controls.

In their statement, they said "that in many communities no slaughtering whatever is being engaged in and market owners by the hundreds are closing their doors."

4,000 AFL Truck Drivers Reject Stop Strike Plan

NEW YORK, Sept. 12. (U.P.)—Nearly 4,000 AFL striking truck drivers at a mass meeting late today rejected a management proposal that their union membership return to work pending a settlement of the present dispute, which has partly paralyzed New York City industry for the past 12 days.

The meeting which had lasted three and one-half hours, adjourned after the rejection of the management proposal.

Coast to Coast Passenger Trips Less Than 5 Hrs.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 12. (U.P.)—Coast-to-coast passenger flights would be a matter of five hours and a few odd minutes, less than half the time they now take, under a plan announced today by Pan-American Airways.

The international carriers proposal to enter the domestic field with a network of transcontinental and border-to-border routes has been set tentatively for civil aeronautics board hearing on Oct. 29.

Planned schedules listed by Pan-America include—

Houston-New York, three hours. Houston-Chicago, two hours, 15 minutes.

Jordan Succeeds Castleberry on Upper Leon Board

Herman Jordan, prominent farmer of Flatwood community, near Eastland, was recently chosen as supervisor of the Upper Leon Soil Conservation District to succeed Ed Castleberry. Mr. Castleberry has faithfully served on the board since the district was set up.

At the recent conventional election held in the commissioners court room, Mr. Jordan was unanimously elected by landowners present. He accepted the position with the hope of furthering the activities of the upper Leon soil conservation district in the best manner.

This district is composed of Eastland, three-fourths of Comanche and part of Erath counties. There are five board members, who meet on the second Friday of each month to transact business of the district and to set up policies for its operation. Present board members are Walter Hamilton, Dublin area; Harry Huddleston, who resides near De Leon; Halter Fritts, near Comanche; J. B. Eberhart, near Rising Star, and Mr. Jordan. This board is to be commended for its outstanding accomplishments and unyielding efforts in establishment of a sound program for soil and water conservation.

MILWAUKEE, Sept. 12.—Delegates to the CIO United Electrical Workers' convention today called for a CIO national conference to consider war veterans benefit proposals, including bonuses of up to \$4,500 for overseas vets.

A resolution calling upon CIO President Philip Murray to summon the conference was adopted shortly before delegates recessed to stage a demonstration against the strike-bound Allis-Chalmers company.

Nine proposals submitted by locals, and covering subjects ranging from the bonus proposals to the army caste system, were contained in the resolution.

It places the union on record for a bonus of \$3 a day for domestic service, with a \$3,500 maximum, and \$4 a day for foreign service with a \$4,500 maximum.

STEELMAN ORDER MAY END STRIKE

WASHINGTON, Sept. 12.—Stabilization Director John R. Steelman today amended government wage policy to pave the way for payment of striking AFL seamen of wage increases twice disapproved by Wage Stabilization Board.

He amended existing wage regulations to provide that government agencies may pay wages and salaries "comparable to the wages and salaries paid for the same or comparable services by other operators in the same industry."

Atlantic and Gulf Coast operators have agreed without any conditions to pay \$27.50 a month more to able-bodied seamen represented by AFL unions.

Steelman's order now permits government agencies to pay like increases on ships operated for the government account.

The \$27.50 pay boost is \$10 a month more than that previously approved for CIO seamen.

Steelman's action will permit the higher increase paid to all seamen, irrespective of the unions to which they belong.

Texas Governor Reproves Agitators From North

AUSTIN, Sept. 12.—Gov. Coke Stevenson said today he does not like the idea of "any outside influence trying to dictate to us how to run our institutions."

The Texas governor was commenting at his press conference on yesterday's action of the national Phi Beta Kappa, which empowered its senate to suspend the University of Texas chapter's privilege of electing members if any "serious deterioration" of educational conditions is found within the next three years.

President T. S. Painter replied to some and kept silent on other phases of the report. He said that "Judge" Dorothy Kenyon of New York, chairman of a committee which claims to have "investigated conditions" at Texas university, apparently "misunderstood" the situation. Stevenson concurred in this saying:

"That is likely to be true of any such outside group.

"History shows that practically all of the internal trouble we have ever had in the United States grew from some agitating group in the north. If some such group wants to organize for its own advancement, that is fine and dandy, but they should not encroach on other realms."

Stevenson mentioned the abolitionist and prohibition movements as among those originating in the north. He said the idea back of

the fair employment practice committee was also northern-agitated. "The American pattern of government as originally drawn is for such matters to be left up to the states," Stevenson said.

BODIES ARRIVE HOME.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 12.—While Yugoslavia's Marshal Tito bargained over identity payments, the bodies of five army airmen shot down by Tito's fighter planes arrived here by plane today for burial with full military honors.

St. Louis Upset Dodgers in Open-er Climax Series

NEW YORK, Sept. 12. (U.P.)—The rolling Red Birds of St. Louis delivered a telling blow to the pennant hopes of the Brooklyn Dodgers today, winning a 10 to 2, 14-hit decision in the opener of the climax series in the National League pennant battle.

Finns and Romanians Make Some Headway in Paris

PARIS, Sept. 12. (U.P.)—The Paris Peace Conference speeded up its work today and both the Finnish and Romanian political commissions completed work on all the treaty clauses assigned to them.

These were the first of the conference commissions to complete their work.

Except for very minor changes the commissions approved the treaty clauses as submitted by the Big Four. However, the military and economic clauses of the two treaties are being handled by other commissions so that the complete Finnish and Romanian treaties are not yet ready.

There are nine conference commissions in all.

POLICE CHARGE MOB.

LONDON, Sept. 12. (U.P.)—Mounted police tonight charged into a surging crowd of demonstrators outside the luxurious Abbey Lodge Apartment House that was occupied by squatters.

MOTHER NOT SATISFIED.

FT. WORTH, Sept. 12.—An irate mother was prevented from attacking W. W. Whitson, 60, after a jury in county court at law No 1 acquitted him on a charge of aggravated assault on her 11-year-old daughter. Officers restrained her.

3 US. Air Force Sergeants Finally Leave Belgrade

CASERTA, Sept. 12. (U.P.)—United States army officials said today that three U. S. air force sergeants, who had remained for seven months in the U. S. embassy in Belgrade, had arrived safely in Naples.

They had stayed within the embassy protection because the Yugoslavs denied them exit visas and wanted to question them about the slaying of a Russian soldier.

Yugoslavia finally agreed a fortnight ago that they were not implicated in the case.

CHINA'S DEBT.

The Chinese know a benefactor when they see one. They are planning to build a national library as a memorial to the late President Roosevelt.

That China survived the eight-year war with Japan at all is due to the steady support of the United States. Time and again the Japanese would have made peace with the United States on almost any terms we wanted, provided that we sold out China to them. Secretary of State Cordell Hull invariably refused.

Had not the war against Hitler taken priority, the full weight of American force would have turned on the Japanese long before 1945. But even at our lowest point of strength, we were able to keep the Japanese from over-running China. The fact that China is today a free and independent power, though harassed by Communist forces, is largely the result of Uncle Sam's money and efforts.

STEEL BARNS.

A barn in flames — struck by lightning — with the accompanying loss of grain or livestock or both, is a common result of a thunderstorm in the country. This hazard will be done away with if the modern farmer builds his barns and other buildings of steel.

The University of Wisconsin has made tests of steel farm buildings. After several years of use, the Agriculture School issued a favorable report on their suitability for dairy farms and corn and livestock farms. They can be insulated against heat and cold and are expected to outlast wood. Smaller buildings, such as sheds, granaries, and milk houses can be prefabricated, but it will be more practical to weld the larger structures on the site itself. Sprayed with paint, the insides of these structures will be as sanitary as hospitals.

These will be wonderful barns, from a practical standpoint, but they will never have the atmosphere of the old wooden buildings.


