O. R. Lawson Ex-Clayton Says Wallace Speech on U. S. Policy Wrong

"I guess you fellows wonder where I got this contraption," said O. R. Lamsons as he exhibited a Japanese aerial camera at the Rotary club luncheon yesterday, when he was presented by Rotarian Edward Lee, who had charge of the program.

Clayton Says Wallace Speech on U. S. Policy Wrong

WASHINGTON, Sept. 13. (U.P.)—Acting Secretary of State William L. Clayton suggested today that certain portions of Secretary of Commerce Henry A. Wallace's controversial speech on Russia were contrary to U. S. foreign policy as enunciated by Secretary of State James F. Byrnes.

He told a news conference that pronouncements by Byrnes still were American policy, notwithstanding the Wallace speech.

After further treatment, Jimmie Latson, 18-month-old son of Mr. and Mrs. J. H. Latson Jr., who was painfully burned in an unusual manner last week, will be as good as new.

The inquisitive young American was playing on the floor when he managed to place a live electric wire in his mouth, severely burning the lips, tongue, and gums.

He was taken to Baylor hospital, Dallas, for treatment and is now getting along nicely, the father stated this morning. However, a second trip to the hospital will be necessary for a job of plastic surgery.

BISHOPS DISAGREE

PHILADELPHIA, Sept. 13. — Bishops of Protestant Episcopal Church in the U. S. A. split today on the question of liberalizing church canons to permit divorced persons to remarry.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 13.—The national maritime strike, with CIO seamen replacing AFL men on the picket lines, entered its ninth paralyzing day today and hopes for an early final settlement faded considerably.

Godfrey Butler, labor relations director of the maritime commission urged the commission at an emergency session to end the crippling walkout by granting striking CIO seamen the same wage increases allowed AFL unions under last night's White House revision of stabilization policy.

But the commissioner decided to take the proposal under advisement and "await developments."

A spokesman indicated it first wanted to see whether the CIO unions and east coast ship operators would negotiate agreements matching the AFL pay scale before deciding to pay such wages on government vessels.

NMU President Joseph Curran also was cool, at the moment, to Butler's proposal, telling a New York mass meeting of rank and file members that it would have no immediate effect on the strike.

"When we get that down in black and white, with signatures on it, it may make a difference," he said.

"Until then, the strike goes on." He said that up to noon he had received no reply from the American Merchant Marine Institute, representing east coast operators, on his request for wage negotiations.

Curran has asked the AFL groups to honor the CIO picket lines in return for the courtesy shown AFL strikers during their eight-day walkout.

Everything At Paris Meeting Except Peace

PARIS, Sept. 13. (U.P.)—The peace conference today was shaken by bitter disputes in two commissions which produced a walkout by one British delegate and a motion of censure against a Russian presiding officer who walked out in the midst of angry shouting.

The first row broke in the military commission when Britain's A. V. Alexander, first lord of the admiralty, angrily walked out after a heated exchange with Soviet Major General Slavine over the right of Albania to present its views on the Italian treaty's military clauses.

A bit later the Bulgarian political commission broke up in a near riot when Kuzma B. Kisselev, White Russian chairman, adjourned the meeting instead of taking a vote on a British proposal as the commission members asked.

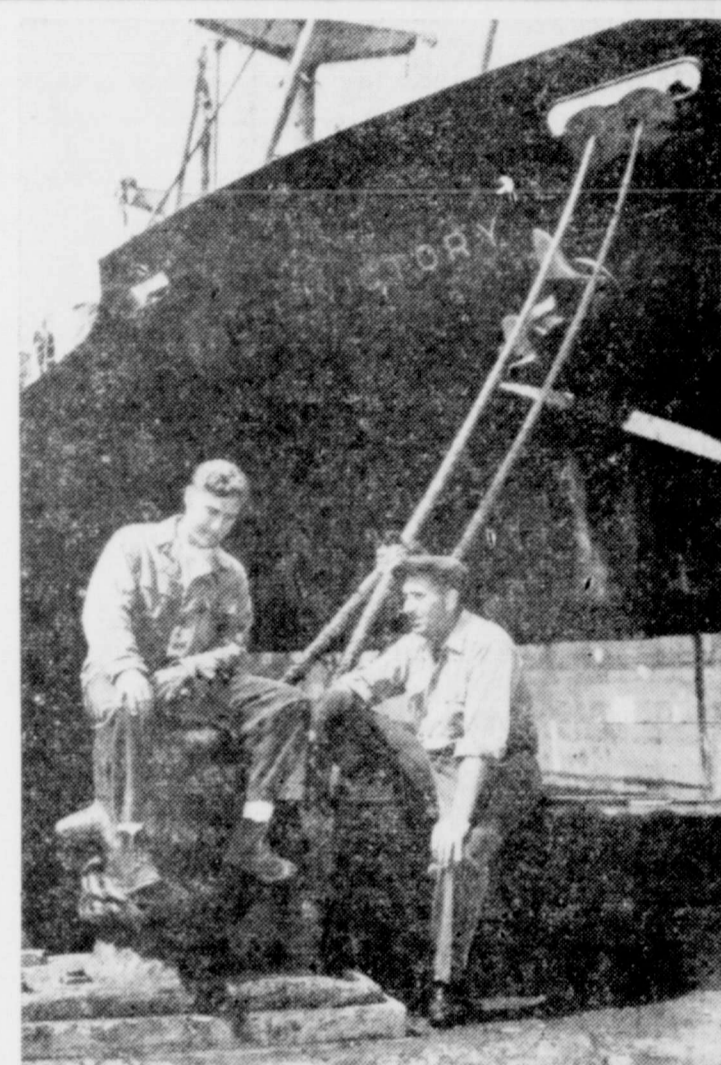
After Kisselev left the room eight of the 13 members of the commission took the unprecedented action of passing a motion of censure against him, asserting that his adjournment was improper and irregular.

Vets Survivors Can Get Social Security Help in N. Y. Speeches

A representative of the Abilene Social Security administration office will be at the following places soon for the purpose of assisting Eastland county residents with claims to be filed by survivors of World War II veterans who died after leaving the service:

Ranger, Retail Merchants association, Thursday, September 19, 1 p. m.

Eastland, United States Employment Service, Thursday, September 19, 1 p. m.

Cisco, Postoffice, Friday, September 20, 8:30 a. m.

Other retirement and death claims under the Social Security Act will also be handled, according to announcement made today by Ralph T. Fisher, manager of the Abilene office.

The 1946 amendments to the Social Security Act provide for the payment of monthly benefits or lump-sum payments to qualify survivors of veterans who die within three years of their discharge and whose dependents are not qualified to receive compensation or pension from the Veterans administration. National Service Life Insurance is not considered as compensation or pension. These special social security payments may be made regardless of whether the veteran had ever been employed in work coming under social security.

In the case of such veterans who died before the enactment of the new amendment, the measure provides for monthly benefits retroactive to the date of the veteran's death. If the survivors file their claims with the nearest office of the Social Security administration before midnight February 10, 1947.

Of course, monthly benefits other than retroactive are payable on claims filed at any time by qualified persons.

COLLEGE REGISTRATION.

R. F. Webb, registrar at Cisco Junior College, stated today that registration there would continue through Saturday morning. Additional students will be registered next week, Mr. Webb added.

NEGOTIATIONS OFF.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 13. (U.P.)—A split among soft coal operators today forced an indefinite suspension of government-sponsored wage contract negotiations two days after they started. The split developed between southern and northern operators.

Wallace Boed and Pepper Applauded in N. Y. Speeches

NEW YORK, Sept. 13. — Secretary of Commerce Wallace, was interrupted by boing and heckling in a White House approved speech at a Madison Square Garden rally last night where Senator Pepper of Florida was applauded for attacking our "blundering foreign policy."

The two men who have been on the same side in many foreign and domestic issues, spoke before an audience of 19,000 at a rally sponsored by the National Citizens Political Action Committee and the Independent Citizens Committee of the Arts, Sciences and Professions.

Wallace, who said the United States must adopt a clear and realistic policy of its own to avoid another war, first was greeted by hisses and hoots when he said he was "neither anti-British nor pro-British, neither anti-Russian nor pro-Russian," and added:

"Just two days ago, when President Truman read these words, he said they represented the policy of his administration."

Another round of heckling broke out when Wallace, speaking of Russia, said "her type of land reform, industrial expropriation and suppression of basic liberties offend the great majority of the people of the United States."

At this point Wallace laid aside his text and declared: "Well, it's true outside New York City, as any Gallup poll will show."

He resumed his speech and said "the Russians have no more business stirring up native Communists to political activity in western Europe, Latin America and the United States."

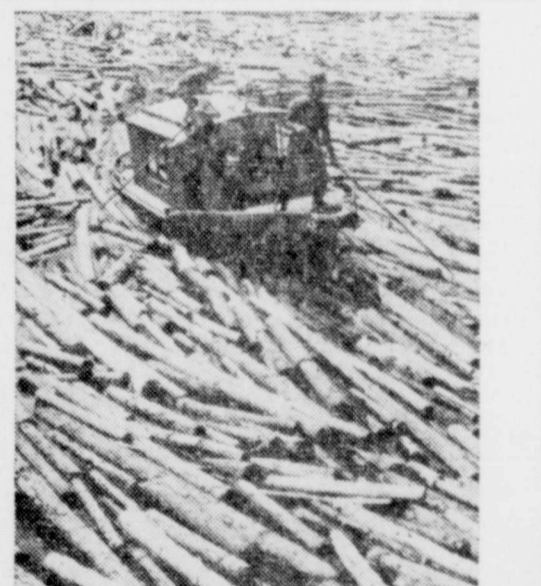
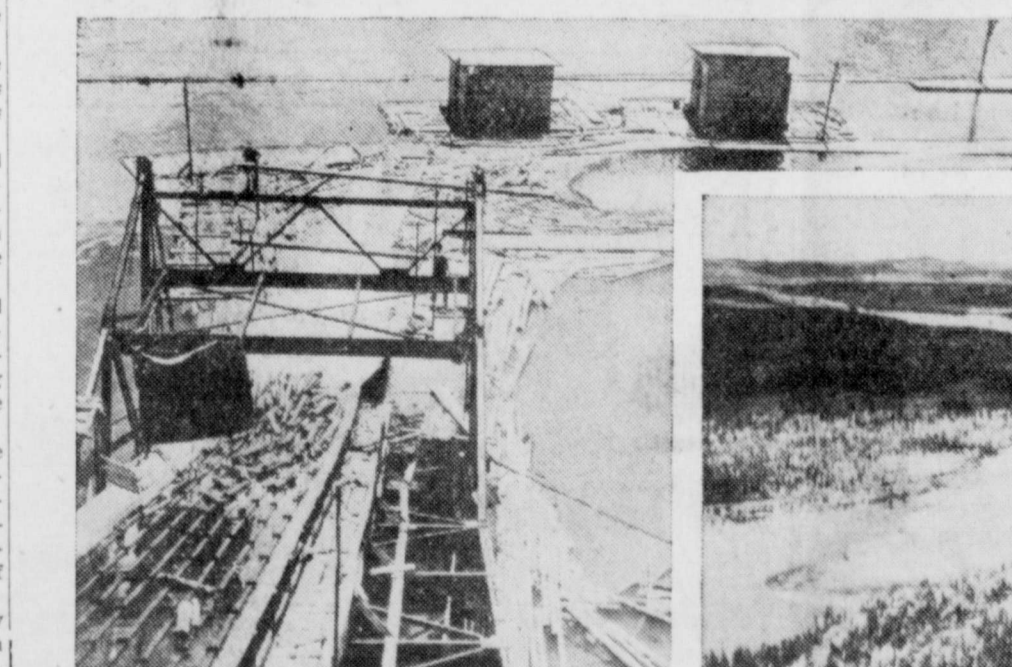
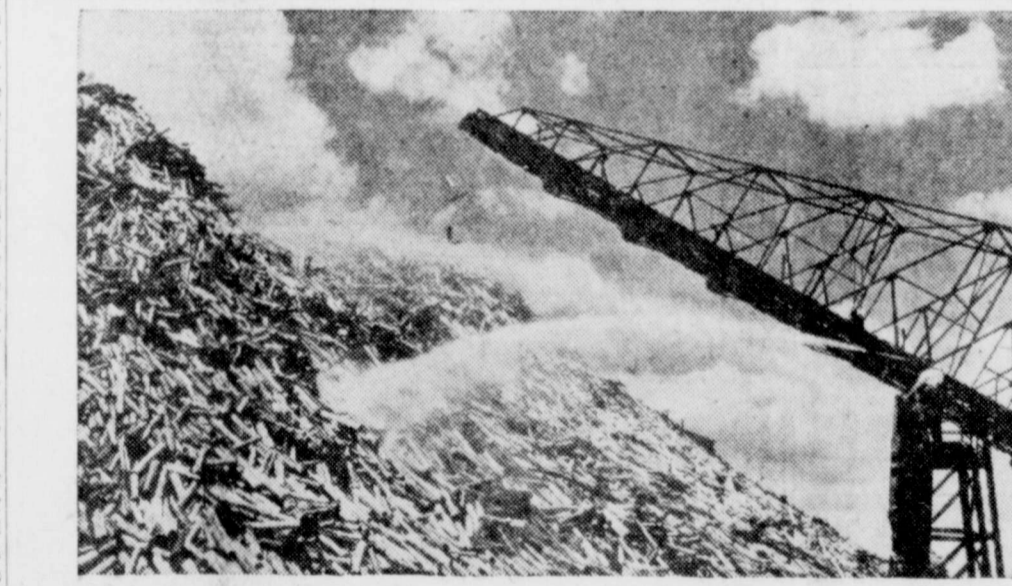
Loud hisses interrupted him and he shouted: "Get the whole sentence," adding to complete his remark, "than we have interfering in the politics of eastern Europe and Russia."

In contrast to the White House approval, Senator Pepper of Florida, in a speech preceding Wallace's at the rally indicated disagreement with his criticisms of the Soviet Union, and said:

"You and I know that today the reason we have got so much Republican unity behind the foreign policy is because there is so much McKinley imperialism in our foreign policy."

G. I. BLACK MARKET.

FRANKFURT, Sept. 13. (U.P.)—The United States army cracked down on the G. I. black market throughout Europe today, with orders for a three-day financial moratorium preceding the introduction of dollar-backed script.



LOGGING—Canada's number one manufacturing industry, pulp and paper products, gets into full swing during the summer and fall months. Lumberjacks spend all winter felling trees, trimming and storing them so that in good weather loggers can "sweep" rivers and streams to bring the precious lumber to the mills where it is processed. Working from four in the morning to nine at night, the logging crews this year are making a record drive to provide pulp and paper for publishing firms that were restricted during the war to amount of paper used. Canada boasts 82 pulp and paper companies, operating 108 mills. The industry employs 200,000. Capital investment of the combined interests is estimated at \$700,000,000. In the forests surrounding Lake Baskinong, lower right, lies the source of most of Canada's pulp. After the logs are hauled to the river they are gathered together or "boomed" into a "sack," upper right. A single tug will haul three or four "sacks" to the mill. Stockpiled for winter mill operation, upper left, the logs are wetted down to lessen fire hazard. Logs are conveyed from river to mill, lower left, by a traveling belt.
