HOUSTON, Tex., Sept. 18. — The walk-out of telephone workers in Houston will spread over a five state area "in a very short time" unless a settlement of the seniority controversy is reached, a union spokesman said today.

15 Ships Cleared New York Ports With AFL Today

NEW YORK, Sept. 18. (AP) — The National Maritime Union—CIO—reaffirmed today its intention not to make the first move toward reopening negotiations with shipowners in an effort to end the nation's 14-day-old shipping strike. Harry Bridges, co-chairman of the committee for maritime unity, which includes the NMU, said after a two-hour NMU meeting that there was little likelihood of a change in the union policy "until the shipowners reverse their refusal to allow the NMU to represent the committee for maritime unity."

WINTER CLOSING IN.
DENVER, Sept. 18. — Snow blanketed the mountain peaks today as winter began closing in on the Rockies. Along the mountain ranges of Colorado, Wyoming and Montana, the U. S. weather bureau reported heavy snow was general above 7,000 feet elevation. Light snow also was falling at many lower points.

BUTCHER SHOPS CLOSE.
CHICAGO, Sept. 18. — Lack of fresh meat since retail price controls were reestablished on Sept. 9 has resulted in the closing of at least 36,000 of the nation's butcher shops, says the national association of retail meat dealers.

WALLACE, TRUMAN IN SHOWDOWN

WASHINGTON, Sept. 18. — Sec. of Commerce Henry A. Wallace, faced with the prospect of a shut-up or quit edict, seemed today to be standing firm on his right to say what he pleases on foreign policy as a member of the cabinet. Wallace is scheduled to see President Truman this afternoon in what may be a showdown talk. Close associates of Wallace said emphatically that Wallace was not going to the White House without an intention of resigning. However, he would have to resign if Mr. Truman asked him to do so.

A liberal Democratic senator said that he understood Wallace planned to resign. Pending the meeting, a spokesman for Wallace said he thought the secretary would have no objection to giving Acting Sec. of State William Clayton an advance look at Wallace's scheduled foreign policy speech at Providence, R. I., next Tuesday night.

OPA Wants Re-control of All Dairy Products

WASHINGTON, Sept. 18. (AP)—Price Administrator Paul Porter said today that immediate re-control of dairy products is essential to the government's stabilization program.

Porter presented his views in a letter to the price decontrol board, which met today to review evidence on whether milk, butter, cheese and other dairy products should be put back under price ceilings.

The board is considering written evidence, which it invited. No oral hearings will be held. A decision is expected tomorrow or Friday.

Texarkana Mayor Who Aired Bribe Was Re-elected

TEXARKANA, Sept. 18. — W. N. Harkness, who resigned after accusing three other members of the city council of taking bribes, was re-elected over three opponents in yesterday's municipal election here.

The vote was Harkness 865, Ralston Crowder 792, William B. Brown 611, and Jimmie Alexander 582.

Luther McClure, Clyde L. Bane and Bruce Cunningham were elected aldermen. They replace Albert McWilliams, Harry L. Everett Jr. and Lee Talley, who are under indictment, charged variously with bribery, accepting a bribe or consenting to accept a bribe.

GIANT PLANE MISSING.

NEW YORK, Sept. 18. (AP)—A giant transatlantic plane carrying 44 persons was missing today, and reports to the coast guard here indicated it might have crashed near Gander, Newfoundland, while coming in to land there after a flight from Shannon, Eire.

"Union heads in Texas and in Missouri, Kansas, Arkansas and Oklahoma and parts of Illinois are awaiting only a request from us to join the walkout," Mrs. Jewel Whatley, general commercial chairman for the five-state union district, said.

Her announcement came during a noon recess of a "continuous meeting" of more than 1,500 members of the Southwestern Telephone Workers Union—Ind. Sessions were to be resumed this afternoon.

Richard Anderson 19, is Recent Addition to Army

Richard Anderson of 711 West Seventh street, Cisco, has enlisted in the regular army for a period of 18 months, says First Sgt. Monroe Fuller of the Eastland County Recruiting office.

Anderson is 19 years of age and was born and reared in Cisco. He graduated from Cisco high school in 1944. Later he spent two years at Texas Tech, where he majored in commercial art and played in the band.

Sergeant Fuller says the opportunities offered by the army attracted the Cisco boy, who expects to continue his art work while serving his enlistment. After discharge he plans to resume his college work under the GI bill of rights.

People Seek Rest in N. Y. Subways; Hotels Crowded

NEW YORK, Sept. 18. — What hotel men call the worst hotel crisis in New York City's history was disclosed today by a survey of hotels, YM and YWCA's and even Turkish baths.

The Travelers' Aid Society said the influx of visitors to the city had gone "out of control," and that large hotels were booked solid for a month, small hotels for at least a week. Turkish baths were being used and persons even were seeking refuge in subways and railroad stations.

Liquor Board In-C. J. Turner and come Over 17 Mil-Gene Haynes Now lion During Year Own Edwards Cafe

AUSTIN, Sept. 18.—The State Liquor control board reports that it collected \$17,207,784 during the fiscal year ended Aug. 31, an increase of \$3,485,870 from the year before.

Expenditures increased from \$774,264 to \$843,714 in the same two years. Principal increase in the board's income came from sale of liquor tax stamps. This tax brought \$11,712,451 in the year just closed, a gain of \$2,579,907.

The board also reported a decrease in the number of stills seized. The only seizure in August was a still in Titus county. It was the smallest haul of moonshiners reported by liquor agents in many months.

IT MIGHT HELP.

AUSTIN, Sept. 18. —Gov. Coke Stevenson today proclaimed the week of Oct. 6 as Optimist Week in Texas. He praised the work of the Optimist club of the United States, Canada and Puerto Rico, which he said were established to promote a friendly spirit of cooperation and far-reaching service through the exercise of practical and realistic optimism.

The Edwards Cafe, 709 D avenue, owned and operated for the past 18 years by Mr. and Mrs. Earl Edwards, has been sold to Carlos J. Turner and Gene Haynes, brothers-in-law, who took charge several days ago. The sale included the brick building that houses the cafe.

Plans of Mr. and Mrs. Edwards have not been announced, but Cisco friends hope they will remain here.

Mr. Turner is well and favorably known to Cisco people, he having been connected with the city schools for several years. For the past two years he was registrar of Cisco Junior College, but resigned that position during this year's vacation period.

Mr. and Mrs. Haynes came here from Breckenridge, where he was manager for the Piggly Wiggly grocery following his discharge last November from the army air corps, where he had served for some three years. Cisco welcomes them as new residents and property owners.

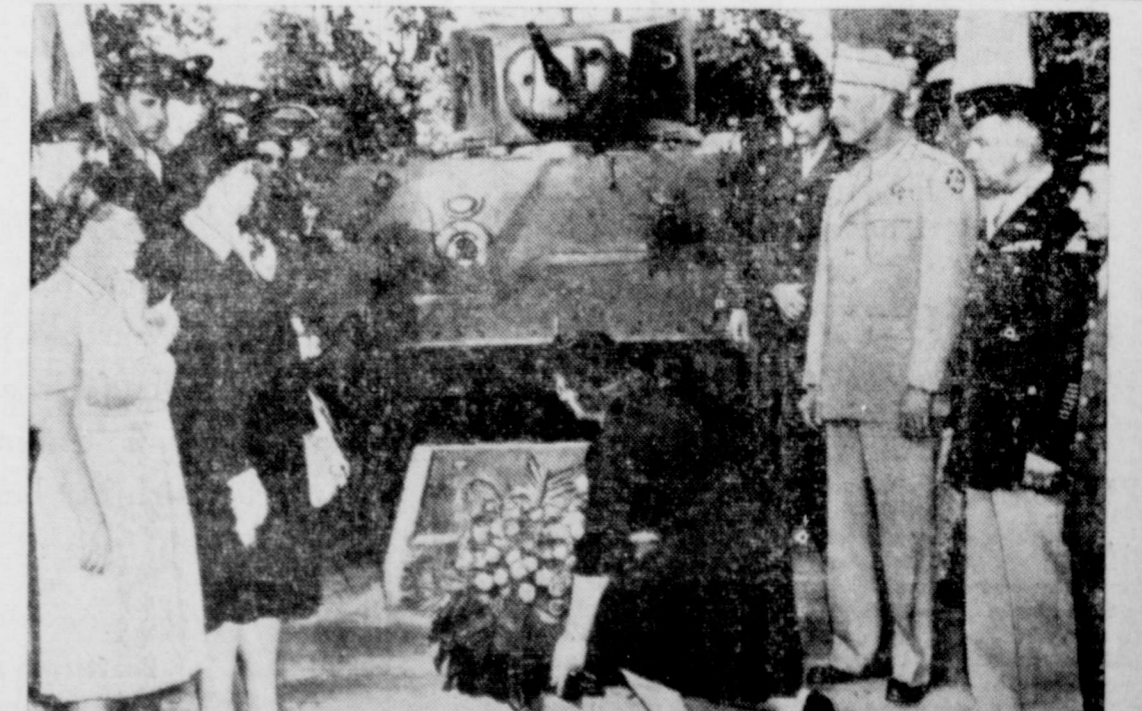
Mr. Turner told the Daily Press that numerous improvements are planned at the cafe, as fast as materials can be secured.

DISINTEGRATION.

The new deal is dead. Most of what is going on in the United States today is proof of it. The new deal is dead and the bones are falling apart. The disintegration is taking place before the unbelieving eyes of millions who have marched uphill and down and through the sloughs of chaos itself behind the most seductive cadenzas that ever a Pied Piper piped. The pipe is gone and the pipe is forever stilled. But the chaos is on every hand.

Chaos Unincorporated. The really encouraging thing about chaos is that it won't work. And higher wages for not working soon bring the blinding realization that higher wages that won't buy anything are too something or other. A pocket full of wages on the outside of a butcher's showcase with no bacon on the inside is bulging, jingling proof that the prophets of the New Jerusalem have been gargling empty words, after all.

New Jerusalem Jitters. You ask what is wrong with the stock market? That's easy — it has the New Jerusalem jitters, the same as the rest of the country has. You don't believe it, Mr. Liberal? All right, where are you getting your steak, or your bacon, or your new car, or your house paint, or your winter suit of clothes?

The New Jerusalem promised freedom from want, freedom from fear, freedom from this and freedom from that. But everybody is scared of tomorrow. You're scared yourself and you don't know why. Don't you really know? It's simple. You're scared because you can't turn on your radio and listen to somebody tell you what to do. The voice of the New Jerusalem is gone. And New Jerusalem is working up like home-brew in old bottles. It's popping all over the place.

New Jerusalem never was run according to the rules. The rules were the newest part of it, anyhow. Fresh rules every time there was a fresside talk. Fresh rules to win the game and throw out the umpire — that was the palm of palms in the New Jerusalem that got old and fell apart.

America has forgotten all about rules, but it remembers the part about throwing out the umpire. The striking women remember it, so they throw out the umpire and so, who do you suppose it was that threw out OPA? The people did. OPA comes back and is being thrown out again.

Henry Wallace is not a great and ominous first cause — he is just a symptom — just a bubble on the homebrew of improvised lawlessness and insubordination to law and constitutional authority. The head of the new deal himself regarded it as a revolution. And his understrappers regarded themselves as inspired and bloodless Danton and Robespierres and Lafayette. Wallace still dreams of the revolution. That is why he loves the Russians who operate with the torture chamber and the firing squad. That is why he distrusts the British New Jerusalem same regimes.

But revolutions won't make automobiles very well. Revolutions won't cut down trees for sawmills and work them up into lumber and finally into homes and places of business and steady employment. No work for more pay defeats itself. When labor bulldozes management you get ill-management or no management at all. A subsidized farm soon comes to regard subsidy as the most important crop. A legislative endeavor devoted to giving everybody special privileges winds up with privileges for nobody and chaos for all.

Getting the Cart Before the Horse... is the popular way of saying that we act before we think. It is a state of mind not confined to the ignorant, nor to the mentally ill, but to all classes of people, some at times, others at all times. For instance, we buy property without an abstract. We spend several thousand dollars for improvements. Along comes a buyer who thinks before he acts and offers to purchase but wants an abstract first. How about your title, Mr. Seller? Can you deliver?

ROYAL PURPLE SCORES AGAIN

Grapes taste equally delicious in jellies, jams, conserves or butters and you can use them speeded or bland to suit your fancy. Now doesn't that speak well for their versatility?

Of course we still can't make all the sweet spreads we want and need, but what we do make can, and should, represent the very best there is to have. And, thanks to short boil recipes and sugar saving natural fruit pectin, this is quite possible. Try these new recipes and see if you don't agree.

GRAPE JELLY:
2 1/2 cups juice
2 1/2 cups sugar
4 1/2 tablespoons (1/2 package) powdered fruit pectin
To prepare the juice, stem about 2 pounds fully ripe grapes and crush thoroughly. (Concord grapes give best color and flavor.) Add 1 cup water, bring to a boil and simmer, covered, 15 minutes. Place in jelly cloth or bag and squeeze out juice. Measure 2 1/2 cups juice into a large saucepan. To make the jelly, measure sugar and set aside. Place saucepan holding juice over high heat. Add powdered fruit pectin and stir until mixture comes to a hard boil. Add sugar at once. Bring to a full rolling boil and boil hard 1/2 minute, stirring constantly. Remove from heat, skim, pour quickly into glasses. Paraffin at once. Makes about 6 six-ounce glasses.

GRAPE JAM:
2 1/2 cups prepared fruit
2 1/2 cups sugar
1/4 cup bottled fruit pectin
To prepare the fruit, slip skins from about 2 pounds fully ripe loose-skinned grapes. (Concord grapes give best color and flavor.) Bring pulp to a boil and simmer, covered, 5 minutes. Sieve to remove seeds. Chop or grind skins and add to pulp. Measure 2 1/2 cups into a large saucepan. To make the jam, add sugar to fruit in saucepan and mix well. Place over high heat, bring to a full rolling boil, and boil hard 2 minutes, stirring constantly. Remove from heat and stir in bottled fruit pectin. (Squeeze off bottled fruit pectin from measuring cup.) Then stir and skim by turns for 3 minutes to cool slightly, to prevent floating fruit. Pour quickly into glasses. Paraffin at once. Makes about 6 six-ounce glasses.

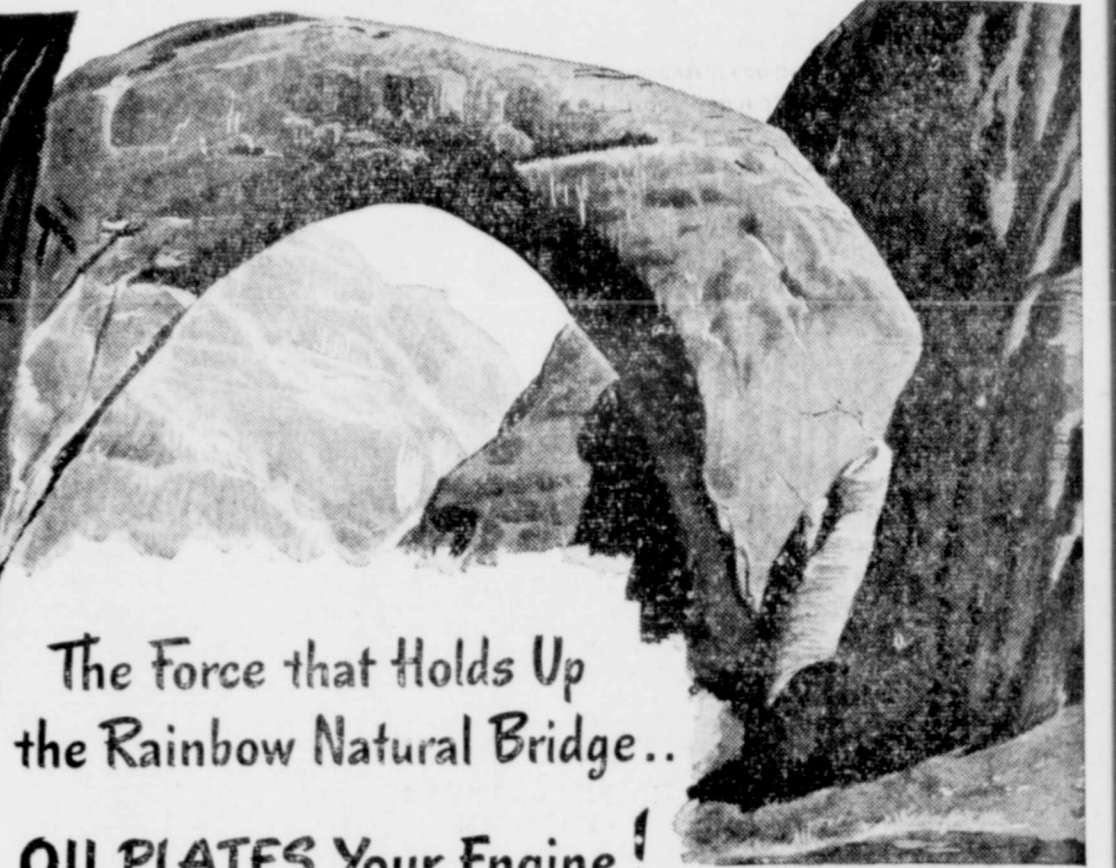

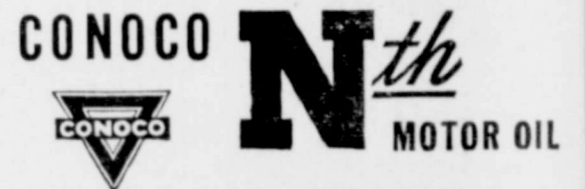
