Nazi War Criminals Must Die Wednesday -- Gallows

By United Press.

BERLIN, Oct. 10. — The Allied control council tonight denied all the clemency appeals it received from the Nazi war criminals, sealing the doom of those scheduled to die on the gallows next Wednesday.

In a blanket rejection of the appeals, the council denied those on behalf of 11 Nazi leaders sentenced to death and refused to reduce the prison terms of five others.

The four-power council was the last recourse of the Nazis convicted at Nuernberg. Thus the refusal of the appeals crushed the last hope of the war criminals for any reduction of sentence.

The council specifically rejected the pleas of Hermann Goering, Alfred Jodl and Wilhelm Keitel to be shot rather than sentenced to the more ignominious death on the gallows.

No Action is Imminent in Serious Meat Situation

WASHINGTON, Oct. 10. (U.P.)—President Truman said today that no action is imminent in the meat situation.

He also told a news conference that the group of cabinet members and government experts who have been seeking a solution to the meat shortage would confer again at the White House late this afternoon.

The president said he himself might join the conference if necessary.

He said he would receive a report from this group when it had decided on a program and he would announce it then.

The statement was said to have been made by General Wainwright in an interview last Saturday, during which he expressed belief that student veterans were getting sufficient subsistence pay.

He was quoted in the Texan editorial as saying: "If the veteran needs more money, he should be working instead of complaining and remaining useless to society."

Flights Over Red Areas Halted By U. S. Military

LONDON, Oct. 10. — Pan-American Airways announced today that it had halted all service to middle Europe after a U. S. military order forbidding flights over Czechoslovakia or Russian-controlled territory in Hungary, Roumania, Germany and Austria.

"Until further clarification of the situation," the airline said, "all Pan American services to middle Europe will be halted in Brussels."

The statement said a Pan-American clipper from Prague to Vienna was turned back Wednesday by U. S. military orders which said that no civil or military aircraft would be permitted to fly over Czech or Russian-controlled territory in Hungary or Roumania from Oct. 9 to 14.

ENVOY LEAVES MOSCOW.

MOSCOW, Oct. 10. — U. S. Ambassador Walter Bedell Smith and his wife departed by plane today for Paris, where Smith will attend Romanian treaty discussions. He will fly to Washington before returning to Moscow.

CHAMPAGNE PARTIES?

SEATTLE, Oct. 10. (U.P.)—Sens. Warren G. Magnuson and Hugh B. Mitchell, D. Wash., asked today for an investigation of charges that American officers in Germany had been entertained at champagne parties by the wives of some of the men tried at Nuernberg as war criminals.

WAGE BOARD STALLED.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 10. (U.P.)—Public members of the wage stabilization board were called to the White House today to discuss establishment of an all-public board to administer wage controls. The wage board has ordered a halt in processing the more than 2,000 cases pending before it here and at its 11 regional boards until a new board is established or other action is taken. The board cannot function with only public and labor members.

REPUBLICANS BUSY.

FORT WORTH, Oct. 10. — Eugene Nolte Jr., Republican candidate for governor, takes his campaign into West Texas today. He plans to visit Wichita Falls and Paducah today and San Angelo on Friday. Nolte is accompanied by his campaign manager, Judge C. K. McDowell of Del Rio. He said he expects Frank A. Blankenbecker of Austin (formerly of Cisco), Republican candidate for the railroad commission, to join him today.

SENATOR'S SISTER.

WACO, Oct. 10. — Funeral services were held here today for Mrs. Amanda Connally Smith, 74, sister of United States Senator Tom Connally. Mrs. Smith, a native of Waco, died Tuesday night at the home of a daughter, Mrs. James E. Robertson of Dallas, where she made her home for the last five years.

CIO Meat Workers Appeal to Department of Justice

WASHINGTON, Oct. 10. (U.P.)—The United Packinghouse Workers' CIO—today asked the justice department to investigate whether big meat packers and chain grocery stores are holding 800,000 head of beef cattle off the market and keeping them in feed lots in Iowa, Nebraska, Indiana and Kansas.

The justice department has been investigating the meat situation for several months.

Officials reported earlier this week that no evidence had been found of collusive withholding.

GUIDED MISSILE MENACE.

CHICAGO, Oct. 10. (U.P.)—Secretary of War Robert P. Patterson said today a guided missile with a range far greater than the German long-range rockets is a probability in a matter of months.

U.S. C. OF C. SAYS REDS HAVE BORED DEEPLY INTO TREASURY, LABOR DEPTS

WASHINGTON, Oct. 10. — The United States Chamber of Commerce, charging that Communists have infiltrated into the government and have driven many faithful public servants out of it, demanded last night that the Communist party be forced to disclose its membership and finances.

The lengthy report, prepared by the chamber's committee on Socialism and Communism, named specifically the Treasury and Labor Departments as agencies into which Reds have bored.

The report, made public after its acceptance by the chamber's board of directors, also declared that Communists have infiltrated into labor unions. It asserted that two of the "top advisers of the CIO Political Action Committee are Communists," taking direct and frequent orders from the very top levels of the Communist party.

Agent of Foreign Power.

It denounced the Communist party as an agent of a foreign power "constantly professing hostility toward us."

Under a barrage of questions from nearly a half hundred newsmen at a press conference, Frances P. Matthews, Omaha, Neb., attorney and chairman of the committee, refused to disclose sources for his information. Nor would he name persons referred to in the report.

"Obviously," he said, "we can't in justice to our informants disclose their identity."

He insisted, however, that the sources for the committee's charges were accurate and dependable.

The report also recommended:

1. "Since Communism thrives upon deceit, exposure of the facts would be a potent counterweapon. We propose more fact-gathering, competent, impartial and patriotic. Both private groups and the government have a responsibility here."
2. "In the labor field, Communism thrives primarily through organization and discipline. Labor unions and noneconomic groups, not directly interested in labor's relations with capital, should encourage labor education. This would give the non-Communist majority the training needed to fight their disciplined opponents."

Stiff Deal With Reds.

5. "In view of the revelation of party activities throughout the world, the United States should enforce strict reciprocity with the Soviet Union in regard to the number and freedom of movement of nationals of either country within the other."

6. "Our government should follow a policy of frankness with its citizens in regard to the major facts which enter into the making of our foreign policy."

3. "The businessman, heavily pre-occupied with business problems, should concern himself more with the problems of government and should make certain that he learns to detect Communist influence in his labor relations, his business, and other contacts."

4. "Because Communist loyalty is primarily given to a foreign power, Communists and their followers should be excluded from government service. Congress should appropriate adequate funds for a stringent but fair loyalty test."

On the cover of the pamphlet containing the report was printed a red hammer and sickle dangling from a string and casting its shadow over an outline of the United States.

When a reporter for the New York newspaper PM asked who was at the other end of the string, Matthews replied: "It may be you."

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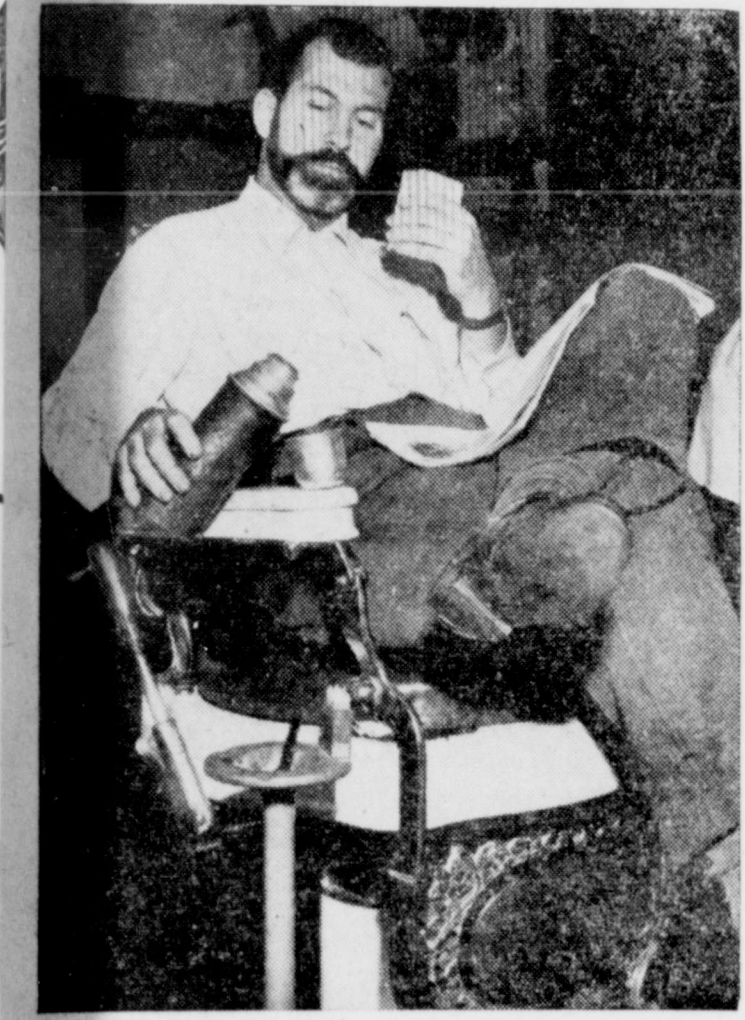

DALLAS WHOLESALE CREDIT MEN SEE BACK TO NORMAL BUSINESS TREND IN SOUTHWESTERN TRADE

DALLAS, Oct. 10. — Dallas wholesale credit circles Wednesday reported a leveling-off trend in Southwestern trade.

Simultaneously, a business economist said this tendency was offsetting inflation on the one hand and probably was preventing severe depression on the other.

Four wholesale credit men reported the following factors in the Southwestern picture, and said each had become more pronounced within the last month:

1.—A noticeable slowing of the pay habits of retailers; more accounts going past maturity; an increased number of requests for special credit terms.

2.—A growing choosiness on the part of retailers in acceptance of goods ordered in quantity when supplies were short. While there were shortages, retailers were ordering heavily in an effort to keep stock on hand. Now there is a trend toward canceling orders, particularly for light consumer goods on which supply is beginning to approach demand.

3.—A decline in the number of orders placed for future deliveries.

4.—Increased attention to selling to retailers. Competition was reported returning to the distribution system.

Retailers said they were experiencing a small decline in percentage of collections, but not an alarming change.

Retailers also reported a decline in cash transactions, an increase in requests for credit and an increase in installment buying.

Paul Kerin, secretary-manager of the Dallas Wholesale Credit Men's Association, said the slowdown in wholesale collections was particularly noticeable in comparison with six months ago. He said whereas many merchants had been paying cash for all goods, there recently was a steady shift to credit.

Herman T. Biar, credit manager for the Schoellkopf Company, said that although accounts were beginning to go past maturity, the situation "was not particularly rough yet." He reported a marked increase in "choosiness" of merchants in connection with accept-

orders placed for future deliveries.

OTHER EDITORS

On Solid Ground.
Dallas News: President T. S. Painter of the University of Texas is on solid ground in his statement to the faculty of that institution that the controversy there be dropped because the people of Texas have spoken. If Dr. Painter is accused of attempting to settle university issues on a political basis, then attention may be called to the fact that it was former President Homer P. Rainey who originally took the issue to the people who turned him down in two decisive defeats at the polls. And, some finespun academic theorizing to the contrary notwithstanding, the University of Texas belongs to the people and it should comply with the mandates of the majority.

Certainly there are principles that should be fought for in the face of majority decisions, and even in the face of death. Academic freedom is one of these things. Dr. Painter would not deny this. Neither would that part of the faculty that will be favorable to Dr. Painter's statement. The issue at the university is not over the suppression of academic freedom. It is the issue of whether academic freedom is being suppressed. This is the issue that Dr. Rainey took to the people. This is the issue on which they turned him down.

In his statement Dr. Painter warns against any attempts on the part of "individuals or small groups within our staff unjustly to besmirch the good reputation of the university or to retard its progress."

This seems to be an implication, though it may not be, that there

are individuals and small groups who have been doing so.

Dr. Painter also asks for a closed book on past events of the controversy. This is logical on the ground that the board of regents has removed whatever of restraints on academic freedom that may have existed in the past. If such restraints exist today, then action by any individual or group of individuals to lay the facts before the public would not come under Dr. Painter's definition of attempting "unjustly to besmirch the good reputation of the university or to retard its progress."

If the controversy is continued, then there should be more than taking notice by university authorities. There should be a full and fair nonpartisan investigation of the whole university situation. Such a step might be unfortunate in that it would lower university prestige in the academic circles of the country, but that would be secondary to the need of giving the people of Texas the full facts about a situation that is depriving them of part of the functioning of a university of the first class after they have invested sufficient money to obtain one.

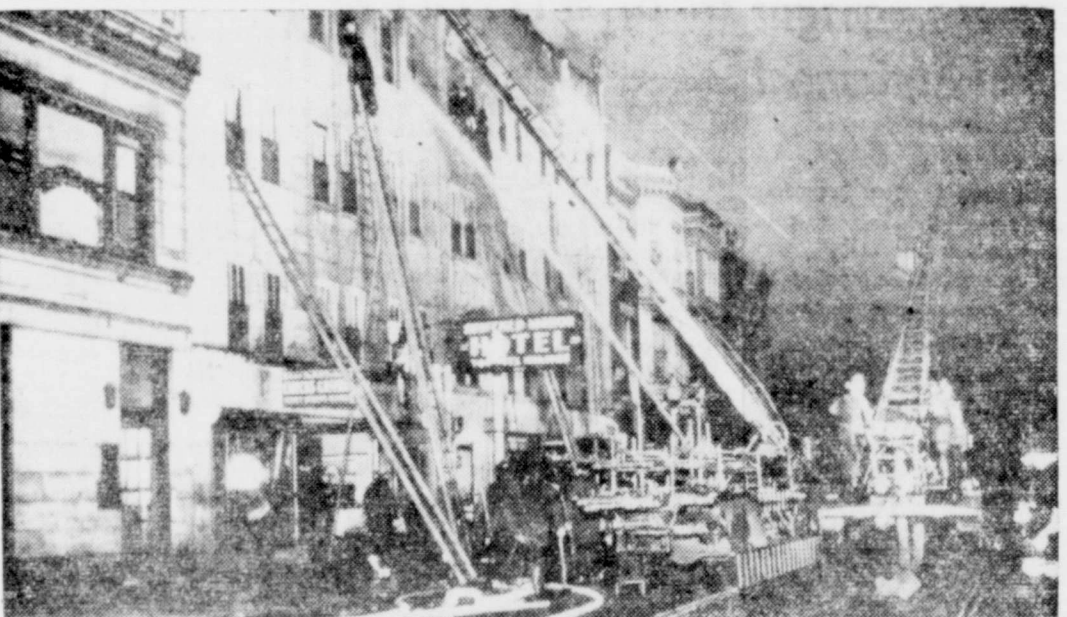

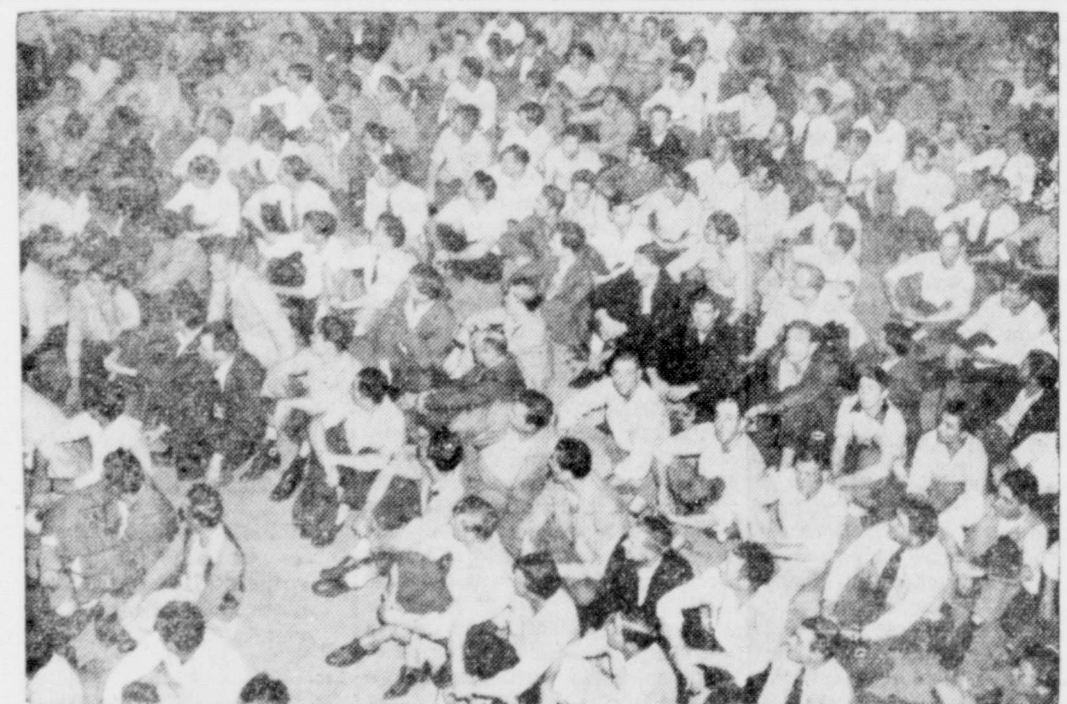

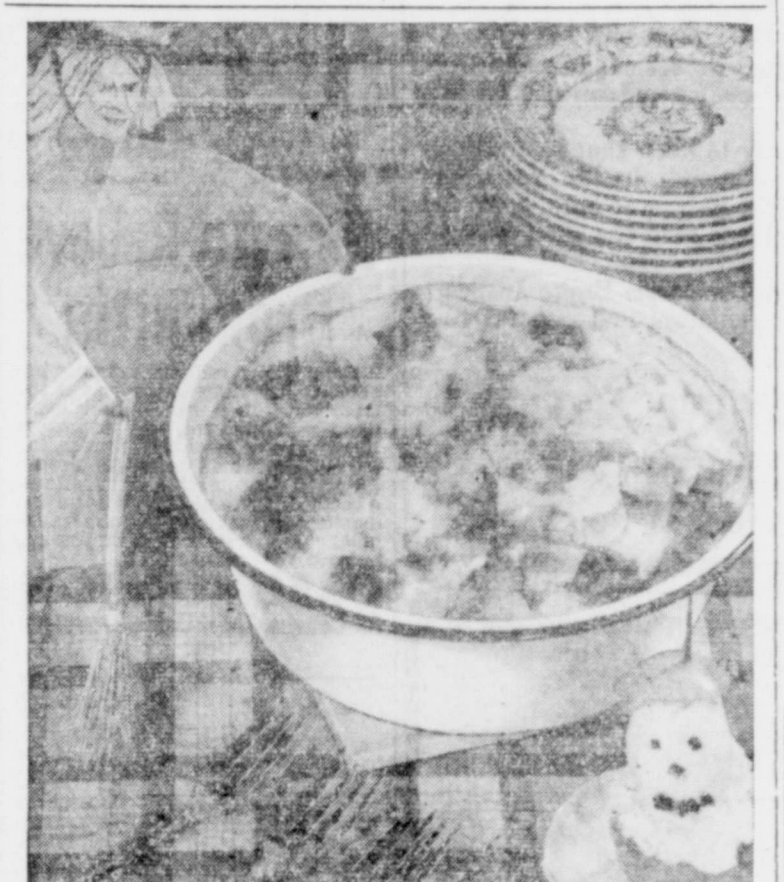
