# Voters answer 'fire call'

By a margin of almost 3-1, Dimmitt voters Saturday approved a \$100,000 bond issue to build a new fire station.

A TOTAL of 282 residents cast votes in the election, with 206 voting for and 76 voting against. Of the city's property taxpayers who voted, 188 okayed the issue and 63 voted no. Eighteen non-property owners approved the issue, with 13 against. The election results will be sent to Attorney General Crawford Martin for final approval, according to City Manager E. B. Noble.

THEN A 30-day wait is required by law before further action can be taken by the city, Noble said. The waiting period is in case an election is contested.

The city commission met Monday morning and canvassed the vote.

After the 30-day waiting period ends, Noble said, the city could proceed with selling the bonds and letting the contract for construction of the fire station.

THE CITY will issue \$100,000 in general obligation bonds to finance the purchase of the old First Baptist Church educational building on West Bedford and convert it to a city fire station.

A 2,300 sq. ft. garage annex will be added to the present building. The second floor of the building will be converted into apartments for the fire marshal and another fireman. The ground floor of the building will be used for meeting rooms, storage and additional garage and working space.

## Lock up pushers, Barnes says

Lt. Gov. Ben Barnes drew his biggest applause here last Wednesday when he advocated 20-year mandatory prison sentences for all convicted drug pushers in Texas.

THE CROWD of 100—including 300 juniors and high school students at the field trip—cheered when Barnes said, "I'm in favor of a 20-year minimum prison term for anyone convicted of selling drugs, with no chance of parole. If Texas becomes the toughest state in the union on pushers, they're not going to stay here and take the chance of going to prison for 20 years."

Barnes earlier was interrupted by applause when he said, "I'm not for legalizing marijuana." Then he continued, "I'm also not for sending a young person to prison for being caught with a marijuana cigarette for the first time. I'm for going after the pusher."

The young lieutenant governor, his red hair rippling under the rigors of a Plains dust

storm, touched down by helicopter on the courthouse square's west parking lot at 2 p.m. Accompanying him were Dallas Cowboys stars Bob Lilly and Walt Garrison—who were mobbed by youngsters before and after Barnes' speech—along with State Representative Bill Clayton of Springlake.

BARNES'S visit here was one of a dozen or more small-town touchdowns in a "whirlwind visit" to the Panhandle-Plains by helicopter.

Barnes kicked off his speech here with a position statement on water importation to West Texas.

"We need to bring water to insure the agricultural future of this area, and provide enough water for the industrial growth of this area," Barnes said.

NOTING THAT the Texas governorship is a ceremonial position "without much power unless he has the experience to influence the legislative leaders," Barnes claimed, "My 18 years' experience will help get the water plan through."

Barnes earned his credentials in farm problems, he said, by spending his boyhood on a small farm near DeLeon. "You can't get any more rural or more agricultural than growing up on a peanut farm at DeLeon, Texas," he commented.

On state taxes, Barnes said, "All the other candidates are saying there will be no new taxes if they're elected. If we have no new taxes by 1973, every teacher in Texas will have to take a \$200 cut in salary."

AFTER HIS brief speech, Barnes called for questions, and answered with these stands:

On education: "President Nixon has proposed a national sales tax to finance education. I'm opposed to his plan. If all moneys come from Washington you're not going to have local control of the public schools. 'We've got to spend more money on vocational/technical training. Too much emphasis is being placed on a college

education."

On welfare: "I'm for a welfare program that would make it mandatory for every person who is able to work, to work."

ON the Sharpstown scandal: "I'm the only state official of the top elected ones who was never called to testify. Why? Because I never knew Frank Sharp. I had nothing to do with writing the Sharp bank bills."

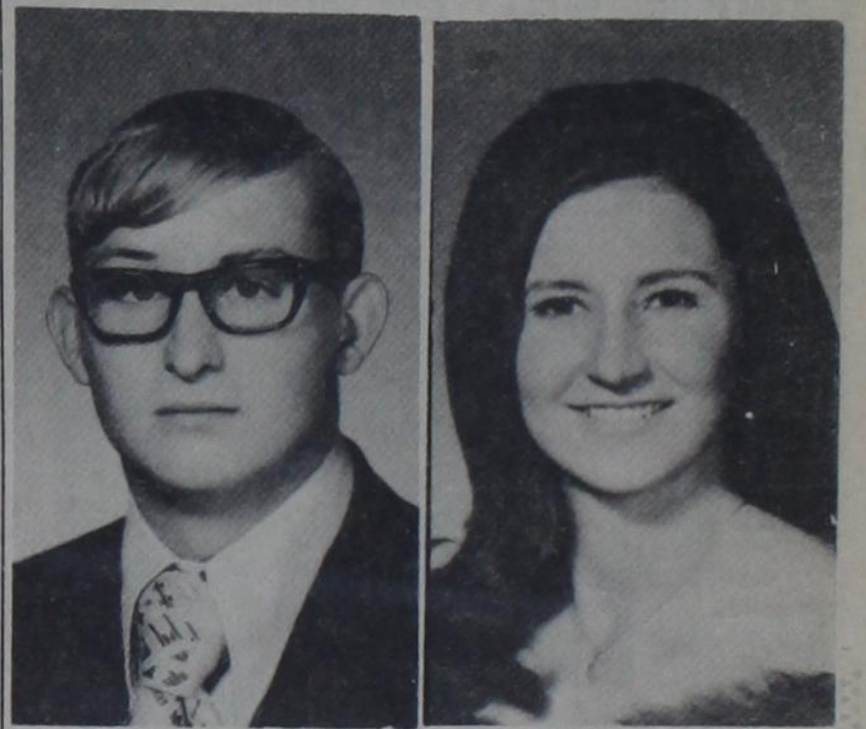
"There was nothing wrong with the Sharp bills on paper. It's just that a couple of our officials knew Frank Sharp and knew what the motive was behind the bills."

On farm and ranch land taxes: "If we evaluate agricultural land at market value,

we'll destroy the producer. Ben Barnes, who owns 385 acres of peanut land in Comanche County, is better qualified to speak on agricultural tax problems than is the largest land-holder in the state of Texas."

BARNES'S local campaign workers were elated at the turnout for the lieutenant governor's speech here.

"I would like to thank all the Castro County citizens who came out to welcome our lieutenant governor," said Bob DuLaney, Barnes' county campaign manager. "It is a good thing to have such an enthusiastic crowd on hand when one of our state officials takes the time to visit our county."

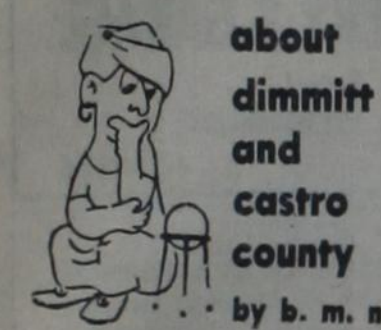

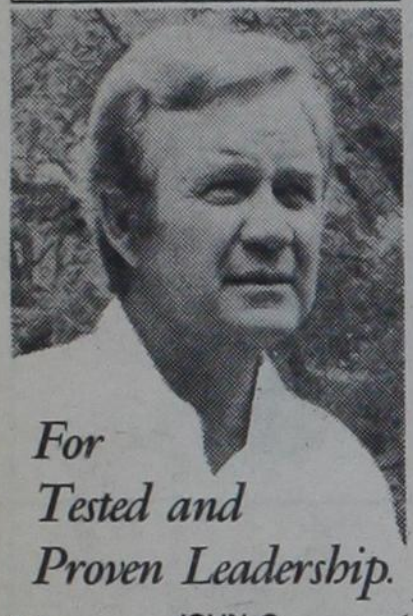

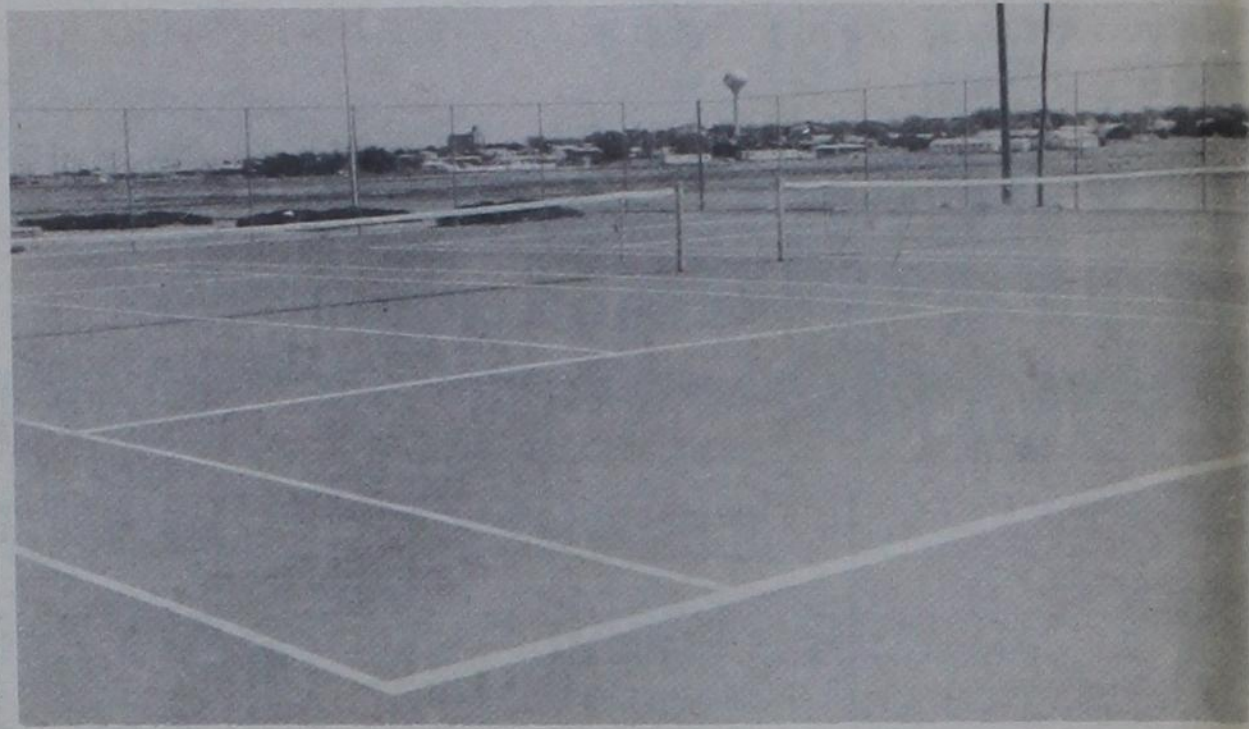

#### A Big Point of Difference

For far longer than many people can remember, George Burger, the senior vice president of the National Federation of Independent Business, one of the most respected spokesmen on Capitol Hill, has warned of the economic evils of dual distribution.

This term dual distribution refers to the practice of a manufacturer also owning and operating retail outlets in competition with independent retailers of his products.

In economic trend developments, the evils that are prophesied often do not become evident until some later time. The financial distress to the tune of some \$30 million dollars that hit Botany Industries is a case that proves Burger's thesis.

For many years Botany has held a well deserved reputation for turning out men's tailored clothing, employing American labor, and still putting out good, sound merchandise at prices giving good values.

Then about 20 years ago, disregarding the old maxim, "the shoemaker should stick to his last," Botany entered the retail business in various sections of the nation, eventually acquiring some 104 stores.

Now, because of the heavy operating losses incurred in retail operations it has either disposed of these stores, or closed them up entirely. In so doing, it has unloaded a huge amount of fine clothing at distress prices.

Naturally consumers who were able to take advantage of this situation made some very fine buys. But the impact on the economy as a whole is not good, because these sales partially saturated these markets, which will undoubtedly result in depressed sales in these areas for some time.

In the meantime, replacement of the distribution of these products through independent retailers is going to be a major task, as it can be expected that many independent dealers will be reluctant to immediately start stocking brands that have just been subjected to distress sale prices.

Yet, healthy competition in these affected markets will suffer if the good, American made Botany products are not maintained in the market place.

It is to be hoped that for the sake of sound competition in the industry that the fine products of this company, especially as they are American made, stay in the marketplace.

But those in charge of anti-trust should be impelled by this example to closely scrutinize the subject of mergers.

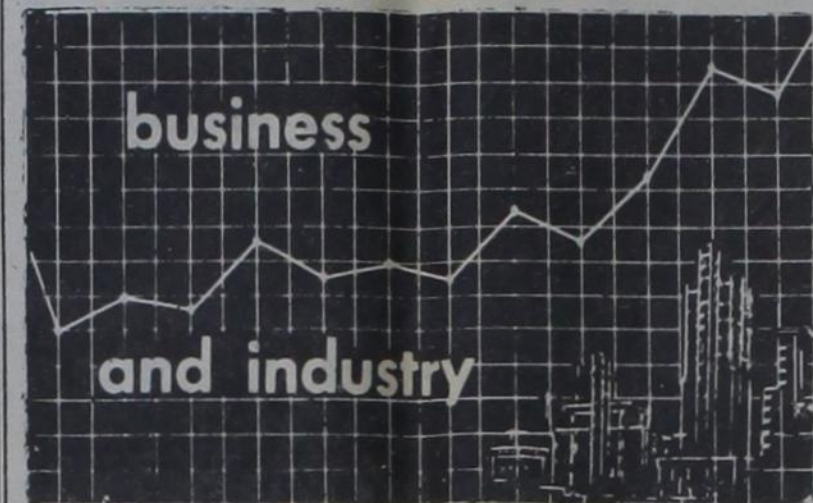
And those who work on taxing policies should more closely scrutinize the detrimental impact of estate taxes which so often force independently owned enterprises to seek out a merger before the death of a principal results in a death tax liability that exceeds the ability of the enterprise to pay.

#### Employers have new tax deadline

A tax deadline that is new to thousands of Texas employers arrives April 30.

FOR AN estimated 72,000 employers who became "covered" employers by act of the last legislature, April 30 is the deadline for filing wage reports with the Texas Employment Commission and paying unemployment taxes for the first quarter of this year.

Employers who are new to coverage have been notified by mail, and have been sent the forms and instructions for making the employers' quarterly report. Some of the quarterly reports received have omitted the wages list containing employee's names and wages. These must be included along with the taxes due.

Employers brought for the first time under coverage of the Texas Unemployment Compensation Act by the legislature are mostly those who have one to four employees.

THOSE employers who became liable for the tax for the first time in 1972—with the exception of the successor in a change of ownership—are assigned an entrance tax rate of 1.0 percent. Within two years, employers become eligible for an experience tax rate which is based on chargebacks to an individual employer's account.

West Texas Press Association, which started the newspaper scholarship in 1956, has three students in college this year. One will graduate this spring.

RULES FOR the scholarship contest have been mailed to high school principals and to newspaper editors or publishers of the West Texas Press Association area town, who will be glad to help with the necessary application details.

Interested applicants must be in the upper 25 percent of their class, must have demonstrated ability in newspaper journalism and a desire for a newspaper career.

The winner will receive \$200 per year (\$100 per semester) for each of the four years in college, providing satisfactory academic requirements are met. Eleven West Texas colleges and universities have been designated for scholarship winners by WTPA. These are Abilene Christian College, Angelo State University, Hardin Simmons University, Howard Payne College, Mid-western University, Sul Ross University, Texas Tech University, University of Texas at El Paso, Texas Christian University, Wayland College and West Texas State University.



Dear Editor:

We lost a grandson in the tragic wreck April 1 in Dimmitt. Our hearts are broken and we are lost without him, but we hold no ill feelings toward anybody.

**THE FIRST** week was a nightmare for us and we will never forget it as long as live. We first thought, "Why couldn't the officers have done something to stop that car?" After thinking about it for several days, we do feel differently about it. The boy who drove the death car just wasn't responsible in his condition. He probably didn't remember going to Tam Anne to get the girl. I think we might have done worse had we been in the officers' place.

We feel the officers were doing what they thought was right, and we don't think they should be blamed for what happened. That boy would probably have driven at that high rate of speed through town had nobody been chasing him.

This doesn't ease the pain so many people are suffering because of losing loved ones in the wreck. We feel that as long as drugs and whiskey are so easy for the young people to get, we will have these things to deal with.

**LET US** look at it this way: God picks His flowers as He needs them. Our little boy is in a far better place than we are, and God doesn't put anyone on us than we can take.

Our prayers go out to each one who lost loved ones in the worst wreck in Castro County's history. We wish to thank our deputy sheriff in Hart for all he did for us in every way. When you need friends, you can count on the good people in Hart.

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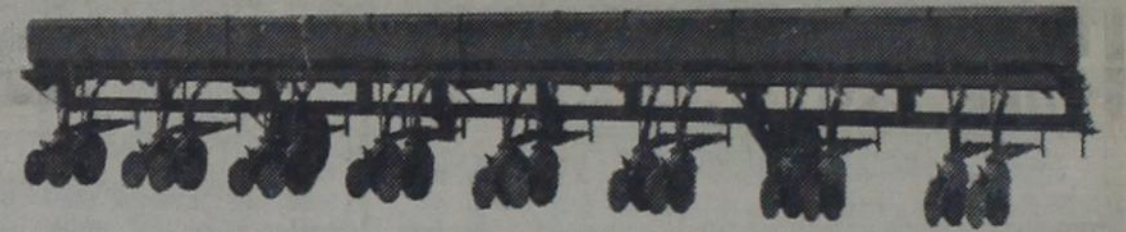

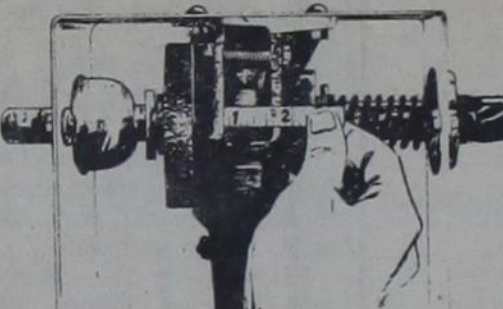

Secretary of Agriculture Butz is more interested in lip service than action. At a time when

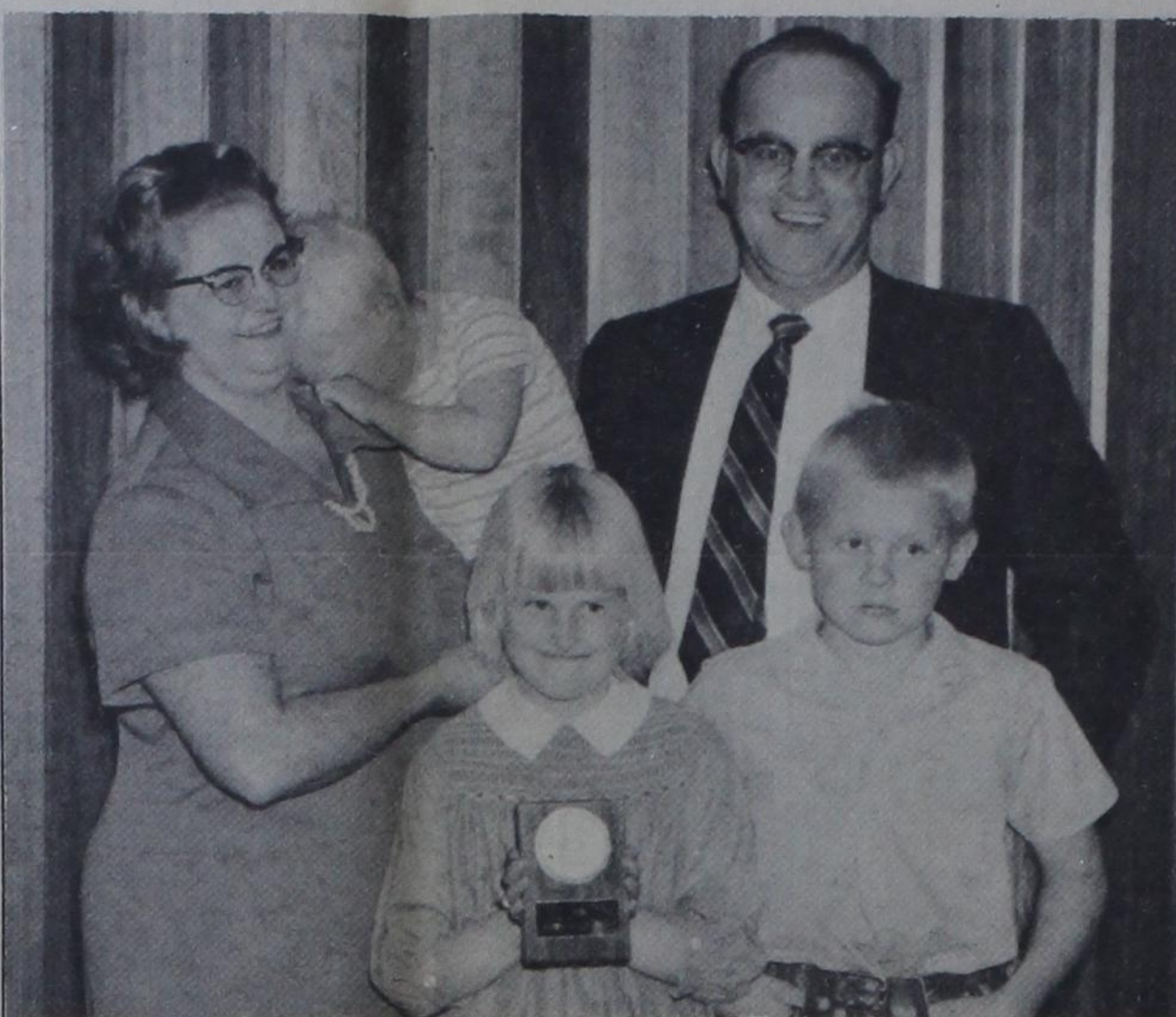

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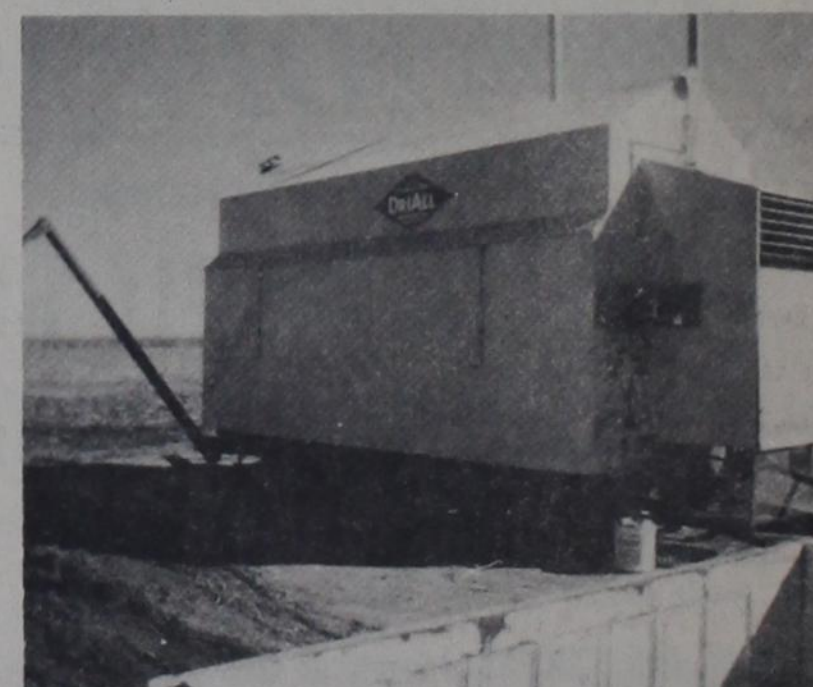
