President Indicates Wage Controls Off in Ten Days

By United Press.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 24. — An indication that removal of wage controls may begin soon because of the sweeping decontrol of foods and other consumer products, came from President Truman today.

Mr. Truman sidestepped all direct comment on the critical question of continuing wage restrictions while the lid is coming off all but the most essential and scarce items entering into the national cost of living.

But, when asked whether wage controls would be lifted by Nov. 1, the president said the answer to that question would be found in the meat decontrol speech he made 10 days ago.

At that time, he called attention to the "close relationship between wages and prices" and said that the removal of wage controls would be accelerated as the price decontrol program gathers speed.

With price controls coming off thousands of items in rapid-fire sequence, the president's oblique comment was interpreted as foreshadowing early government action on wages, perhaps within a week or 10 days.

Cottonseed Steps Loboes to Weatherford Tomorrow; the Price Ladder Team Spirit Good

ABILENE, Oct. 24. — Cottonseed stepped to the top rung of the price ladder Wednesday, bringing about \$90 a ton.

It represented a \$30 increase since removal of OPA ceiling prices last week. Big advance results from dearth of vegetable oils and keen demand for protein feed, supplied by cottonseed.

Oil price has increased from 14½ cents a pound, ceiling price, to 25 cents since OPA control was lifted. Prices shot up immediately.

Market had been very jumpy during the past week. Oil mills and gins operated on a day-to-day basis, all selling "short," taking no chance on a break.

Farmers who get more for seed than the staple, cannot recall when seed price was so high. Sam Martin, Merkel, remembers \$85 a ton seed around World War I.

Meal brought \$90 a ton in Abilene, pellets \$92.50. Some brokers offered cake at \$108 and millers asked \$100 per ton for peanut cake and meal. It compared with \$70 under OPA ceiling and \$66 a ton this time last year.

What effect the steep rise will have on feeding operations could not be predicted. However, most ranchmen, it was understood, were willing to pay.

If frost come late, an immense feed crop might be harvested. Also, an abnormal wheat acreage has been sown and moisture will bring the grain to grazing stage if weather continues warm.

PEN FOR BOWLERS. CHICAGO, Oct. 23. — Men who bowl 279-games or over in sanctioned bowling leagues or women who bowl 232 or over will receive a new Reynolds Pen from the Reynolds Master Bowlers association in Chicago. The pen is the new precision made ball pen that writes under water, in the air, anywhere and writes for years without refilling. This offer is good until January 1st and all bowling alleys in the United States have been notified of the offer.

The Cisco Loboes, back at full strength, will go to Weatherford Friday night to engage the Kangaroos in their third 9-AA conference football game of the season.

The team, trying for its first win in three starts, will be battling to overcome the handicap of a tie and a loss, and to climb in the standings of the district, although they have little chance at the title.

The squad has been going through two weeks of the hardest kind of drill and the spirit of the boys is good.

Broadcast May Interest Owners of Trophy Firearms

Owners of war trophy firearms are invited to listen to the American Broadcasting company's program, Counter-Spy, at 4:30-5:00 p. m., Sunday, Alcohol Tax Unit Investigator William A. Deen announced today.

The script for this broadcast will be entitled "The Case of Souvenir Weapons," and will emphasize the necessity for the registration of such firearms. The story promises to be not only interesting but exciting. Joseph D. Nunan Jr., commissioner of internal revenue, will make appropriate remarks regarding the unit's firearms program.

In addition to certain trophy firearms, Deen pointed out that shotguns and rifles of domestic manufacture having barrels less than 18 inches in length are subject to registration.

Inquiries from this area relative to the registration of firearms should be addressed to Investigator in Charge, Alcohol Tax Unit, P. O. box 5566, Dallas 2, Texas. A representative of the unit will then call to inspect the weapon to determine whether or not it is subject to registration. There is no charge for this service, Deen said.

Father of Van Gardenhire Died Today at Ranch

RANGER, Oct. 24 (U.P.) — Walter Jackson Gardenhire, 75, died today at his home north of Ranger, on route three.

The funeral will be held at Macedonia church at 2 o'clock Saturday afternoon, with burial in the Macedonia cemetery. Officiating ministers will be Rev. K. C. Edmunds and Rev. H. B. Johnson.

Mr. Gardenhire, one of the most prominent and highly esteemed men of the county, had lived in the Macedonia community for 68 years and on the ranch where he passed away for the past 46 years.

Survivors include the wife, one son and four daughters, as follows: Van Gardenhire, Cisco; Mrs. C. J. Samuels, Fort Worth; Mrs. R. L. Justice, Ixey; Mrs. Roy Trower, route three, Ranger; Mrs. R. E. Steele, Ranger; Brown Gardenhire of Ranger is a brother of deceased.

No Ban on Reading Lord's Prayer in Schools

NEW YORK, Oct. 24. — John E. Wade superintendent of New York City schools, told school principals Wednesday "There has never been a ban on the reading of the Lord's Prayer as a passage from the Bible."

A circular letter from Wade to heads of the city's 900 elementary and high schools was made public after Dr. Frederic Ernst, associate superintendent, said he had ordered recital of the Lord's Prayer discontinued in Flushing high school and Brooklyn technical high school in the face of a threatened court suit.

Ernst said Alan Dewitt, a member on the teaching staff of Brooklyn technical high school, "who believes the practice is sectarian and a violation of the state constitution," had threatened the suit.

The ban was protested by the New York City Protestant council. Howard A. Shiebler, secretary to Wade, said Ernst took his action without knowledge of the board of education.

GROWING FIGHT VS. VETO USE

FLUSHING, N. Y., Oct. 24 (U.P.) — Belgium late today joined a growing fight in the United Nations General Assembly against abuse of the big power veto right and appealed for action against Franco-Spain, which it charged was harboring the Belgian traitor, Leon Degrelle.

Fernand Van Langenhove, speaking for Belgium, declared that abuse of the veto power was hampering the work of UN and reducing the prestige of the Security Council.

He joined Mexico in attacking the veto right in the assembly's general debate, after battle lines already had been drawn between Russia, which seeks to keep the veto issue off the assembly agenda, and the United States, which backs fullest possible discussion.

The Belgian delegate said that he would submit at this session a proposal that the assembly call the attention of the Security Council to its interest in a concrete solution of the Spanish problem. This, he said, was all that it was possible to do under present UN charter rules.

Secretary-General Trygve Lie tossed Spain into the general assembly hopper with a demand for action and a plea that "ways and means" be found to restore liberty and democracy to Spain, which he said would remain a constant cause of "mistrust and disagreement" until Gen. Francisco Franco is toppled from power.

ONE DEAD; 18 ILL.

FRANKFURT, Germany, Oct. 24. — One American soldier is dead and 18 are ill, four critically, from drinking "cocktails" of poison alcohol and fruit juice in a prison stockade at Heidelberg, the U. S. 3rd Army announced today.

Thurman Baby Civil Service Examinations For Beef Turkeys Stenos, Typists

Turkey selection and blood testing of turkeys was the order of the day at the Thurman ranch near Staff, October 16, when H. H. "Red" Weatherly, special representative of a feed mill; J. M. Cooper, county agriculture agent, Eastland, an approved flock selector and tester and N. R. Watkins, his assistant, worked Mrs. John Thurman's turkey flock.

Mrs. Thurman who raises baby beef bronze turkeys, has U. S. approved and U. S. certified birds under the national turkey improvement plan. This year she started with 495 poult and raised 400 to maturity.

To meet the requirements of the national improvement plan, the birds were first selected or culled according to the following points: Appearance, conformation, balance, lack of deformities, health, vigor, size, weight and development. A blood sample was then drawn from all birds that were selected. These samples were sent to the turkey laboratory at Stephenville, Texas, to be tested for pullorum. Any reactors were then removed from the selected birds.

Mrs. Thurman is keeping fifty of these selected and tested hens for her own breeding flock for another year. The rest of the selected and tested hens and toms are being sold to other breeders. The culls will be sold for eating purposes when the turkey market opens.

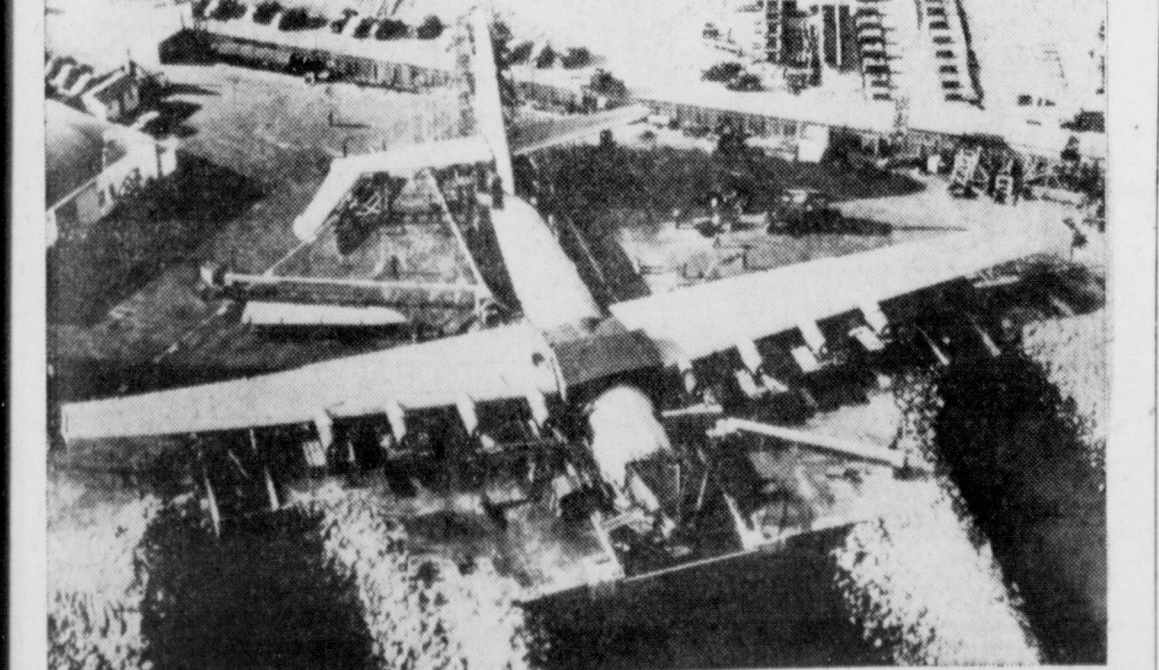
Employment will be in various federal agencies in Texas. The salary for both typists and stenographers is \$1954 per year.

A HERITAGE.

Phrase-makers who refer to Dixie as the Bible Belt have missed an important point. Without ignoring anything, I should like to appraise the whole of America as a Bible Land. This is done humbly, for Americans have sometimes failed to follow the light of truth when that light burned brightly before them.

Despite efforts of some historians to interpret the facts differently, our forefathers developed this nation with religious principles in mind. They read their Bibles. Regardless of how many Americans have forsaken these fundamentals, it remains a nation that has been blessed bountifully by God. Heathenism has been synonymous throughout history for superstition, ignorance, and poverty. The nation today whose citizens recognize God are the very nations which are most sincerely seeking peace.

Our Best Seller

Where in the realm of recorded human experience can you find a land so blessed with liberty and opportunity, as is America? And where in history has there been a land so prosperous, where material blessings fit only for kings of the past may be enjoyed by each man and his neighbor? In 1939 our national income was not merely the highest in the world; it equaled the total incomes of the next six highest nations on earth. Let it be remembered that America's best-seller is still the Bible, a phenomenon which is cause and not effect.

Agriculture wants a prosperous market, with many people eating and living well. This it cannot attain by selfishly looking to itself. It must be more interested in the welfare of other groups.

Wherever we have strayed from God, and from His laws and His formulas, that is exactly the point where we must return. Harmony, prosperity, and peace will surely follow. If we love one another as we love ourselves, we should have no fear about what use might be made of atomic bombs. Neither science, nor so-called "civilization," nor any of the humanisms, offers a sure cure for the world's ills. A return to God and the principles found in the Bible is our only hope that we shall not literally destroy ourselves.

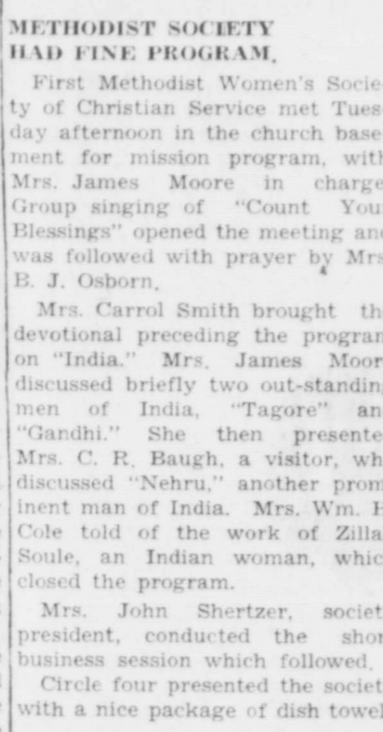

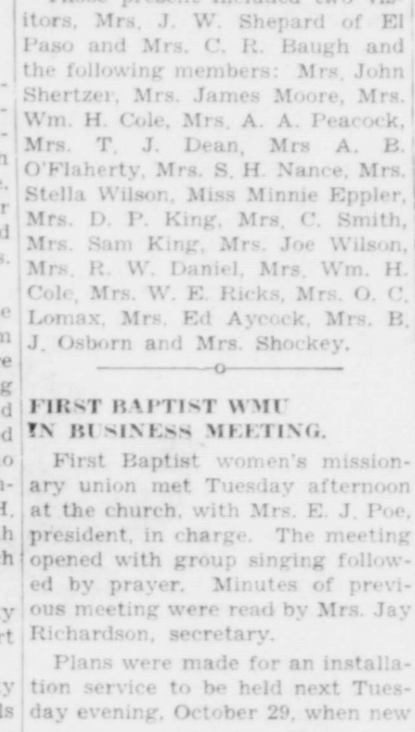

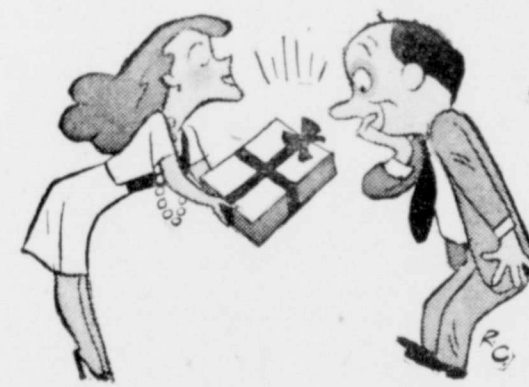
