## Timber to Enter Duty-free to Aid Housing Shortage

By United Press.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 25. — President Truman today ordered suspension of tariffs on timber, lumber and lumber products needed to relieve the housing emergency.

Mr. Truman by proclamation declared an unprecedented housing emergency which authorizes the secretary of the treasury to permit duty-free importation of any articles certified by Housing Expediter Wilson W. Wyatt as "timber, lumber, or lumber products suitable for the construction or completion of housing accommodations."

The suspension will continue until the Veterans' Emergency Housing Act of 1946 expires, or until the president ends the emergency.

## NATION'S STRIKE SITUATION

President Truman's cabinet today discussed briefly the United Mine Workers — AFL — threat of a Nov. 1 work stoppage, and industrial or transport strikes ended in two major Ohio cities.

Cabinet members admitted they did not study the coal situation in detail.

Attorney General Tom Clark said that the justice department is examining the contract between the UMW and the government, which operates the nation's FOT coal mines.

A week-old wildcat strike which had idled 10,000 Goodyear Tire and Rubber Co. employees ended today with the return to work of two employees whose suspension had brought on the walkout at the Akron, O., plant.

Columbus, O., was promised an early return of trolley cars and buses to the streets with the ending of a 25-day strike of CIO Transport Workers Union members.

A ship owners' policy committee met at New York to study an AFL Master, Mates and Pilots Union proposal, designed to end a nationwide shipping tie-up.

## Death Separates Young Soldier and 9-Day Bride

FORT WORTH, Oct. 25. — Death in an overturned automobile today separated a young Fort Worth soldier and his bride only nine days after their marriage.

Pfc. Charles Edwin Faust, 19, an overseas veteran, was killed when his automobile overturned twice on a highway near Temple Thursday afternoon during a heavy rain. His bride, the former Miss Frances Stitt, was injured, but was believed in a not serious condition today in a Temple hospital.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 25. (AP) — The state department said today that the Russian member of the allied control commission for Bulgaria has blocked a U. S. plan to assure a fair election in Sunday's Bulgarian balloting.

## MacArthur Makes Wise Statement About Filipinos

TOKYO, Oct. 25. (AP) — Gen. Douglas MacArthur today blamed reported deterioration of Filipino-American relations in the Philippines on an "understandable feeling of nationalism on the part of Filipinos" as a result of their newly-won independence.

He said reported "irresponsibilities" in the Philippines of a few "homesick" American soldiers could be corrected easily, but that the "fundamental question" of the Filipino's nationalistic feeling was one that would have to be solved by the Filipinos themselves.

In an accompanying statement he said the morale and discipline of occupation forces in Japan "now is of the highest," adding "I could ask for nothing better."

## 23 Nazi Doctors Are Indicted; 250 Others Be Tried

NUERNBERG, Germany, Oct. 25. — Twenty-three Nazi doctors were indicted today on charges that they "murdered hundreds of thousands of human beings" in Germany's war-time program of medical killings and brutal experiments with living prisoners.

A woman, Herta Oberhauser, and Dr. Karl Bandt, one of Hitler's personal physicians, were among the 23, who will be tried next month in the first of a series of war crimes trials by special American military courts.

Brig. Gen. Telford Taylor, chief counsel for the courts, said between 250 and 500 former Nazi military, industrial, financial and governmental leaders would be arraigned during the trials, which are expected to last through 1947.

The doctors were charged on three counts — conspiracy to commit atrocities, participation in war crimes against enemy nationals, participation in crimes against humanity involving German civilians and the nationals of occupied countries.

Ten also are accused of membership in the SS (elite guard) which the international military tribunal declared was a criminal organization.

## Ft. Worth Cattle and Hog Market Steady

FT. WORTH, Oct. 25. — The moderate supply of cattle and calves reaching Fort Worth today's trading cleared at fully steady prices. Low grade and plain quality kinds made up most of the run.

Scattered lots of common to medium slaughter steers and yearlings sold at \$12 to \$17. Good cows were scarce at \$13 up while common and medium cows brought \$9 to \$12 and canners and cutters sold mostly at \$6.50 to \$8.50. Bulls ranged from \$8 to \$13.50.

Good fat slaughter calves drew \$15 to \$16.50 with choice kinds scarce. Common and medium calves cashed at \$10.50 to \$14 and culls at \$8 to \$9.50.

Medium and good stocker calves and yearlings turned at \$14 to \$16 and stocker cows went out at \$8 to \$12.

The hog market was active with butchers fully steady and sows steady to 50 cents higher. Stocker pigs were unchanged. Good and choice butcher hogs weighing 180 pounds and up cashed at mostly \$25, the day's top.

## Bahan Bros. Will Spot Ellenburger Test Near Moran

MORAN, Oct. 25. — Bahan Bros. of Fort Worth will drill No. 1 Mrs. C. A. Gray, in the northeast quarter of University Survey No. 83, for the first Ellenburger test in the immediate vicinity of Moran in Shackelford county.

Only test to go below 4,000 feet near Moran was the Texas Company No. 7 Webb Farm, drilled 25 years ago. It went to 4,182 feet. That was being before Ellenburger production in Shackelford county, as it was then thought the Moran sand, now identified as Strawn sand, at 2,100 feet was the only production possibility for the southeast part of the county area.

RUSSIA GIVES UP. FLUSHING, N. Y., Oct. 25. (AP) — Russia gave up her losing fight today to keep the UN general assembly from debating the Big Five right of veto.

### URBAN GOT PRIZE.

Tut Tabor, Franz Essl, Francis Urban, R. A. Bearman and Howard Lankford went to Breckenridge last night and met a five-man tenpin team at the Rogers alleys in that city. The three-game session was warmly contested, but ended in victory for the Ciscoans. Urban and Lankford made nice single game scores, 222 and 210, respectively. Urban's three-game total was 597, for which he received a nice Eversharp pencil from Manager Rogers. Breckenridge will come to Cisco next Thursday night.

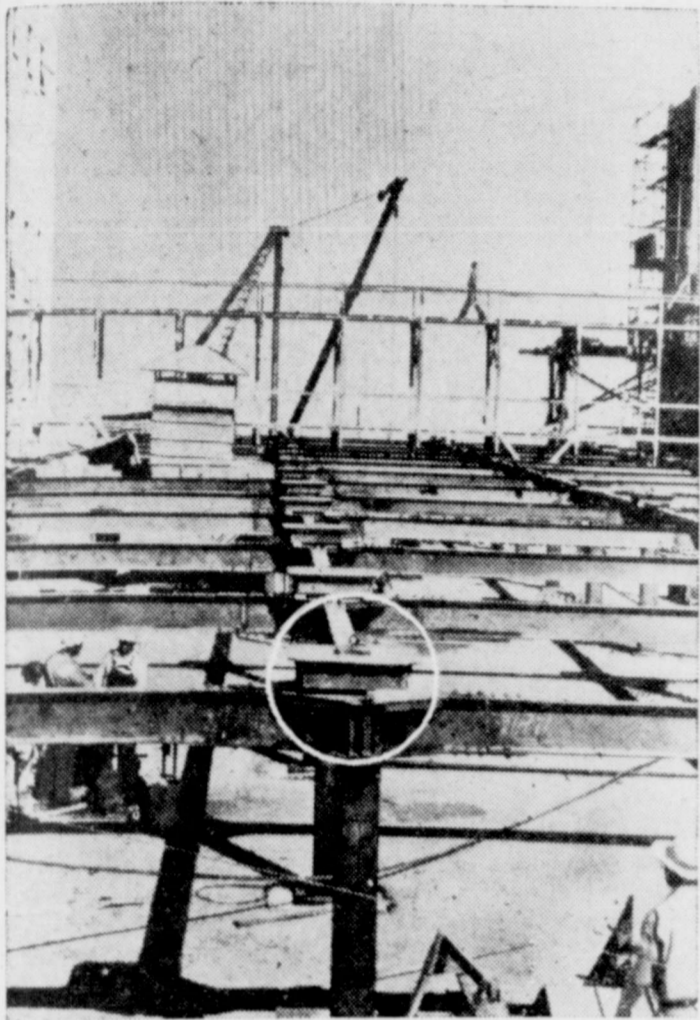
## England Building a Strong Front Against the Reds

LONDON, Oct. 25. — Winston Churchill and Prime Minister Attlee captured Britain's headlines today with almost simultaneous verbal blasts against Russia in what appeared to be shaping up as a solid British front against Communism.

Churchill told his constituents in suburban Loughton last night that he had "facts" and "evidence" to support his suggestion — made in the form of a question before the house of commons Wednesday — that the Soviet union now has 200 divisions — more than 2,000,000 men — on a full war footing in Russian-occupied eastern Europe. He lauded Attlee's speech before the trades union congress at Brighton earlier in the day in which the prime minister bluntly accused Soviet leaders of erecting a "wall of ignorance and suspicion" between the Russian people and the rest of the world.

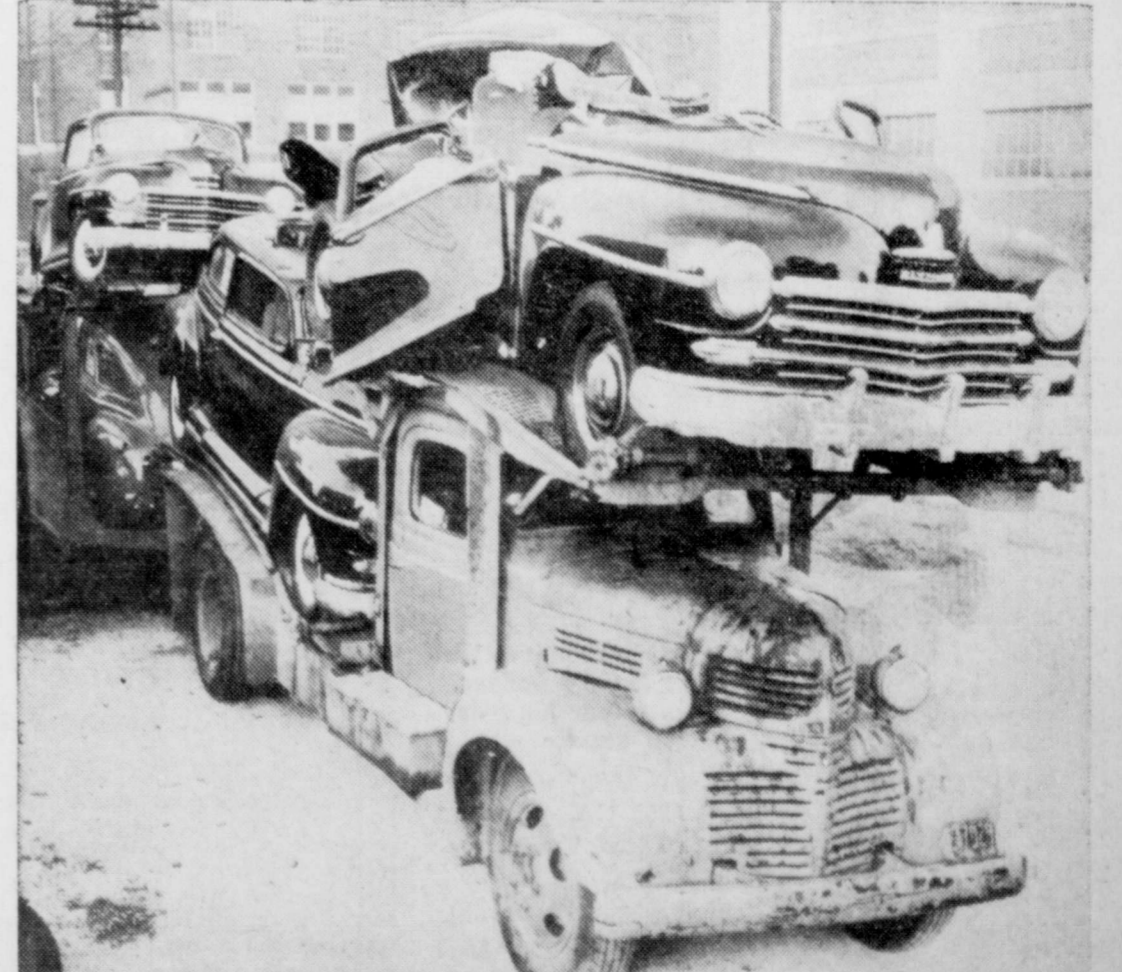
### HUGE DEFICIENCY.

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OVERSEAS BUSINESS.

Aeronautical shows, a auto shows, mercantile fairs and business displays in European countries, so recently disorganized by war, give evidence of those countries' intention to take an active part in world trade.

According to an article in Business Week, France, Holland, Switzerland and Russia are aggressively going after foreign markets for their goods, and are getting the orders. Great Britain is in the forefront of this movement, and on a larger scale than any other country.

Businessmen say that the ten per cent of our manufacturers which we normally exported makes all the difference between operating at a profit and merely breaking even.

The most important thing in the world just now is for the United Nations to remain so.

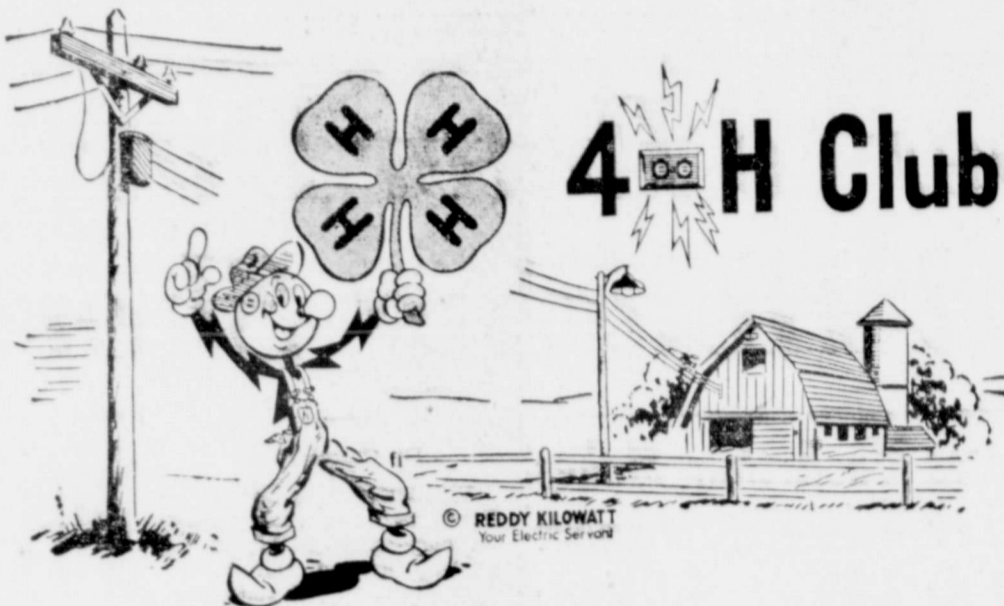

CIO vs. Communism. Reader's Digest for November: Employers and politicians would be well advised to keep out of CIO's current revolt against Communism within its ranks, and to leave it to the labor leaders themselves.

Appraising recent successes of the CIO in ridding its unions of Communists, the article cites the efforts of individual leaders, Philip Murray, national president of CIO, has reduced the power of Harry Bridges, "the special adoration of all CIO Communists" and former CIO regional director of the whole of California.

Behind CIO's purge of its Red members are two related fears: that the minority of Communists may make the entire CIO appear disloyal, and that recognition of this danger may drive CIO memberships into the American Federation of Labor.

The authors emphasize the fact that Communist leadership in CIO is a minority problem. In only eight CIO unions are they firmly entrenched: the Fur Workers, Office Workers, Public Workers, Transport Workers, Longshoremen, Farm Equipment Workers, Food and Tobacco Workers, and the American Communications Association.

**"CANYON PASSAGE" TRIUMPH IN TECHNICAL ACHIEVEMENT.**

One of the most interesting sets ever needed by a motion picture company was built at Universal Studio in Hollywood to represent the town of Jacksonville, Oregon, during the boom days of 1856, just prior to the famous Rogue Indian Rebellion in that year.

The picturesque set, required for "Canyon Passage," a technical film produced by Walter Wanger, was authentic in every detail.

It was used for scenes with Dana Andrews, Brian Donlevy and Susan Hayward, co-stars of the picture which will be shown at the Paface theater, here, Sunday and Monday.

A dozen log barns, stables, corrals and cabins were constructed, complete to the shake roofs and puncheon floors.

Hundreds of lodgepole pines were cut in the Umpqua National Forest of Oregon and transported to the studio for "replanting" in the Hollywood hills, which form a background for the set. Huge ponderosa pines, too large to be logged and hauled from the timber stands of the Northwest, were built from plaster and paper mache by studio technicians and garnished with real bark and moss.

Acres of ground throughout the set were sprinkled with pine needles and the litter from the Oregon forest floor.

"Canyon Passage," directed by Jacques Tourneur and adapted from the widely-read Saturday Evening Post story of the same title by Ernest Haycox, features Patricia Roc, Hoagy Carmichael, Ward Bond, Andy Devine and others in its impressive cast.
