A second major project of emergency facilities for the training of veterans at Cisco Junior college has just been approved by a federal agency, President R. N. Cluck of the college has been informed. The project consists of at least three buildings and all the equipment and furniture necessary to implement them for use, Mr. Cluck said.

Value of the newly approved project will probably be considerably greater than that of the emergency housing units now under construction on the college campus, it was said. This housing project, consisting of 28 apartments in several large buildings, will cost in excess of \$85,000 when completed and furnished. All of this cost is being borne by the Federal Public Housing Authority which awarded the units to the college and is constructing them under the terms of the Lanham bill.

The teaching facilities project, just approved, will provide classrooms, laboratories, machine and automobile and radio shop equipment and a cafeteria together with all furniture and equipment. The project is awarded by the Federal Works Agency through its Bureau of Community Facilities, and the award is based upon a finding of need by representatives of the Department of Education of the federal government.

The award represents a substantial part of the application which the Cisco Junior College, with the aid of the Cisco Chamber of Commerce, made to the FWA, Mr. Cluck explained, and when completed on the college campus it will enable the college to take care of educational needs of twice as many veterans as at present as well as to carry on a more effective educational program generally.

Work to Be Expedited.
Facilities recommended by the U. S. Office of Education is tantamount to their approval by the FWA, Mr. W. H. Sindt, regional administrator for the Federal Works Agency at Fort Worth, indicated in a telephone conversation with Mr. Cluck today. However, Mr. Sindt made plain that at least the agency was doing everything it possibly could to expedite the program and have facilities available for veteran education at the earliest possible time, there is such a vast amount of detail to be done before actual work can be started that it may be the first of the year before construction can actually begin. The agency can not take any steps until the Federal Security Agency, of the U. S. Office of Education, can process the applications and certify a need in each case. Since the program started only late last summer, an almost herculean task has been accomplished by the FWA and the Office of Education in getting it along to the present stage.

However, Mr. Sindt assured, the work will go forward as rapidly as possible and the college should have these facilities available within a reasonable time.

Specifically, the project approved for the Cisco school, includes:

Five classrooms and two science laboratories, with furniture, teaching desks, chairs, commercial department equipment, and complete science lab equipment;

Shop facilities for teaching mental work, automotive and radio mechanics, etc., with all necessary machines and equipment listed as needed by the college;

A cafeteria with all kitchen and dining room equipment, utensils and tableware, to feed 150 persons.

Included in the general classroom equipment were visual teaching aids, such as a 16mm Bell and Howell sound film projector; stereoscopes with slides; 30 standard typewriters; a comptometer; two electric adding machines; biology, physics and chemistry tables; microscopes, and complete equipment for the two science laboratories.

Shop Equipment.
For the shop an electric welding unit and an oxy-acetylene welding unit, several lathes and all that is necessary to equip a shop for teaching metal working and automotive and radio mechanics trades, were approved.

The cafeteria will be completely equipped, from kitchen to front, to take care of the preparation and serving 150 persons per meal.

When this project is completed Cisco Junior college will be able not only to add additional desired subjects and training courses to its curriculum for ex-servicemen, but to accommodate about twice as many veterans and other students as it now is able to do, Mr. Cluck said.

The housing program already under construction and the addition of four buildings which the college now has at Camp Berkeley awaiting removal, will provide accommodations on the campus for many more resident students and thus further expand the service of the school to this area.

Gallup Poll Indicates Heavy GOP Gains on Nov. 5

PRINCETON, N. J., Oct. 30. — Unless political sentiment shifts sharply in the next few days, present Institute survey results point to Republican control of the house of representatives when the votes are counted Nov. 5.

More than 1,000 trained field reporters for the Institute have been querying thousands of people in all parts of the country in a series of polls on how they intend to cast their ballots in the congressional elections.

The results of these continuous polls from early September until the third week of October show that today 44 per cent of those giving evidence of an intention to vote said they would vote Democratic, while 56 per cent said they would vote Republican.

The shift in voting sentiment in congressional elections from 1944 to today amounts to eight percentage points throughout the entire country — a drop from 52 per cent from Democrats in 1944 to 44 per cent today.

The Institute will of course continue its constant polling throughout the nation to chart any further shifts in sentiment between now and election day.

Rice First Texan to Head Masonic Knights Since 1901

HOUSTON, Oct. 30. — Knights Templar of the United States have financed the education of 40,000 college students, the grand encampment in session here was informed yesterday.

It is anticipated that the Knights, through their educational foundation, will greatly increase their activity in making loans to students during the next triennium, the national committee reported to the conclave in its second business session of the week-long encampment which is being attended by Knights Templar from every state in the union.

During the twenty-four years the Knights have sponsored an educational foundation more than \$8,000,000 has been loaned students who agree to complete a minimum of four years of college work.

The loans are repaid, if possible, and the foundation has lost only 1.55 per cent of its loans in the nearly quarter century.

Selection of students is allocated to each state grand commandery. No preference is given applicants for loans with Templar or Masonic antecedents and there are no restrictions as to race, color or creed.

The foundation started with a fund of \$1,000,000. It now exceeds \$5,000,000. Adrian Hamersley, grand recorder of the grand encampment reported.

The forty-third triennial conclave reached the height of its pageantry Tuesday night when the 8,000 Knights, in full uniform, paraded Houston streets in a formation which was augmented by the marching of twenty colorfully uniformed drill teams and eighteen Templar bands.

The parade required nearly two hours to pass the reviewing stand, from which Charles N. Orr of St. Paul, Minn., eminent grand commander.

The triennial election of grand encampment officers will be held today. John Temple Rice of El Paso, present deputy grand commander, will be elevated to grand commander. He will be the first Texan since 1901 to hold the highest office in the organization, which is the highest order in York Rite Masonry.

SPANISH ISSUE MONDAY.

WORLD FLIGHT POSTPONED.
WASHINGTON, Oct. 30. (U.P.) — Some state department officials fear that a proposed around-the-world flight of B-29 bombers might increase tension between the United States and Russia and have succeeded in getting the flight postponed indefinitely, it was learned today.

AIR PILOTS REFUSE.
WASHINGTON, Oct. 30. (U.P.) — Striking Transcontinental & Western Pilots today rejected a government proposal that they return to work pending settlement of their dispute by negotiation and arbitration. TWA had approved the plan.

TO FILE STRIKE NOTICE.
DETROIT, Oct. 30. (U.P.) — The CIO United Auto Workers Union said today it would file 30-day strike notice against the Ford Motor Company in connection with a dispute at the firms giant River Rouge plant.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 30. (U.P.) — President Truman today was urged by an Alabama delegation to have the Agriculture Department step into the cotton market to prevent a further price collapse.

Rep. John J. Sparkman, D. Ala., warned Mr. Truman that the economy of the South was "threatened by the collapse of the cotton market."

He said Mr. Truman authorized him to state that the president was keeping up with the situation, conferring with government officials and working to do whatever possible in stabilizing the cotton market.

The Alabama delegation's appeal for government action to halt the cotton market decline came as cotton exchanges at New York, Chicago, New Orleans, Dallas and Houston suspended trading for the day on the heels of another \$10 a bale drop in prices yesterday.

In New York, Frank J. Kneil, president of the New York cotton exchange, said the exchange's board of managers was meeting this afternoon to decide when the market will re-open for trading.

Body of Jerome McCarty Found Near City Today

The body of Jerome Wishert McCarty, 32, married and a former member of the U. S. army, was found about 7 o'clock this morning, just off the Eastland highway and about a half mile outside the city limits. Chief of Police Perdue and Officer Wayne Parsons found the body.

According to Henry Stubblefield, justice of the peace, deceased came to his death by the accidental discharge of a pistol.

However, members of the family, it is stated, are not satisfied that the young man was accidentally killed and his death will be looked into thoroughly.

The bullet entered the inside of the left leg and ranged upward. The body is at the Thomas funeral home, but no arrangements will be made for the funeral until word comes from a brother, Master Sgt. Ted McCarty of the U. S. Marines, who is now in Pennsylvania. Burial will be in Oakwood cemetery, Cisco.

Deceased, who lived at 1702 E. avenue, was born July 23, at Comanche, Texas. Survivors besides the wife are his father, Jerome McCarty, Cisco, and the brother, Ted McCarty, Pennsylvania.

The display will consist of rockets, aerial bombs, spray bombs and so forth. It will be presented a few minutes before eight o'clock when the game begins.

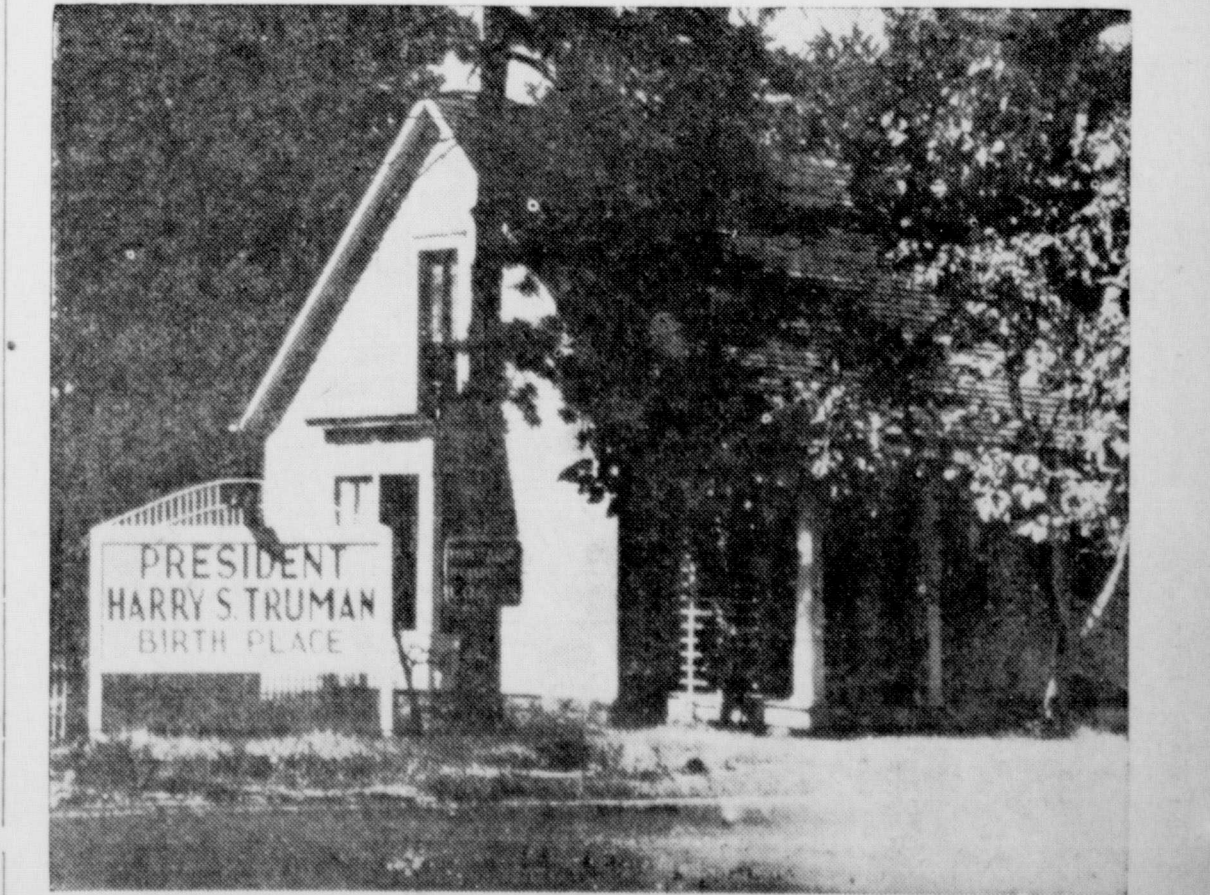

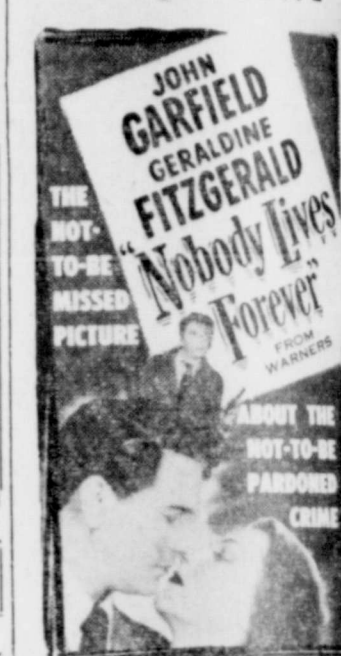

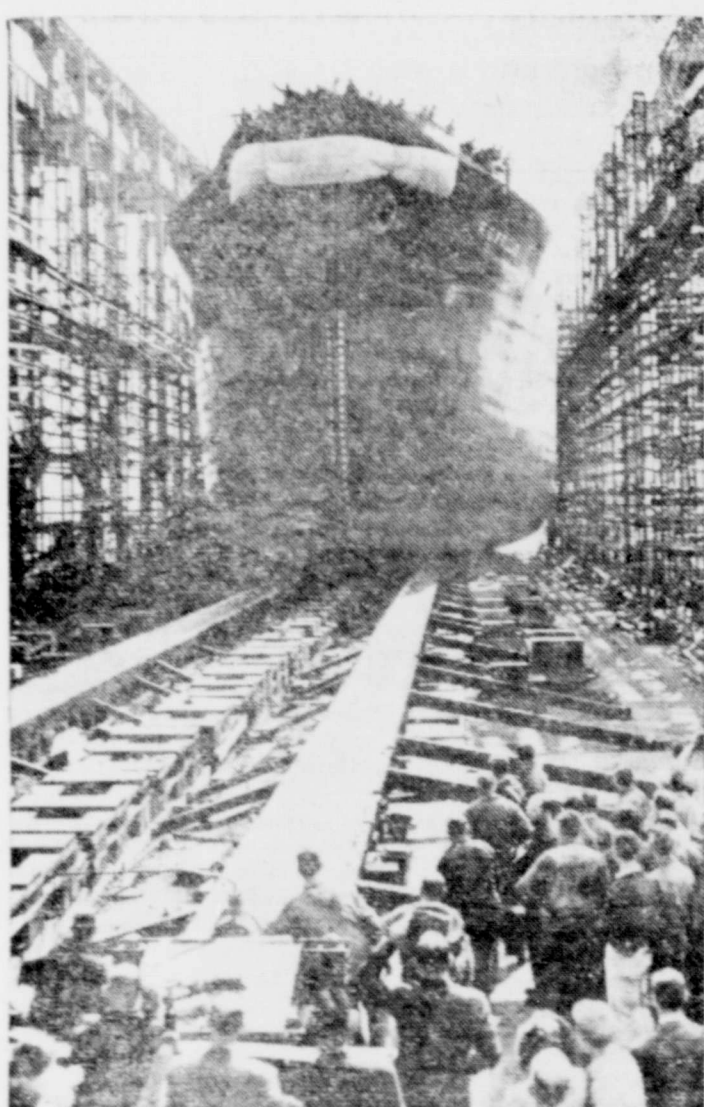

Man Won't Fly to Moon or Invade Any Other Planet

FRANKFORT, Ky., Oct. 30. — Otis White, Morgantown editor and long-time public official, has stirred up a controversy in his weekly newspaper, the Green River Republican, over stories to the effect that there will be rocket flying to the moon.

White simply says, "It isn't so," taking his cue from his Bible, which he claims limits man's dominion to the earth. His argument in a fashion might seem to be kindling fresh the dying embers of the Dayton, Tenn., "monkey trial" in 1925 in which Clarence Darrow and William Jennings Bryan clashed in the courtroom over "moderism" and "fundamentalist" doctrine.

Like Bryan, White accepts the Biblical version in support of his position.

"The writer remembers to have read in the Bible about a group of men in the older days who said: 'Let us build a tower and a city. These people wished to climb up above the earth and penetrate into the heights.'" White wrote in his weekly publication.

"But God made man. He gave him dominion over the earth. He did not give him dominion over the moon and the heavens.

"Man is not going to fly to the moon or invade any other planets. He is going to stay down here where he belongs. He will probably keep on messing up this planet."

"If man went to Mars like he is now, a corrupt, miserable sinner, and there were any good creatures on Mars he would probably corrupt them. The writer would hate to think of the heavenly planets as chaotic and bloody as the hell we call the earth."

White is a former state senator and representative in the general assembly from Butler county; has held numerous public offices locally and attends the Baptist church regularly. He was Republican nominee for representative in congress in the 1944 election in the Second district.

When White's term expired as a public official last January he bought the Green River Republican and through it expresses his views.

HAD NARROW ESCAPE.


