1,642 Local OPA Price Boards to Close Nov. 4

15 4-H Clubs Totaling 350 Boys Organize for '47

Fifteen 4-H clubs have been organized in Eastland county for 1947, with an enrollment of 350 boys, says N. R. Watkins, assistant county agricultural agent. All boys enrolled in 4-H club work will carry on one or more demonstrations or projects, with one or more of the following livestock and crops: Poultry, swine, sheep, goats, dairy cattle, beef cattle, any field crop and gardens. Requirements are that each club member own and care for his project and keep accurate records of his work under the supervision of his parents, his local leader and the county agricultural agent.

Clubs organized are Eastland high school and Eastland junior high, Eastland; Olden school, Olden; Hodges Oak Park and Young School, Ranger; Morton Valley school, Morton Valley; Carbon high school and Carbon grammar school, Carbon; Gorman school, Gorman; Desdemona high school and Desdemona grammar school, Desdemona; Pioneer school, Pioneer; Rising Star Grammar school, Rising Star; Scranton high school and Scranton grammar school, Scranton.

Rotary Governor Was Guest of the Cisco Club Today

Cisco Rotarians were hosts today to District Governor Aubrey Stephenson who, incidentally, is professor of government and assistant dean at Hardin-Simmons University, Abilene.

Mr. Stephenson's visit here was primarily to advise and assist

President Bill Hogue and Secretary Lonnie Shockley and other officers on matters pertaining to club administration and Rotary service activities.

He is one of the 157 district governors of Rotary International who are supervising the activities of some 5,800 Rotary clubs, with more than a quarter of a million members in 73 counties and geographical regions throughout the world.

The governor found the local club in good shape generally and was particularly impressed with its attendance record. There have been five 100 percent meetings this month.

Governor Stephenson made a report of the recent Atlantic City convention and his talk to the club was impressive and well received. His general theme was "The World's Problems and Their Solution." He stated that strict adherence to the principles of Rotary would solve most of today's serious problems.

British Embassy in Rome Partially Wrecked by Bomb

ROME, Oct. 31. — A thundering bomb explosion shook the city, wrecked an entire wing of the British embassy early today and wounded an Italian passerby, perhaps mortally. Police and embassy officials confessed themselves without a clue as to the identity of the perpetrators.

A gaping hole reaching back for a depth of two rooms was torn into the building by the blast, resulting from two suitcases full of explosives detonated by clockwork.

The heavy masonry of the block-long, three-story structure was cracked so deeply that police said part of it might have to be pulled down.

Italian investigators said they could not even think of a reason why anyone in Italy should want to bomb the British, for sustained criticism of British policies has been lacking in Italy since the war ended. Ward and Michael Stewart, British press attaches, said they also were mystified by the bombing.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 31. — The OPA announced today that 1,642 local price boards will be closed Nov. 4.

The agency said supervision of rent controls will continue through the 650 OPA area rent offices.

Sugar rationing already is being administered by the 61 district OPA offices. Administration of other items which remain under ceilings will be carried on by the district offices.

Today's action affects 8,613 paid employees, who are being given 30-day dismissal notices.

The action also will mean the end of volunteer work for 33,556 board members who have served without pay and 10,177 other volunteers.

OPA's decision to close local boards was based on an investigation by its personnel branch.

With rapid decontrol in all areas but rent, OPA said, it was decided the local offices were no longer needed.

OPA said that trade and consumer inquiries about price control should be addressed to OPA district offices.

Compliance actions pending before boards will be transferred to district offices.

Certificates of transfer covering sales of used passenger cars can be obtained from principal auto dealers, instead of local boards.

Shoes Going Up

BOSTON, Oct. 31. (U.P.) — Shoe prices may double within the next few days as result of the removal of ceilings from shoes, leathers and hides, dealers and manufacturers predicted today.

Pussyfooting Enforcement Officers Are Rapped

AUSTIN, Oct. 31. — Law enforcement officers should demand a more stringent code of criminal procedure in Texas at the next session of the state legislature, Judge Lloyd Davidson of the court of criminal appeals told the officers here yesterday afternoon.

Judge Davidson addressed the regional conference of enforcement officers sponsored by the FBI and the State Public Safety department.

"I am sick and tired of the rampant doctrine that the only way to punish a criminal is to rehabilitate him," Judge Davidson said. "There are two-and-three-time offenders walking the streets of Texas cities today who do not know what it is to pay for violating the law."

DOUGLAS HOPEFUL

WASHINGTON, Oct. 31. (U.P.) — Chairman Frank P. Douglass of the National Mediation Board said today he was "hopeful of an early settlement" in the 11-day old strike of Transcontinental & Western Air Pilots.

JERUSALEM, Oct. 31. — Ugly talk about an Arab uprising spread through Jerusalem's streets today in the wake of two major attacks attributed by police to Jewish extremists in which four British soldiers were killed and at least 12 Britons and six Arabs wounded yesterday.

Men of Many Nations Bare Displeasure at UN

UNITED NATIONS HALL, FLUSHING MEADOWS, N. Y., Oct. 31. (U.P.) — South Africa today delivered a veiled threat that she and others might walk out of UN if the general assembly decided to consider the "purely domestic" matter of the treatment of Indians in South Africa.

Field Marshal Jan Christian Smuts startled delegates with his vigorous opposition to UN action on the issue raised by India as the general assembly began debate of its agenda.

Ukraine Foreign Minister Dimitri Manuilsky wound up the assembly's debate on Secretary General Trygve Lie's report with a bitter denunciation of "reactionary" warmongers and a general restatement of the Soviet policy expressed by Russian Minister Molotov on Tuesday.

The steering committee cleared the way for assembly action on both the disarmament and Spanish questions.

COTTON FUTURES UP

NEW YORK, Oct. 31. (U.P.) — Mounting pressure for government action to bolster cotton prices brought a sharp rise in futures today after the market weathered a storm of liquidation in early trading.

BROWNWOOD, Oct. 31. — Dr. J. A. Abney will celebrate his 100th birthday Nov. 6 and several Texas leaders have indicated they will attend the open house planned in celebration.

Abney, a native of Mississippi, has been a Texas resident since he was 7 years old. He has been a soldier and physician and established the Citizens National bank here fifty years ago. He is a Confederate veteran.

SIXTY CENTS OR BUST

WASHINGTON, Oct. 31. — A cry of "60-cent sirlin or bust" went up today from leaders of 12 civic organizations claiming 260,000 members. They set up 33 stations in shopping centers, where they will try to sign consumers to a pledge: No meat purchases for more than 60 cents a pound.

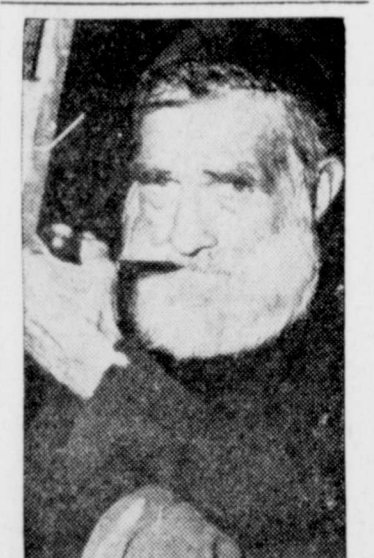

PRICE CONTROL AND CHAOS.

In an article on price control, in Newsweek, Henry Hazlitt writes: "The government cannot monkey with the price mechanism... without courting disaster. Only one thing will do now... the definite termination of all price control..."

Between price controls and priorities, production has been thrown into more chaos than we have ever seen in peace times. The meat fiasco, regardless of what is done by the government in the future, brought the whole subject of continued price control to a head...

The complete abandonment of price control would naturally result in a period of more or less difficult readjustment. There would be temporary dislocations, hardships and confusion. But they would be nothing compared to the enormous troubles that lie ahead if price control is continued.

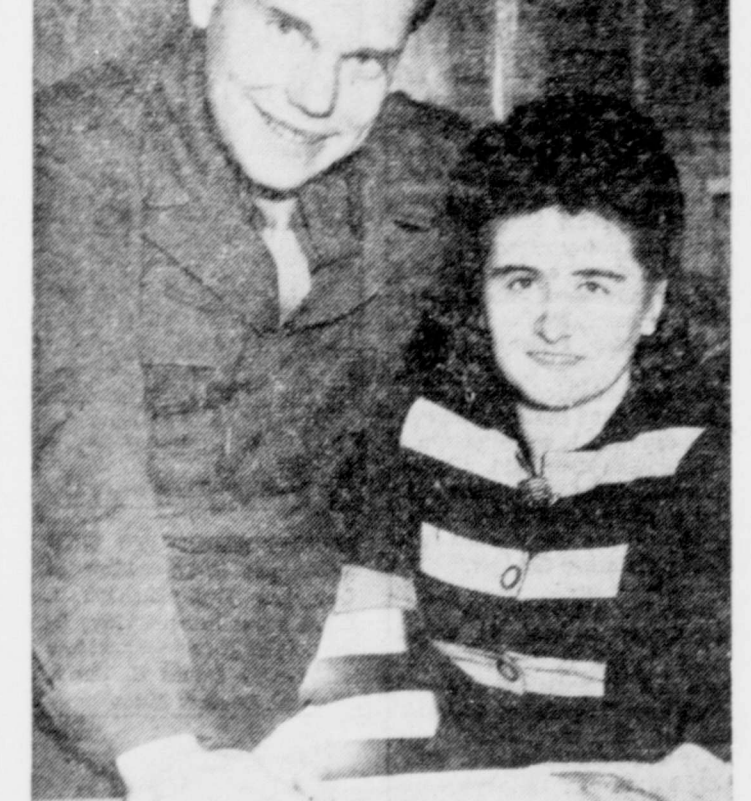

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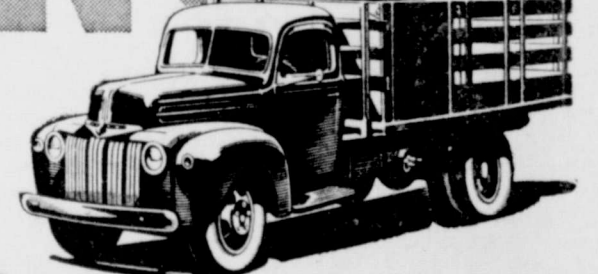
